Noblesville School Board will travel...

Next meeting planned at Carmel

Noblesville's next school board meeting will be held at Carmel.

On Monday, July 21 and Tuesday, July 22, the Board of Trustees of Noblesville Schools will hold a retreat at the Renaissance Conference Room in Carmel.

The first two sessions, the 1 p.m. executive session on Monday and the 8 a.m.

executive session Tuesday, will be closed to the public.

By law, schools can hold executive session to discuss certain topics.

The first session on Monday will be closed in order to train school board members with an outside consultant on the performance role of members as public officials.

Two items are on the Tuesday executive session. There will be a session on collective bargaining and a discussion on the purchase or lease of property.

The Board will move from the Tuesday morning opening session to a regular session at 10:30 a.m. Noblesville residents, if they care to drive to Carmel, can attend this open session.


It might be an interesting opening session, beginning with an update on the strategic plan.

I've written about it a few times in the short history of the Hamilton County Reporter. One of our goals, one of our challenges is to get our readers thinking.

Thinking about their schools. Thinking about their governments. Thinking about their towns and cities. Heck, even thinking about their newspaper.

We've written editorials giving you folks our opinions. On other occasions, we've simply tossed the facts onto the table and asked you to decide.

We did it again last week in a column, "County Line," written by veteran newsman Fred Swift. Fred for years covered Hamilton County government with the old Daily Ledger. Then he left the newspaper business and went to work for the Hamilton County Commissioners.

Nobody knows Hamilton County government – city government – more than Fred.

In Fred's "County Line" last week, Swift urged caution by the Noblesville Common Council in allowing more multi-unit apartments to be built in the city. Although agreeing that new apartments bring in more city taxes, Swift warned that new apartments could put a strain on the community in police and fire needs and even new schools.

At the Common Council meeting earlier this week, the seven-Council group voted to allow approximately 850 new units, most of which are in the same area on the city's south/east corner.

*The Flats at 146th of Meredith Meadows.

*Templeton Ridge, located in the 14700 block of Gray Road, East Side.

In the days leading up to the Council's vote, The Reporter used considerable space to give its readers a

Looking for a room?

Courtyard about to open

If you have friends who are frequent business travelers, you might want to let them know about a new hotel that's soon to open in Noblesville.

Actually, you may want to grab a room yourself at the Courtyard by Marriott.

The hotel is due to open in the next several weeks, just east of downtown Noblesville. Courtyard will be located at 17863 Foundation Drive, which is on the northeast corner of the intersection of State Roads 32/38 and 37. The company already operates a Fairfield by Marriott right next door at 17960 Foundation Drive.

"We're looking for late summer or early fall, depending on how everything flows in," said Rex Martin, vice president of Marriott. The hotel's interior is still being finished, but a quick tour of the building shows the core and the character of Courtyard is already coming into view.

"They're focusing on the first floor right now," said Fairfield general manager Christi Gadd. "They're actually putting furniture in the rooms right now." Indeed, several of the fourth floor rooms are nearly complete, except for the furniture.

Public Safety Communication Center gets a...

911 makeover

No, Ty Pennington wasn't in Noblesville last week, but Hamilton County's 911 Public Safety Communication Center did receive a \$30,000 makeover.

The dispatch center configuration may have made sense in 2010 when it was built but since the consolidation of three communication centers into one agency in 2012 the room was no longer as efficient as it could have been. Having a portion of the room remain unused no longer made sense. The center now uses the entire room to its full capacity and has a better workflow to enhance the abilities of call takers and dispatchers.

According to Communications Director Michael Snowden "the initial rough estimate received late last year was that a room reconfiguration would cost more than \$100,000. Through diligent negotiations with the vendors, and a lot of hard work, we were able to reconfigure the room in 6 days' time for under \$30,000". Technicians from AT&T, AMK Services, Fredericks Electrical, Dispatch Products and Hamilton County's own IT department worked tirelessly to complete the enormous task of completely redesigning the layout of the state of the art facility that was built in 2010.

Director Snowden said "The room reconfiguration is only the beginning of changes that are all designed to aid our service to the public. Within the next year, Hamilton County will have a new radio system in place that will greatly enhance responders' ability to communicate and the computer-aided dispatch (CAD) system is

slated to be upgraded as well. All of the changes are designed to make our employees more efficient and better able to serve the public".

