



From Wildkat to Miller...

It’s McCauley

Noblesville has replaced one of the state’s most outstanding basketball coaches, Dave McCollough, with another outstanding coach, Brian McCauley.

In a second-floor news conference held 45 minutes before the scheduled school board meeting on the first floor of the Noblesville Schools administrative building, Noblesville athletic director Michael Hasch introduced McCauley, who for the past eight years has been the head basketball coach at Kokomo High School.

The announcement by Hasch was made pending official approval of the School Board, which came approximately two hours later.

Assistant athletic director Tony Oilar called the hiring of McCauley “like hitting a home run.”

It certainly appears that way.
In eight seasons at basketball-strong Kokomo McCauley, who played his high school basketball for the Wildkats, put together a 130-58 record. He led the Wildkats to a 23-3 record and the state championship game in 2011, losing to Bloomington South, 56-42, for the crown.

After taking over a program which the year before finished 10-11 and a program which had losing seasons two of the previous three years, McCauley struggled in his first season at Kokomo, posting a 5-16 record and losing to Lafayette Jeff in the first round of the sectional. McCauley’s second season ended at 13-9 and a second-round sectional loss to Jeff.

Since that time McCauley has won five sectionals, one regional and a semi-state.

This past season, Kokomo was only 16-8, but played half of the season without an injured player who following the year was named to the Indiana All-Stars. Kokomo won nine of its last 10 regular season games, losing only to Richmond. The Wildkats then upset Marion in the first round of the sectional and defeated McCutcheon for the sectional championship before falling 68-60 to Homestead in the regional.

Last season Kokomo played four Hamilton County teams, losing to Fishers, Guerin Catholic and Carmel and beating Noblesville, 38-36.

McCauley has coached against Noblesville four times, winning three and losing one.

He defeated Noblesville, 51-32, in Kokomo’s romp to the state in 2011. In a story written by Dave Kitchell in the Kokomo Tribune the week before Kokomo played in the state championship game, McCauley pointed to the dominating win over a talented Noblesville team on Dec. 21 as a huge confidence builder.

In that same story, McCauley said, “Winning is exhilarating, but losing is such a difficult part of the game, especially for players who’ve invested so much.”

McCauley should know because he was an outstanding player on outstanding Kokomo teams in 1995 and 1996. McCauley was a starting guard on those two teams which produced a combined record of 46-6, the third-best ever at Kokomo. The 1996 team set a school record by going 19-0 before losing the final game of the regular season at Harrison, in overtime. That same Kokomo team then lost to Fort Wayne Dwenger 52-50 at the For Wayne Semistate. One year earlier, McCauley and the

Wildkats lost to Elkhart Central 35-34 at the South Bend Semistate.

Asked at the press conference why a coach with such a successful program and a man who has been a Wildkat most of his life would want to leave all of that behind and come to Noblesville where come tourney time he will be facing the likes of Carmel, Hamilton Southeastern, Fishers and North Central, McCauley answered, “Noblesville has a great academic and athletic history. Noblesville has a great tradition in basketball.

“There is no better sectional in the state. It’s an opportunity to achieve in the toughest sectional in the state,” McCauley added.

McCauley will come to Noblesville on Thursday to meet with his new players and their parents.

“Brian’s impressive record on the court and his focus on playing hard, playing smart and emphasizing teamwork make him a great fit for our program,” said AD Hasch when introducing his new coach. “We’re excited to have him and are ready for him to hit the ground running.”

Hasch said 36 coaches applied for the job and that a final six were interviewed.

A graduate of Kokomo High, McCauley played varsity basketball for three years,

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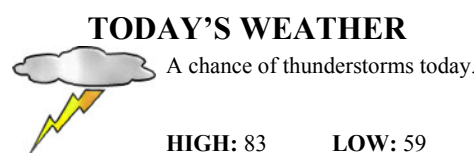

Big changes come from board meeting...

Noblesville Schools adopt 21 Impact strategic plan

Noblesville Schools announced today the adoption of a strategic plan for 2014-2021 that focuses on moving the district forward through the adoption of innovative 21st Century learning concepts.

The plan, termed "21 Impact", starts with the clear recognition that the world is changing and was developed with community involvement.

"For Noblesville Schools to best serve our mission of preparing students for success in college, careers, and life, our learning systems and environments must evolve to meet the demands of the world we live in today," said Dr. Libbie Conner, superintendent of Noblesville Schools.

"This means providing appropriate space and tools for students to collaborate, solve problems, research and communicate digitally, and apply what they learn to real world scenarios."

