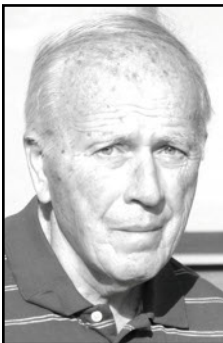
Is county government the answer?

Mosaics needs a permanent home

I would assume that many reading this series of articles have no direct contact with the Hamilton County Mosaics School. Maybe an indirect contact. Currently, there are less than 40 kids in the school for special needs children.

But, think about it this way. You have a son or daughter who is enrolled in the public school system at Noblesville, or at Sheridan or Heights, or at Westfield and you wake up



in the morning and learn that your child will be attending a school housed at different locations throughout Hamilton County.

That might happen if a plan presented last week by Mosaics director Steven Wornhoff is approved. I don't want to paint Wornhoff as a "bad guy." From what I've been told, he is an excellent school director. In Part 2 of this series, Hamilton Heights Superintendent Derek Arrowood labeled Wornhoff's plan "a last ditch effort" to save Mosaics.

It may well be just that. Very soon, Mosaics will lose its home in Noblesville Schools. As we recently learned, the Noblesville Armory, purchased by Noblesville Schools, is no longer an option for Mosaics' new home.

Nobody wants to see Mosaics in the position it is. These are good people, the superintendents here in northern Hamilton County. No one wants to see Mosaics without a home; a good home. And, nobody is giving up. Noblesville Superintendent Dr. Libbie Conner this past week was out still searching for a suitable location for Mosaics.

However, facing facts, Wornhoff's solution might be "last ditch." That, to me, is unacceptable in Hamilton County. We have 63 schools in Hamilton County. Beautiful schools. Well equipped schools. These public school kids are not being shuffled from one school district to another, which, basically, is the plan Wornhoff has put on the table.

Not only would Wornhoff's plan shuffle students from this school to that school, it also would shuffle the staff. This is a great staff, I've been told, but how can any staff operate in a school which is housed in three or four different communities?

What Mosaics needs is a home of its own. This should be a challenge not only for the school districts involved, but a challenge which should be faced by all of Hamilton County. Our tax money has been used and is being used to provide the finest buildings, teachers and facilities money can buy. Some way, some how, some of that money needs to be spent on the Mosaics kids.



The future of Sheridan's Biddle Park

In 1970 Ken Biddle donated approximately 20 acres to the Town of Sheridan that is now known as Biddle Park.

The park has served the Sheridan community as a gathering location for many community activities including Sheridan's youth league baseball and softball programs, the July 4th festival, a horseshoe league, a tennis park and Harvest Moon Festival.

The 20 acres of real estate that comprises Biddle Park is owned by Sheridan; however, unlike most city and county owned parks, Biddle Park is currently not maintained by its owner.

Maintenance and daily operations of the park has for many years been funded by the Biddle Memorial Foundation.

In a recent community meeting, titled Renew Sheridan, town council member Si DeVaney stated, "They (referring to Biddle Memorial Foundation) do not want to run the day to day activities of the park."

The Biddle Memorial Foundation spends approximately \$35,000 per year maintaining the park, in addition to capital improvements.

Last fall Brian and Roger Myers, grandsons of Ken Biddle and members of the Biddle Memorial Foundation, approached Hamilton County officials about taking over maintenance and operation of the park.

Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger responded "We are not necessarily opposed to the idea of maintaining the park; however, we are not in the business of taking care of parks that are not county owned." Dillinger said county commissioners requested Myers discuss with Sheridan the possibility of signing over ownership of the property which has an assessed valuation of \$808,500 to the county.

Now, Sheridan officials have confirmed the town is in discussion with Biddle's grandsons regarding Sheridan taking over park operations.

Sheridan Town Council Vice President Steve Fisher indicated he and DeVaney met with Brian and Roger Myers about the town taking over operations. "Roger Myers is putting together hard numbers for review," stated Fisher.

"We may need to create a Park Department," said DeVaney.

A spokesperson for the City of Noblesville confirmed property surrounding Biddle Park is part of a recent Brownfield assessment.

The EPA defines Brownfield as real property, the expansion, redevelopment, or reuse that may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of hazardous substance, pollutant or contaminant.

