## Democrat Mike Boland to run for Indiana State Treasurer

Democrat Mike Boland of Fishers filed paperwork this morning to seek the Democratic nomination for Treasurer of State at the Indiana Democratic Party's State Convention on Saturday, May 31.

Boland, a 30-year educator, moved to Indiana in 2012 with his wife, Mary, after serving in the Illinois General Assembly for 16 years. While in office there, was he awarded 36 awards for his service in the House from groups representing educators, veterans, child advocates, agriculture and



firefighters. Since arriving in Indiana to be closer to family, Boland has become active in the Democratic Party, helping candidates and organizations with their mission to restore balance to Hoosier government.

"Mike Boland is a lifelong public servant who will work hard to advance the cause of 'better and more balanced' government in our Statehouse," said IDP Chair John Zody. "Hoosiers deserve better in our state, and a candidate like Mike who understands that mission. When elected, he will keep his focus on Hoosiers instead of on politics."

"The Treasurer of State is tasked with enormous responsibility in the financial management of taxpayer dollars. From college savings plans to the Indiana Bond Bank to the State Board of Finance, which can move money

separately from General Assembly appropriations – it is imperative that there be transparent and balanced representation in our Statehouse," said Boland. "As Treasurer, I will work to restore the trust of Hoosiers with my attention squarely focused on the fiscal health of our state. The current administration made headlines when it sued to put Chrysler out of business – and in doing so putting 5,000 workers out of a job. Hoosiers deserve better."

Democrats will gather in Indianapolis on May 30 and 31 for 'Big Dem Weekend', which includes the Party's annual Jefferson Jackson Dinner followed by the State Democratic Convention on Saturday. Nominations will be done at the Convention's General Session, beginning at 3 p.m. at the Indiana Convention Center, 100 S. Capitol Avenue, in downtown Indianapolis.

Who was the most recent U.S. presidential candidate to visit this county?

Where was the first stop-and-go light in Indiana and one of the first in the U.S. located?

It was a nice payday for Ryan Hunter-Reay Monday evening at the Indianapolis 500 Victory Banquet. Hunter-Reay earned \$2,491,194 for his first-ever 500 win.

## Hunter-Reay receives almost \$2.5 million for Indy 500 victory

Ryan Hunter-Reay earned \$2,491,194 from an overall purse of \$14,231,760 for his victory Sunday, May 25 in the 98th Running of the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race. Hunter-Reay held off Helio Castroneves by only .0600 of a second -- the second-closest margin of victory in the history of the event -- in a six-lap duel to claim his first Indy 500 victory. Hunter-Reay is the first Amer-

ican to win "The Greatest Spectacle in Racing" since Sam Hornish Jr. in 2006.

There were 34 lead changes among 11 drivers in the fast-paced 200-lap event (186.563 mph average), with Hunter-Reay topping all other drivers by leading nine times for 56 laps after starting 19th in his No. 28 Andretti Autosport DHL Honda. The last time a driver led the most laps of

the race from a lower starting position was in 1975 when Wally Dallenbach led a race high 96 laps after starting from the 21st position.

A resident of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Hunter-Reay took the lead for good from Castroneves on Lap 199 and recorded a 220.927 mph final lap to Castroneves'

## Firestone lands big contracts

Fifty years ago things were humming at the Firestone Plant on east Division Street in Noblesville. The company received a \$4.4 million contract from the federal government to build tank tracts. That followed a \$1.2 million contract just a few months earlier.

\*Several Noblesville residents showed up at a Noblesville School Board meeting to object to the schools' plan for a 210 space parking lot at the high school. The project was to cost \$15,000. Residents of the area, just north of the high school, said additional parking was not needed.

\*A trailer park on the east side of Noblesville protested to the City Council concerning a long-standing policy of

charging an additional \$25 on sewer bills for businesses outside the city

\*Noblesville High School graduated its largest class in history, 178 seniors.

Noblesville basketball coach Glen Harper, who many thought was the leading candidate for the Kokomo High position, said he was not interested and instead signed to coach the Millers for a 9<sup>th</sup> season. "I suppose Kokomo is the No. 1 job in the state, but there is more to moving than just doing it to join a better team," Harper said.