The plan lays out specific curriculum objectives for elementary, middle and high school students such as inquiry-based learning, college and career readiness, and technology integration. To support the high quality educational programming, and the expected continued growth of Noblesville Schools' enrollment, specific facility objectives are also captured in the plan.

New start times to begin across system in 2015-16

Noblesville Schools today announced that start times for all schools will be adjusted beginning in the 2015-2016 school year.

The start of school for Noblesville High School and the middle schools is tentatively scheduled to be 8:45 a.m. from the current time of 7:35 a.m., and elementary schools are tentatively scheduled to start at 8 a.m. as opposed to the current time of 8:40 a.m. Final, confirmed start times for the schools will be announced in early 2015.

The change is being implemented to address the energy level and alertness of many students during their morning classes.

"Noblesville Schools is committed to considering all available approaches to set our students up for successful outcomes," said Dr. Libbie Conner, superintendent of Noblesville Schools. "Changing school start times, while a challenging adjustment

for some families in the short term, will help forward our objective of doing what’s best academically for our students in the long run.”

Noblesville Schools has been extensively studying the issue of start times for approximately two years through a calendar committee made up of administrators, teachers and parents. The specific start times being planned are based on the committee’s recommendation.

The committee’s research concluded that there are several significant positive outcomes associated with adolescent students starting school later in the morning including better attendance, an increase in student achievement, and fewer cases of depression and student car accidents.

The committee research indicated no negative academic outcomes for younger students starting their school day earlier.

Public input was also invited on the subject through a live discussion forum, Facebook and Twitter commentary, and an online survey of the Noblesville Schools community. Approximately 2,500 respondents participated in the online survey and key findings indicated that the majority of survey respondents were not opposed to a change in start times, with 70 percent of respondents seeing no negative impact from the proposed change for their high school/middle school student(s) and 56 percent of respondents seeing no negative impact from the proposed change for their elementary student(s).

The change in start times was originally being considered for implementation in the 2014-2015 school year, but was delayed to 2015-2016 to provide families and school administration more time to plan for and process the changes.

and discriminatory positions on social issues. Of course, voter turnout is always critical in off-year elections.

There is also a possibility that additional Democratic candidates will file to run against unopposed Republicans. Hamilton County Democratic Chair Keith Clock is aggressively looking for additional candidates, particularly women. He notes that women account for 51% of the population in Hamilton County, yet only 29% of the elected officials in Hamilton County are women.

He also said that voters in Fishers have told him that they aren't ready to settle with who was elected in the Republican primary and want additional choices. He is hopeful that Democratic candidates will step forward, including a mayoral candidate. Inter-

ested Democrats can contact Clock at info@hcdemocrats.org and have until June 30th to file.

Interested Democrats can also meet and talk to many of the Democratic candidates at Hamilton County Democratic Club meetings, which are held on the 4th Wednesday of the month. 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Accident on Little Chicago Road claims life of Noblesville man

On May 20th, 2014 at approximately 8:20 a.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the intersection of Little Chicago Road and Buttonwood Drive (Noblesville) in reference to a report of a 2-car motor vehicle crash. A short time later, officers arrived on the scene and located two vehicles and two occupants involved in the crash.

Based on preliminary information, it appears that a 2002 Chevy Monte Carlo was traveling west bound on Buttonwood Drive and was attempting to turn south bound onto Little Chicago Road when the crash occurred. Evidence at the scene and witness statements seem to suggest that the driver of the Chevy Monte Carlo pulled into the path of a 2012 Chevy van that was traveling north bound on Little Chicago Road.

The driver of the Chevy Monte Carlo, Zachary M. Bish, 19, of Noblesville, was transported to Riverview Health Hospital (Noblesville) by ambulance in critical condition. Shortly after arrival at the hospital, the driver succumbed to his injuries. The driver of the Chevy van, David E. Millis, 65, of Greenfield, was also taken to Riverview Health Hospital with minor injuries. There were no other occupants in either vehicle.

Accident reconstructionists from the Noblesville Police Department are investigating the crash. Little Chicago Road was temporary closed between S.R. 38 and Myers Lake Drive as investigators collected information and evidence pertaining to the crash. The road was reopened at 10:56 a.m. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

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May is Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month

Governor Mike Pence has proclaimed May as Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month, reminding all motorists and motorcyclists to share Indiana roads and practice safe driving habits. The warm weather of spring brings increased motorcycle traffic with Hoosiers riding for recreation and transportation.

