Final part: Neal on responsibility...

## Newspapers' right to interpret

Editor's Note: This is the third in a three-part series as The Hamilton County Reporter publishes a story written by Noblesville Daily Ledger co-owner and editor Jim Neal in the newspaper's 100th anniversary edition in 1988. Neal wrote on the "responsibility of the press."

Part 2 of the series left off with Neal writing about key issues in Hamilton County and how the newspaper focused on those issues.

He wrote about how the Indianapolis Water Company operated in secret when purchasing land for Morse Reservoir. He wrote on the consolidation of Hamilton County schools in 1950. He wrote on sports coverage in the 1950s when the community erupted during a 20-game losing streak by the basketball team.

Today, the article resumes with Neal writing about how governments often did business behind closed door.

outside of doors.

It is difficult to understand why so many local public officials find it necessary to meet privately, or confidentially, or in secret when handling public business.

Over the years doors have been closed in city halls, county offices, school board meetings and wherever elected and appointed public servants congregate.

One group of elected school board members campaigned criminal news, regardless of the person's status in life. for election on a platform that they would meet only in public. They held their first meeting in secret.

Hamilton County's Board of Commissioners has traditionally met in secret over the years. The commissioners have been known to meet privately in Ledger reporters spend a lot of time looking at the restaurants before their regular meetings. They also have transacted public business over the telephone and in their cars enroute to meetings – all in violation of Indiana's open door law.

> The question is should the press continue to expose these violations until both elected and appointed officials meet in full public view?

## Facing my fears

man year of high school. I remember well. That summer my best friend, Patrice, I went camping with my parents in Mountains. was one of my

favorite vacations. It was also the first time I remember facing fear.

We ventured around an amusement park until we came to...The Mouse. It was an old, rickety, wooden roller coaster. Patrice said "let's go!" My heart screamed "No Way!" She kept pleading. I kept resisting. It was a gentle tug of war. Finally, Patrice won.

I remember feeling as if my heart would beat out of my chest as we stood in line. Patrice kept telling me how much fun it would be. Fear left me speechless while my mind did the arguing. I climbed into the back of the car that held two people. Patrice told me to shut my eyes and hang on...for dear life.

As the car climbed to the top of the first hill I remember thinking that I was going to faint. Actually, I wanted to faint. As the car made the drop I promised Patrice and God that I would never ride another roller coaster again. I had faced fear and fear had won.

Since that summer of 1971 I have faced other fears. Most of them I have overcome.

For many years I had a fear of flying. Larry Jacobi, a friend, teacher and pilot taught me that turbulence is like a bumpy road. Whenever I fly, I think of his words. If his words don't help, I carry a little Xanax.

When I first started writing I had a fear of what people would say about my thoughts. The truth is...I still do. I wrestle with my thoughts as I press the keys on the keyboard and my heart races as I click "send" to Don Jellison, my editor.

Some fears are real, maybe only to us, but it's just the way that we are wired. Overcoming some of my fears has felt good. It has made me stronger and more confident. I can speak in front of a large crowd of people, I can drive a large commercial truck and I can travel alone without being afraid, yet the thought of skydiving, bungee jumping



# Hamilton County Reporter Girls Track and Field Athlete of the Year Rachel Mather, Noblesville




