Noblesville has replaced one of the state's most basketball outstanding coaches, Dave McCollough, with another outstanding coach, Brian McCauley.

In eight seasons at basketball-strong Kokomo McCauley, who played his high school basketball for the Wildkats, put together a 130-58 record. He led the Wildkats to a 23-3 record and the state championship game 2011, losing Bloomington South, 56-42, for the crown.

After taking over a program which the year before finished 10-11 and a program which had losing seasons two of the previous three years, McCauley struggled in his first season at Kokomo, posting a 5-16 record and losing to Lafayette Jeff in the first round of the sectional. McCauley's second season ended at 13-9 and a second-round sectional loss to

Since that time McCauley has won five sectionals, one regional and a semi-state.



million dollars to bring the Amory up to code. The school systems involved indicated they did not want to make that type of investment, considering they would have the building for only five or six years.

That sent the co-op folks scrambling the last two weeks, trying to come up with a facility to keep the Mosaics School alive.

"We had discussions with White River Christian Church in Noblesville," sad Mosaics Director Dr. Steven Wornhoff. "They offered us space. They have a lot of space, but that space is being used part-time."

Wornhoff said that even furniture used by the Mosaics School would not be the same as used by the church.

'They have something going on each Thursday and then again during the weekend," explained Wornhoff. "We would have to break down our stuff for Thursday evening; set it up again on Friday mornings; move it again Friday evenings and then come back on

"It just wouldn't work," Wornhoff added.

So, what then will work?

Wornhoff presented, and the superintendents approved, what the director called a "satellite school."

Beginning next fall, two classes will be housed at Hamilton Heights and one each at Noblesville and Westfield.

That's exactly what some parents made clear isn't what they want, citing splitting up the staff to the point where it would not be effective.

The answer from the board was, effective or not, the plan is necessary. At this point, there is no other option.

Wornhoff said that could require building, because there appears to be nothing available

"We haven't had a good discussion on building," Wornhoff said, "but that could come in our long range planning. We just don't have time to make that happen before school begins next fall.'
