Only 10 school board filings so far

candidate filing period for this year's school board elections, only ten hopefuls have filed for

seats on the six Hamilton County chool boards There are 18 seats at stake

countywide in the Nov. 4 non-partisan school election,

two in Noblesville, four at Southeastern and three each in Carmel, Westield, Heights and Sheridan.

Candidates have until noon on Friday, August 22 to file their petitions of candidacy with the county elections

One would think there would be more interest in the election with numerous candidates seeking to be on the school board. After all, the schools control more tax money than any other local government entity. But, in many of these school elections some candidates run unopposed for election or re-election.

The question then arises as to whether this means the general public is satisfied with schools as they are, or whether it is simply apathy on the part of the public. Then there's also the possibility that a great portion of the public is not informed enough to know anything about their school board or how its members are selected.

Naturally, we'd like to believe the schools are all doing an outstanding job and the data indicates Hamilton County schools are doing a good job when compared with other schools in the state. But, I suspect there is also apathy and a lack of understanding of what's involved which is unfortunate when dealing with such an important subject as public education.

The Indiana Department of Education released some good news when publishing 2014 ISTEP scores earlier this week.

But, there also was some, perhaps, not so good news.

The good news is that more than 80 percent of Indiana students passed the English/Language Arts portion of the test, up from 79.5 percent in 2013. More than 74 percent passed both English/Language Arts and Math, up from 73.7 percent last year.





Clearing work on West 146th Street today

Please be advised: effective Wednesday Aug. 6, 2014, clearing work will begin along 146th Street from 1000 feet west of Ditch Road to 1000 feet west of Spring Mill Road. Traffic will be maintained on existing 146th Street and Ditch Road although short delays may occur. Please be cautious and aware of the surroundings in this area.

This clearing work begins the reconstruction of this segment of 146th Street. Additional notices will be issued as the work / schedule progresses.

Crews Setting Bridge Beams for New US 31 Ramp to I-465

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plan to restrict traffic lanes on U.S. 31/Meridian Street during overnight hours this week to set bridge beams for a new ramp to I-465.

Beginning at 10 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday nights, crews will begin lane restrictions on northbound and southbound U.S. 31 between 106th Street and 96th Street. After midnight, crews will temporarily stop traffic on this section of U.S. 31 for up to 20 minutes at a time as beams are lifted over the roadway for a new bridge that will carry southbound U.S. 31 to eastbound I-465.

Crews will also restrict lanes on U.S. 31 at I-465 on Friday and Monday nights for work on the bridge beams, but short-term traffic stops will not be needed. Restrictions are expected to end before 6 a.m. the following day.

E & B Paving and Gradex are INDOT contractors for the \$141 million contract to upgrade U.S. 31 to freeway standards from 96th Street to the Monon overpass. The contract builds new roundabout interchanges at 106th, 116th, 131st and 136th streets and improvements to the U.S. 31 and I-465 interchange, including two flyover ramps from southbound U.S. 31 to eastbound I-465 and eastbound I-465 to northbound U.S.

261st Street closing Monday

INDOT To Patch S.R. 47 Before Chip Sealing

The Indiana Department of Transportation plans to repair a two-mile section of State Road 47 this week in advance of a chip seal operation tentatively scheduled for the week of August 25.

INDOT Tipton Subdistrict maintenance crews will be working along the east-west highway with a milling machine and motorpaver beginning Wednesday or Thursday - weather permitting. Strip repairs will be made between the Boone-Hamilton County line and S.R. 38 at Sheridan. Flaggers will be on site to direct motorists around the advancing worksite.

INDOT officials say S.R. 47 repair operations should be completed early next week.

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
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Sheriff's Office to host forum on heroin, illegal drugs, and underage drinking

public education forum on Heroin, Illegal Drugs, and Underage Drinking. Like many communities across the country, Hamilton County has experienced an increase in drug and alcohol activity in recent years. All Hamilton County residents and concerned citizens are invited to attend this important meeting at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 28, at the Hamilton County 4H Fairgrounds. Among the presenters will be Brandon Robinson who was arrested for involvement in a fatal drunk driving crash; Jeanine Motsay who lost her son to the synthetic drug NBOMe; a recovering heroin addict; and Major A. Dietz of the Hamilton -Boone County Drug Task Force.

"We can't turn our backs on the increasing problems of illegal drug use and underage drinking that are present in central Indiana and people are asking for information," said Sheriff Bowen. "Our goals for the evening are to present current and accurate information on the situation, give ideas resources such as the Hamilton County on how families and friends can proactively address the problem, and to honestly answer questions those in the community have." 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Queen bee: 2014 Honey Queen spreads bee awareness with sweet title

Not all queen titles with sashes and tiaras come from beauty pageants. For 2014 Indiana Honey Queen Katie Neighbors, the process involved essay writing and an interview in front of a panel of judges about none other than bees and honey.

