# IMI drivers back to work

Friday morning all 13 drivers at the IMI River Road plant in Noblesville, and drivers across the Midwest, went back to work after being on strike for just under 48 hours. The strike that started Tuesday night at midnight was resolved around 6 p.m. on Thursday evening securing

benefits that the union drivers were seeking. Teamsters Local 716 driver Dan Melvin said, “It was a good win for us and the company.” While the drivers were on strike, Irving Material Inc. non-union employees were sent from plants all over Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee to keep the trucks running.

Teamster drivers had been on a wage freeze for more than six years and IMI wanted to give new hires lower wages and benefits than current employees. While the specifics of the agreed upon contract were not available, drivers at the Noblesville plant were very happy with the resolution saying “we got even more than we asked for.”

## Rate study recommends increase in Cicero bills

A rate study recently completed for the Town of Cicero could possibly lead to an increase in water and sewer bills. Cicero Clerk Treasurer Jan Unger reported council members will conduct a public hearing prior approving the rate increase.

Unger said if approved the increase will be spread out over three years.

Cicero residents sewer bills would increase 1.5 percent and water bills 2.5 percent beginning in January of 2015. Water would then increase 2 percent and sewer would increase 1.5 percent in 2016 and 2017.

Currently the cost for a minimum water and sewer bill of 3,000 gallons or less is \$41.13. The proposal would increase a minimum water/sewer bill 78 cents the first year.

On Friday Unger said, “A date has not yet been established for the public hearing; however, it will most likely be conducted in July.”

# Hamilton County Emergency Management programs join forces

Today between 8 and 10 a.m., Hamilton County Emergency Management will host an inaugural full scale exercise in a sub-division of the City of Westfield to test damage assessment capabilities in the aftermath of a tornado affecting a neighborhood. According to Tom Sivak, Executive Director of Hamilton County Emergency Management, “Creating a damage assessment program is a vital part to identifying the scope of an affected area and will help ensure a community has tools necessary to recovery post disaster”.

Hamilton County Emergency Management has two volunteer programs which train vigorously to assist in the aftermath of disasters these include the R.A.C.E.S (Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services) and C.E.R.T. (Community Emergency Response Team). Both teams have trained for Damage Assessment and they will put their training and communications capabilities to the test today. The objective of the day is to test establish teams canvassing a target area and create a common operating picture for Emergency Management at an offsite

location. They will complete these through communication via amateur radio.

The exercise is a first of its kind in bringing together two programs to focus on a common goal of assessing an area after a disaster. “We are extremely excited to bring two programs together who have never worked before to create a hybrid approach to assessing a community post-disaster,” Sivak said.

The exercise is expected to last approximately 2 hours and will focus on damage assessment and communications.

# Ivy Tech introduces School of Computing and Informatics

The Indiana Commission for Higher Education (CHE) has approved seven new programs within Ivy Tech Community College's School of Computing and Informatics. A business and industry IT task force provided development guidance and endorsement of the programs. The new programs will begin in August 2014 and are available at select Ivy Tech campuses

across the state. This initiative directly links to the College's new academic division structure of providing focused workforce relevant career pathways for students.

The seven new programs include Cyber Security-Information Assurance (CSIA), Database Management and Administration (DBMS), Server Administration (SVAD), Software Development (SDEV), Informatics (INFM), Information Technology Support (ITSP), and Network Infrastructure (NETI). The Computer Science program (CSCI) was initially offered in 2012 and is also in the School of Computing and Informatics.

Degrees granted to Ivy Tech students through the School of Computing and Informatics will allow graduates to be pre-

pared for careers that are in high-demand in computing and informatics. Certificates toward preparing students to earn IT certifications are incorporated throughout the program curricula. Pathways are available for students to transfer to a four-year university so students can pursue a bachelor's degree and more.

# U.S. 31 construction update

**Westfield Park Road construction continues at SR 32**  
Westfield Park Road is currently closed at SR 32 while crews rebuild the drive just west of its current location. The new drive is expected to open by early July. Access to businesses on Westfield Park Road remains available via 169th Street.

**Construction on Wheeler/Tomlinson roads begins on or after June 9**  
Beginning on or after Monday, June 9, crews expect to begin work on the piece of roadway that will connect Wheeler and Tomlinson roads. For approximately three weeks, crews will construct this connector; and thru traffic will not be able to access Wheeler Road north of 181st Street or Tomlinson Road south of 191st Street. Access to North Glen Village will remain available via southbound US 31 at Blackburn Road and South Drive. However, access to North Glen Village will not be

available via Tomlinson Road during this time. After the connector road is complete, motorists will have access to North Glen Village via Tomlinson, Blackburn and Wheeler roads; and access to/from US 31 at Blackburn Road and South Drive will be permanently eliminated.

**Smokey Row Road closure at Old Meridian Street begins on or after June 12**  
Beginning on or after Thursday night, June 12, crews expect to close access to/from Smokey Row Road at Old Meridian Street for approximately 60 days to construct a roundabout. Access to Smokey Row Road will remain available via Range Line Road. Motorists should note that eastbound and westbound traffic on Old Meridian/136th Street will be restricted to one lane in each direction near US 31, and traffic lanes will be shifted to accommodate construction of this roundabout.

Mather wins state in high jump...

Royals tie for 4th, 'Hounds and Millers tie for 6th

After soaring above the competition all season long, Noblesville senior Rachel Mather went out as a champion.

Mather won the high jump at Friday's IHSAA girls state track and field championships at Indiana University in Bloomington. Mather's victory was the first individual state championship for Noblesville at the state girls track meet, and also the first time that a Hamilton County athlete won a field event (see related article, Page 9).

