Logan Street Community Bank robbed, suspect caught

A Noblesville man was taken into custody Wednesday afternoon after allegedly robbing the Community Bank at 830 Logan St. in Noblesville.

Robert A. Gagle, 50, was apprehended at the CVS Pharmacy on the east side of Noblesville. He was transported to the Hamilton County Jail and booked on one count of Robbery, a Class B Felony and one count of Theft.

Officers from the Noblesville Police Department were called to Community Bank shortly before noon upon hearing the report of the robbery. Officers arrived on the scene and made contact with the bank employees.

Evidence at the scene and witness statements indicate that a white male came into the bank and demanded money from the teller. It was reported that the suspect displayed a handgun during the robbery. The suspect took an undetermined amount of money and fled the scene. There were no injuries reported.

Officers immediately established a perimeter in the area and utilized police canines in an attempt to locate the suspect. The perimeter was lifted at approximately 1 p.m. without the suspect being located.

CALLER ALERTS POLICE

The NPD publicized the robbery on news and social media, and it believes that's what led to the apprehension of the suspect. They gave the description of the suspect as "a white male approximately 30-35 years of age. He was wearing a long sleeve flannel shirt, full-length blue jeans and a baseball cap at the time of the robbery."

At approximately 3:53 p.m., a 911 caller contacted the Hamilton County Communications Center and advised that Gagle was located at the CVS Pharmacy at 2550 Conner St. Officers arrived on the scene and located a person matching the description. The subject was taken into custody without incident.

After further investigation, investigators petitioned for and were subsequently granted a search warrant for the subject's vehicle. Investigators believe that they located items relevant to the criminal investigation surrounding the alleged robbery.

In a statement, the NPD said it "would like to thank all of the media outlets for their coverage of this incident. During the investigative process, investigators learned that the 911 call was placed after a citizen viewed news coverage on the internet and was able to identify the suspect by the photos NPD supplied to the media."

United Way trains volunteers for disaster preparation

In a joint effort to prepare Hamilton County for any type of disaster, the United Way and Hamilton County Emergency Management participated in a two day course to train volunteers. According to United Way Hamilton County Area Director, Joan Isaac, "this is the first training of its kind that we have done in Hamilton County, we have done several in Marion County but wanted to extend the training north". The class was put on at the Hamilton County 4H building and about 40 volunteers from across Hamilton County participated.

The course is entitled "Disaster Reservist Training". The Disaster Reservist assists year-round in disaster preparation and is activated during a disaster to help run the Volunteer Reception Center (VRC). Duties during activation can include matching volunteers with agencies, processing walk-ins and phone volunteers, conducting interviews, replying to queries about the VRC, and assisting Volunteer Center staff however he/she is able.

The Disaster Reservist fulfills vital VRC roles, allowing the VRC to mobilize quickly and efficiently. Volunteers who sign up to be Disaster Reservists will receive ongoing training and information about disaster preparedness, and take part in any drills and exercises related to the VRC.

Hamilton County Emergency Management Director Tom Sivak interacted with

Mick Donoff, a Noblesville native, last week completed a trip from his current home in Laguna Beach, California to St. Augustine, Florida. Not so unusual except he made the 3,069-mile trip on a bicycle.



More interesting is the fact that he is 70 years old. In top physical condition, he does not look his age.
Mick is no stranger to bike riding. For the past 36 years he has ridden, sometimes competitively, and has been a runner for years. He and his wife, Sharon, have lived in Laguna Beach for 38 years. For 25 years Mick was a high school teacher and track coach.

Donoff is the son of the late Jules and Betty Donoff of Noblesville. His father was a career Firestone employee. His mother was a former city clerk-treasurer. A brother, Tad, lives in Southern California.

