achieve Registered Athletic Administrator status as well as my Certified Athletic Certification with the National Interscholastic Athletics Administrators Association."

In the athletic arena, the eight year growth of Fishers High School has been one of the great all-time stories of high school athletics in Indiana. When Miles came to Fishers, there was nothing. No facilities. No equipment. No staff.

"Overseeing final phases of construction; hiring 20 head coaches and nearly 80 assistants; tracking almost one-million dollars of purchasing for equipment, uniforms and supplies was a great learning experience," Miles said.

Correlating duties included creating a vision, mission and an identify for the second high school in the district that would mirror the success and expectations the community had for new Fishers High School.

The current enrollment of Fishers High School is 2,582. Miles said the plans call for an enrollment of 3,700, once current construction is finished. He says that student level should hit the top number in a couple of years.

Then what?

"I don't know," Miles answered.

The Fishers athletic teams have been extremely successful in such a short period of time, topped by a state championship in football.

"Winning the state in football was a big achievement, but all of our athletic teams have been very good," said Miles. "We've been able to do this by not only hiring outstanding coaches, but being able to retain them."

Miles is quick to share the success with others.

"I would like to thank all of the people who have worked with me the past eight and one-half years with this endeavor we call Fishers High School. Creating Fishers High School continues to be one of the great opportunities and professional accomplishments of my lifetime. While the kudos we receive as an institution is definitely shared with all of us, I take enormous pride in the body of work that I hope some will consider my legacy to the

Tigers school community. To have built something of this magnitude, from the ground up, at the speed it was done has been truly magical and immensely rewarding. Our academic, athletic and performing arts accomplishments are well chronicled, but it is the environment and culture that permeates FHS that makes me most proud. Since reestablishing in 2006, we have flourished and created a very special place to serve our students, parents, patrons and our community."

Miles believes he was "well prepared" to accept the challenges of building a new Fishes

He received his Bachelor's Degree from Ball State in 1983 and went on to earn his Masters Degree from Indiana University in 1996. He spent one year teaching in West Palm Beach, Florida before returning to Indiana to teach at Ben Davis Junior High and moving on as teacher and athletic director at Northview Middle School in Washington Township.

"I learned from some great ones," Miles said. "While at Ben Davis, I was able to pick the brain of (legendary football coach) Dick Dullaghan. "Roland Inskeep (AD at North Central) was one of my role models. I learned so much from him, and then later from (North Central athletic directors) Chuck Jones and Paul Loggan.

"I want to thank past and present colleagues, administrators and board members for the chance to participate and contribute in the opening and development of Fishers High School," Miles said. "I am very proud of my contributions to our students, my fellow teachers, and our community. It is my sincere hope that you are proud of the high school we have built. It has been a privilege to bring my career to its conclusion at Fishers High School. I wish all of you, and the HSE Schools community, nothing but the best as you grow and prosper in the years ahead."

Miles said he has no immediately plans for his future.

"I have, at this time, completed the leadership training classes necessary and will take my CAA exam this spring at the IIAAA State Conference to continue towards my goals," Miles said.

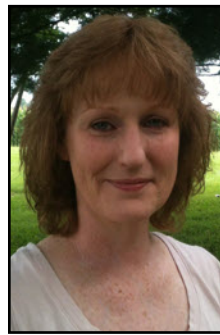

Pray Without Ceasing

As I sit trying to write this week's devotion I am drawing a blank. I read the passages that come to mind that I think are speaking to me, but still nothing. I really do not know what to write. It is one of those days that everything I read I apply to someone else thinking that's them, So and So should be reading this, they need to know about that "if you don't work you don't eat stuff." Thank the Lord a spirit of conviction takes over. I remember a wise friend taught me all scripture should be applied to yourself first. Matthew 7:3 - "Why do you look at the speck in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own. It really is not wise to create a bully pulpit or plainly just beat people up with the Bible."



Anyway, I liken that not knowing what to write is very similar to not knowing what to pray. So, right now, this minute what do I pray for, who do I pray for and for how long should I pray for. If I prayed for everything I am to pray for - I'd be praying a week in a day! So what happens, I spend 5 minutes in prayer..... and done. Well let me tell you that is not effective and I doubt that it is pleasing to God.

A year ago I spent more time in prayer, could pray out loud with my husband or with a brother/sister without hesitation, knew the pleasure of spirit filled prayer, and the peace and comfort felt in sorrowful prayer. So what has happened? I know I am not alone in this as I hear many others commenting on how their prayer life is not what it used to be or ought to be. We seem to be drying up. Is this an attack of the enemy? Is it laziness? Busyness? Or has the burdens of life crept in? Maybe all the above. The less we pray, the dryer we get and God seems far away.

