That's the message Hamilton County Commissioners Steve Dillinger, Mark Heirbrandt and Christine Altman delivered to the Hamilton County Council earlier this week. They will do the same in coming days when meeting

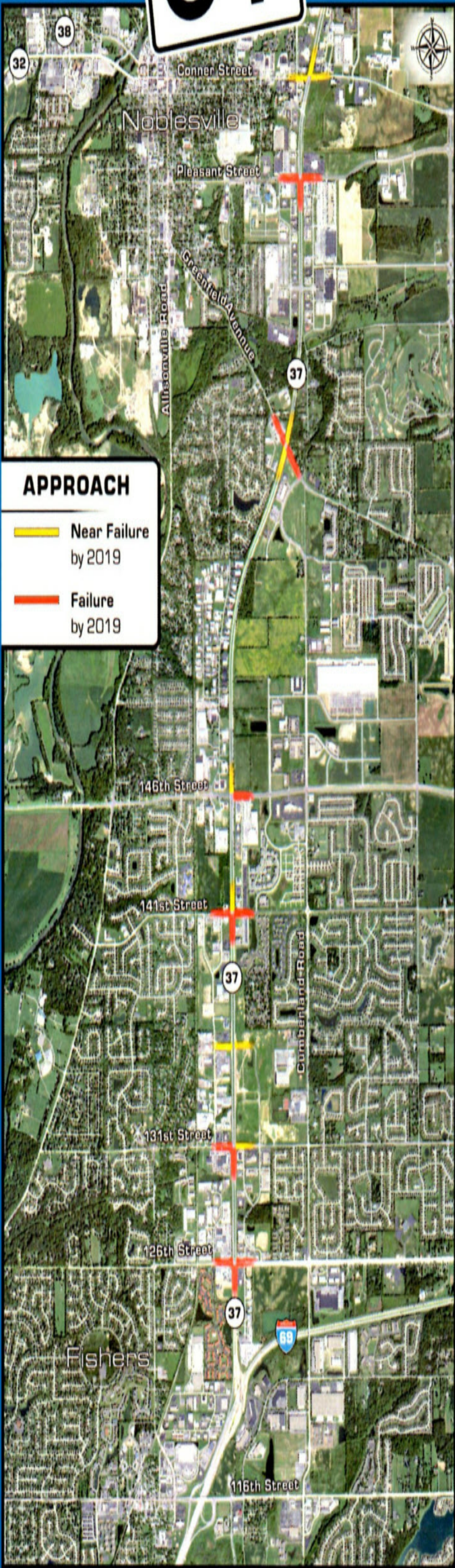

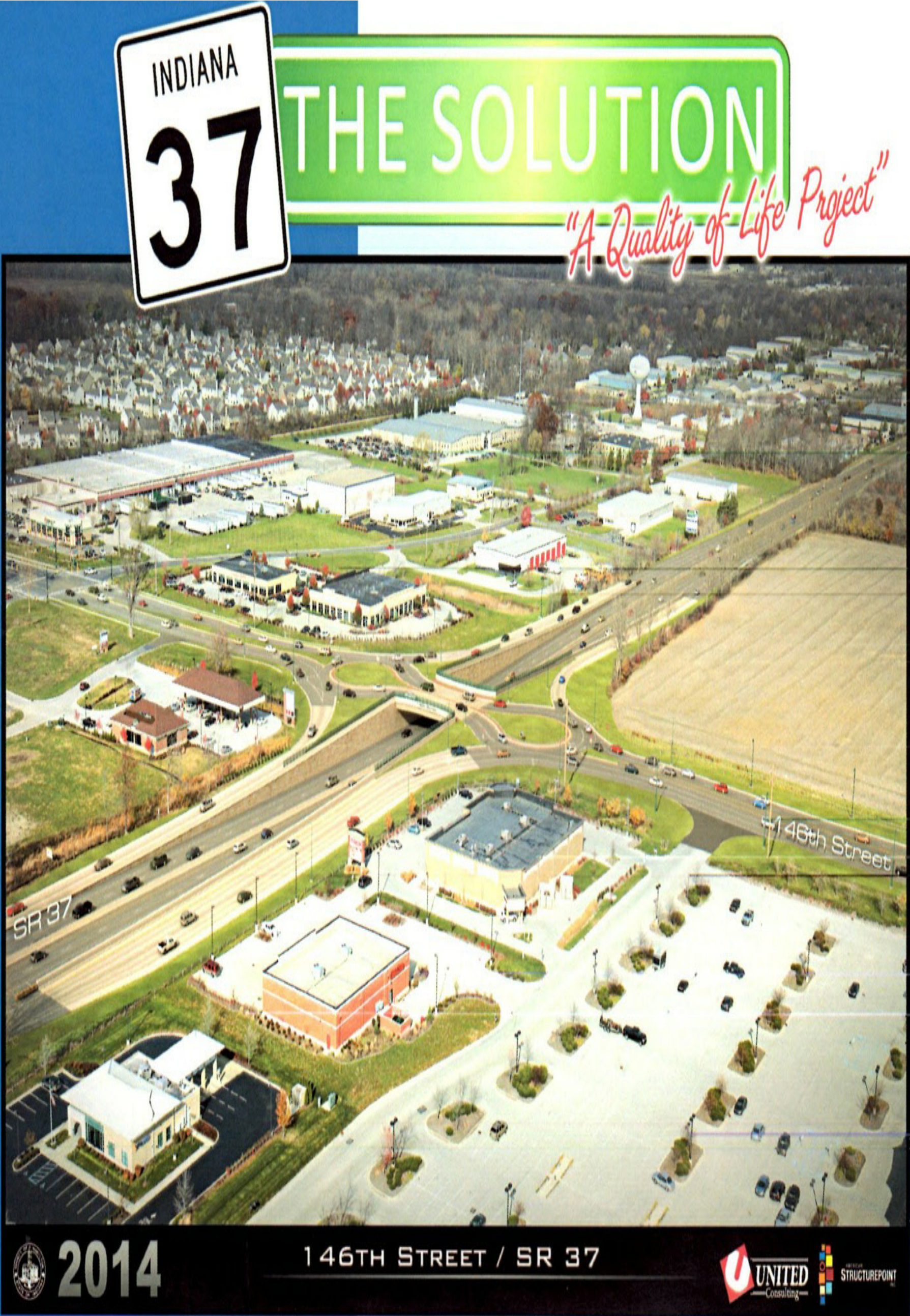
Site Map showing intersection failures

Community: Indiana State Police Offers Summer Driveway Safety Tips

In an effort to keep our children safer, the Indiana State Police would like to offer residential summer safety tips concerning driveways. With summer upon us, our most valuable resource will be outside enjoying the weather, playing in the yard and in our driveways. Tragically, over 2,400 driveway accidents involving young children happen each year in the United States. The Indiana State Police would like to offer the following tips to help avoid unnecessary tragedy.

1) Set the rules with your children. As with any safety issue (firearms in the house, swimming pools, stairways, household cleaners) no matter what their age, designate steadfast rules without options. Tell your children when they see a car approaching the driveway that they all have to meet up in the yard or when a car is moving in the driveway, "your feet are touching the grass!" Teach your children to watch for the white rear lights that illuminate when a car is in reverse.

2) Listen – Before entering your driveway, roll down your windows and turn your radio off. A radio playing too loud can make for a distraction and cause the driver not to hear a child coming to welcome you home. Cell phone usage can provide that same distraction. Being able to hear someone yell or scream to you could save a child's life.

3) Count Heads – How many children are supposed to be in your driveway? Don't neglect the possibility that other children may be playing in the area that you are not aware of.

4) Communicate – Stop your car before you completely roll in to back the car into its parking place. Talk to the children! "Is everybody on the grass?" "How many children are outside?" Tell them what you are about to do and not to move until you do it.