Noblesville facilitates the Brownfield program for several Hamilton County communities.

Sheridan Town Councilman Glen Bougher stated, "The council has made mention of expansion of Biddle Park. The property west of the park and the Monon Trail is owned by Sheridan." Bougher indicated he believes portions of nearby properties, several years ago, served as the site of an oil company and glass factory and sits within the Brownfield area.

Biddle Park is located at the intersection of State Road 47 and State Road 38 on Sheridan's east end. The Monon Trail runs adjacent to the park.

Recent focus groups involved with Renew Sheridan have indicated the need for gateways. The same groups have also discussed amenities located in Sheridan that might tap a noticeably increased number of people traveling through town.

"Coming from the east the park is the first thing you see when entering Sheridan. Coming from the west it is the last thing you see when leaving Sheridan," said a local resident that attended Thursday's Renew Sheridan meeting. "We need to take advantage of the park and blend it into our gateway plan."

Another resident pointed out how completion of the Monon Trail will connect Sheridan to the nearly 1.5 million visitors each year expected to visit nearby Grand Park.

Don't misunderstand, I totally support the county's help in providing a battered women's center. I'm just asking, what would be the difference in helping find a home for Mosaics?

The Commissioners have agreed to tackle the battered women home problem. They've kicked around giving that group county owned land near the jail or near the County Health Center on the east side of the city. They also are looking at purchasing land on Field Drive.

With not many "last ditch" options available, it might be a good idea for the Mosaics people come Monday morning to knock on the Commissioners' doors.

It's time for Mosaics to have its own permanent home. In an area as affluent as Hamilton County, having this problem is embarrassing for us all.

Crash on Olio Road sends runner to the hospital

Shortly after 6:00 Saturday, Fishers police officers and emergency personnel from the Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Services responded to a motor vehicle crash involving a pedestrian.

This crash occurred in the 11700 block of Olio Road as many pedestrians were preparing to participate in the annual running of the Geist Mini Marathon. Information at this time suggests a 2012 Thomas School Bus was attempting to turn northbound onto Olio Road from an entrance/exit to a shopping center located just north of 116th Street. According to witnesses and evidence at the scene the pedestrian was running northbound in the crosswalk when she was struck by the bus.

Initially, the pedestrian was transported to IU Saxony Hospital and later to Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis. At this time the pedestrian is listed in critical condition.

The Fishers Police Department's Crash Reconstruction Team responded to collect evidence and investigate the crash. At this time it does not appear that drugs or alcohol were a factor.

The driver of the bus is David McCollum, 69, of Indianapolis. The pedestrian is Erin Harris, 34, of Fishers.

Standoff with Noblesville teenager ends peacefully

On May 16 at approximately 9:54 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the 800 block of Watermead Drive (Noblesville) in reference to a report of a disturbance between a mother and her juvenile son. A short time later, officers arrived on the scene and located the complainant.

Officers on the scene were advised that a 16-year-old juvenile had allegedly barricaded himself in an apartment and was refusing to come out. Officer made several attempts to contact the juvenile by telephone but the juvenile initially refused to exit the apartment. At approximately 10:13 p.m., the Noblesville/Westfield Emergency Services Unit was dispatched to the scene in order to provide additional assistance.

At approximately 11:37 p.m., repeated attempts of communication with the subject proved successful and the juvenile surrendered to police without incident.

The juvenile was transported to the Hamilton County Juvenile Detention Facility. Information regarding potential charges will be available through the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office.

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Dollars awarded for fix up home projects

The Noblesville Preservation Alliance is awarding grants for historic home projects in the amount of \$500.00 seed grants and \$1000.00 matching grants with an application deadline of May 30, 2014. That could buy a lot of paint and materials and the criteria is simple. The home must be 50 years old or older, you must own the home, be current on taxes and be within the Noblesville city limits. The money can be used for masonry repair, repair of the building facade (front, rear, or sides), cleaning of the a building exterior, exterior painting, repair, replacement or addition of architecturally appropriate cornices, entrances, doors, windows, decorative detail, porches and more. Other repairs on outbuildings or concrete, provided the repairs are permanent and contribute to the overall preservation of the property's historic character.

