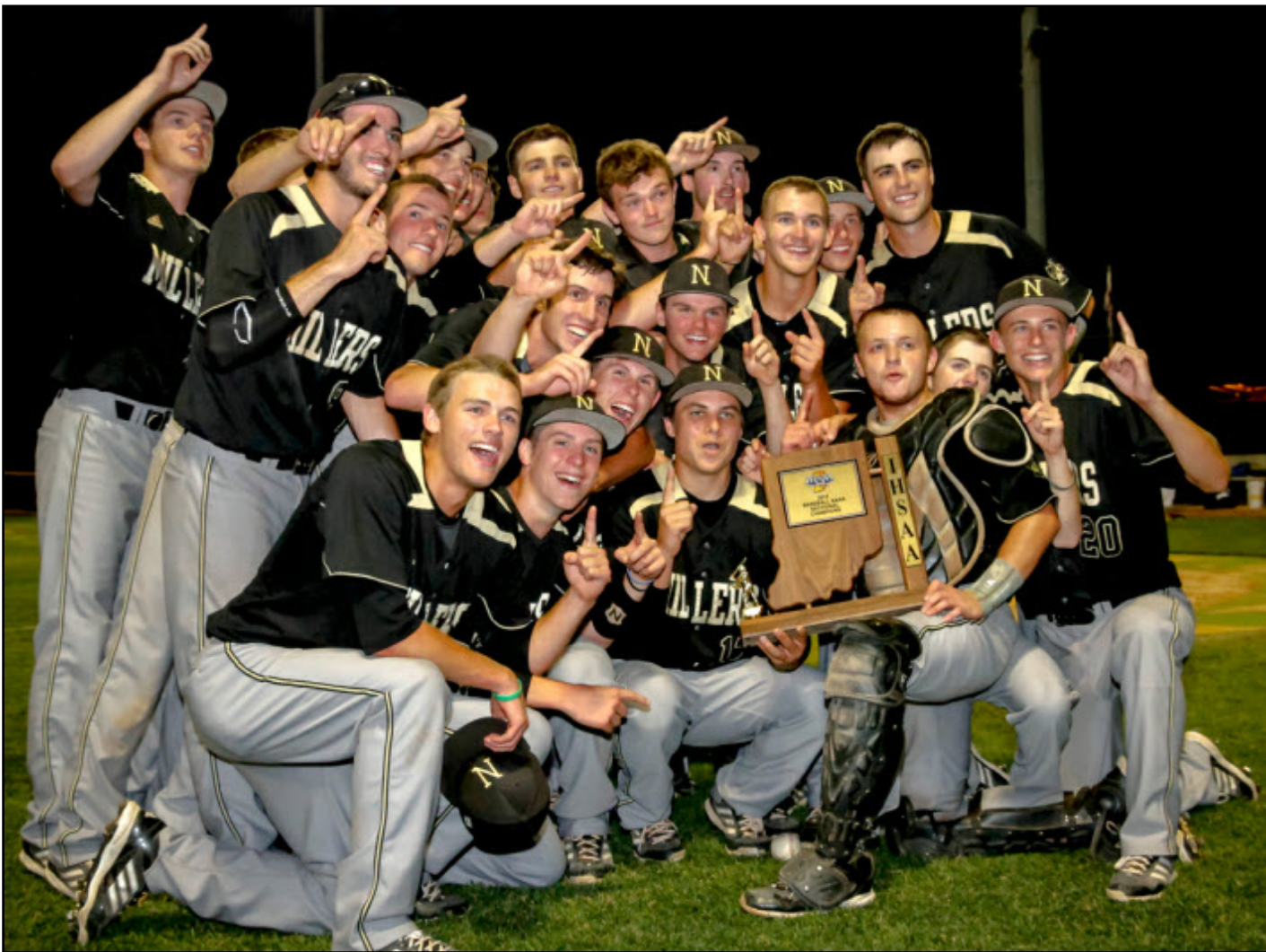

Roundabout work stars soon at Main/Penn, Smokey Row/Old Meridian intersections

The intersection of Pennsylvania and Main (131st) streets is scheduled to close for up to 60 days beginning Wednesday, June 4 for construction of a roundabout. Main Street between Pennsylvania and Illinois streets remains closed through this fall. Carmel Drive/126th Street is open to provide east-west access across U.S. 31.

Access to and from Smokey Row Road at Old Meridian Street is scheduled to close on or after Thursday, June 12 for up to 60 days for construction of a roundabout. Traffic on Old Meridian/136th Street will be shifted to accommodate construction of the roundabout.

Roundabouts are becoming a relatively common traffic feature in Indiana, with more than 90 constructed through 2013 by both INDOT and cities and towns. For more information on modern roundabouts, go to <http://www.in.gov/indot/3249.htm>.

