Conner Elementary will become...

Boys & Girls Club expansion

Noblesville Schools announced today that their Board of Trustees approved a motion to make the former Conner Elementary School property available for sale to the City of Noblesville.

The property, located at the corner of Conner Street and North 17th Street, houses the former Conner Elementary School, which closed in 1989 when Hazel Dell Elementary opened. The property was used for some years for various programs like Head Start, but has been vacant and in a state of disrepair for approximately three years. In that time it has been used only for district storage.

The school board's approval to sell the land starts the chain of events that is intended to lead to the Boys & Girls

Club of Noblesville taking possession of the property for a future expansion of their operation. The transaction is being managed through the City of Noblesville to streamline the transfer process, and so that the city can access needed features on the property like curb cuts and entryways to support the new Ivy Tech Hamilton County Campus in Noblesville.

"The sale of this property has been under consideration for years," said Libbie Conner, superintendent of Noblesville Schools. "Now that we have identified appropriate storage needs for the district though our acquisition of the armory and our new administrative center, we are happy to make this property available to the City of Noblesville and

ultimately to our partners at the Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville. Their kids are our kids, and this is a positive step for the community overall."

Becky Terry, Executive Director of the Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville shared her vision for the land. "Our mission is to provide high quality, affordable programs that best serve the children of Noblesville and this site is ideal. We are excited about the opportunity to expand our scope, adjoin with our Community Center to create a full campus, and remain in a centralized, accessible area of the city."

The Noblesville Common Council is expected to discuss the future of the property at an upcoming meeting.

County is closing in on "37 Corridor"

It had been a long Monday afternoon session of the Hamilton County Board of Commissioners, highlighted, arguably, by four not-for-profit groups standing in front of commissioners Steve Dillinger and Mark Heirbrandt (Christine Altman could not attend the meeting) and requesting funding for 2015.

Not just any not-for-profit groups:

- *Hamilton County Economic Development.
- *Aspire.
- *Janus Developmental Services & Hamilton County Express.
- *Humane Society for Hamilton County.

All very important organizations for providing life styles Hamilton County folks crave. Aspire, perhaps the least known to all of Hamilton County, is a comprehensive community mental health center serving adults and children in Boone, Hamilton Madison and Marion counties.

All four got what they came for, the only hitch being a "small lecture" from Dillinger to Connie Sanders, President/CEO of Janus. Dillinger suggested that the Janus people also go to the cities of Hamilton County for financial support, which Sanders promised to do before next year.


It was a very interesting part of the Commissioners session. Those of us who didn't know, much was learned about Janus and the Humane Society.

All well and good.

But when the meeting really sparked attention was near the end when Dillinger and Heirbrandt pulled out their smart phones and tried to finalize plans for a couple of very important meetings.

The Commissioners were continuing their hike down Highway 37, addressing the "37 Corridor." The dreaded "37 Corridor," a six-mile stretch of highway between Fishers and Noblesville, a drive made every work day morning and evening by folks trying to get to work or trying to get home.

It's nearly impossible to do. And, everyone who is everyone who knows predicts the traffic problem will get worse and worse and in the next 10 years

State and federal investigators descend on Sheridan fire scene

On Tuesday local, state and federal investigators descended on Sheridan to begin sifting through the rubble of 400 South Main Street, home to Main Street PowerMail, following a fire that destroyed the building on Saturday evening.

Sheridan Fire Department's Public Information Officer, Travis Stern said, investigators were not able to enter the scene until the three-story building's existing walls were torn down and the area is made safe.

At the scene Tuesday morning were investigators representing the Indiana Fire Marshall's office, Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) agents, insurance investigators and local Sheridan police and fire personnel.

Several Sheridan residents stood at nearby intersections to watch crews demolish the building.

A Federal ATF agent, along with Sheridan Fire Department personnel, met with several downtown business owners asking if any of them had video cameras that might have captured the events surrounding the fire.

Main Street PowerMail is owned by Kyle Malott and provides direct mail advertising campaigns, in addition to, assisting

businesses with design, printing and mailing.

Stern said the upper floors of the building had been converted into a loft style residence that previously had been occupied by Malott.