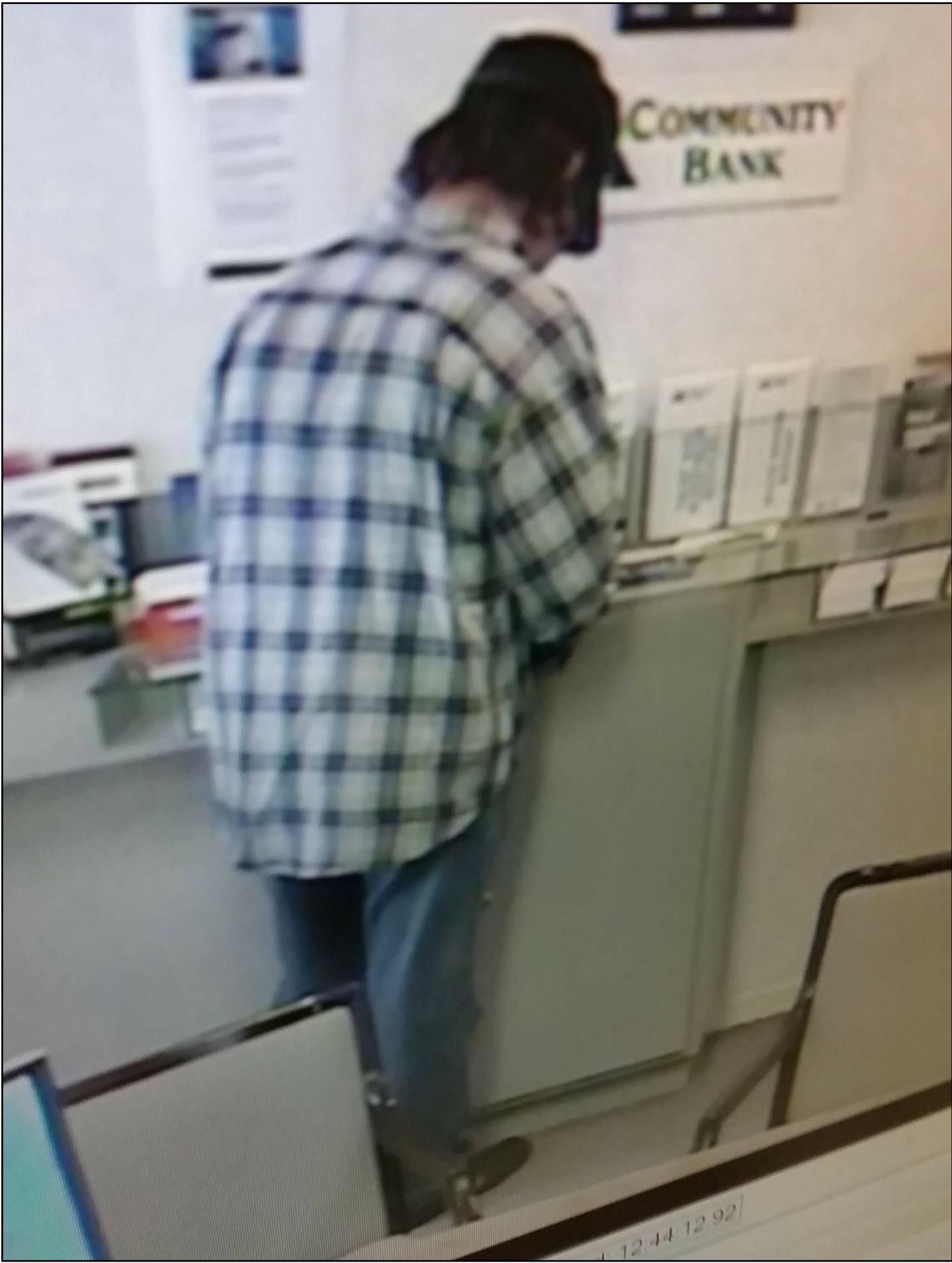
Mick made the bike trek for a charity, Stand Up 2 Cancer, for which he solicited contributions. His goal was \$10,000. He set out on the long ride in April hoping to make about 100 miles per day. He said, however, he would be in no hurry, wanting to see the sites along the way.

In Austin, Texas, he spent a few days. Sharon had arranged to meet him there with some supplies. But, he generally traveled light with a sleeping bag, small tent, a change of clothes, some bicycle tools and his phone and camera. Some of the photos he took are posted on Facebook.

Mick thought St. Augustine would be the right destination for his trip. He points out that is where Ponce de Leon claimed to have discovered the Fountain of Youth. "I figured I'd need it about then," he quipped.

Roundabout construction expected to last 60 days...

Smokey Row/Old Meridian closure starts tonight

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plan to temporarily close access to and from Smokey Row Road at Old Meridian Street to construct a roundabout. The 60-day closure is scheduled to begin Thursday night.

Traffic on Old Meridian and 136th Street will be shifted and lane designations will be adjusted to accommodate construction of the roundabout. Access to Smokey Row Road will remain available via Range Line Road during the closure.

Roundabouts are becoming a relatively common traffic feature in Indiana, with

more than 90 constructed through 2013 by both INDOT and cities and towns. For more information on modern roundabouts, go to <http://www.in.gov/indot/3249.htm>.

UPCOMING CHANGES AT I-465 INTERCHANGE

Beginning on or after June 23, the westbound I-465 exit to U.S. 31/Meridian Street will be restricted to one lane at the top of the ramp. The exit ramp will have two left turn lanes and two right turn lanes onto U.S. 31/Meridian Street. The traffic shifts will require overnight (9 p.m. to 6 a.m.) restrictions on the ramps as contractors modify

pavement markings. The ramp configuration is expected to remain in place through the end of this year.

