# **Commissioners** ask Alternatives

Hamilton County's need for a domestic violence shelter seems to have moved further down the road following Monday's meeting of the Hamilton County Commissioners.

Although all three Commissioners applauded what is being done by not-forprofit Alternatives, which runs an Anderson shelter that helps more than 100 Hamilton County residents each year, the Commissioners sliced \$10,000 from the

County.

Seven different not-for-profits appeared before the Commissioners. Among the seven, only Alternatives' budget renewal request was not granted, as requested.

The other six were Primelife Enrichment, Prevail, Chaucie's Place, Promising Futures, Hamilton County Leadership Academy and Conner Prairie.

# No hostage incident in Strawtown

A possible hostage incident in Strawtown has been resolved.

Shortly after 11 p.m. Monday, Hamilton County dispatchers received a report of a possible hostage situation near Strawtown, just north of Noblesville. According to the initial call, Daniel "Danny" Johnson had an unknown male somewhere in the area and was threatening to stab the individual and then shoot himself. The caller stated Johnson was armed with a gun and knife. Johnson, who has a previous history with law enforcement, had allegedly tied up the other male and beaten him unconscious.

Sheriff deputies were able to locate Johnson in a home near the area. The vague information concerning a hostage and suicide threat provided during the call to Hamilton County Communications was not completely accurate but was taken seriously based on the nature of the call and Johnson's history with law enforcement. Upon contact with Johnson, it was determined he had not threatened another individual or himself. No charges are expected to be filed as a result of the incident.

# **Negative income tax** would eliminate poverty

#### Dear Editor,


Rep. Paul Ryan (R-WI) wrote an opinion article concerning poverty in America that was published in newspaper all over the country. He states "Each year, the federal government spends almost \$800 billion on 92 programs to help struggling families. Yet the poverty rate is the highest in a generation." His solution: consolidate 11 of the 92 programs into a new program that would give states 'more flexibility in exchange for more accountability' to the federal government. He doesn't explain proposed by Milton Friedman, would not why we should keep the other 81 programs. As I read how Rep. Ryan explains how states can qualify for his new program, it's obvious that many more bureaucrats will be needed to run his new program. Seems to me that the politicians in Washington are always trying to fix old programs with new programs and, invariably, more spending and things seem to get worse and worse.

Maybe this makes sense in Washington, but not here in Indiana. We Hoosiers would use a common sense approach. The US Census Bureau says that 46.5 million Americans live in poverty. If you divide

the \$800 billion that Ryan says we're now spending on 92 programs by 46.5 million people in poverty, that means we're spending an astounding \$17,204 per person in poverty! That's \$68,816 for a family of four! If we eliminated all 92 programs and just passed out the \$800 billion to those in poverty, not only would poverty be eliminated, but all people who were in poverty would be elevated to the upper middle class income level!

A simple negative income tax, such as only eliminate poverty in the United States, but would save us billions of dollars - money that could go to fulfilling our promise to veterans and help pay down the federal debt. Of course, the politicians in Washington would lose power and some bureaucrats would be laid off, but I'm willing to bet that the majority of Hoosiers are willing to suffer these consequences.

The Westfield boys basketball teams were road warriors this summer, playing three out-of-state tournaments.

Those trips certainly did much to help what will be a young Shamrock team when winter comes around. Westfield will have just one senior, a few juniors and a majority of freshmen and sophomores on its roster.

Shamrocks coach Eric Rauch took his team to tournaments at Ohio State, Michigan State and Michigan. Rauch said his teams finished with "around .500" records in the first two tourneys, then were a perfect 5-0 at Michigan.

The only senior back for Westfield this year will be Spencer Tebbe. He played in all 21 games and delivered solid minutes, with 3.7 points and a team-leading 2.5 assists per game. Other juniors back will be Kyle Nicole (also 3.7 points per game) and Robbie Lynch, the latter moving up from junior varsity.

The Shamrocks had several freshman and sophomore players last year, in which Westfield had to deal with a 2-19 record. Rauch acknowledged the team struggled then, but things are looking up, as he said "this summer we started playing well" and that the team "really became a family this summer."

Among the sophomores-to-be coming back are Ian Kristensen, Aaron Bennett, Jonah Welch and Sawyer Olsen.

"I think from Christmas on he started every game as a freshman," Rauch said of Olsen. "He's really developed into a nice player."

Of that group, Welch returns the most points with 4.1 per game. Olsen averaged 3.4 per game and is the leading returning rebounder, bringing back 3.0 per game. Olsen was just behind now-graduated Nick Ferrer, who pulled 3.1 rebounds per game.