Remember, young children are short and they like to play! If they are in very close to your vehicle, you won't be able to see them. They may think it would be a fun game to "hide" from you by sneaking up and covering themselves from sight by way of the front or back of your car. Talk to them about this version of "hide and seek".

with the Noblesville and Fishers city councils.

The message also is being and will be delivered to the State of Indiana, which along with Hamilton County, Noblesville and Fishers will be a key team player in giving motorists from Noblesville to Fishers a quicker way and a safer way to drive to Indianapolis.

What the Commissioners want is for the state to turn over ownership rights of State Road 37 to Hamilton County. That is what the State did to allow the City of Carmel to build Keystone Parkway, a stretch of road which now allows folks in Carmel and north of Carmel a faster, safer way to drive to Indianapolis.

"Something has to be done; someone has to do something," Dillinger told The Reporter yesterday in an exclusive interview.

The County, Fishers and Noblesville need to get their ducks in place and join together in this project. If not, then expect the State to do something. If local government moves in the direction the Commissioners are suggesting, then it will be local government which decides how a 37 Corridor might look. If not, the State will decide.

"The state's concern, as it should be, will be getting people north and south. Locally, we need to also get people east and west," said Dillinger.

East and west being the streets which feed into Highway 37. The Commissioners would like to see 10 overpasses or roundabouts to solve that situation.

The "model" is there and easily viewed.

*Do the people of eastern Hamilton County, Fishers and Noblesville want a 37 Corridor like the State has made of State Road 31, coming through the county tearing down homes and businesses, with not always a regard to how motorists will get east and west (off 31)? Even some businesses left are having trouble attracting customers. Take the intersections of 146th and 151st streets, for example.

*Or, does Hamilton County want a 37 Corridor capable of moving traffic (approximately 105,000 vehicles a day) and still allow easy on and off intersections to reach local businesses?

There may be some reasons, minor differences, on why eastern Hamilton County neighbors would not work together as a team. That always happens. It should not happen this time.

"If everyone was on board and if the first shovel was put into the ground today," Dillinger said, "it would take from 5-8 years to complete the project."

"Your Time Is Now," Hamilton County, Noblesville and Fishers.

Act now, before the State makes decisions for you.

111th Street closure begins Monday

Crews plan to close 111th Street on Monday to begin construction of the future overpass at U.S. 31. Upon completion of the project, 111th Street will cross over U.S. 31 and eliminate direct access to and from U.S. 31 at this location. The nearest U.S. 31 interchanges will be located at 106th and 116th streets.

Monday, crews plan to close 111th Street from just west of Tottenham Drive (west of U.S. 31) to Illinois Street for approximately three weeks. During this time, residents on Tottenham Drive will maintain access to U.S. 31 but not Illinois Street.

After approximately three weeks, 111th Street will reopen between Tottenham Drive and Illinois Street. Direct access to and from U.S. 31 at 111th Street will close permanently.

Construction of the 111th Street bridge over U.S. 31 is expected to take approximately six months. Upon completion of the bridge, motorists on 111th Street will be able to travel east and west over U.S. 31. Direct access to and from U.S. 31 will not be available at this location.

E & B Paving and Gradex are INDOT contractors for the \$141 million contract to upgrade U.S. 31 to freeway standards from 96th Street to the Monon overpass. The contract builds new roundabout interchanges at 106th, 116th, 131st and 136th streets and improvements to the U.S. 31 and I-465 interchange, including two flyover ramps from southbound U.S. 31 to eastbound I-465 and eastbound I-465 to northbound U.S. 31.

Master Gardener class open for fall registration

If you've always wanted to sharpen your gardening skills, and you have an interest in sharing your knowledge with others, the Purdue University Extension Service of Hamilton County has the ideal program for you. This fall a Master Gardener training program will be offered for residents of Hamilton County and surrounding areas. The Master Gardener Program is a series of classes to train volunteers through an extensive course in home horticulture in exchange for a donation of volunteer hours to help teach others what you have learned.