The deadline for the grant applications has been extended to May 30th. The award is offered on a annual basis with the mission to promote the preservation of historic neighborhoods and resources in order to enhance the quality of life in Noblesville. The Homeowner Facade Grant Program is designed to support Noblesville homeowner in the thoughtful restoration of historic residential properties. The money can be used for exterior improvements only. NPA has awarded \$11,000 in grant funding to date. Most grants are distributed as matching funds with NPA contributing 50 percent of the total project cost up to \$1000. For homeowners whose projects cost above \$10,000, contact NPA to learn about possibilities for additional grant funding. The smaller seed grant of \$500 does not require a match. Applicants should submit projects that contribute to the preservation of the overall historical and architectural character of the property. To apply download the 2014 Homeowner Facade Grant Application Packet at the web site www.noblesvillepreservation.com/Homeowner_Facade_Grants. But hurry! You can also become a member to help support the efforts of preserving the culture, community and historic assets of Noblesville at the web site.

For over 20 years, NPA has brought attention to the wonderful details of the historic fabric of the community. The Annual Home Tour, offering assistance in many ways, watching and voicing decisions make by government at all levels, awareness, heritage, economic, social and aesthetic benefits of preservation, promotion of the downtown, helping to save endangered homes and structures and placing qualified buildings and neighborhoods on the National Register of Historic Places.

There are many misconceptions about National Register listings. A listing does NOT prevent a private owner from altering the property or restrict the use or sale of the property. What is does do is give the property prestige and publicity to the property. It provides protection for the property from federally funded projects and permits the use of investment tax credit for certified rehabilitations and allows the owner to apply for federal grants-in-aid. Noblesville has an impressive list of National Register sites. The Noblesville Commercial Historic District bounded by Clinton, 10th , Maple and 8th streets along with the Catherine Street Historic District, Cole-Evans House, Conner Street Historic, William Houston Craig House, Daniel Craycraft House, Hamilton County Courthouse Square, Dr. Samuel Harrell House, and the Holliday Hydroelectric Powerhouse and Dam are impressive sites.

The dedication to the historic value of Noblesville by the Noblesville Preservation Alliance and its all volunteer crew cannot be measured. When the historic awards fall upon Noblesville, everyone steps up to take the credit for their leadership, but it's the NPA who did the work to make it happen. No question and credit should go no further. With little notice or high fives, NPA has done more for the old town preservation of the community than any other and continues each day to make improvements. The volunteers work hard and raise money to help others improve their property, provide opportunity for thousands of people to visit Noblesville for the Annual Home Tour and Christmas tour, and be the voice for preservation. Thank you NPA, Noblesville would be very different today without your success and dedication to the historic structures that have been passed down by the people who built them, cared for them and hoped to save them for future generations.

Tigers finish second, HSE fourth at HCC girls tennis meet

It was a wacky Hoosier Crossroads Conference girls tennis meet over the week-end, but all four Hamilton County teams that participated had something to be happy about after all the matches were finished.

Fishers was the highest-placing county team, taking second plus an individual championship. Hamilton Southeastern was a strong fourth and had four all-conference players (two singles and one doubles team). Noblesville finished fifth thanks to some strong performances, while Westfield tied for sixth and has a bright future thanks to its young No. 1 singles player.

The Tigers scored 39 points, behind Zionsville's 43. The No. 16-ranked Eagles finished in the top four in all five flights, winning the No. 1 singles position. Fishers got No. 24-ranked Harrison by one point in the team standings; this was despite the Raiders winning three flights.

Caitlin Gardner led the way for the Tigers, dropping just seven games en route to the championship at No. 2 singles.

"I really came prepared today," said Gardner. "I knew this was coming from day one and I worked since last year."

Gardner has a goal going on to the court: To come off the court a better player.

"I figure if you do that, you're preparing to the best that you can," she said.

As the No. 2 singles champion, Gardner earned All-Conference honors. Other Tigers getting that reward were No. 1 singles Jessica Lorenz and No. 3 singles Megan Moriarty, both of whom finished second in their respective flights.

"We're showing improvement," said Fishers coach Dave Heffern. "Miss Gardner here played a very nice tournament today and got herself a championship. "We're getting better as a team. Still got a lot of things to work on. Not much time left (before sectionals), but I can see the improvement."