So, back to basics for me. Prayer is first mentioned in Genesis 4:26 "Seth also had a son, and he named him Enoch. At that time men began to call on the name of the Lord". References say that some form of the word pray, prayer, or prayed appears 512 times in the Bible.

As I study prayer I am reminded it is, simply put - sincere and open communication with God. Nothing mystical. Not hard. Open your mouth and with your lips say the words of your heart. There is no correct or certain position for prayer. In the Bible people prayed on their knees, bowing, prostrate on their faces, standing and even while being crucified on a cross. Eyes can open or closed. Prayer can be silent, quiet, or aloud and fervent. It's words can be eloquent or common. The list of what it can be goes on and on. The shorter (not all inclusive) list is what it cannot be. It cannot be showy - Matthew 6:5 ...do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to prayto be seen by men; or Selfish - James 4: 3 When you ask, you do not receive because you ask with the wrong motives....

The reality is that prayer cannot be neglected without expecting adverse results. We have all heard it said over and over again - How long can you go without talking to your husband, your wife, or any other important person in your life without growing apart. Prayer is what keeps us grounded in our relationship with Christ. Deuteronomy 4:7 tells us God is near us whenever we pray to Him. Philippians 4:6 tells us by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving we should present all our requests to God and then the Peace of God will guard our hearts and minds. Hebrews 4:15-16 tells us we have a high priest who is able to sympathize with our weaknesses in every respect. We can confidently draw near to the throne of grace and receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need. How do we come near the throne? Through prayer!

It is clear even with a brief study that prayer is what we are called to do in all situations and at all times. I do not know how else to put it other than if we want to make it through life with intact peace, joy, and gentleness we have to pray in order to stay close to God for guidance, wisdom, strength, deliverance, the list goes on and on.

As far as not knowing what to pray for in any given situation, in that area we can rely on the Holy Spirit. Romans 8:26-27 states the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what we ought to pray for but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express.

And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will. Prayer is a means of discerning His will. By letting the Spirit lead, you will be praying God's will.

I cannot think of anything that will carry us closer to God than personal prayer time. There seems lately to be such a big focus now on corporate prayer. I do really dislike this name, prayer is not a business, I don't like to think of my brothers & sisters as merely business partners. But I digress ...sorry.

While Matthew 6:6 tells us when praying to go into your prayer room, close the door and pray to your Father who is unseen Acts 2:42 tells us the early believers together devoted themselves to the apostles teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Acts 1:14 states they all joined together constantly in prayer, along with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers. James 5:16-18 says confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed.

It is obvious that the early believers saw the importance of praying together as a one body. While it may be intimidating for some to pray out loud in front of people this does edify and encourage those of us struggling with life's burdens. Knitting us together, this type of prayer bonds us to each other while building a love and concern for others in our souls and spirits. Sad to say I have been in some prayer sessions where long-winded, hypocritical prayers have been pervasive. I direct you back to Mat-

thew 6:5 - for they love to prayto be seen by men, Verily I say unto you they have their reward. It is a joy to say that in the majority of the fellowship prayer sessions (I like the term fellowship better than the word corporate, sorry - I know that is just opinion) I do now attend are filled with a genuine love and concern for others. I encourage anyone who has not attended a prayer meeting to do so.

There is so much in the Bible about the importance of prayer. I think it can be looked at as if prayer were Christian water, without it we will shrivel up and our relationship with God will dehydrate and our roots risk dying. So all in all and in an attempt to be brief and concise I know it is time, at least for me, to get back to an earnest prayer life.

Lastly, God does answer prayer - He answers Yes, No, and Wait. Wait is a difficult answer - but stand still and know He is God. Read 1 John 5:14-15 And this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, he hears us. And if we know that He hears us, whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of Him.

But, that is a whole other devotional. God Bless,

Part 4, summer football: Southeastern...

Royals’ schedule is loaded

The problem with Hamilton Southeastern’s football schedule the last few years, some folks will tell you, was the strength of the schedule came in the first half of the season. The second half of the year has been, pretty much, cakewalks, hurting the Royals’ chances when facing tougher teams in the sectional.

Head coach Scott May kind of buys into the theory.

“Winning big in late season games has left us not knowing exactly where we are,” May said.

All of that will change this fall with the change of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. Lafayette Jeff, Harrison and McCutcheon, year after year mostly at the bottom of the conference standings, are gone. HCC teams each have picked up three non-conference foes. Southeastern has added Carmel and North Central from the MIC Conference and powerhouse independent Cathedral. This season HSE’s last three foes will be Noblesville, Cathedral and Brownsburg.

Hello!

“It’s a tough schedule,” May said. “Carmel is really tough. The thing about Carmel is we open with them and then we’re likely to see them again in the sectional.”