\*Charlie Core cleared 6-3 to finish third in the high jump at the state track and field meet. Tom Allen was eighth in the mile run.

Jalopy Night was playing at the Noblesville Drive-In.

\*Zeckel's announced it would close on Memorial Day. Pickett's in Westfield advertised it would be open for Memorial Day diners and Kenley's market was open for Noblesville grocery shoppers.

\*Jim Dandy was selling double decker burgers for 55 cents.

\*Standard grocery was selling cream pies for 29 cents, while Kenley's advertised all-meat wieners at 49 cents a pound.

\*Blue Ribbon Dairy had a cheeseburger special, five for \$1.

220.729 mph, keeping the Brazilian from joining A.J. Foyt, Al Unser and Rick Mears as the only four time winners of the event.

Castroneves earned \$785,194 in driving his No. 3 Pennzoil Ultra Platinum Team Penske Chevrolet to a runner-up finish for the second time in his career, matching his performance from 2003.

Hunter-Reay's Andretti Autosport teammate Marco Andretti drove his No. 25 Snapple Honda to his third, third-place finish in nine Indianapolis 500 starts. Andretti led the race three times for 20 laps and received \$585,194.

Last year's Indianapolis 500 runner-up and Rookie of the Year Carlos Munoz had another strong performance in driving his No. 25 Cinsay AndrettiTV.com HVM Honda to a fourth-place finish after starting the race seventh. He received a check for \$449,194.

Juan Pablo Montoya returned to the Indianapolis 500 for the first time since winning his only other start in 2000, and finished fifth in his No. 2 Verizon Team Penske Chevrolet after starting tenth. Mon-

toya led the race three times for a total of 16 laps and was awarded \$441,944.

In the first Verizon IndyCar Series race of his career, NASCAR star Kurt Busch started 12th and finished sixth in his No. 26 Andretti Autosport Suretone Honda. Busch was voted the winner of the prestigious Sunoco Indianapolis 500 Rookie of the Year Award and was presented with \$423,889, which included a \$25,000 bonus from Sunoco.

Also turning in an impressive rookie performance was Sage Karam, a 19-year-old rookie from Nazareth, Pa., who started 31st and finished ninth in the No. 22 Comfort Revolution/Brantley Gilbert Chevrolet, earning \$270,305.

Pole sitter Ed Carpenter, who led the race four times for 26 laps in his Fuzzy's Vodka/Ed Carpenter Racing Chevrolet, finished 27th after a crash ended his day on lap 176. Carpenter received \$463,694, which included \$100,000 for earning the Verizon P1 Award as pole winner for the second consecutive year.

Party on the Patio to feature Grand Junction Plaza design concepts

Tonight’s Party on the Patio event will feature design concepts for the Grand Junction Plaza project. The monthly Downtown Westfield Association event will allow citizens to view and comment on designs from Land Collective, the lead design group for Westfield’s downtown revitalization project.

Party on the Patio begins at 5 p.m. and is sponsored by Westfield Parks and Recreation, Edward Jones and Body One. It will be held at the Parks and Recreation facility located at 330 E Main Street, with the entire patio available for food and refreshments. The event is free to the public.

David A. Rubin, Land Collective’s principal, credits the success of the group’s projects with empathy-driven design and a synthesis of art, technology and social sciences to create human-centered works.

"A successful space is one that’s well-attended," said Rubin. "Land Collective aspires to render Grand Junction as an extraordinary venue filled with art, architecture, community and life. We have worked with the City to gather some of the most extraordinary talent across design disciplines, in the hope that the future park will continuously heighten one's experience, no matter when one engages in it - any time of day and through all seasons," Rubin said.

"We are very eager to see Land Collective’s concepts for Westfield’s future," Mayor Andy Cook said.

"Their work on Eskenazi Hospital in Indianapolis brought them to our attention, and their emphasis on collaborative, community driven design work left no doubt in our minds that this was the right group of people to take our community’s vision to the next level," Cook said.

