

Fanboys in Carmel is all about...

Comics, games and fun

If you're into comic books, gaming and all those "nerdy" things, then there's a new shop in Carmel that's just for you.

Fanboys, located in Carmel's Monon Square (the northwest corner of City Center Drive and Range Line Road) opened this spring. The store has seen steady growth over that time, and cemented its popularity by conducting a mini-convention this past Sunday.

Fanboys has been open for about two months, with the store making a soft open a week before its grand opening. Since then, store owner Matt Hastings said that business has been "steady, and it's been getting better every week."

Owning a comic-book store was Hastings' dream since he was little. When his uncle passed away, he left what Hastings called "a very large comic book collection." Hastings' aunt told him that something needed to be done with it, and he told her about his childhood dream.

"Why don't we use this to start your comic shop?," she said.

John "Abe" H.V. Evans III February 12, 1951 - June 14, 2014

John "Abe" H. V. Evans III. Died June 14, 2014 in Indianapolis. Born on February 12,



1951 in Yakima, Washington. A 1973 graduate of Wittenberg University, Abe majored in history and political science, and was also active in the touring choir. Abe sang bass in the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus under director Robert Shaw and participated in 16 recordings that earned 14 Grammy awards. In 1985, Abe married Suzanne Alldredge, joining her family's business AppleTree Photographers

first in Atlanta, Georgia and then in Atlanta, Indiana, where Abe served twice on the Atlanta Town Council and represented Atlanta on the Regional Transit Authority. He was a substitute teacher for Hamilton Heights schools and sang with many notable local choirs, most recently Encore Vocal Arts and Second Presbyterian Church.

Abe was preceded in death by his parents, John HV Evans, Jr. and Janet Bonnewitz Evans, and wife Suzanne A. Evans. He is survived by his wife, Cantor Judith Meyersberg, of Indianapolis; stepdaughter Lisa (Michael) Ilk and grandson Brett Ilk, of Atlanta, Indiana; sister Laura Abigail "Abby" (Theodore) Mathiesen, and nieces Brooke (Daniel) Williams, of Peachtree City, and Sydney (Nicholas) Kaigler, of Atlanta, Georgia, and their children Abigail and Luke Williams and Colton Kaigler; his chosen brother David "DayDave" (Rachel) Johnson, of Dayton, Ohio and honorary nephews Joseph and Jeremiah Johnson; and his adoring dog Sienna, as well as his many friends and choral colleagues.

A memorial service for Abe will be held on Sunday, July 13, 2014 at First Presbyterian Church, 1207 Conner Street, Noblesville, Indiana at 4:00 pm. spermann and Cathy Langham, President and CEO of Langham Logistics, offered 25 recommendations related to priority projects, transportation funding, policy changes, and strategies to prepare Indiana for future innovations.

"I want to thank each of the members of the Blue Ribbon Panel for their extensive research and collaboration over the past year," said Governor Pence. "The panel's work has recognized several opportunities for the state to build on, and I hope that many of these ideas will encourage a broader conversation on the future of transportation infrastructure in this state."

The Governor will engage relevant state agencies, including the Department of Transportation and the Ports of Indiana, in evaluating the recommendations of the panel.

The report fulfills the Governor's Roadmap promise to appoint a blue ribbon panel to plan the next generation of Hoosier infrastructure.

Brinegar: Recommendations are "important first step"

Indiana Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Kevin Brinegar on the release of the report from the state's Blue Ribbon Panel on Transportation Infrastructure:

"The recommendations of the Blue Ribbon Panel on Transportation Infrastructure are an important first step. The group has identified priority projects and clearly defined the funding challenges. Equally important will be the work called for in HEA 1104 (2014), legislation outlining an Indiana Department of Transportation study of financing alternatives that will help meet future funding needs.

"In addition, it's time for Washington to get its act together and assure that federal funding shortfalls are addressed. Some states are already cutting back on important projects in fear of Highway Trust Fund deficiencies as soon as August 1. What is truly needed – instead of short-term, crisis-avoiding extensions – is a multi-year renewal of the federal transportation plan.





Indians sweep doubleheader with Columbus Clippers

The Indianapolis Indians (53-42) swept a doubleheader from the Columbus Clippers (49-46) with a 1-0 shutout and 14-2 beatdown of their division rivals on Thursday night at Victory Field.

In the first contests of the six-games-in-four-days series, starter Nick Kingham paced the Tribe's 1-0 win with his six-inning, two-hit, scoreless gem. The righty retired each of his first 17 batters faced before a two-out single from Luke Carlin ended Kingham's perfect game bid with only four outs remaining.

After five shutout innings from both clubs, Mel Rojas Jr. broke the scoreless tie by battling through a nine-pitch at-bat to draw a two-out, bases-loaded walk from Danny Salazar and give the Indians a 1-0 lead heading into the final inning.

All-Star closer Andy Oliver took over for Kingham and preserved the starter's victory by fanning two in a shutout ninth for his 11th save in as many opportunities.

The Indians had no need for their closer's services in the second game of the twin-bill, as the Tribe set a Victory Field Era (1996) record for its largest margin of victory against Columbus in the 14-2 rout. Five Tribe batters produced multi-hit efforts and Mel Rojas Jr. and Tony Sanchez each homered in the blowout.

Vin Mazzaro made his first career IL start and allowed two runs in four innings, before John Holdzkom one-hit the Clippers through three scoreless frames to earn the win and complete the sweep.