Many serious and fatal crashes occur when motorists turn in front of motorcyclists. Be aware of motorcycles, especially at intersections and while turning and changing lanes. It is difficult to accurately judge the time, speed and distance of an approaching motorcycle. Before you drive through an intersection or make a turn, check the position of oncoming motorcycles at least 2-3 times.

Tips for passenger vehicles:

- Watch attentively for motorcycles. Check blind spots before changing lanes and look twice at intersections before you turn or pull out into traffic. Use your turn signals when changing lanes.
- Anticipate hazards that may confront a motorcyclist like large pot holes, debris, or generally poor road conditions. Allow at least two seconds of following distance between your vehicle and a motorcycle.
- Be cautious when turning left. This is a primary cause of crashes between vehicles and motorcycles.
- Share the road, motorcyclists are entitled to operate in a full lane.
- Obey all traffic laws.

All motorcycle riders should wear helmets. According to the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute, 151 motorcycle fatalities occurred in Indiana during 2012. Of those fatalities, 122 people were not wearing helmets. Not wearing a helmet might save you two seconds, but it could cost you the rest of your life.

Construction zones and uneven road surfaces can also be a deadly area for motorcyclists. Indiana State Police and the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) encourage all motorcyclists to be extra vigilant while riding through these sites. Many roadways will be resurfaced over the next several months and motorcyclists should be aware of "edge traps," which occur when one lane is higher than the other. An inexperienced or inattentive motorcyclist can easily lose control when encountering these "edge traps."

Safety tips for motorcycle riders:

- Wear a DOT approved helmet and riding safety gear.
- Don't consume alcohol while riding. During 2012, 36 motorcycle fatalities occurred in Indiana involving alcohol.
- Be visible. Ensure your headlight, taillight and brake light work properly.
- Wear high visibility clothing.
- Use lane positioning to increase visibility and watch for turning vehicles.
- Avoid riding in blind spots.

Royals repeat in loaded sectional

It wasn't easy, but the Hamilton Southeastern girls track and field team defended its sectional championship.

Of course it wasn't going to be easy. Four of the top seven teams in the state were at the Guerin Catholic sectional on Tuesday, including the third-ranked Royals. But Southeastern came through, scoring 128 team points to win the championship. No. 7 Fishers was second, besting No. 4 Carmel by a point: 115-114. Sixth-ranked Noblesville was fourth with 83 points.

Most important was advancing athletes to next week's regional at West Lafayette. The Royals got 13 places on to the next level, as did the Tigers. The Greyhounds qualified 12 for regionals, and the Millers 11. Westfield advanced seven.

"In general we got most people through that we hoped, so that's what's important for next week is just getting people through," said HSE coach Julie Alano.

Southeastern was helped by five event wins, with Rachel Nichwitz getting two of them. The junior repeated her schedule at the Hamilton County meet, winning the 1600 (5:01.43) and 800 runs (2:18.13) after participating on the 4x800 relay. The relay finished second, thus qualifying for regionals.

A big win towards the end of the meet was Lindsay Walton in the shot put. She got the Royals pumped up with her winning throw of 40-10, taking the event by over two feet.

"That's her first time over 40 feet, so we were really excited for her," said Alano.

Southeastern also won the 4x100 relay, with Brittany Goggans, Alexa Jenkins, Deneen McKinney and Kayla Seymour finishing in 48.88. Breanna Hargrove was the 400 dash winner, clocking at 57.51. Both of those times were under the three participant standard, the time/distance that automatically qualifies an athlete for the next round.

The Tigers had two winners. The 4x400 relay team of Paris Carver, Molly Gorgol, Allie Harris and Bre White in a standard-beating 3:56.83. Alexxus Smith also had an above-standard performance, winning the long jump with a best effort of 17-8.25.

Carmel had two champions as well. The 'Hounds began the meet with a 4x800 win, courtesy of Chandler Dykstra, Haley Harris, Kelsey Harris, Megan Kress. Carmel's winning time of 9:19.82 was a new sectional record, and nearly 10 seconds under the standard - in fact all of the top four teams went under the standard of 9:29.65.

The standard is also important because it allows a third athlete to compete in an event, provided all three have equaled or bettered it during the season. The Greyhounds did that in the 3200 run, and that resulted in a 1-2-3 finish in that race. Kelcy Welch was the winner, clocking in at 10:56.02.

Noblesville had three wins, with the high-flying Rachel Mather getting two of them. Mather repeated both her pole vault (12-0) and high jump (5-4) championships with relative ease. Jessica Kiser won the discus, with her best effort 130-8.

