








Tigers hungry for more after great season

There's so much for the Fishers girls basketball team to be proud of with last season

The Tigers won their first-ever sectional championship, tied a school record with 21 wins, and produced an Indiana All-State player in now-graduated Alex Hochstedler. But believe it or not, that wasn't enough for Fishers.

Tigers coach Michael Gaines sees it, especially noticing it during his team's summer play. He said that the group of five seniors that will return to the team definitely "want to make their mark."

"There might be a little bit of momentum left (from the sectional win), but I don't think our players were satisfied last year by winning the sectional," said Gaines.

Fishers was busy during the summer. The Tigers played in three different shootouts, one at Ball State, another at Indiana University, and then Fishers hosted a shootout. The Tigers also traveled to Vincennes for their annual team camp.

Gaines said his team "did really well" at all its shootouts. The Tigers

Gaines said his team "did really well" at all its shootouts. The Tigers struggled through their first game - which Gaines noted is "kind of how our summer goes every year" - but then rebounded to play well in their other games.

"Once we got through that first game, our kids actually did really nice all summer long," said Gaines.

With the exception of Hochstedler and Natalie Brooks, who also graduated, Fishers' shootout line-up was basically the same. Senior-to-be Abby Mozingo came back from an ACL tear, but Gaines said "she was playing in games by the end of the summer."

Also back is senior-to-be Adrianna Murphy. She too had to deal with an injury, but made it back in time to help her team win the sectional.

"Adrianna Muprhy was huge, she's been great," said Gaines.

The coach said that many players have been stepping up their games, hoping to fill in the void that has been left by the graduation of Hochstedler. But by taking a look at who the Tigers have coming back, it appears that finding players to step up won't be a problem.

Junior-to-be Kara Gerka was actually the leading scorer for Fishers last season, averaging 16.4 points per game - just ahead of Hochstedler's 16.1 per game. Gerka was also the team's leading rebounder, with six boards per game. Brooke Sugg, soon to be one of those senior leaders, brings back 10.4 points per game. Murphy handed out 4.0 assists per game, and averaged 6.8 points. Senior Blake Inglis was a 3.9 rebound per game player.

Dixon wins pole for Iowa Corn Indy 300

Scott Dixon set the Iowa Speedway the Verizon P1 Award to lead a front-row sweep for Target Chip Ganassi Racing during qualifications for Saturday night's Iowa Corn Indy 300 presented by DEKALB. Dixon's two-lap average of 186.256 mph shattered the previous speed record of 180.375 mph held by Takuma Sato since 2011.

Tony Kanaan, the 2010 race winner on with Andretti Autosport, recorded a two-lap average speed of 185.891 mph in the No. 10 TNT Energy Drink entry to tie his seasonhigh qualifying result of second.

Dixon, driving the No. 9 entry, is the ninth different driver to claim the Verizon P1 Award during the first 12 races of the Verizon IndyCar Series season. Today's effort marked his 21st career Indy car pole, tying Gil de Ferran for 13th on the all-time Indy car list.

"It's definitely a good thing to see the Ganassi cars at the top," said Dixon, the reigning Verizon IndyCar Series champion, whose previous best qualifying result on an oval this season was seventh at Texas Motor Speedway. "We had been stuck in sort of a rut and it had been a while since my last pole (Baltimore in August 2013). We're winless so we have a bit of work to do. It definitely will be a tough one; the competition is extremely good."

Eight different drivers representing six teams have won this season, though none have been from Chip Ganassi Racing. Andretti Autosport has won five of the seven races at Iowa Speedway, including the past

Dixon started on the pole at Iowa in 2007 and 2008, but has yet to win on the oval. His next victory will tie Al Unser Jr. for sixth all-time on the Indy car win list with 34. No driver has won from the pole in the seven races at Iowa Speedway.

Helio Castroneves, who enters tomortwo-lap qualifying track record en route to row's 300-lap race tied with Team Penske teammate Will Power atop the championship standings, set the one-lap track record (186.809 mph) on his second qualifying lap in the No. 3 for a two-lap average of 185.685 mph and will join Ryan Briscoe (185.339 mph) on Row 2. Power, battling bronchitis this weekend, qualified ninth in the No. 12 Verizon Team Penske car.

Carlos Munoz qualified fifth and Sebasthe 0.894-mile, variably-banked oval while tien Bourdais will join the series rookie in Row 3. The fourth Chip Ganassi Racing car, driven by Charlie Kimball, will occupy Row 4 in the seventh starting position with 2011 Iowa race winner Marco Andretti, who starts eighth.


