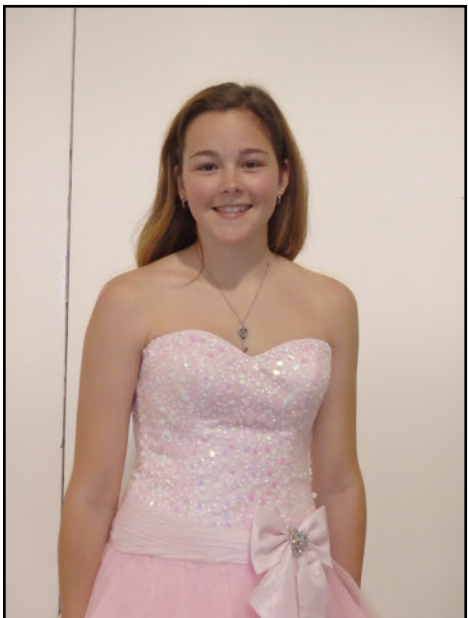

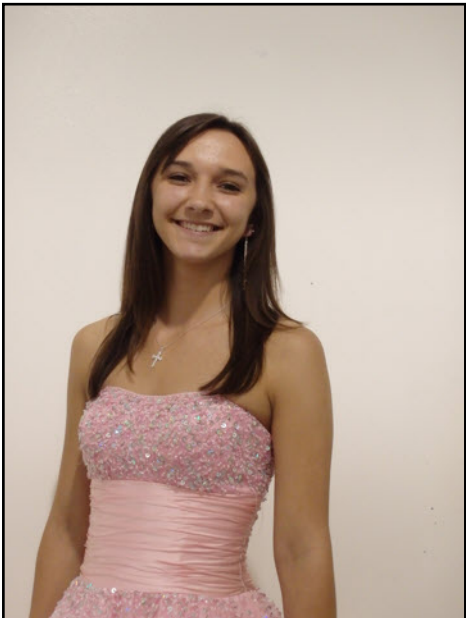

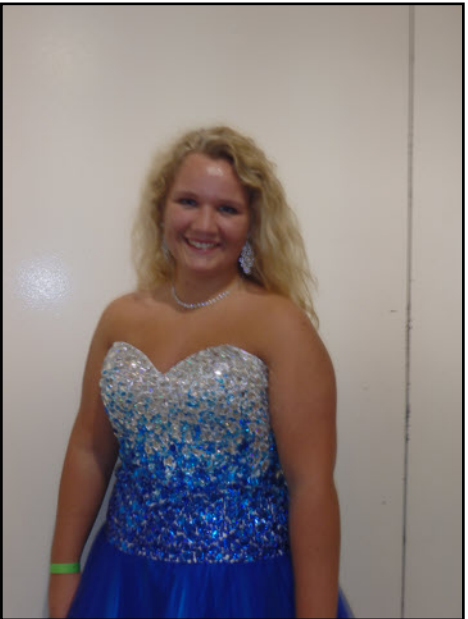

Smith to become executive director at ISBA

Dr. Brian Smith, superintendent of Hamilton Southeastern Schools, will be moving from one big leadership position to another.
Smith was selected as the executive director of the Indiana School Boards Association on Tuesday. ISBA president Larry Stillson and search committee chair Sally Krouse made the announcement, and it was a happy one.
"The ISBA is excited and honored to make this announcement and welcome Dr. Smith to our association," said Mr. Stillson. "Since the ISBA was established in 1949, we have only had 6 executive directors, so it is quite apparent we are very deliberate in choosing our leadership. Dr. Smith is a dedicated visionary who has served with

distinction as a prominent educator in Indiana for many years. He has been nominated as a regional candidate for superintendent of the year and was selected as the national superintendent of the year by the National Association for Gifted Children. His depth of experience and breadth of knowledge make him a perfect choice to lead our organization."
Before serving as a superintendent, Dr. Smith was a principal at Edinburgh High School and also taught at Marion High School. Dr. Smith earned his Educational Specialist and Master of Arts degrees from Ball State University and his Educational Doctorate degree from Indiana University.
"I'm excited about serving as ISBA's new executive director," said Dr. Smith. "Representing almost 1700 school board