Several months prior to Saturday's fire Malott had placed the building for sale. Internet based Trulia and Zillow both reported the listing price as \$750,000.

An investigator at the scene stated the cause of the fire was still unknown. "It could be several weeks or even months before we are able to make a determination."

CIRTA to launch two new commuter bus services

Building on the success of the Plainfield Connector, which started in 2013 and provides more than 1,400 one-way trips a month connecting people to jobs in industrial parks, the Central Indiana Regional Transportation Authority (CIRTA) will launch two new commuter bus services later this year.

The Plainfield North Connector will pick up commuters at the IndyGo Route 8 stop on Bridgeport Road between Washington Street and Perimeter Road and make a loop on the north side of Plainfield. With stops throughout the All Points Midwest industrial park, it will deliver workers to jobs at the Wal-Mart Distribution Center, Prime Distribution and Ingram.

The Whitestown Connector will pick up commuters at the IndyGo Routes 37 and 86 Crosstown stop at Trader's Point and take them to jobs with such Anson Development

employers as Amazon, Express Script, GNC and Weaver Popcorn.

CIRTA plans to launch the routes before the holiday rush, when many of the distribution centers are at their highest employment levels. Both services will be funded through three-year federal Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) grants,

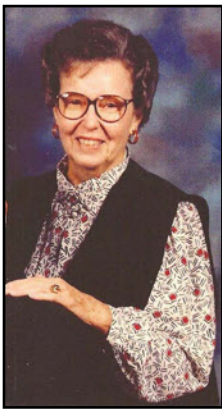

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Two separate accidents claim two lives

Two accidents claimed the lives of two people in a period of less than 18 hours.

A Cicero bicyclist was struck and killed in a crash shortly after 9:30 p.m. Monday. Cicero Police were dispatched to the area of Main and Neal Streets on a report of a bicyclist found on the side of the road and have since asked for assistance from the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team.

An initial investigation showed that Nicholas Camp, 20, of Cicero, was riding southbound on Main Street when the left handlebar of his bicycle was struck by a passing motorist causing camp to lose control of the bike and crash. Camp, who was found with his bicycle on top of him by a passerby, was not wearing a helmet and sustained severe head trauma. He was taken to Riverview Hospital and then by air ambulance to Methodist Hospital where he later died from injuries sustained during the crash.

The vehicle that struck Camp left the scene and the driver may not know that someone was hit. The vehicle would have been traveling southbound on Main Street between Neal Street and Buckeye Street around 9:40pm and may have damage to the passenger side mirror or side. Anyone with information on the vehicle should contact Sgt. Brian Niec of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office at 317-776-4106.

Tuesday morning at approximately 11:35 a.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the area of 18900 Hague Road, Noblesville in reference to a report of a motor vehicle crash. A short time later, officers arrived on the scene and located one vehicle and one occupant involved in the crash.

Based on preliminary information, it appears that a 2006 Cadillac CTS was traveling north bound in the 18900 block of Hague Road when for some unknown reason the vehicle

left the right side of the roadway. The vehicle eventually came to rest after it collided with a small tree on the east side of the roadway.

The driver of the Cadillac was unresponsive at the scene and was transported by ambulance to Riverview Health Hospital (Noblesville). The driver was later transported to St. Vincent Hospital (Indianapolis) by air ambulance. The driver did not survive.

Accident reconstructionists from the Noblesville Police Department are investigating the crash. Hague Road was temporarily closed for a period of time as investigators collected information and evidence regarding the crash. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

Identification of the driver will be released after family notifications have been confirmed.

with local contributions from Plainfield and Whitestown.

"These commuter services are important for people who need jobs and also for employers who need workers," said Patricia Castañeda, mobility manager for CIRT. "Plainfield and Whitestown have been incredible to work with, because they recognize the need and see the local value of these demonstration projects."

CIRTA now operates a total of five commuter services, all of which connect to existing IndyGo stops and provide connections to employers beyond Marion County. In addition to the commuter services, CIRTA operates express (nonstop) routes between Carmel and downtown Indy and Fishers and downtown Indy. The express routes are funded through local municipalities and a private operator, following the expiration of federal CMAQ grants Dec. 31, 2013.