The Grand Junction Plaza project began as a citizen-driven effort to revitalize Westfield through downtown development. Ken Kingshill, chairman of the Grand Junction Task Group and executive director of the Downtown Westfield Association, sees the selection of Land Collective as the culmination of a seven-year-long process.

"The Grand Junction Task Group participants have devoted thousands of volunteer hours over the past seven years to dream up the Grand Junction concept," Kingshill said. "We are thrilled that the city has hired David Rubin of Land Collective to prepare the final design of the Grand Junction Park and Plaza. We look forward to the day that downtown Westfield will indeed be the place where connections are made, both for our residents and for our sports visitors."

U.S. 31 construction update...

Contractors preparing to open new ramp to I-465

Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) contractors plan to temporarily close the right lane of westbound I-465 at U.S. 31 tonight from 9 p.m. until 6 a.m. The lane restriction is expected to repeat Wednesday and Thursday nights as crews finish paving and remove barrier wall from the new northbound U.S. 31/Meridian Street ramp to westbound I-465.

The northbound U.S. 31 loop ramp to westbound I-465 closed for reconstruction on April 25. Weather permitting, contractors anticipate opening the new ramp Thursday night/Friday morning. Ramp traffic is currently detoured to make a left turn and merge onto the southbound U.S. 31 ramp to westbound I-465. Posted and dynamic message signs will be used to notify motorists that the ramp is open and the temporary left-turn configuration is no longer in place.

A right lane restriction on northbound U.S. 31 near I-465 will be required Thursday night from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. as crews work to stripe the roadway, modify signage and open the ramp.

The intersection of Pennsylvania and Main (131st) streets is scheduled to close for up to 60 days beginning Wednesday, June 4 for construction of a roundabout. Main Street between Pennsylvania and Illinois streets remains closed through this fall. Carmel Drive/126th Street is open to provide east-west access across U.S. 31.

Access to and from Smokey Row Road at Old Meridian Street is scheduled to close on or after Thursday, June 12 for up to 60 days for construction of a roundabout. Traffic on Old Meridian/136th Street will be shifted to accommodate construction of the roundabout.

**U.S. 31 Remains Closed Between Old Meridian & 136th Street**

Contractors closed U.S. 31 between Old Meridian and 136th streets on April 4 to accelerate construction of this section of highway, including an overpass at 126th Street and interchanges at 131st and 136th streets. The signed detour directs motorists to Keystone Parkway. The highway is expected to reopen before Thanksgiving this year. For maps and details, go to US31closure.com.

E & B Paving and Gradex are INDOT contractors for the \$141 million contract to upgrade U.S. 31 to freeway standards from 96th Street to the Monon overpass. The contract builds new roundabout interchanges at 106th, 116th, 131st and 136th streets and improvements to the U.S. 31 and I-465 interchange, including two flyover ramps from southbound U.S. 31 to eastbound I-465 and eastbound I-465 to northbound U.S. 31.

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# Nutrition is key in combating osteoporosis

Before you wonder if I am becoming forgetful in my, ahem, advanced years...yes I realize I used this identical quote by Ursula Andress in my last column! While I focused on the importance of strength training to stave off the effects of osteoporosis last time, today I would like to discuss the role of nutrition in combating this debilitating, and sometimes fatal, disease.

(For those of you who do not know the name Ursula Andress, I suggest you inquire of any male on the planet over 50...) If someone of her fine physical form could one day suffer from osteoporosis, the rest of us are fair game for certain!

For those who may be more at risk to suffer from osteoporosis we find we must be diligent about both our activity level and our nutritional needs. As I suggested in my last column, activity is paramount; a sedentary lifestyle will most certainly advance the disease at a much greater pace. Nutrition plays a very important role as well in keeping our bones as strong as possible. Calcium, as many of you know, is a critical mineral in this regimen. Likewise, most of us are familiar with dairy products being a good source of calcium, which is true. However, other sources include salmon, sardines, dark green vegetables, and fruits such as figs or prunes. A calcium supplement is usually warranted for most women, along with a Vitamin D supplement.

This, of course, should be discussed with your own personal physician who will recommend the dosage most appropriate for you.