members, ISBA is clearly an outstanding platform from which to pursue and support excellence in education. Getting to meet and serve board members from across Indiana is a responsibility I look forward to."
"Our loss is most certainly the Indiana School Boards Association's gain," said John DeLucia, president of the HSE School Board. "Dr. Smith has been a terrific leader for our district. While we may be sad to see him go, we are pleased that he is taking a position that will allow us to continue to work with him."
The ISBA, located in downtown Indianapolis, provides numerous services to the boards of 289 Indiana public school corporations, which are entrusted with governing and overseeing Indiana's P-12 public schools. The mission of the Association is

to assist local school boards in their respective governance roles by providing education and training, conducting seminars and conferences, offering legal services, and leading legislative advocacy, to ensure the opportunity for the highest quality public education for all of Indiana's children. ISBA works closely with the National School Boards Association in Washington, D.C., as well as dozens of other educational organizations and governmental authorities throughout the state.
Smith will retire/resign from Hamilton Southeastern on Sept. 1, 2014, and assume his new duties as executive director of ISBA on Sept. 2.

Tipton County wind farm development falls through

juwi Wind announced today that it no longer plans to pursue the development of the Prairie Breeze Wind Farm, a wind energy project in Tipton County, Indiana that would have had a nameplate capacity of approximately 150 megawatts.
"Withdrawing from a late-stage development project is always a difficult decision," said Mike Martin, president of juwi Wind, "especially when the development work has complied with all substantive and procedural regulations, and juwi has had the support of dedicated and civic-minded landowners and other community members who championed the merits of this project."
A key reason that juwi originally identified Tipton County as a desirable site for the Prairie Breeze Wind Farm was the clear regulatory guidelines concerning wind projects because a straightforward local regulatory scheme typically reduces development risk. However, the permitting authority that issued the principal permit for the project, the Tipton County Board of Zoning Appeals, imposed conditions that juwi believes were outside of its administrative authority and which effectively rendered the project impossible to build.
Consequently, juwi and a group of landowners in support of the project jointly initiated a lawsuit against the BZA to reform the conditions of the permit. juwi strongly believes in the merits of the litigation and believes the ultimate outcome of the lawsuit would allow the Prairie Breeze Wind Farm to be constructed. But, the continuing litigation costs and indefinite time period associated with pursuing the permits through litigation no longer make sense for the company.
juwi officials noted that although the company has decided to withdraw from the project, there are other plaintiffs involved in the lawsuit who may choose to continue pursuing their claims against the BZA. To facilitate these efforts, juwi has already begun the process of notifying the landowners and appropriate officials of its decision.