E & B Paving and Gradex are INDOT contractors for the \$141 million contract to upgrade U.S. 31 to freeway standards from 96th Street to the Monon overpass. The contract builds new roundabout interchanges at 106th, 116th, 131st and 136th streets and improvements to the U.S. 31 and I-465 interchange, including two flyover ramps from southbound U.S. 31 to eastbound I-465 and eastbound I-465 to northbound U.S. 31.

Southeastern’s final hurdle...

Bloomington tough on mound

Back on April 26 when Hamilton Southeastern edged Bloomington South, 4-3, it’s doubtful if the two softball teams had any idea they would meet in June for the IHSAA Class 4A state championship.

But, that’s exactly what will happen Saturday when the Lady Royals from HSE and the Lady Cougars from Bloomington bring their talents to Ben Davis High School for a 7:30 p.m. matchup.

There were times this season for Southeastern when David Cook’s traditionally tough club must have wondered if it would even escape the sectional, let alone play for all the marbles.

Towards the end of the season Southeastern lost five in a row. The Royals lost 6-of-7. They finished their last 11 games with a 3-8 mark.

“We were going through a period of time when we didn’t have Maggie Armstrong. She was injured and not having her on the mound, or at shortstop, or at the plate hurt the confidence of this team,” Cook said. “Savanna Copeland (the standout freshman pitcher) lost confidence when Maggie wasn’t pitching and when Maggie wasn’t playing shortstop. Armstrong also was our No. 3 hitter.

“Things started to turn around after Maggie returned,” Cook continued. “It didn’t happen quickly. It kind of happened gradually.

“We didn’t play well in the opening game of the sectional against Westfield, but then we beat Fishers 1-0 after they had handled us pretty easily during the season. We then won a slugfest from Carmel in the championship game.”

Arguably, Southeastern’s wins over very good Fishers and Carmel teams were upsets. Then, the Royals knocked off No. 2

Harrison in the regional and defeated good teams from Penn and Huntington North in the semi-state.

“The teams we’ve been facing were tough teams,” Cook said.

Now comes another toughie, Bloomington South.

“Their good pitcher didn’t throw against us when we beat them, and neither did Copeland,” Cook pointed out.

Bloomington ace is a junior, Olivia White. She is 17-4; has a 1.83 ERA and has fanned 168 batters in 149.2 innings. She has allowed only two runs in Bloomington South’s last six games. She hurled five consecutive shutouts in tourney play until New Castle scored a run and lost 2-1 in the semi-state finale last week.

“She is a very good pitcher,” Cook said of White.

So is Copeland, the Southeastern freshman. Savanna is 14-8 with a 2.70 ERA. She has fanned 223 batters in 142.2 innings. And, of course, waiting n the wings, now apparently completely healthy, is Armstrong. She is 6-0 with a 1.99 ERA and 29 strikeouts in 31.2 innings.

Both teams have excellent hitters. Leading Southeastern are is Madi Maloff, a junior outfielder who is batting .514. Ashley Rohr is hitting .385, Armstrong .372 and Copeland 356.

Cook has a young team with only three seniors. Two start, Natalie Heiniger who is batting .293 and Sydney Payne who is hitting .275. Both are outfielders.

Bloomington South has an even .500 hitter, junior second baseman Ali Sexton. Elizabeth Getz is batting .414; Addie Behham .403 and Mena Fulton .384. Behham is a freshman on a team loaded with seniors.

This is Cook’s and Southeastern’s third trip to the State Finals. They won the other

Sixty years ago, the Milan basketball team completed its miracle. Rollin Cutter didn't just remember it, he lived it. He was part of the Milan team that won the 1954 basketball state championship. Cutter joined some of his former teammates and life-long friends at Victory Field on Wednesday, where the Indianapolis Indians honored Milan prior to its game. "It's supposed to be fun and it has been so far," said Cutter after the ceremonies. Each team member also got to throw out a first pitch, and all of them did quite well. Cutter is well-known and well-regarded in the Noblesville community. He worked as a guidance counselor at Noblesville High School for 19 years, and also worked in that position at Carmel High School. His resume of teaching/coaching stops is almost

like a basketball schedule: Syracuse, Brownsburg and Arlington. "All of those were coaching and teaching responsibilities," said Cutter. After graduating from Milan, Cutter joined some of his teammates at Butler University. "Unfortunately didn't get to play a lot of basketball because I got a knee torn up early my freshman year," said Cutter. "But I enjoyed it, got my degree there, enjoyed my 38 years of teaching. Even after 60 years, Milan continues to be remembered today. Cutter credits the movie "Hoosiers," which is based on the Milan Miracle, as something that has helped keep Milan in the public consciousness. "I think it's amazing that it's lasted this long," said Cutter.
