








Next comes State on Friday

Justin Keever could only sit in his home team dugout at The Dunk and watch the lightning, sheets of rain and even some hail fall onto the baseball diamond. Noblesville's open house and sneak state tourney preview was a washout Wednesday evening.

You wonder if Keever was hoping he could take some of the thunder with his offense when the Millers face Terre Haute North on Friday (7:30 p.m.) at Victory Field in Indianapolis.

He might need it, Keever said.

"Terre Haute is a good hitting team," said the coach.

But, not quite as good hitting team as Noblesville. The Millers will enter the Class 4A state championship game with a .333 team batting average. Terre Haute North, as a team, is hitting .331.

But, what is kind of scary about the Patriots is that they have blasted 33 home runs, scored 245 runs and have totaled 201 RBIs. Noblesville has 16 home runs, 237 runs and 193 RBIs.

"They can score runs," said Keever.

While Noblesville's offense is wellbalanced from top to bottom of the lineup, Terre Haute North has a super star, one of the state's better players. T.J. Collett, a sophomore catcher, is batting .524 with 17 home runs, 12 doubles and 51 runs batted

While Noblesville has no Miller who can match Collett's totals, everyone Keever sends to the plate can hit the baseball, led by senior outfielder Andrew Wilson with a .402 mark. Brian McLean is hitting .353; Zach St. Pierre .393, Bret Rundle .272, Easton Brock .395, Austin Shirley .308, Vinny Essig .314, Garrett Christman .342, Dax McLochlin .294, Trevor Salmon .300, and Connor Christman .292.

In not many games this season has a Miller or two had "off nights" that another Miller or two didn't pick them up.

The power guys in Noblesville's lineup are Essig with six home runs and St. Pierre and Wilson with five each.

Wilson and Essig each have 26 RBIs, followed by McLochlin 23, Garrett Christman and Connor Christman 22 each they can put runs on the board and they and St. Pierre with 19.

Few Democrats on ballots could mean trouble for GOP state races

In less than two weeks more than 50 unopposed candidates county, city and township office appear headed for election by default. June 30 is the deadline for Democrats to fill their ticket for the November 4 gen-

eral election. Thus far there has been no indication candidates will be placed on the ballot by the party's central committee which is permitted by state

That will make the November voting a formality. It's the typical story for the minority party in Hamilton County. Few Democrats want to run because their chances of winning are slim, very slim. There are reports that a few have been asked and are considering it, but it will be few if any who end up placing their names on the bal-

The unopposed candidates, all Republicans, are those running for 11 city offices in Fishers, 10 county courthouse positions and a host of township offices. At the top of the ballot there will be five contested races, for Congress, for Indiana Secretary of State. Auditor, Treasurer and state legislature, but no presidential race, no governor's election, not even a U.S. Senate contest

So unless Democrats file candidates soon, the ballot is going to be very one-sided below those first five contested races. Thus far their only local candidates are three for Fishers City Council, one for Sheridan Town Council and one for the Clay Twp.


Obviously, this means no success for the Democrats, and oddly it could be bad news for the Republicans as

With almost no contests at the local level in an off-year election, voter turnout is expected to be light. And, judging from the record light vote in the May primary, the assumption would be another poor showing which is bad for the GOP in statewide contests where Hamilton County is usually counted upon to produce a big plurality for the party's slate.

About half of Gov. Mike Pence's winning margin in 2012 came out of this county. The state GOP organiza-