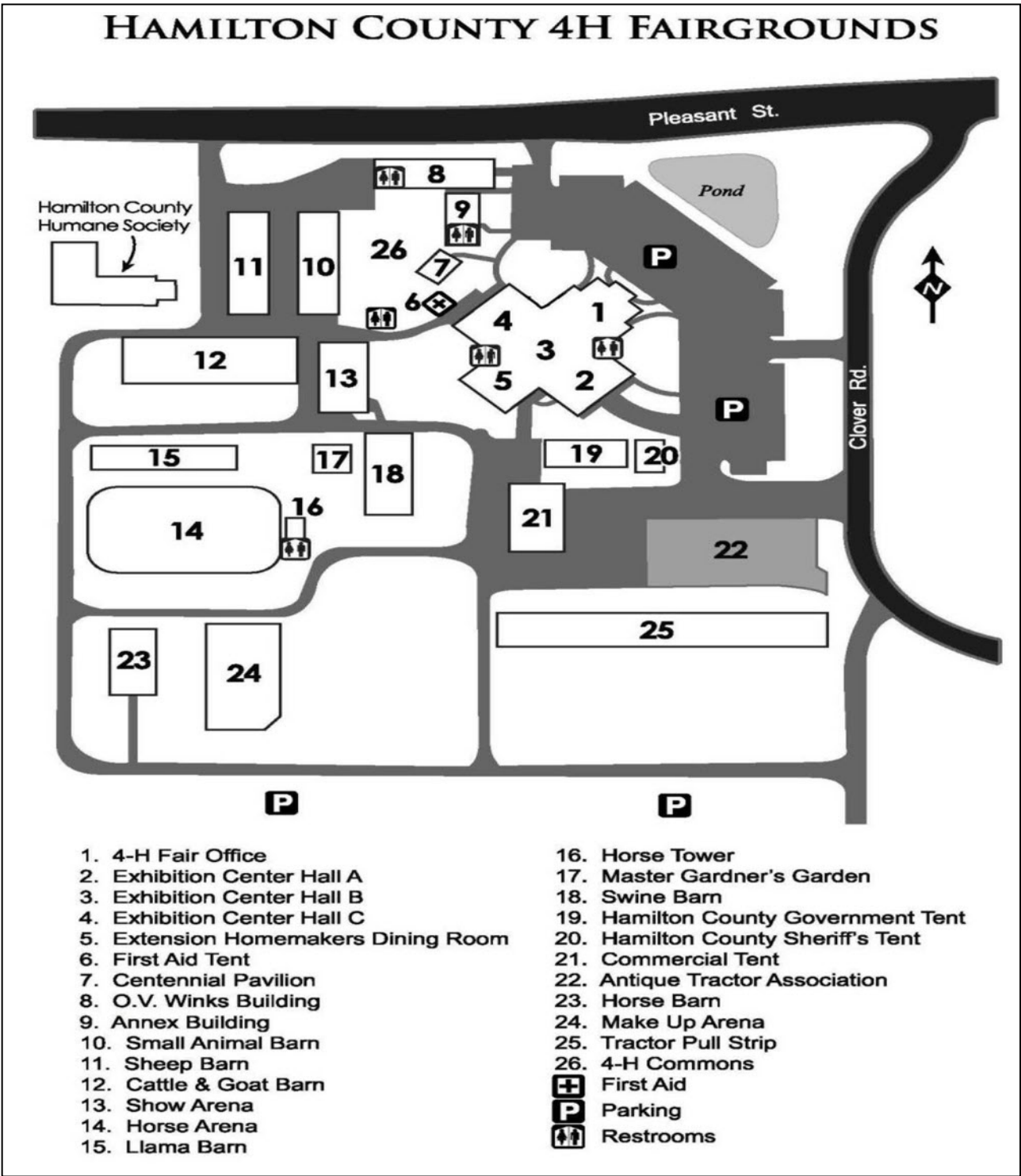

U.S. 31 updates...

Contractors setting beams at 136th, 169th streets

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plan to set beams this week for new interchange and overpass bridges as part of The New U.S. 31 Hamilton County freeway improvements.

Crews began to set bridge beams for U.S. 31 over 136th Street on Tuesday night, with work expected to finish by 6 a.m. Wednesday morning. The crews will continue that work Wednesday night between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. Temporary traffic stoppages of up to 20 minutes each should be expected on 136th Street while crews are setting the beams.

When construction is complete, an interchange will replace the existing signalized intersection, U.S. 31 will pass over 136th Street, and a roundabout on 136th Street will control traffic on interchange ramps and 136th Street.

Weather permitting, crews will set beams for U.S. 31 over 169th Street on Thursday night between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. The right lane of southbound U.S. 31 will be closed near 169th Street during this time. Temporary traffic stoppages on 169th Street may take place for up to 20 minutes each while crews are setting the beams.

Upon completion, 169th Street will cross under U.S. 31 with no direct access to

the freeway at this location. Nearby access will be provided by interchanges at State Road 32/Main Street and 161st Street.

181st Street west of US 31 temporarily closed

Beginning Monday, crews closed 181st Street between Market Court and US 31 (just west of US 31) for approximately three days for installation of a utility structure. Access to 181st Street will remain available to US 31 via SR 32.

Also on Monday, crews permanently closed access to/from US 31 at Blackburn Road and South Drive. The new connector road between Wheeler and Tomlinson roads is currently open, providing residents in North Glen Village access to their neighborhood. During the short-term closure of 181st Street (see above), access to North Glen Village will be maintained via SR 32 to Wheeler Road and 196th Street to Tomlinson Road. Advance warning signage will notify motorists of the closures on Blackburn Road and South Drive at US 31.

Statement from Dr. Brian Smith, HSE superintendent

The following statement from Dr. Brian Smith, superintendent of Hamilton Southeastern Schools, was posted on the HSE Web site following his appointment to the executive director position of the Indiana School Boards Association:

It is with mixed emotions that I will be leaving my position as superintendent of Hamilton Southeastern Schools to become the executive director of the Indiana School Boards Association. As often happens with career opportunities, more than one factor influenced the timing of this decision. First, the opening at ISBA is not one that occurs very often. Since 1975, only two people have directed ISBA in that capacity. Having served Indiana education for over 45 years in various capacities and in many different areas of the state, I believe this a rare opportunity to be a voice for Indiana public edu-

cation on a statewide basis. In addition, recent changes in the state teachers' retirement fund have prompted many long-time, seasoned educators, to consider retiring early. This combination of circumstances led me to conclude that this was the right time for me to make this career change.

