

### Defense comes up big for Millers at Victory Field

Yes, big hits in baseball are exciting.

But so are big defensive plays, especially if your team is the one making them. Just ask Noblesville fans, who were cheering every time the Millers turned a double play, got a big strikeout, got another big strikeout, picked a runner off...

And of course, they were cheering when Noblesville held up the big state championship trophy. The 2014 edition of the Millers made history at Victory Field Friday night, beating Terre Haute North 2-1 for the Class 4A title. It's the first-ever win for Noblesville's baseball program, and it was accomplished as part of an unforgettable game in front of crowd of 4,961, a record for a play. Friday night championship game.

"These guys have been good all year long," said Millers coach Justin Keever. "They won the toughest conference in Indiana (the Hoosier Crossroads Conference), they win the toughest sectional in Indiana, they go and play in a really tough regional, and these kids just found a way all year

ble plays in the first and third innings, turning potential Patriot scoring opportunities into the end of the inning. Third baseman Connor Christman got the play started in the first inning, while shortstop Vinny Essig got it going in the third. Both times, the ball was played to second baseman Michael Carmosino, and he got it over to first baseman Dax McLochlin in time.

Keever said those double plays were big, especially in the first inning, with a run already on the scoreboard.

"They could have had a chance of hanging a crooked number there," said Keever, who credited starting pitcher Garrett Christman with inducing the first-inning double

"Defense came up big," said McLochlin. "I think the middle infield was great." He credited Carmosino, and Essig with McLochlin made some of those big plays himself. Noblesville played error-free ball on the night.