Contractors closed U.S. 31 between Old Meridian and 136th streets on April 4 to accelerate construction of this section of highway, including an overpass at 126th Street and interchanges at 131st and 136th streets. The signed detour di-

rects motorists to Keystone Parkway. The highway is expected to reopen before Thanksgiving this year. For maps and details, go to [US31closure.com](http://www.US31closure.com).

E & B Paving and Gradex are INDOT contractors for the \$141 million contract to upgrade U.S. 31 to freeway standards from 96th Street to the Monon overpass. The contract builds new roundabout interchanges at 106th, 116th, 131st and 136th streets and improvements to the U.S. 31 and I-465 interchange, including two flyover ramps from southbound U.S. 31 to eastbound I-465 and eastbound I-465 to northbound U.S. 31.

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Crews paving on southbound I-69

Overnight restrictions to I-465 and Binford Boulevard

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plan overnight paving this week on I-69 near I-465. Beginning tonight, contractors will have various lane restrictions on this segment of I-69 from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. Two or more lanes may be restricted after 10 p.m.

Tonight and Tuesday night, crews will restrict the three left lanes of southbound I-69 near the split to I-465 and Binford Boulevard. Traffic will not be able to access southbound Binford Boulevard from southbound I-69 after approximately 10 p.m. Motorists will be detoured onto westbound I-465 to exit at Allisonville Road and return eastbound on I-465 to access southbound Binford Boulevard.

On Wednesday night, crews plan to restrict the right lanes of southbound I-69 near the split to I-465 and Binford Boulevard. Traffic will not be able to access westbound I-465 from southbound I-69 after approximately 10 p.m. Dynamic message signs will direct motorists southbound

on I-465 to 56th Street (Exit 40) to return northbound and access westbound I-465. At the same time, the ramp from 82nd Street to southbound I-69 will also be closed.

Rieth-Riley Construction is also currently building auxiliary lanes along southbound I-69 to connect between ramps at 116th Street and 96th Street as well as 96th Street and 82nd Street.

Drivers are advised to be cautious and practice safe habits in highway work zones. Follow speed limits, maintain safe distances from other vehicles and avoid all distractions—including cell phones. For information on INDOT work zones and highway restrictions, go to TrafficWise.in.gov or call toll-free 800-261-ROAD (7623).

Last year, Rieth-Riley constructed a new southbound travel lane between 116th Street and I-465 to add capacity and improve traffic flow. The contractor also built northbound auxiliary lanes connecting interchange ramps at

82nd, 96th and 116th streets. The auxiliary lanes are intended to improve traffic flow and strategically alleviate recurring commuting bottlenecks by allowing traffic traveling from one interchange ramp to the next to avoid unnecessarily merging with mainline interstate traffic.

Coach Justin Keever's Noblesville Millers have all of those qualities, plus more. A sectional championship.

Noblesville won its first sectional title since 2010 last evening when the Millers ended Hamilton Southeastern's bid for another game upset by beating the Royals, 6-0, at Don Dunker Field.

The battle between these two county and two Hoosier Crossroads Conference rivals was close for three innings. The Millers broke things wide-open with a five-run fourth and then added a final run in the top of the seventh.

***Pitching.** Senior Trevor Salmon got the win working 6.1 innings of shutout baseball. When he allowed a pair of base runners in the bottom of the seventh, Keever went to his bullpen ace, sophomore Cory Conway. The lefty quickly ended the game by striking out a pair of Royals.

***Defense.** The Millers played errorless baseball.

***Hitting.** Noblesville collected 13 hits, including six while putting the five spot on the board in the fourth. In that frame, Bret Rundle singled home Dax McLochlin, who had doubled, with Noblesville's first run and then Andrew Wilson homered to put two more runs on the board.

"Rundle's hit was a big one because it came with two out," Keever said. "Then, Wilson followed with the huge home run."

***Speed.** Noblesville ran the bases well all night long; closed the gaps in the outfield, and made a couple of outstanding defensive plays in the infield.

"I wasn't happy with our swings early in the game, but then we got it going in the fourth," Keever said.

"It has been a different guy doing it for us every night," Keever said. "You don't win the Hoosier Crossroads Conference, or this sectional, with just one or two players."

Three or the five total hits Salmon allowed came in the first two innings. He got a big two-out strikeout with two Royals on base in the second, and after that Salmon breezed past the Southeastern hitters. He retired 11 consecutive batters before Aaron McGee broke the string with a two-out single in the sixth. In the seventh, Salmon allowed a single to Jack Casey and Carter Poiry drew a walk and that's when Keever brought Conway to the mound.