The commuter services and employers along each route follow.

1. Plainfield Connector – Amazon, Ingram Micro Mobility, DJO, Ryder, Ozburn Hessey Logistics, GENCO, Pep Boys and Foxconn.
2. Plainfield North Connector (new) – Walmart Distribution Center, Prime Distribution and Ingram.
3. Carmel Connector – GEICO, Delta Faucet, Adesa, Meijer, hotels and office parks

4. West Carmel Connector–ITT Tech, RCI, FedEx, Target and retail along North Michigan Road.
5. Whitestown Connector (new) – Amazon, Express Script, GNC and Weaver Popcorn.

"We're pleased to help bring this powerful recruiting tool to our employers," said Rich Carlucci, Plainfield Town Manager. "This connector will form a vital link between the good jobs in this area and the workforce in the areas nearby."

Whitestown Town Manager Dax Norton said, "Transportation is an important part of economic development. These connectors help us continue to build a strong case for locating businesses on this side of town."

The cost to ride the commuter buses is \$1 and a valid IndyGo pass. Riders who do not have an IndyGo pass pay \$3.

Among the organizations that collaborate to make both connectors a reality are the Hendricks County Economic Development Partnership, the Plainfield Town Council, the Plainfield Chamber of Commerce, Duke, Browning Investments, Central Indiana Regional Workforce Board, Hendricks College Network, IndyGo and Commuter Connect.

the Hamilton County east side will be in grid lock. If it isn't already.

What the Commissioners want to do is to turn Highway 37 into what Carmel did with Keystone Parkway on the west side of the county, that today being a clear shoot between Carmel and Indy.

The County Commissioners want the State (the Indiana Department of Transportation) to relinquish State Road 37, and with that it appears 70 to 80 percent of the construction cost would come from the State, the remainder being split by the County, Noblesville and Fishers.

What the Commissioners are attempting to do now is to gather a united front here in Hamilton County to march on the State. "March" might be too strong of a label, but "united" isn't.

The Commissioners already have met with the Hamilton County Council.

"We're not looking for funding," said Dillinger. "We're out to inform people."

"Our next meeting is with the Fishers," Heirbrandt said. "That is scheduled for Aug. 4 at 5 p.m."

The third meeting, expected to be late summer, will be with the City of Noblesville.

Dillinger already has talked with Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear.

While the cost of the project is only an educated guess at this point, the price tag could be as high as \$250 million. It also is projected that the project could take from five to 10 years to complete.

Having seen what the State has done with Highway 31, being united in a "37 Corridor" movement seems like a no brainer for Hamilton County, Noblesville and Fishers.

"It's a question of whether or not we want to be in charge or for the State to come through with its own highway," Heirbrandt warned.

When quizzed by The Reporter at a recent Noblesville City Council meeting, Noblesville Attorney Mike Howard said, "Westfield lost million of dollars in assessment when the State came through and took out those businesses on Highway 31."

"Something has to be done," said Ditslear.

So, for now, look for results from the upcoming Aug. 4 meeting with Fishers, followed by the meeting with the City of Noblesville.

Sheridan BZA's approval paves way for new agricultural business

The Sheridan Board of Zoning Appeals on Monday evening gave a favorable recommendation to the Sheridan Town Council to approve rezoning of 50 acres owned by Webster Properties located at the southwest corner of State Road 47 and West Road.

Webster approached the board requesting the property be re-zoned from commercial to industrial paving the way for the sale of a four acre parcel to Dura Products.

Dura Products is based in Arcadia and specializes in the manufacturing of digital agricultural chemical meters and mini-bulk transfer pumps.

Dura Products plans to build a facility that will house 12,000 square feet of production space and 8,000 square feet of storage and offices. Dura Products currently

employs approximately 12 people and the company stated it hopes to hire more employees in the future.

The BZA's unanimous approval came after area residents spoke publically against the proposed re-zone. The residents expressed concerns with drainage and the impact the manufacturing business would have on the residential properties.

The BZA also unanimously approved a re-zone request submitted by Sheridan businessman Dan Lyons.

Lyons requested 6.5 acres located on the southwest corner of Mulebarn and State Road 47 be re-zoned from a residential zoning to commercial zoning.