Karen Hubbard was a double winner for Westfield. She dominated the sprints, cruising to the 100 dash championship in a new sectional record time of 12.45. Later, Hubbard won the 200 dash in 26.07.

Hamilton Heights' Sierra Brown picked up her usual pair of hurdle wins. Brown led a 1-2 finish in the 100 hurdles, getting that event in 15.13. Macey Policka was second. Brown then had no trouble with the 300 hurdles, winning that event in 47.08.

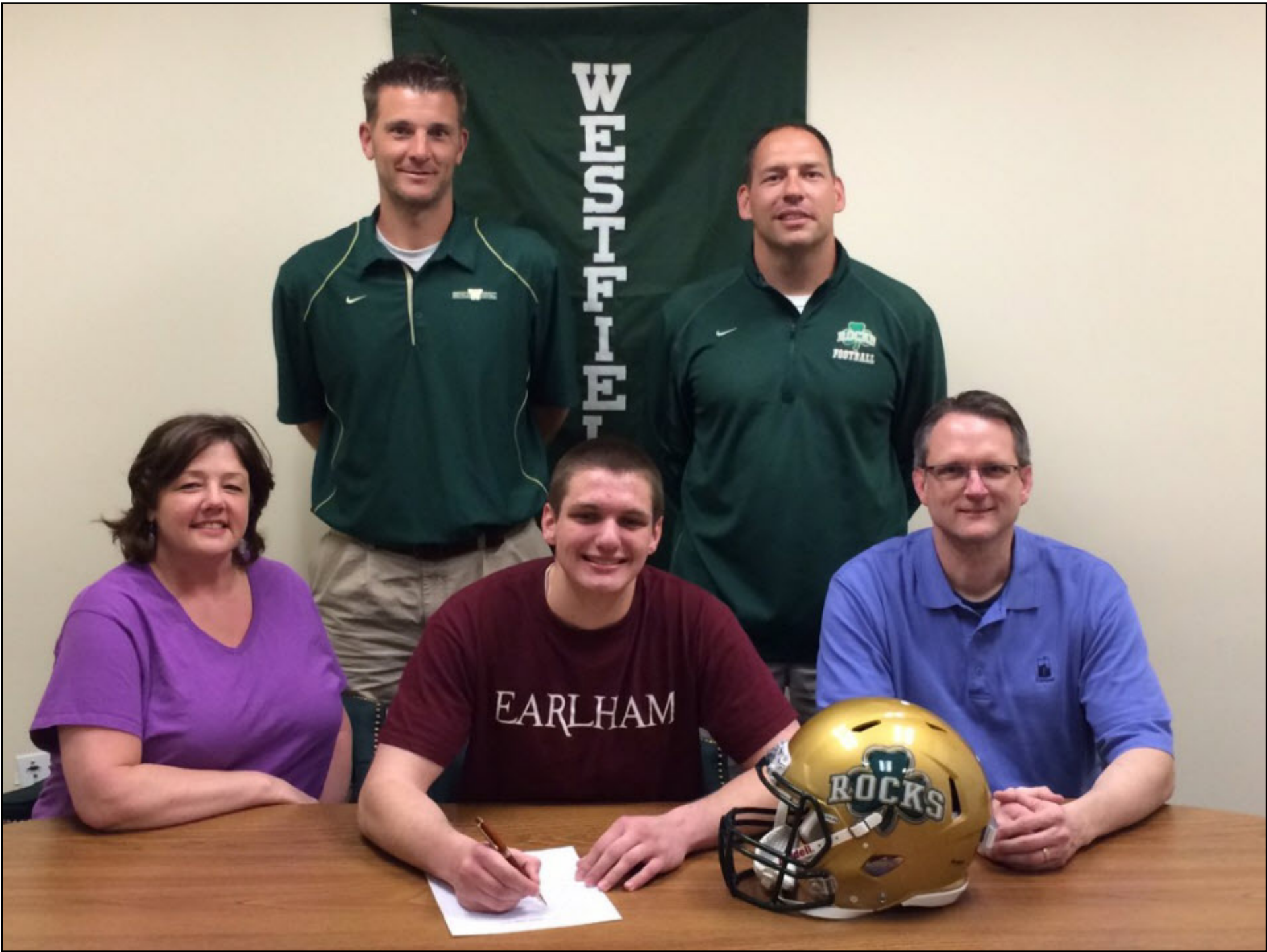