I have been honored to serve HSE. Working with the students, teachers, administrators, school board, support staff, parents, community members, and the Town of Fishers has been an exceptional experience; and I have been privileged to be part of a community where a world-class education is an expectation.

Together, we've experienced countless successes. Our successes have come even though we have faced numerous funding challenges. Nevertheless, we have been able to develop effective strategies to allow

us to continue to provide an outstanding educational program for all of our students.

Through the HSE 21 Initiative, our engaged educators are learning more about teaching our students critical thinking and problem solving skills using innovative methods and collaborative activities that will prepare them to enter careers and professions and will serve them throughout their lifetimes.

Our long-term educational plan also addresses our ability to sustain academic excellence. We're expanding building capacity in a district that now educates over 21,000 students each year – a number that rivals many colleges and universities. With the completion of our senior academies and updates to state legislation allowing more autonomy for high performing schools, HSE students will have the capability to easily substitute college classes for high

school classes and complete up to two years of college credits prior to graduation.

My hope is to be able to one day reflect on the challenges we have faced and know that they were well managed and educationally transcendent for our students, parents and community. I am truly honored and privileged to have been able to serve Hamilton Southeastern Schools and become a part of Fishers, Indiana, where my wife and I will continue to live even as I take on a new position

In the meantime, I look forward to opening another school year and will remain with Hamilton Southeastern Schools through September 1, 2014. During that time, I will be working with the school board to ensure a smooth transition in new leadership for HSE.

Board “will be accelerating our process” to find new superintendent

Hamilton Southeastern's School Board released the following statement on the departure of Dr. Smith, which was also posted on HSE's Web site.

The Hamilton Southeastern Board of School Trustees congratulates Dr. Brian Smith on his appointment to become the Executive Director of the Indiana School Boards Association.

We have had a very strong and collaborative working relationship with Dr. Smith as our superintendent and Hamilton Southeastern Schools has experienced many innovative steps in education under his leadership. Although we will miss him

serving as our superintendent, we look forward to a continued relationship with Dr. Smith in his new role.

Dr. Smith's current contract set his planned retirement for June 2015, and because we were aware he had very recently been faced with considering earlier retirement due to the impact of a new change in the teacher retirement system, the Board had been developing a long-range succession planning process.

Given this and because of Dr. Smith's new opportunity, we will be accelerating our process of looking for a new superintendent. We realize this is an essential responsibility and it is incumbent upon us as

a Board to locate the right leader who can keep our remarkable district moving forward.

As we work through the process of finding our next superintendent, we are open to the possibility of hiring an interim superintendent. We recognize that a district our size requires a unique skill set and a level of

experience that requires our thoughtful and diligent consideration.

The Board is confident that our outstanding staff at HSE will continue delivering an exemplary education to all students.

Contact or visit your local shelters and animal control organizations. File a lost pet report with every shelter, dog pound and animal control office within a 60-mile radius of your home and visit the nearest shelters daily, if possible.

Get the word out to all veterinarians in the area. Sometimes people pick up a stray and drive it to a distant clinic.

Search your neighborhood. Walk or drive through your neighborhood several times each day. Enlist friends,

family and others to help you. Ask neighbors, letter carriers, and delivery people if they have seen your pet. Hand out a recent photograph of your pet and information on how you can be reached if your pet is found.

Go door to door and speak with your neighbors. The more people know you have lost a pet, and that you are upset, worried and desperately trying to find your pet, the more people will call you if they see an animal in the woods or on the road, or in their backyard.

Place posters and flyers throughout the neighborhood. Post notices at grocery stores, community centers, veterinary offices, traffic intersections, at pet supply stores, and other locations. Also, place advertisements in newspapers and with radio stations. Include your pet's sex, age, weight, breed, color, and any special markings. To avoid scams, when describing your pet, leave out one identifying characteristic and ask the person who finds your pet to describe it.

Post info about your pet on all pet recovery websites and services. Sites such as Craigslist.org,

TheCenterForLostPets.com and FidoFinder.com allow you to broadcast your missing pet info quickly. National pet care providers can be hired to assist you in your search for your lost pet.

Consider using a lost pet recovery service. There are now numerous lost pet alert services, such as FindToto.com, that will contact homes, veterinarians, shelters and animal control organizations for a reasonable fee.

Place food and water outside your home. Your pet may eventually return to your home when they get hungry or thirsty. Consider placing the food in a rented or purchased humane pet trap to capture them.

Tell everyone you see about your pet and ask them to keep their eyes open for her. The more people you alert about your missing pet, the greater the chance someone will recollect seeing your pet in their area.

