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



Garrick Mallery Day

The City of Noblesville celebrated "Garrick Mallory Day" on Sunday. Mallery has been a leader in Noblesville for decades. He was honored with an open house at the Noblesville Forest Park Inn that day.

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear issued the following proclamation:

WHEREAS, In 1820, a pioneer family by the name of Mallery arrived in Hamilton County. Mr. Garrick Mallery was born in Wayne Township in 1927 and has since been a resident of Hamilton County. He earned a degree in agricultural economics from Purdue University; hosted a weekly farm show on Purdue's radio station, WBAA; attended the United States Military Academy at West Point; and also served as an Officer in the Cryptography Division of the United States Army. Garrick married Nancy Everson of Fishers, Indiana and they had four children; Carol, John, Fred, and David; and



WHEREAS, In 1951, Garrick returned to Noblesville to begin his career in real estate. He has served Noblesville in many capacities over the years. These accomplishments include being one of the founders of the Noblesville Elementary Football League; Finance Chairman for the construction of the First United Methodist Church on Monument Street; a dedicated 4-H Leader for more than 25 years; and President and longtime Director of the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce; and

WHEREAS, During his first year as Director of the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce in 1962, the inaugural Christmas Parade was held. Garrick portrayed Santa in the parade for the following seven years, as well as in the 50th Anniversary of the parade in 2012; and

WHEREAS, Garrick Mallery has put his stamp on Noblesville and Hamilton County by appraising, developing, buying and selling real estate. He has seen it all from selling his first house in Noblesville for \$3,000 in 1947 to helping other developers locate and purchase a site that he used to pass by on bus on the way to school, now known across the country as Klipsch Music

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Up to 400 new jobs created... Systems in Motion expands Carmel, Kokomo operations



Millers win H League Tourney...

Varsity edged by Marion

What the coach called a "great week" nearly ended with a perfect Sunday for the Noblesville High School basketball teams at the Super Hoops Tourney in Marion.

Almost perfect. A couple of points shy of perfect.

Sunday began with Noblesville's H varsity team (the second varsity team) winning the bracketed tourney by pulling back to back upsets over heavily favored teams from Penn and Hamilton Southeastern.

Noblesville defeated Southeastern, 43-39, in the H tourney championship game after edging Penn, 37-35, in the semifinal round. Early in the morning, the Millers started their day by beating Western.

Noblesville had finished 4-4 in the pool play, action which included a 36-31 loss to Southeastern. The Royals breezed through pool play with a 7-1 record, losing only to Penn, 41-29.

While the H team was doing something which, arguably, not many thought would happen, Noblesville's No. 1 varsity team, in the S League, on Sunday made it to the finals in the consolation round, losing, 28-26, to the Marion Giants. The Millers missed a wide-open, 10-footer on the base line and Marion rebounded with a fast break bucket to win the game.

Noblesville finished 4-4 in pool play and then on Sunday fell, for the second time in the tourney, to eventual tourney champion Columbia City.

Falling to the consolation bracket, the varsity Millers trailed East Noble, 21-19, at halftime, an East Noble team Noblesville had easily defeated 48-32 Saturday in pool play.

Junior-to-be John Kiser opened the second half with four straight field goals and senior-to-be Sean Wilson scored five straight points to sail Noblesville into the lead. Kiser scored 14 points in the half and finished the game with 20 points. Also in the fourth quarter pounding NHS dished out to East Noble, sophomore-to-be Max Finchum fired in a pair of 3-pointers and senior-to-be Joey Brewer and senior-to-be Joey Herron each connected from the field.

"It was a great week," said Miller coach Brian McCauley. "This team got better, and that's what we were trying to do."

Against East Noble, Noblesville's 10th game of the weekend, Kiser took over like, perhaps, no Miller took over in the tourney.

"We'll need that from all our players," McCauley said. "We've been together for only three weeks, so it's still a learning
