## Small Blessings will come to Sheridan

A public/private partnership formed between Sheridan Community Schools and Small Blessings, a privately owned daycare operation, will open the doors of Sheridan Elementary School to approximately 50 new students, ages three to five years old.

"Small Blessings is a huge blessing for Sheridan Schools," said Sheridan Superintendent Dr. David Mundy.

Small Blessings is owned by Karen and Danny Christian. The Sheridan couple just finished their 15<sup>th</sup> year providing preschool for Sheridan area children.

Mundy stated "Transitioning kids from preschool to kindergarten can sometimes be overwhelming for the kids. Getting them into the school building at an earlier age helps them get acclimated with the school and aids the transition."

Mundy and Christian outlined how the newly formed partnership will provide opportunities for Sheridan preschoolers that are not typical to other area preschool programs.

"These kids will have access to the elementary school's facilities, curriculum and special resource programs," said Mundy. Christian and Mundy also pointed out the school nurse will be available for the students, as well as, the additional security of

the school's Resource Officer which is not typical with other preschool programs.

"When needed, one big advantage will be the availability of our special resource teachers, which include the speech pathologists and other specialists, to be able to identify and work with kids that may have a learning disability or perhaps slow physical motor skill development at an earlier

## Ivy Tech conducts open house

Thursday evening, Ivy Tech Chancellor, Kathleen Lee and Noblesville City officials welcomed the public to an open house at what is currently Noblesville East Middle School. Chancellor Lee gave a presentation to about 100 attendees that lasted about twenty minutes. She explained the steps that are soon to begin to transform the current Noblesville East Middle School to a full service college campus.

Questions about traffic, parking, security and course information were the big topic of conversation after the presentation. It was obvious that Ivy Tech has put a great deal of research and planning into the project. City officials and college administrators were very willing to listen to local residents concerns and explain what the school would like to do to resolve their concerns.

The complete project to bring Ivy Tech Community College to Noblesville was a joint effort of state, county and local government. Hamilton County with its contribution of \$11.5 million and the City of Noblesville's \$3 million dollar contribution paid for the building purchase from Noblesville Schools at a price tag of \$14.5 million. The City of Noblesville is committing another \$3.5 million for renovations and the State of Indiana \$12 million. A total of \$30 million committed to higher education right here in Hamilton County.

Once renovations are completed over a period of several years, the campus will have a capacity of nearly 10,000 students. Full semester classes are scheduled to begin Aug. 25. For complete information on courses and programs Ivy Tech Community College has to offer visit ivytech.edu.

## County Basketball Hall of Fame to welcome 5

Hamilton County will continue to honor its basketball heroes of past seasons when on June 8 at Hamilton Heights High School four men and one woman will be inducted into Hamilton County Basketball Hall of Fame.

The induction ceremony is set for 1 p.m. This will be the Hall of Fame's 11<sup>th</sup> class of inductees.

New members will be Cindi Merrill, Roger Bryant, Dave Sanders, the late Fred Anderson and special contributor Sam Watson.

Merrill was a four-year letter winner while playing for the Noblesville Lady Millers. She averaged 23 points, 7.8 rebounds, 3.5 assists and 3.0 steals per game during her senior year. Cindi was a four-time All-Hamilton County Tea selection and a three-time all-state selection. She played in the 2002 North-South All Star Game.

She went on to become the fourth all-time leading scorer at Miami of Ohio, netting 1,497 career points.

Merrill currently serves as assistant director of enforcement with the NCAA as a member of the basketball development group

investigating violations of NCAA legislation.

Sanders played basketball at Sheridan for legendary coach Larry Hobbs and later played for legendary coach Tony Hinkle at Butler University.

At Sheridan, Dave played on a sectional championship team; was named All-County and was the Hamilton County scoring champion his senior year. His single game high was 36 points.

Sanders scored 1,126 points at Butler and as a senior averaged 20.6 points a game. He held the single season scoring record as a senior and was named MVP and All-Conference. He had 559 career rebounds.

Bryant graduated from Walnut Grove High School in 1960.

He holds the record, 71 points, for the most points ever scored in a Hamilton County Tourney and also for the single game scoring record with 32 points. Roger was All-County for three years. His career scoring total at Walnut Grove was 1,071 points.