Don't give up. Be aggressive in your search, get lots of help, get the word out right away – don't wait a few hours "to see if she'll come home on her own" – you need those early hours to put up posters and start your search.

Fishers Fire and Emergency Services Department receives Silver Award

Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Services has received the American Heart Association's Mission Lifeline EMS Silver Award that recognizes the commitment and success of Protecting the Heart of Fishers Initiative. Specifically, this award recognizes the measures of care for patients who suffer from a heart attack known as STEMI (ST Elevation Myocardial Infarction).

Fire Chief Steve Orusa, on behalf of the American Heart Association, presented this award to the Fishers Town Council last night, July 7.

Fishers Fire Department on average, transports heart attack victims to the cath labs 35 minutes faster than the national average. Through rapid recognition, early treatment and efficient transport to the appropriate facilities, patients' blood flow to the heart is re-established more quickly and saves lives.

Chief Orusa says "This cardiac blockage affects more than 200,000 people nationally each year, of which, over 60 percent of STEMI victims die without decisive medical treatment and transport."

Fishers Fire Department is one of three EMS providers in the state recognized by the AHA for their assessment and treatment of patients with heart attacks.

Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Service staffs three paramedic ambulances and four paramedic engines as a minimum, with most days having six paramedic engines available to respond.

Keever excited about games

In a new age of travel team baseball and even summer football being played at the same time, not always will all the best players picked for the Indiana North-South Baseball Classic report and play in the games.

Football and even basketball have gone through the same summer conflicts.

But, Noblesville coach Justin Keever, has been around the block long enough to know the history and the tradition of the North-South Classic. He is very excited to have been selected as coach of this year’s North Team.

The games will be played this Saturday and Sunday at Richmond’s McBride Stadium, one of Indiana’s long-time baseball diamond gems. The Saturday double-header will begin at 2 p.m. and a 12 noon Sunday single game will end the weekend activities.

“I’m excited,” said Keever. “It is a real honor to coach many of the state’s best seniors.”

Keever’s North roster is much like the roster of the Noblesville team he led to the Class 4A state championship only a few weeks ago.

The North Team is loaded.

“I’ve been able to research the players a little,” Keever said. “We’ve got some good players on the North team, and the South has some good players, too.”

Keever will have the thrill of being able to coach one of his own Millers, Garrett Christman.

“Garrett has been a real example for the younger kids,” Keever said. “He always prepares at a very high level and he plays at the championship level.”

Christman, also an outstanding shortstop and hitter, was selected to the North Team as a pitcher. That usually means he will pitch three innings and in another game(s) will be the designated hitter.

Keever said he is still conferring with his assistant coaches concerning the pitching rotation, but he plans on using Christman in the first game on

Saturday. Christman could be the opening pitcher, but also on the roster is another outstanding hurler, Hobart’s Brandon Murray, who is headed for a Division I college career at South Carolina.

Christman pitched Noblesville to the 4A championship game victory. He hurled in 76 innings this season and struck out 80 batters while walking just 18. He had an 8-1 won-lost record and a 2.08 ERA.

Keever also has another Hamilton County pitcher on his roster, Westfield’s Luke Dietz. He posted a 3.12 ERA in 43 innings, striking out 38 and walking 20. His record was 3-3.

Keever said it is likely that Dietz will pitch in Game 2 on Saturday.

Five seniors this season were selected in the Major League Draft. Four will play for the North Team. They are Christman, Murray, McCutcheon shortstop Logan Sowers and Bishop Noll shortstop Larry Crisler. Also on the North Team is Fort Wayne Carroll pitcher Taylor Goshen, who was selected this season to the Indiana All-State Team. The fifth drafted player is Valparaiso’s Andrew Sykes, who is not playing in the North-South Classic.

Two Hamilton County players will compete on the South Team. They are Hamilton Southeastern outfielder Tre Gantt and Fishers pitcher Nathaniel Rhodes.

Rhodes was 9-1 on the mound this season, losing only to Noblesville in the sectional.

Gantt, Hamilton County’s Player of the Year in 2013, missed much of this season with an injury, but still hit .371 and had six doubles, two triples and three home runs.

At a banquet on Friday evening, the Coaches Association will select Indiana’s Player of the Year. Some say it might be Murray. Keever isn’t ruling out Christman.

“You guys (The Reporter) picked Garrett as the Hamilton County Player of the Year,” said the Noblesville coach. “That was a great selection.”