Master Gardener classes will meet for 15 Thursdays beginning August 14, 2014 and finishing November 20, 2014. There will be two concurrent sessions offered on the same day. One series will be from 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. and the other will be 6:30 – 9:30 p.m. The program topic will be the same for both sessions on a given day. The afternoon session will be cancelled if there is not enough interest. Sessions will be held at the Hamilton County Exhibition Center located on the 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville. Deadline for enrollment is July 11, 2014.

Participants will be exposed to a wide range of subjects including soil and plant science, diagnosis of plant problems, pesticide safety, and culture of vegetable, flower, landscape, lawns, and fruit plants.

A supplies fee of \$175.00 will be charged to cover such items as reference notebooks and the new Master Gardener Manual. The charge for the second person, from the same address, sharing the same materials is \$50.00. These materials will become a part of the Master Gardener's personal collection.

While the class will be encouraged to create new educational outreach programs, there are already plenty of opportunities for which volunteers are needed. Some of these projects include Grow-Labs in elementary schools, a scholarship program, community display gardens at the 4-H Fairgrounds as well as other places, speaker's bureau and more.

You don't have to be a gardening guru to take advantage of this program. All that is needed is a passion for gardening, an enjoyment of learning, and a desire to help your community.

How good are the Millers?

Very, very good

The Noblesville baseball team Coach Justin Keever will take to the Lafayette Jeff regional this Saturday is good enough to win a state championship.

Yes, the Millers are that good. They have it all . . . pitching, hitting, defense and speed. They are ranked No. 8 in the state. They have a 25-8 and two of those losses were tacked on by out-of-state teams.

That’s how good Noblesville is.

Noblesville, on the flip side, also could be eliminated from the post-season at the regional. That’s how good the regional field is. Opening foe Homestead is 22-9. Homestead will face the Millers in the 1 p.m. game after Ft. Wayne Carroll takes on McCutcheon in the 11 a.m. start. Carroll is 21-9. McCutcheon defeated Noblesville twice this year, even though the Millers finished ahead of the Mavs to win the Hoosier Crossroads Conference crown.

You know, you just know, McCutcheon would love to have a shot at Noblesville Saturday in the 8 p.m. championship game. And, you know, you just know, that Homestead would love a second shot at NHS. The Millers blasted Homestead, 12-2, in the Noblesville Invitational.

Keever has suggested that everyone should forget that 10-run win over Homestead.

“They are a better team now than when we played them,” said the Noblesville coach.

That may be very well true. Homestead won a tough sectional tourney, but after a 16-2 opening win over Fort Wayne South, Homestead had to battle to beat Jay County 7-6 and Huntington North 4-3.

Homestead’s only loss in its last 12 games was a 5-4 backyard thriller again Fort Wayne Luers.

In Noblesville’s win over Homestead in the April 5 game, the Millers broke things wide-open with six runs in the third. The game was called after five because of the 10-run rule. Dax McLochlin threw a three-hitter and fanned seven batters. The Millers collected nine hits. Sophomore third baseman Connor Christman collected two hits. Senior Andrew Wilson went 2-for-3 scored two runs and drove home four. He sent one ball flying over the fence.

McLochlin is one of four starting pitchers on a deep and talented staff. He has a 4-1 record with a 1.53 ERA. Trevor Salmon is 7-3 with a 2.68; Garrett Christman is -71 with a 2.00 and Zack St. Pierre is 2-0

with a 2.44 ERA. Just for an extra, when needed. Keever can go to the bullpen and bring in sophomore Cory Conway. He has a 1.02 ERA. Christman has fanned 69 batters in 63 innings. Salmon has 50 strikeouts in 47 frames.

That’s how good Noblesville’s pitching staff really is.