Anderson, while coaching at Arcadia, held the record for winning the most consecutive tourney championships, five, while winning titles from 1920-24. The record later was broken when Larry Hobbs coached Sheridan to eight crowns.

Anderson's 1921 championship came as Arcadia defeated Westfield before a packed house at the old Opera House in Sheridan. More than 500 fans were turned away.

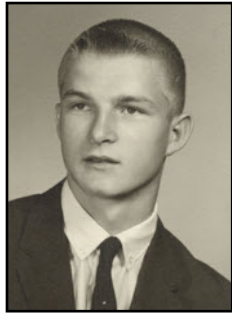

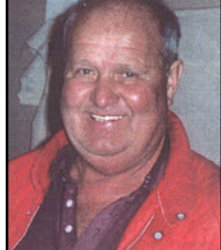

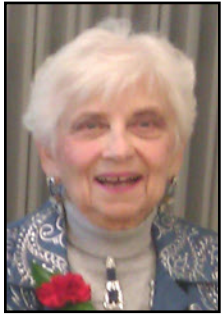

## The County Line

### Expanding Government and Judicial Center is a good idea

Hamilton County officials are making the right decision with their plan to expand the Government and Judicial Center in downtown Noblesville.

County Commissioners received 10 proposals for architectural and engineering services for an addition to the building when they met in regular session on Tuesday.

During the next month commissioners' administrative assistant Dan Stevens and building maintenance director Steve Wood will review the 10 quotes, narrow the number to three, and report back to the board at its next meeting.

County Commissioner Steve Dillinger said yesterday if the cost for the expansion reaches \$12 million or more the county will probably leave a second and third floor of the addition as a shell and finish it when space needs become more critical.

County Commissioners were scheduled to take quotes for architectural and engineering services at their meeting this week. The general plan is to build an addition on the west side of the existing building to house additional courtrooms, office space and storage space.

The Judicial Center was completed 22 years ago at a cost of about \$32 million. It is a beautiful building, and it was built so that expansion could be made when the need arose. Officials say that need has or soon will arrive. Last year there were thoughts of building a separate structure away from downtown. That met with opposition, and fortunately has been discarded.

The present building houses Circuit Court and six Superior Courts along with offices for the prosecutor, county clerk, surveyor, planning department, veteran services and IT (computer services) department. It has served well in a convenient location for the public.

With some architectural imagination, the addition, or west wing, can become an attractive west front to the building facing White River and the Riverwalk. Let's hope all goes well as the plan moves through the

Board of Commissioners and County Council.

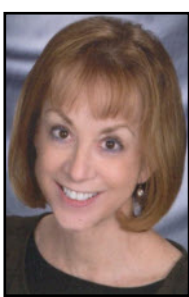
Cost is always a factor, and the whole concept could go up in smoke if prices are too high. The county hopes to keep the construction cost at no more than \$12 million. If the cost is to be financed by bonding and exceeds that amount, state law provides a public referendum must be held in order to proceed.

For various reasons the county does not want the project to be submitted to a referendum. Officials should not allow that to be a stumbling block. If the costs should be a little over the \$12 million limit, the county has the cash and the creative financing ability to move on with the project.

Let's do it. Costs will not get lower, the location cannot be better and planning for the future is always wise.

osteoporosis, the rest of us are fair game for certain!

For those who may be more at risk to suffer from osteoporosis we find we must be diligent about both our activity level and our nutritional needs. As I suggested in my last column, activity is paramount; a sedentary lifestyle will most certainly advance the disease at a much greater pace. Nutrition plays a very important role as well in keeping our bones as strong as possible. Calcium, as many of you know, is a critical mineral in this regimen. Likewise, most of us are familiar with dairy products being a good source of calcium, which is true. However, other sources include salmon, sardines, dark green vegetables, and fruits such as figs or prunes. A calcium supplement is usually warranted for most women, along with a Vitamin D supplement. This, of course, should be discussed with your own personal physician who will recommend the dosage most appropriate for you.