Lyons, owner of Patton Automotive, stated the purpose of the request was to relocate his business.

Community gateway coming to Fall Creek, Brooks School roads

The Town of Fishers will begin construction on a community gateway at the intersection of Fall Creek and Brooks School roads on July 17. Working collaboratively with the Geist Impoundment Board, the Town selected this intersection because of its high traffic volume and access to Geist Reservoir. The project will enhance the intersection while preserving green space in the area.

"Residents that live near the intersection have indicated that the gateway project is incredibly important to them," stated Jeff Hill, Director of the Department of Engineering. "Being such a high trafficked intersection, the gateway project will welcome visitors, improve economic development opportunities and enhance the intersection aesthetically speaking."

Construction on the gateway is slated to begin later this month and should be completed mid-September. The intersection is scheduled to be closed for 12 hours begin-

ning at 8 p.m. on Thursday, July 17 until 8 a.m. on Friday, July 18, weather permitting. The closure will allow crews to relocate a water line. After the water line has been placed, traffic restrictions through the intersection should be minimal during construction. The project is estimated to cost \$400,000 and is being paid for by the Geist Impoundment Board. The Town Council approved the gateway projects at the April 7 council meeting.

Drive Fishers is the Town of Fishers Engineering Departments' initiative to ease traffic flow and increase travel efficiency via innovative projects and a proactive approach to road construction and maintenance. Residents are encouraged to visit the Drive Fishers website at www.Fishers.in.us/DriveFishers for additional information about traffic improvements throughout town, the real time signal system and sanitary sewer and water service upgrades.

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Leonard has lots of bodies...

Looking for rebounders

If basketball is a game of numbers, which most high school sports are, then Joe Leonard and his Fishers Tigers are looking pretty good this summer.

“We’ve got 21 kids returning from last season,” said Leonard, who finished the Fishers summer season at the end of June.

“We took two teams to a tourney at Indiana Wesleyan in Marion,” Leonard said. “I tried to keep the two teams equal. Both teams went 2-2.”

However, the one number which is missing this summer and will be missing next winter is a big one.

“We’re going to miss Devin Chaudion,” agreed Leonard.

“He led us in everything ... scoring, rebounding, assists. Everything.

“Chaudion averaged 20 points a game (18.7). He did everything well.”

Chaudion was the only senior on Leonard’s sectional roster.

“We’ve played lots of kids this summer. Two who have really stepped up are (6-4, junior-to-be) Lance Dollison and (6-7 junior-to-be) Cameron Wolter.

“Wolter went to a camp at Colgate; they really like him,” Leonard continued. “Dollison is a good player with his back to the basket, but he also is a good outside player and that’s what he wants to do. He shot 39 percent from the 3-point range as a sophomore last season.”

Leonard said his biggest concern this summer is finding rebounders. Chaudion led the Tigers on the boards last year with a 5.4 average per game. Wolter was next at 5.2

“We will need Wolter on the boards,” said the coach.

Two other returning prospects are football players, Josh Lloyd and Zach Eaton. Lloyd is a senior and Eaton will be a junior.

“Eaton is talented and he is a leader,” said Leonard. “He’s the quarterback on the football team and a point guard with our basketball team. We will want him to be more of a scorer this season.”

Two other scoring talents are a pair of seniors, Keegan Kollmeyer and Luke Wehner. Kollmeyer moved in from Hamilton Southeastern last year and missed much of the season with an injury. He’s a shooter.

Wolter will give Fishers scoring power. He averaged 10.4 points a game last season

“Rebounding is what we’ll need,” stressed Leonard. “That’s what we’re looking for, rebounders.”

The Hoosier Crossroads Conference will drop to seven teams this season, and Leonard said he likes that.

“All of our conference games will be on Friday,” the coach pointed out. “I saw Brownsburg play this summer. They are good. I also saw a little of Zionsville. They will be good, too.”

Fishers’ first four games this season will be road games against Shortridge, Pike, Noblesville and Kokomo.

“All four will be on the road,” Leonard said, “but that’s not as bad as opening against Hamilton Southeastern, as we have in the past. We’ll have a little time to get ready for HSE.”