The offense gets started with the two rabbits leading off the game. Wilson is hitting .422, with five home runs, 10 doubles and three triples. Brian McLean is batting .361.

Every Miller in the starting lineup is an offensive threat. Vinny Essig is batting .312 with six home runs. Salmon is at .300. Garrett Chrstman is hitting .358 and Conner Christman is at .295. St. Pierre has a .386 mark with four homers. McLochlin’s average is .307. Bret Rundle is at .288. Easton Brock has a .367 mark and Austin Shirley is at .308

Who would you want to face if you’re the opposing pitcher?

Five Millers have driven home 20 runs or more ... Wilson 26, Essig 24, McLochlin 22 and Garrett Christman and Connor Christman 21 each.

Speed? You better believe it. McLean has 17 steals in 19 attempts. Wilson 15 in 16 tries. Pinch running expert Matt Swearingen has been caught only twice in 13 steal attempts.

That’s how good this offense is.

The defense is good, too. Wilson, St. Pierre, McLean and Brock can cover ground as well as any group of outfielders in the state. The infield is tougher than nails with Connor Christmas at third, brother Garrett or Essig at short, Essig or Michael Carmosino at second and McLochlin or St. Pierre at first. And, with Rundle behind the plate.

That’s how good the defense is.

That’s how good this Noblesville team is.

