Low primary turnout is disappointing

I can't help but make some observations on the primary election that took place earlier this month.

We should be disappointed, not by the outcome for individual candidates but by the numbers. Voter participation was pitiful, only 12 percent of eligible



voters cared to help choose the people who will be our local leaders during the next four years.

Why is voter turnout taking a nosedive in local elections? There are probably several reasons, but one is

that so many of the average citizens fail to read or listen to their local news

I realize that most folks reading this column voted last week. But, so many citizens of our county and the other counties surrounding Indianapolis are influenced by the big city TV news and newspapers that they don't get the message that there are events going on locally that deserve their attention.

Besides the poor election day turnout, a part of the election story is the involvement of the Tea Party. Although no candidates were publicly endorsed by the Tea Party, there were at least three candidates on the GOP ballot that received assistance from the

Two of the three failed to attract any wide support. David Stockdale who challenged U.S. Rep. Susan Brooks got only about 17 percent of the vote while Don Meier who challenged incumbent State Rep. Jerry Torr received about 37 percent of the vote in Dist. 39, the Carmel area.

But, in the third race, Fred Glynn, candidate for County Council, won with 56 percent in a contest with Andrew Dollard for the right to succeed retiring Merideth Carter in Council Dist. 1. In this race Glynn got support





Charles M. Orff Foundation donates \$4,000 to Biddle Park

One is a play set with slides; two are spring riders. The equipment will be installed by volunteers including members of the American Legion Riders and Andy Stites. Jennifer Stites is the president of the The Charles M. Orff Foundation which was created to honor the memory of Charles M. Orff. Charlie Orff was a native of central Indiana, and attended school in Sheridan and graduated from Noblesville High School. Shortly after graduation, Charlie joined the US Army and served two tours in Iraq. He achieved the rank of Staff Sergeant and continued his service in the Army

Upon his return from Iraq, Charlie took a job as a foreman for a central Indiana roofing company. In July of 2008 Charlie was severely injured when he fell off a roof. By February, 2009, he was able to return to work, but on March 22, 2009, Charlie was killed in a catastrophic motorcycle accident near Sheridan.

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

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


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No tie for Justin's Millers...

Two long-time, backyard Hamilton County baseball rivals, each this season better known for hitting than pitching, Friday evening hooked up in a slinger's battle at Arcadia.

Jacob Hammel and Zac Moffatt and Coach Rick Hawley's host Huskies won out, 3-2, over Austin Hoover and Coach Matt Britt's Sheridan Blackhawks.

Hamilton Heights had scored in the first, but it took three walks, a fiedler's choice, a Sheridan error and two stolen bases to get that one run

Sheridan got both of its runs in the fifth, coming off a double by sizzling-hitting Jordan Kyriakopolos, a triple by Crail and a fielder's choice RBI off the bat of Nathan Pflugh.

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

For the second time in three years, Target Chip Ganassi Racing and Scott Dixon have won the Tag Heuer Pit Stop Challenge, which determines the fastest pit crew in the Indianapolis 500.

Today's contest at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway featured 12 teams in four rounds of action. Each team was timed while performing a pit stop that required crews to change four tires and execute a simulated fuel hookup during each round of competition. Teams went head-to-head with the faster time advancing to the next round. Crews had to be careful however, as penalty time was added for various infractions, such as loose wheel nuts or running over air hoses.

Dixon and the No. 9 Target Chip Ganassi crew took first place and earned a \$50,000 payday after defeating Indianapolis 500 rookie Sage Karam and his Dryer & Reinbold-Kingdom Racing crew by over half a second (Dixon's crew recorded a time of 11.658 seconds; Karam's registered a time of 12.163 seconds).

The No. 9 Target Chip Ganassi Racing crew includes: Chief Mechanic and outside front tire, Blair Julian; inside front tire, Adam Rovazzini; outside rear tire, Greg Shuker; inside rear tire, Tyler Rees; airjack, Andy Schneider; and fueler, Todd DeNeve.

"Every week it's pretty tight (between teams in the pits)," said Julian. "We've been fortunate enough to do a good job here on pit lane - today and in the races. It's working out pretty good. There is not a huge amount of (pit stop) practice throughout the season; it's mainly on race weekends. We try and get a few pit stops in during the practice sessions, unless we have a big problem, and everything has been going pretty good this year."

"It's actually one of my most stressful days apart from Race Day because you don't want to mess it up," Dixon said. "I've been very lucky and blessed to have such a great team for many years and to win the pit stop competition two times within three years is pretty tough to do. Without them, I wouldn't have had the success I have had. They are one of the best teams on pit road. It's definitely going to help me a lot come Race Day this weekend."

Today also marked the second time Dixon and the No. 9 crew have ever won the Tag Heuer Pit Stop Competition, as they earned the top spot in 2012 after defeating Oriol Servia and Panther/Dreyer & Reinbold Racing.

The 98th Running of the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race is scheduled for noon ET on Sunday, May 25.