Carmel and Southeastern, once annual football foes, haven’t played each other in the regular season since Nov. 4, 2005. The Royals won 17-7. Last year in the sectional, Southeastern was beaten by Carmel, 40-7.

“We’ve got North Central the second week. They are tough,” May continued. “I don’t know about Fishers, but they are always good.”

May hopes the HCC can soon find an eighth team.

“I don’t like a seven-team conference,” he explained. “It’s too hard to find non-conference teams. We have Cathedral for just one year. Then, the following year, we were to play Homestead, but they have joined a new conference and can’t play us.”

Another big change in Southeastern’s camp this season is the return of Rob Cutter as an assistant coach. Cutter’s last year as head coach was 2006 when the Royals went undefeated during the regular season but lost to Lafayette Jeff in the first game of the sectional. The previous year, Cutter’s club finished 11-4, losing to Warren Central in the state championship game.

“Having Rob back sure will help,” May said.

Southeastern finished its summer season this week.

“It was a good summer,” May said. “We finished up with our team camp. Everyone worked hard.”

Southeastern returns six starters on the offense, including senior quarterback Tyler Janney, who last year threw for 1,444 yards and eight touchdowns. Also returning are two receivers, Kyle Schrank and Chris Ford, who combined caught 44 passes. Schrank grabbed 23 for 316 yards and Ford 21 for 353 yards.

“We have the core of our offensive line returning,” said May.

But, graduation took two key running backs, Hunter Hardee (157 carries for 882 yards) and Jamitreus Crockham (80 carries for 601 yards). Janney, at quarterback, carried 98 times for 625 yards.

Janney also starts on defense at safety. May would like to give him some relief from going both ways, so he will use a junior, Carter Poiry, some at QB.

“We don’t have any senior running backs on the team,” said May, “but we’ve got a pair of good juniors, Aaron Matio and Curtis Goss.”

Matio carried 36 times last season for 317 yards. Goss carried only four times, picking up 19 yards.

May said he will miss his front three on defense, but he has three good returning defensive players in Collin Miller, Ryan Clements and David Hermann. Miller started as outside linebacker as a sophomore last year.

Age Group State swimming...

Carmel wins four more events, with one record



Dillon wins Nationwide race

Ty Dillon got the first win of his young NASCAR Nationwide Series career Saturday, as he dominated the last 24 laps to take the checkered flag at the Lilly Diabetes 250 at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

With threatening skies throughout the entire race, Dillon took the lead on the 77th lap of the 100-lap race. It was his first time as the leader, and he never relinquished it.

Dillon managed to hang on even though his fuel was dwindling, and he expended what he had left in the gas tank with a loud burnout after getting his race win.

"It really hasn't fully sunk in yet," he said later in a press conference.

Dillon hung tight in what turned out to be a clean race. There were only three cautions, with two yellows for debris and another for fluid in Turn 4. It was also a hot race for Dillon, as his air conditioner broke early on.

"I was definitely pushing," said Dillon, who noted that he could already feel his car getting hot early.

Pole-sitter Kyle Busch finished second. He led 10 laps, including all five of the final caution period.

"It's unfortunate that we weren't as good as were last year," said Busch. "He got the lead and it was over from there. As soon as I got tight, he just distanced me."

Matt Kenseth placed third, while Kevin Harvick was fourth. Harvick led the most laps with 33. Fifth-place Joey Logano paced 21 laps.

Ballard’s injury means Bradshaw, Richardson will be stepping up

The suspicion that Indianapolis Colts running back Vick Ballard’s Friday leg injury was serious was confirmed overnight, and he will miss the season with a torn left Achilles tendon.

A stable of three backs that have thrived in the league is decreased by a third, leaving more room for Ahmad Bradshaw and Trent Richardson to reach bell cow status in the backfield.

Chuck Pagano held Richardson from work on Friday and Saturday, with today’s session being the first padded practice of camp.

“He hasn’t done much. He’s nursing a soft tissue injury. He’s started doing some things going about half-speed and made no sense really having him out there. He knows exactly what to do, getting all the mental reps, going through walk-through stuff. We want to get him 100 percent before we get him out there.”

Bradshaw and Ballard both were coming off season-ending injuries that caused them to miss a combined 28 games. Bradshaw will see significant duty.

“He looks really good. He has found the groove to make it,” said Pagano. “We know how tough Ahmad is. We know how he’s wired. I’m not going to be pulling back on the reins.

“He’s not one of those guys that will think about what he went through. He’s a football player, tough guy, hard-nosed.”

“I’m still going to be full speed whenever I’m in there,” said Bradshaw, who relished putting pads on Saturday. “Trent (is) going to be there and my role’s not changing at all.”