Along with Rundle's two-out RBI and Wilson's two-run homer in the fourth, Brian McLean reached on an error and Garrett Christman singled. Vinny Essig followed with a two-run single.

Noblesville now advances to Saturday's regional at Lafayette Jeff, playing Homestead in the second game at approximately 1 p.m. the championship game will be Saturday evening at 8 o'clock.

"We beat Homestead during the regular season," Keever said, "but that was very early in the season. They are now a totally different-looking team. The regional will be tough."

NHS added an insurance run in the seventh on a double by Wilson, a single by McLean and another Fishers error and then a sacrifice fly RBI by Christman off Fishers reliever Mike Chakiry.

“The Tigers ended their season having won at least 21 games for the second time in three years,” pointed out Fishers coach Matthew Cherry. “According to MaxPreps.com our strength of schedule was rated the second toughest in the state.

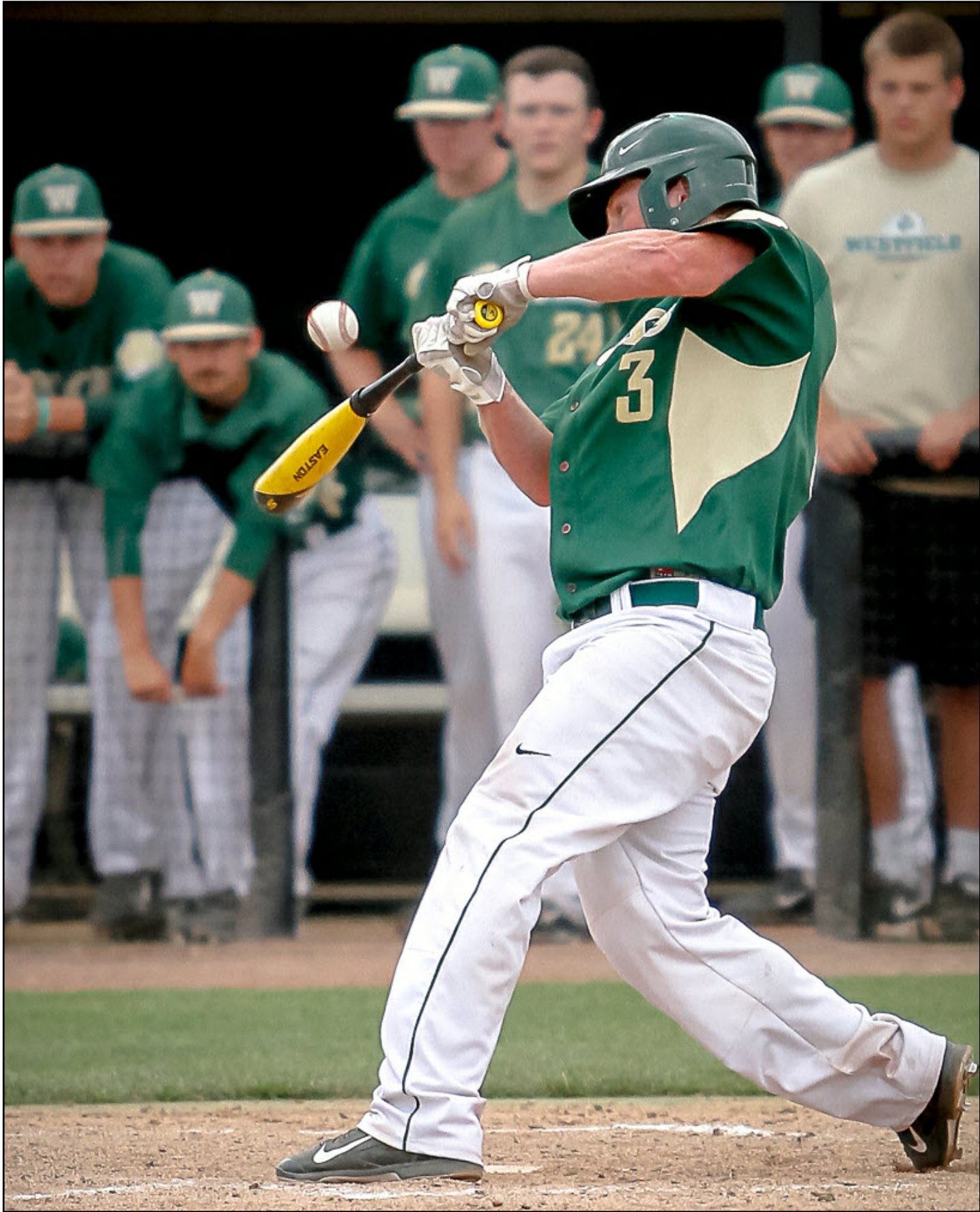