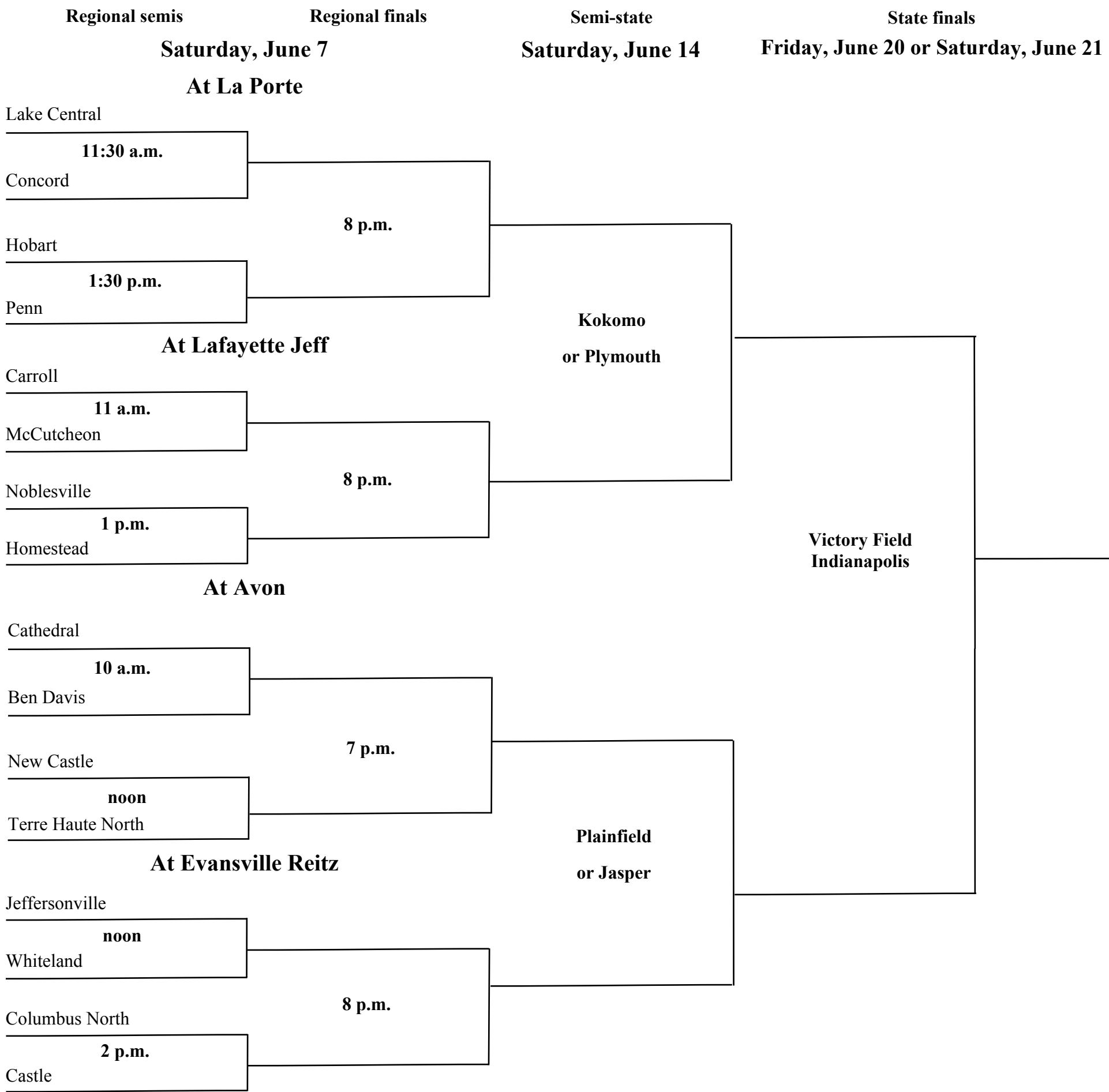

Royals have two top seeds at state...

‘Hounds in the running for the big trophy

If a track and field team can get enough people down to the state meet, it has a decent chance of winning.

The Carmel boys track and field team will certainly have a nice amount of people down at Saturday’s state meet, which takes place at Indiana University in Bloomington. The Greyhounds qualified 12 to the meet - that includes two runners in the 100 dash and the 3200 run.

Is it enough? Going by the IHSAA’s performance list, Carmel is seeded to score 44 points. To an untrained eye, that looks like a low number. But it isn’t.

Forty-four points would have placed third at last year’s state meet. Also, Ben Davis won the 2010 state championships by outscoring Lawrence Central 47-44. So, if the ‘Hounds can perform to their seeds, they have a good chance at winning state. And if they outperform? Even better.

For the record, the least amount of points scored by a state championship team is 13, which happened in back-to-back years. Manual won state with that score in 1923, Kokomo did the same in 1924. Things are obviously different now.

Carmel’s highest seed is Josh Ebikwo, who is rated second in the 200 dash with a regional time of 21.69. The top seed is Lafayette Jeff’s Mathew Johnson, who won the regional by clocking in at 21.67. So Ebikwo isn’t far away.

The Greyhounds’ relays all are seeded highly. The 4x100 team is rated third and the 4x400 and 4x800 relays are seeded fourth. Ebikwo is also rated sixth in the 100 dash. Daniel Sechuga is seeded fourth in the 1600 run.

Hamilton Southeastern is the defending state champion, and this year the Royals have two top seeds. The 4x800 relay team is rated first, as is Jacob Wright in the 110 hurdles. Wright is also seeded second in the 300 hurdles.

Wright was part of HSE’s winning 4x400 relay and placed fourth in both hurdle races last year. Also, look out for Austin Hogan, who is seeded second in the discus. He finished sixth at state there last year. In all, Southeastern qualified 10 for state.

Noblesville has six qualifiers at state, with Max Milkey accounting for two of those. Milkey has a chance to medal in both hurdle races, as he is seeded sixth in the 110 hurdles and ninth in the 300 hurdles. The top nine athletes earn medals.

Fishers’ four qualifiers are led by the 4x400 relay team, which is seeded third.

Calvin Kraft has the fifth seed in the 1600 run. Westfield has two qualifiers, including the second-seeded 4x800 relay team. Eric Gonzalez will be running in that race; he will also run in the open 800.

Hamilton Heights’ two qualifiers are Craig Schildmeier in the 800 run and Michael Defoe in the 110 hurdles. Guerin Catholic’s Joseph Taylor will represent the Golden Eagles in the 1600 run.
