Dick Nyers Indiana Football Hall of Fame induction is long overdue

the Baltimore Colts showed up at a small Hamilton County high school looking for a teaching and coaching job. It was the school's lucky day.

Dick Nyers, a na-

tive Hoosier, was hired at Carmel High School to coach a football team that had a less than spectacular history in the sport. That fall only 29 youngsters showed up wanting to play at the school which had barely 400 students.

In his first year, Nyers' team was 5-5 for the season. That was followed by nine seasons with winning records including two undefeated years. The young coach had started a winning tradition. Since then Carmel has been the state's team to beat for half a century.

Dick was in Carmel on Tuesday to have lunch with some of his former students and players. He's now 79 and lives in Columbus, Indiana, but says he still closely follows all Carmel sports in the news media.

During lunch the veteran coach mod-In the summer of 1958 a just-released estly mentioned that on June 12 he will be inducted into the Indiana Football Hall of Fame. It is certainly an overdue honor for the former high school, college and professional player and coach at the high school and college level.

> Dick played for Manual High School and then for Indiana Central College (now University of Indianapolis), before playing for the Colts where he caught Johnny Unitas' first touchdown pass as a pro. But, after two seasons the Colts said they no longer needed Dick's services. He was later offered a position with a West Coast team, an offer he turned down because he had by then already accepted the Carmel job.

> After ten successful years at Carmel, he was offered and accepted an assistant coaching job at Ball State, then the head position at his alma mater, Indiana Central. He left coaching in the 1970s to enter the private sector with Arvin Industries in Columbus. Next, he started a woodworking business of his own.

> Later he sold the business and retired. Now he plays a lot of golf and enjoys time with family and old friends. He's a legend in Indiana football and a good friend of a grateful Carmel sports community.


In its hey-day, Arcadia was home to This is a special invitation to join glass and tin factories powered by the natufriends and have some ral gas boom of the 1880s, and later through alternative means of power. Arcadia is one of several towns that dotted the inter-urban rail line, one of the largest electrical trolley systems in the country.

The Arcadia Depot is a part of this rich railroad history. The historic Nickel Plate Road began as the Peru & Indianapolis Railroad in 1849. Many mergers later, the Nickel Plate was part of a comprehensive network that featured 1,683 miles of track, including the 30 miles that constitute the Nickel Plate Arts Trail today. This portion of the track is owned by the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority, operated by Hamilton County, Fishers and Noblesville and is still affectionately referred to as the Nickel Plate.

The Historic Depot, located on South Street, is one block south of Main, on the east side of the railroad Come in and see our large collection of Arcadia Glass which was made in Arcadia between 1914 and 1932, as well as several artifacts of Arcadia's rich

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



Noblesville baseball coach Justin Keever did an extremely-successful juggling act on the mound at Lafayette's historic Loeb Stadium Saturday evening as his Millers came from behind to defeat Ft. Wayne Carroll, 7-4, in the championship game of the IHSAA Class 4A Regional.

By winning, the Millers advance to next Saturday's one-game semi-state, playing Lake Central. The game will be played either at Kokomo or Plymouth.

Keever, his back to the wall after Carroll exploded for three runs in the top of the first, sent four pitchers from a deep, deep hurling staff to the mound in clinching the championship.

Earlier in the day, Noblesville advanced to the title game with a 7-3 win over Homestead.

Keever started the championship tilt with lefty Trevor Salmon on the mound. He lasted just six batters and one out as Carroll exploded for three runs on a walk, a single and two doubles.

In came another lefty, Cory Conway, Nob who got Noblesville out of the first with a double-play ball and then fanned the side in the second.

"Conway was the perfect replacement," explained Keever. "He was the only pitcher not being used as a position-player at the time. It would have been difficult to go with one of the other starters at that time."

But, Conaway, a sophomore who had pitched four innings earlier in the day, tired in the third, giving up two hits and a walk and Carroll's fourth (and final) run of the night.

"Conway had thrown 55 pitches in the earlier game," said Keever.

In came a third lefty, Zach St. Pierre.

"St. Pierre did a great job of shutting them down," said Keever.

St. Pierre got the third out in the third and then held Carroll scoreless on just one hit through the next three innings.

St. Pierre struck out the first Carroll batter in the seventh, but then walked the next and Keever went to the mound for a fourth time, this time picking right-hander Garrett Christman from his shortstop position. Christman gave up a hit, but then nailed the next two Carroll hitters to send his team off to the semi-state.

After Carroll scored the three runs in the top of the first, Noblesville started to eat away at the lead in the bottom of the frame, scoring one run. Andrew Wilson tripled and scored on a wild pitch.

It was the third inning when the Millers took charge, scoring four times to take a 5-4 lead. Wilson, St. Pierre and Dax McLochlin all drew walks in the frame. A sacrifice fly off the bat of Vinny Essig got Noblesville one run. Easton Brock was hit by the pitcher, forcing a second run; and then a single by Connor Christman and a Carroll error on the

starter Garrett Christman allowed six hits Zack St. Pierre and three runs in the first three innings, but Conway pitched the last four and allowed just one hit while fanning seven.

Noblesville scored five times in the fifth. breaking open what had been a tight game.

The Millers collected eight hits, including a double and two singles by Essig. St. Pierre and McLochlin each doubled in the game.



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

Greyhounds dominate for seventh state championship

The words "Carmel" and "tennis" go together like "serve" and "volley."

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