The No. 21-ranked Royals were not far out of the running, as they scored 37 points. No. 2 singles Megan Warren was the runner-up to Gardner, with the No. 1 doubles team of Andrea Updike and Kelsey Cahlamer placing third (after being seeded seventh at the start of the tournament).

"That was a really good result for them," said HSE coach Kirk Webber. "I knew they were getting better every match. I knew if they kept working they'd have a really good day today, and they did."

Kelsey Hay finished fourth at No. 1 singles; she joined Warren, Updike and Cahlamer in the All-Conference circle.

"Megan had a really good finish," said Webber.

The Millers were led by their No. 2 doubles team of Sydney Thomas and Olivia Goad, which upset the top seed in the quarter-finals. Thomas and Goad, seeded eighth, then went on to finish second in the flight, giving them All-Conference honors.

"Two doubles did a really good job of achieving a little more than expected of them," said NHS coach Tim Samons. "They've improved as the year's gone on."

Jenna Gerhardt, who placed fifth at No. 1 singles, earned All-Conference honors as well.

"Jenna did another great job playing 1 singles," said Samons.

Westfield's freshman No. 1 singles player, Laura Moore, finished third in that flight, giving her an All-Conference award as well.

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Carpenter tops Day 1 qualifying for 500

Ed Carpenter turned the fastest four-lap average speed in Round 1 of qualifications for the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race, but he'll have to make another run May 18 to capture the Verizon P1 Award in the Fast Nine Shootout.

The Verizon IndyCar Series team owner/driver of the No. 20 Fuzzy's Vodka/Ed Carpenter Racing Chevrolet recorded a four-lap average of 230.661 mph to lead the 10 entries that surpassed 230 mph -- the first qualifiers above 230 mph since 2003 -- during the qualifications format revamped for 2014 to emphasize two days of competition.

Round 1, which featured 71 qualifying attempts, set the 33-car field for the May 25 race. Qualifiers 10-33 from Saturday will make another four-lap run on Sunday to set their starting positions. The fastest nine qualifiers from Saturday will compete in Sunday's Fast Nine Shootout, where they will vie for the pole and set the first three rows of the race.

Carpenter will try to repeat as the Verizon P1 Award winner at Indianapolis. He was joined in the 230 mph club by Carlos Munoz (230.460), three-time Indy 500 winner and four-time pole winner Helio Castroneves (230.432), James Hinchcliffe (230.407), Will Power (230.323), Marco Andretti (230.134), Simon Pagenaud (230.070), Josef Newgarden (230.033) and JR Hildebrand (230.027).

Newgarden, in his third season with Sarah Fisher Hartman Racing, bumped Ryan Hunter-Reay from the fast nine with his run in the final five minutes of the session. Five different teams are represented in the Fast Nine Shootout.

Kurt Busch, who is seeking to be the fourth driver to compete in the Indianapolis 500 and the Coca-Cola 600 in Concord, N.C., in the same day, was 12th after his initial qualifying run (229.256 mph). With an hour to spare before having to leave for the evening all-star race at Charlotte

Motor Speedway, Busch moved into the top nine (229.960) and departed by helicopter satisfied with the day's efforts. By the time he landed, Juan Pablo Montoya had bumped Busch from the fast nine with a four-lap average of 229.966 mph. Montoya was summarily bumped by Andretti.

The Verizon IndyCar Series boost level has been increased from 130 kPa to 140 kPa for qualifications today and Sunday.

The change in pressure adds about a 40-horsepower boost to the engines produced by Chevrolet (twin-turbocharged Chevy IndyCar V6) and Honda (twin-turbocharged Honda H114TT. The boost level will return to 130 kPa for practice on Monday, May 19, Coors Light Carb Day on Friday, May 23 and the 500-mile race Sunday, May 25.

Martin Umbarger will take place for 70 enlistees from branches of the U.S. military including: U.S. Army, U.S. Army Reserves, Indiana Army and Air National Guard, U.S. Marine Corps, USMC Reserves, U.S. Navy and USN Reserves.

The ceremony will include a joint service color guard and a performance by the 38th Infantry Division Band. Following the ceremony at 11:00 a.m., the 38th Infantry Division rock band Rapid Fire will perform on the Pagoda Plaza Stage.