Bone loss often begins for women in the thirties and can continue throughout life. An early sign of osteoporosis is loss of height, sometimes followed by a curving of the spine. This is a scenario which may be followed by a fall and possible broken bones. However, you can make diet and exercise choices which will make a huge difference in your quality of life

In the past several years there have been several advances in pharmaceutical products which, according to research, can possibly even reverse some of the effects of osteoporosis. Again, a subject to broach with your physician for his/her recommendation. In the meantime, I encourage my clients to do their own research, to ask questions, and become informed regarding their bodies - after all do we wait until our car breaks down

completely before we listen for any odd noises, see how the brakes are working - or the steering? If we are pro-active in taking care of a machine, what about these bodies of ours, don't they deserve at least that much consideration? Talk with your physician as well about the diagnostic test available to detect osteoporosis and osteopenia. Let's take charge of those health issues that we can address and improve; so focus on increasing your strength, add a walking regimen if you are able, and enjoy some delicious calcium-rich foods!

County sends 36 to state...and there will be more

After some amazing performances at the West Lafayette girls track and field regional Tuesday, many Hamilton County athletes are ready to take the state meet by storm.

Hamilton Southeastern was the team regional champion again - as in, for the fifth year in a row. In fact, the county swept the top five: Fishers was second, Noblesville third, Carmel fourth and Westfield fifth.

Just as important, a total of 36 qualifiers officially made it to next Friday's state championship at Indiana University. The Royals and the Greyhounds are sending eight to state, Fishers has seven, Noblesville and Westfield five each, and Hamilton Heights three - all of them the great Sierra Brown.

The Millers officially have five, but they will have more. Athletes qualify for state by either finishing in the top three in their event or by meeting the state standard. With eight regionals and three qualifiers from each one, 24 are guaranteed a place at state.

If there are still open spots after all the top three and standard-beaters are placed, then the next best times are called to state to fill a field of 27 in each event. Noblesville will have that happen in the 4x800 relay and for Deja Cox in the 300 hurdles - a quick glance through the other regionals shows that the relay team and Cox are easily among those next best times.

More about the Millers later - they certainly had an awesome meet. So did Southeastern, with four champions.

Breanna Hargrove continued to dominate the 400 dash, setting a new regional record in winning with a time of 56.81.

"That was a big win," said HSE coach Julie Alano.

Rachel Nichwitz blasted to another double victory, pacing the 1600 run and emerging victorious in a very tight 800 run. Lindsay Walton was the shot put champion, repeating her sectional triumph.

So now Southeastern will prepare for the state meet. The Royals won the indoor state meet in March, so they will have many eyes on them in Bloomington.

"Some people were putting pressure on us and everything after we won indoor state," said Alano. "I was hoping we'd have a few more solid state meet points. I'm not sure what it would score like right now. We'll have to see the other regionals.

"We just want to be in the top five. We were seventh last year, so any top five finish would be great for us, and we just want to get as many girls up on that medal stand as we can."

The Tigers got four wins as well, with freshman Paris Carver earning victory in the 200 dash.

"That was huge," said Fishers coach Andrew Belloli.

Alexxus Smith was the long jump champion, and Fishers won the 4x100 and 4x400 relays, too.

"We had a lot of qualifiers tonight and a ton of amazing performances," said Belloli. "4x4 had another great time, so close to the regional record."

"We were very pleased with the results across the board, and couldn't ask for too much more out of the meet tonight."

The Millers were led by Rachel Mather, who set a new high jump regional record by leaping over 5-08. She also tied her regional pole vault mark with a 12-0 effort.

Carmel got two wins, first a record-setting victory in the 4x800. Kelcy Welch then blasted to an easy win in the 3200 run.

Karen Hubbard led Westfield's parade with a victory in the 100 dash.

And as for Sierra? Just another day at the office - a 100 hurdles win, and second place finishes in the 300 hurdles and the

long jump. This is the first time Brown will go to state in three events.

Guerin Catholic got a fourth-place finish from Lily Hess in the 200 dash, while Rachel Yuska was sixth in the 1600.