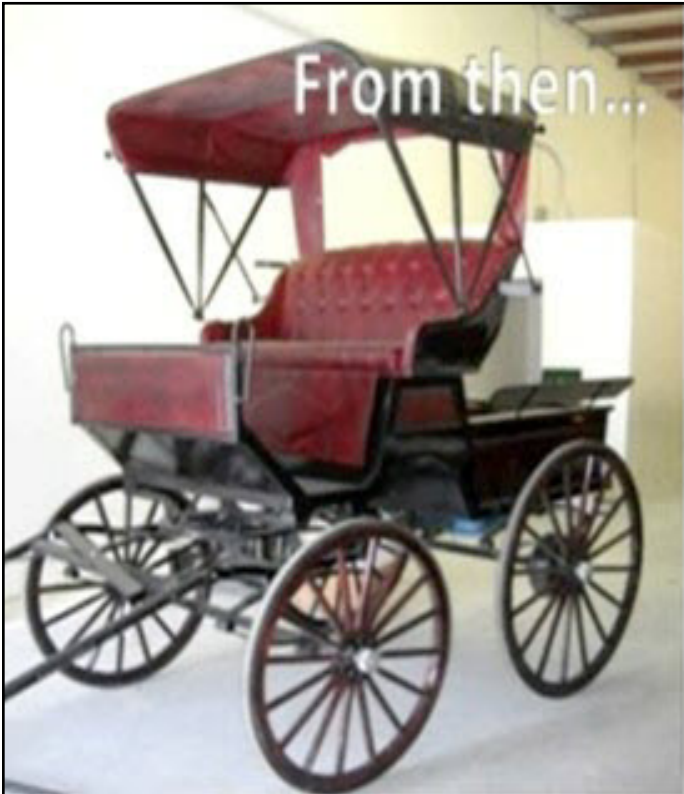

# 'Hawks fly to finale

You've heard it from Sheridan throughout the spring. Blackhawks fans watched game after game. The prediction came early in the season and stayed until now.

If Sheridan could get some pitching to go along with this offensive talented team, who knows what the Blackhawks might accomplish in the post-season tourney.

Coach Matt Britt got the answer Saturday evening in the semi-final round of the Sheridan hosted sectional.

The Blackhawks played Elwood in the championship game on Monday, falling 13-3. The game was played at Grand Park because of rain.

The offense continued to pop, and on the mound junior Austin Hoover provided the pitching as he allowed just one hit in

Sheridan's 5-1 victory over an Alexandria team which earlier in the tournament eliminated a good Tipton team.

Hoover was outstanding. The only hit he allowed came in the second inning. He survived a fourth inning when he walked three batters. He retired nine of the last 11 batters he faced.

"Hoover threw a great game," said Britt. "He made pitches when he had to make pitches.

"Our kids are taking a lot of pride in hosting this sectional," the coach continued. "They've worked hard getting the diamond ready to play on."

Hoover struck out six batters. His only real problem was issuing five walks, which he danced around.

Sheridan's offense continued to explode. It's an offense which has two .500-plus hitters in Hoover and Jordan Kyriakopoulos,

a junior second baseman who last school year moved from Noblesville to Sheridan.

The Blackhawks collected six hits against Alexandria. Two were triples, one each by freshman Sam Crail and senior Nathan Pflugh, who is one of only two seniors on the team. The other is Bobby Perry, who had a huge hit as Sheridan broke open the game by scoring three runs in the top of the seventh.

Sheridan nursed a 2-1 edge going to the seventh.

The Blackhawks had taken a 1-0 lead in the first when Hoover drew a two-out walk and Pflugh tripled him home.

Alexandria's only run came in the second when a single, a fielder's choice and a Sheridan error allowed the Tigers to plate an unearned run.

Sheridan scored what proved to be the game winning run in the third. Jacob

Chesney walked and scored on a double by Hoover.

The winners batted around while scoring three times in the seventh. Chesney led off with a single and scored when Crail's triple got over the left fielder. Hoover was intentionally walked, but Crail and Hoover both scored when the Tigers booted a grounder to first by Pflugh.

Now, the question comes as to whether or not Sheridan can back up Hoover's pitching. Britt said after the game that the assignment likely would be shared between Craig and Harwood.

Harwood, a freshman, left-handed catcher, played an interesting role in the game last evening. Alexandria stole six bases, but in the seventh Hoover hit a batter. That Tigers attempted to steal, and was thrown out by Harwood.