Military vehicle display : An impressive collection of military vehicles and equipment will be showcased in the IMS Midway on Sunday, May 18 when the gates open at 7:00 a.m.

Vehicles on display will include an Expando Van, an M1200 Armored Knight Truck, two M1117 Armored Security Vehicles, two M1151 High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles (Hummers), an MTRV Truck and a U.S. Coast Guard Speed Boat. Also on display will be an RQ-11B Unmanned Aerial System, a Battlefield Surveillance Brigade Airborne Display and two horses representing the Indiana Guard Ceremonial Unit.

Recruiting stations representing the United States Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, National Guard and Indiana Air National Guard will be on hand at IMS during Old National Armed Forces Pole Day.

Pagenaud perseveres to clinch Fast Nine spot

Simon Pagenaud persevered through what he called the most stressful day of his racing career to earn a spot in the Fast Nine during the first day of qualifying for the 98th Indianapolis 500.

Pagenaud's four-lap average speed of 230.070 mph in his third attempt in the No. 77 Lucas Oil Dallara/Honda/Firestone car was seventh fastest overall. All speeds will be wiped clean Sunday, and drivers who qualified in the Fast Nine will have a chance to earn the coveted Indianapolis 500 pole.

"I've got to tell you, I think IndyCar's got it right for the nerve-wracking intensity we experienced today!" Pagenaud said. "It was a very entertaining qualifying day, especially for the fans. We got a 230-mph average early on in the day, so waiting it out to see if it would hold up was difficult."

Schmidt Peterson Motorsports re-entered Pagenaud in the qualifying line as time dwindled.

With very little practice time available before qualifications due to rain, Pagenaud said his team used his first two qualification runs to find more speed in his car.

"It felt like I was out there driving all day with my three qualification attempts," he said. "The speed we found today is going to help us immensely tomorrow when we run for the pole. It's honestly another dream come true to have a chance at the Indianapolis 500 pole, and I'll certainly give it my best tomorrow."

Rookie Mikhail Aleshin qualified 16th in the No. 7 SMP Racing Dallara/Honda/Firestone car. He completed two qualifying attempts, and his best four-lap average was 229.091 mph.

Jacques Villeneuve qualified 27th in the No. 5 Dollar General Dallara/Honda/Firestone car. His first of two qualifying attempts was his fastest, with a four-lap average speed of 228.171 mph.

"We had a run at the end of the day where we trimmed the car out, but we went slower than before," Villeneuve said. "That was frustrating because we just weren't accelerating like we should have. We were using that run as a test for tomorrow, so we have a few things to figure out before tomorrow."

The last thing the Indiana Ice wanted was a bus trip back to Waterloo, Iowa to win the Clark Cup. After out-shooting the Black Hawks 15-2 in the first period to grab a 2-1 lead, the wheels fell off. The West Division champions scored six unanswered goals to send the series back to Waterloo for a decisive game five after a 7-2 victory at Pan Am Pavilion.

After Josh Jacobs and Mitch Hults potted first period goals, Indy had nothing left in the tank. Jacobs gave the hosts a 1-0 advantage when he buried a blast from outside the blue line 2:14 after the opening face-off.

Hults scored in his third consecutive game with a power play goal giving the Ice their last lead before Waterloo took control of the contest. Scott Conway and Denis Smirnov assisted Hults on their last tally of the game.

The visitor’s Tyler Sheehy sandwiched a first period score between the Indiana lamplighters before the Black Hawks seized control in the second period.

Waterloo reversed the one goal deficit into a 3-2 lead on a pair of scores by Zach Sanford. His first came at 3:10 of the middle stanza and the forward added another on a power play at 8:25.

The Black Hawks stepped on Indy’s throat by adding four more in the third period. Tim Lappin, Brandon Montour, Liam Pecararo, and Patrick Russell finished the scoring.

Nothing went well for the Ice after the opening surge. Jason Pawloski had a rare off-night as he started the contest with a postseason best 1.38 goals against average and seven playoff wins. He needed relief help from Hayden Stewart to finish off the evening.

With the series tied at 2-2, Indiana will have to win the cup Tuesday on enemy ice. The Ice rebounded from a similar letdown in a game-one, 4-2 loss to earn a split on the Black Hawks turf with a 3-2 double over-time victory.