If that's not enough, Mather also finished third in the pole vault, matching her place at state in both events last season. The senior's performance helped the Millers tie for sixth place in the team standings, with Carmel. Both schools scored 23 points.

But the top county team at IU Friday was Hamilton Southeastern. The Royals tied for fourth with Fort Wayne Northrop, with each team scoring 28 points. Southeastern had three runner-up finishes at the meet.

The top three teams made it a Metropolitan Conference sweep: Lawrence Central won its third state championship with 47 points, followed by Pike with 38 and Warren Central with 35.

The Royals started off the meet by edging the 'Hounds for runner-up honors in the 4x800 relay. Grace Andritsch, Rachel Nichwitz, Jessica King and Samantha Zuber finished the race in 9:09.81, with Chandler Dykstra, Haley Harris, Kelsey Harris and Megan Kress clocking in at 9:09.87.

Nichwitz then took the silver in the 1600 run, finishing in 4:55.48. HSE's third runner-up performance was at the end of the meet, as the Royals' Breanna Hargrove, Ashley Mager, Brittany Goggans and Zuber got second in an exciting 4x400 relay. Their time was 3:51.92. Earlier, Hargrove placed sixth in the 400 dash.

Carmel's Kelcy Welch was the highest finisher for the Greyhounds, taking second in the 3200 run at 10:44.42. The Harris sisters helped out in the distance events as well: Harris was fifth in the 800 and eighth in the 1600, with Kelsey right behind her in ninth.

In addition to Mather's heroics, Noblesville also got a medal performance from its 4x800 relay. The team of Abby Crouch, Megan Line, Sarah Schuster and Susanna Sharples-Gordon finished in 9:19.49. With West Lafayette winning the race in 9:07.45,

that means the West Lafayette regional produced the top four teams in the state.

Fishers finished tied for 15th with 16 points. The Tigers' 4x400 relay took third, with Paris Carver, Molly Gorgol, Allie Harris and Brienn White finishing in 3:52.69. Fishers also got seventh in the 4x100 relay, that team consisted of Lauren Lewis, Carver, India Johnson and White.

Seven was indeed a lucky number for Fishers: Alexxus Smith was seventh in the long jump, while Abigail Horn placed seventh in the 1600 run.

Hamilton Heights' Sierra Brown placed fifth in the 100 hurdles, the event she won last year. Brown's time was 14.56 seconds. Westfield's Karen Hubbard earned a medal in her first state appearance, placing seventh in the 100 dash.







# Cline, Holba lead Indiana Junior All-Stars

Hyron Edwards of East Chicago Central poured in 20 points to pace eight players in double figures Friday night (June 6), leading the IndyStar.com Indiana Junior All-Stars boys to a 127-104 victory over Kentucky in the first of two basketball home-and-home doubleheaders.

Edwards added six rebounds and four assists while converting 8-of-10 shots overall and 4-of-5 3-pointers as the Hoosier boys extended their series edge to 4-1 over Kentucky in the third-year event.

Earlier, Lamina Cooper of Lawrence North scored 14 points and Darby Maggard of Fort Wayne Concordia added 13 points as the Indiana girls defeated Kentucky 98-67 to move to 5-0 in their series against the Bluegrass girls.

The Indiana Junior All-Stars will square off in another doubleheader against Kentucky on Saturday (June 7) at Paul Laurence Dunbar High School in Lexington. The girls' game begins at 5:30 p.m., and the boys' game will follow.

In the boys game Friday, Jordan Geist of Penn and K.J. Walton of Brownsburg each added 17 points for Indiana, which set records for points in a game, field goals in a game (49) and 3-pointers in a game (16) in the fledgling series.

Four players -- Davon Dillard of Bowman Academy, Ryan Cline of Carmel, Ryan Fazekas of Marquette Catholic and Josh Speidel of Columbus North -- each contributed 12 points for the Hoosiers. Tahjai Teague of Pike chipped in 10 points, while Matt Holba netted seven points for Indiana.

Speidel grabbed a team-high 11 rebounds, while Geist dished six assists and Cline dealt five assists.

James Bolden of Holmes scored a team-high 17 points for Kentucky, which took an early 8-0 lead but then saw Indiana rally for a 50-43 edge at the half. Jalen Perry of Louisville Ballard added 14 points, while Jaqualis Matlock of Hopkinsville tallied 13 points and Aric Holman of Owensboro had 11 points.

Indiana took complete control in the second half, outscoring the visitors 77-61 at the break in the game played in two 20-minute halves at Greenfield-Central High School.

In the girls game, Homestead's Josie Fisher, Michigan City's Michal Miller, Merrillville's Victoria Gaines and Northwood's Jordyn Frantz all joined Cooper in Maggard in double figures for Indiana, which used a big surge in the middle of the first half to lead 45-28 at intermission.

Columbus North's Ali Patberg and Evansville Mater Dei's Tori Schickel each added nine points, while Bedford North Lawrence's Jenna Allen chipped in eight points for the winners. Cooper and Gaines each corralled a team-high seven rebounds, while Murphy, Maggard and Patberg each was credited with a team-high four assists.

Elizabethtown's Reauna Cleaver led Kentucky's girls with 14 points, but she did not receive near as much support. Joining her in double figures were Boyd County's Logan Fraley with 11 points as well as Ashland's Haley Sue Foutch and LaRue County's Alexis Brewer with 10 points apiece.

Next week, the Indiana Junior All-Stars will play the Indiana Senior All-Stars in a pair of girl-boy doubleheaders -- at 6 p.m. Monday (June 9) at Logansport High School and at 6 p.m. Wednesday (June 11) at Columbus North High School.