Since Director Snowden took over the reins last year he has worked with county commissioners to increase efficiency by hiring much needed personnel. Hamilton County dispatch has already hired six additional full time staff this year and is now in the process of hiring six more.

While emergency dispatchers are the most unseen side of public safety they are the heartbeat of the entire system. Hamilton County dispatchers are responsible for hundreds of calls that come in each day. Some are emergencies and some are not but they have to manage each and every call that comes in so that the community, police officers and firefighters are safe.

Hamilton County Public Safety Communications Director of Operations Darin Riney said "this couldn't have been pulled off without the dispatchers. Their professionalism and patience really shined last week. With all the noise and commotion in that room, I didn't hear one complaint. There were a lot of questions, but I believe once they settle into the new arrangements the dispatchers will be very pleased with the more functional setup. The entire room and its atmosphere should be more positive and user friendly. The rearrangement went off without incident".

During the one week renovation there were no interruptions in public safety services to any of Hamilton County.

good look, good idea of these three apartment complexes. We took more news space for apartment maps and designs than had ever been devoted to such a project in a Hamilton County newspaper.

In doing so, I think we thought that at least one of our readers would show up at the Council meeting and say, "Enough is Enough." Perhaps Noblesville Schools would do that. Noblesville Schools will be a major player in finding space to educate the many, many children who will live in those apartments.

The working relationship between the Council and the Schools has not always been great. It may get lots better, based on what Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear told the Council at the Tuesday meeting. Ditslear said he already had met with new superintendent Beth Niedermeyer, and that he thought the relationship between the Council and the Schools was headed for a great future in Noblesville.

There was some one at the Council meeting you kind of hinted that, "Enough is enough." At least three Councilmen said that, but they also added, "We don't want to slam shut the door."

Do Noblesville residents want a larger city?

Council president Mark Boice said, "We have been able to maintain a small-city flavor." But, at the same time Noblesville's population has grown to over 50,000.

This is a good, strong Common Council, one which has the best interest of Noblesville in mind. But, what are the best interests when it comes to growth?

Foundation Drive has sort of become Marriott's core in Noblesville. Martin said that the Fairfield "does very well." The new Courtyard will have 92 guest spaces, which breaks down into 82 rooms and 10 suites, which will make it bigger than its sister property. The Fairfield has 34 rooms and 25 suites.

"For that market, I think it's sustainable," said Martin. He said Noblesville was picked to open a new Courtyard because it's a growing market.

While the Courtyard will be geared towards all travelers, a big draw will be its business-friendly attitude. The first of the new hotel's four floors will contain a spacious meeting room, enough to hold 60 people.

"The meeting space in Noblesville is very limited," said Martin, noting that many people have to meet at the city's library. To make meetings even more convenient, Courtyard will operate its own restaurant, called "The Bistro." It will also have a Starbucks, and will provide in-house catering as well.

The rooms are business-friendly as well. They offer WiFi, and Martin said this will be one of the few hotels that offer 20 MBPS speed. Each room will have a microwave and a refrigerator, and will also contain movable desks - wheel your workspace to wherever you want it.

Standard rooms will offer either one king-size bed or two queen-size beds. An executive king has a little more space than a standard room, and then the suites have the living room and bedroom separate.

Fred Ham, Marriott's Director of Construction said that there will be "a lot of detail to the rooms."

"A much more higher-end product has much more detail in it," he said.

Those that are traveling for pleasure will also be welcome at the Courtyard. Ev-

everything will be open space, especially in the dining area: Martin said there were be "big communal tables in the breakfast and restaurant area."

"Kind of that new set-up, there's no longer pods, everything's open," said Martin.

Other amenities will include a heated indoor pool and a whirlpool, guest laundry,

a fitness center and underground parking. Martin said the average price of a room will be \$139.

If you'd like to get a closer look at the new Courtyard, Marriott is offering an event from 3 to 7 p.m. this afternoon. Guests will get a chance to take a hard-hat tour of the building, and also participate in a silent auction and raffles, which benefit

the Children's Miracle Network in conjunction with Riley Hospital. There will also be beverages and snacks, including cookies.

Martin said the new hotel will employ about 50 to 60 people, depending on the season. If you're interested in working at the Courtyard, you can apply by email at resume@mhghotelsllc.com, or apply in person at the Fairfield.

New budget notices Web site launched for 2015

Hamilton County and the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance have created and launched a new budget notice website that will provide taxpayers with the ability to view budget notices in one central online location.

BudgetNotices.IN.Gov will assist Hamilton County citizens who want to attend and stay involved with the budgets of their local government units. Taxpayers will be able to view all local government units in Hamilton county, search by their address, or use an interactive map tool. This website has been designed to promote the importance of budget notices and the role that they play in the daily lives of Indiana taxpayers.

BudgetNotices.IN.Gov allows taxpayers the opportunity to view budget notices at their convenience and not depend on following a printed publication. "Budget notices are vital to transparency," said Micah Vincent, commissioner of the Department of Local Government Financing. "It is important that the State continues to pursue opportunities to the benefit Indiana taxpayers and this is a step in the right direction."

Taxpayers that do not have Internet access or have difficulties with the website may contact the Department of Local Government Finance at (888) 739-9826 and request a paper copy of the notices for their local government units.

BudgetNotices.IN.Gov is available on the Indiana Gateway for Government Units. Gateway is the primary collection and publishing tool for local government units submitting their required reports to the State of Indiana. It has the benefits of digital collection into a robust data warehouse and immediate accessibility by taxpayers.

BudgetNotices.IN.Gov was established with the passage of House Enrolled Act 1266. The budget notices application was developed to provide Hoosiers with another way to learn about the budget process for the local taxing units and in particular, to know when hearings would be held on next year's proposed budgets.

The Indiana Department of Local Government Finance is the state agency that oversees the property tax and local government budgeting system in Indiana.

There will be a little touch of green to the Indiana All-Star North-South Football Classic on Friday night: Shamrock green.

Westfield will have four men on the South sidelines at the annual game, which kicks off at 7 p.m. at North Central. Two are players: Quarterback Nick Ferrer and offensive lineman Zane Burtron. "It's great," said Zane. "It's a pretty big honor. We got some of the best kids in the state of Indiana."

Since Zane is a lineman and Wade is a quarterback, Zane said that they didn't get too many of the same honors - of course both of them got recognized, but usually for different things.

"It was cool to get one honor we both had," said Zane, who will play for Olivet Nazarene University in Bourbonnais, Ill. next fall.

In his first full season as a reliever, Indianapolis Indians closer Andy Oliver picked up an accolade which had eluded his four-year stay in the starting rotation – an All-Star selection.

Oliver, who enters the break ranked second in the International League in average against (.152), third in strikeouts-per-nine innings (11.35) and tied for eighth in saves (11), will join fellow All-Stars Matt Hague and Casey Sadler as the Tribe's representatives at the 2014 Triple-A Midsummer Classic on Wednesday night (7:00) in Durham, NC.

Through the first 99 games of the 2014 campaign, Oliver has emerged as one of the league's top closers by converting 11 of 12 save opportunities and holding opponents scoreless in 25 of his 33 total games. The southpaw also enters the first-half break having allowed more than one hit in just six of those 33 appearances, and never more than three total knocks.

And while Oliver's transition from 2013 Opening Day starter to back-of-the-bullpen arm has featured his same knack for striking batters out – the 2013 IL strikeout leader has whiffed at least one batter in 26 of 33 contests – the role change has not included his previous inconsistencies with control; Last season, the southpaw issued 112 walks in 124 1/3 innings (1.1 per inning). This year, only 27 free passes in 46 frames (0.6 per inning).

“You can just tell in his mannerisms on the mound,” Sanchez said. “He knows what he wants to throw when he wants to throw it and he has a lot of conviction in each of those pitches. Last year we didn’t see that. You can even tell in his shakes. If I put something down that he doesn’t want to throw he shakes me off and you can tell, ‘you better put down the right sign.’ That’s something you need out of a closer and he’s been lights out for us.”

“He’s a fastball-slider guy,” Sanchez said. “Fastball to both sides of the plate. He can throw his slider for a strike or he can throw his slider down in the zone for the