Pairing her sparkling crown and white sash with a black business-suit jacket, the 19-year-old Purdue University student stood by handing out ribbons at the Watermelon Seed Spitting Contest at the Indiana State Fair on Saturday.

At the State Fair, Honey Queen and Princess duties also include presenting honey-cooking and candle-making demonstrations, manning the Indiana State Beekeepers Association booth and answering people's questions in an effort to spread bee knowledge. But their work doesn't end with the fair. They promote beekeeping through presentations at schools, farmer's markets and 4-H groups throughout the

Neighbors has been beekeeping for three and a half years. Already fascinated by bees, she went to beekeeping school on scholarship in 2012, running for Indiana Honey Queen in 2014.

"I really like trying new things," she said. "I've always liked helping people. Before I was queen I would come up here sometimes and help out with some of the booths, and I really wanted to get more younger people involved in beekeeping,"

Neighbors wrote her essay for the Honey Queen competition on the antibacterial aspect of honey, and then underwent an interview with three judges from the Indiana State Beekeepers Association.

"They want someone who can speak in front of people," Neighbors said.

"They're kind of like our ambassadors," said Lacy Dooley, board director of the Indiana State Beekeepers Association and 2011 Indiana Honey Queen.

Like Neighbors, Dooley was motivated to become Honey Queen to share her knowledge of bees with others and enjoyed the friendships and connections she made.

Being the youngest contestant running this year, Neighbors was shocked to win.

"People cheered," Neighbors said. "I actually had some of my friends from college come down because I told them I was running for the Indiana State Honey Queen, and they just wanted to see what was going

Kids dissect owl pellets for science and fun

Right behind the misting rock fountain, under the DNR front porch at the Indiana State Fairgrounds, children dissected owl pellets provided by the Gene Stratton-Porter State Historic Site.

Yes, owl pellets. They're often mistaken for poop. They're small hairballs full of bones that are regurgitated by owls as part of their unique digestive system. Disgusting. Yet a ring of parents, strollers and grossed-out but intrigued kids clustered around a folding table covered in the pellets they were taking apart and examining.

"It's a great experience for kids. Owls eat a lot different than other animals," said Dave W. Fox, the site manager for Gene Stratton-Porter State Historic Site.

Owls have two stomachs and do not digest bones and fur; instead, they vomit up the remnants of their dinner they don't need in the form of pellets.

"I loved it. I want to be a vet someday so it was really fun to do," said Maeve Pintal, 8, who was touching the pellets with her bare hands. "I got to take some owl pellets home!"

Gene Stratton-Porter workers had sticker-covered sandwich bags ready for kids to take home their finds.

"People are curious and scared to come over," said Fox, who has set up a state fair

Fast start for county golf teams

The standard of golf just keeps going up in Hamilton County.

For example: The Hamilton Southeastern girls team opened its season on Tuesday by shooting 294 at its own Invitational at Stony Creek Golf Course. Three Southeastern players carded 73. Very impressive.

And the Royals finished second. Carmel got HSE by two strokes, totaling 292. Two Greyhound players broke 70, and one of them nearly broke the Carmel school record.

That would be Alyssa Cook, one of two players who was on the Greyhounds' record-setting state championship team last year. Cook lit up Stony Creek with a fourunder par 66, running away with medalist honors.

Carmel's school record is 65, set by Milena Savich in 2007. As a team, the Greyhounds were just two strokes off the school record of 290, which was set in 2011.

"(Alyssa) told me she would have not bogeyed the last hole if she'd known that," said 'Hounds coach Ken Kelly.

Maggie Rees, also returning from last year, followed that up with a one-under par 69. Rees tied for second with Jaylee Bunner of Fort Wayne Blackhawk Christian.

"That was a great, great two rounds by those two girls," said Kelly. "They're going to be leading the team all season between the two of them."

Carmel played two teams at Stony Creek, with the Gold team carding a 325. Hannah Sharkey finished with a 73, putting her in a five-way tie for fourth place.

Sharkey joined the three Royals - Marissa Holliday, Ciara McAree and Kat Leighty - with their 73s. Phoebe Cha's 75, which tied her for ninth place, gave Southeastern its strong score.

"We are very excited about what the girls did today," said HSE coach Steve Guenin. "We got to see a lot of girls play, so we're very excited about that."

The Royals had three teams compete -Blue, White and Black. The Blue team scored the 294, but there were decent scores on the other two teams. Rachel Eaton (78) and Esther Bahn (79) led the White team, with Phyllis Cha's 80 the best of the Black team. Kaitlyn Johnson competed as an individual, giving Southeastern 16 players on

All of them are there to help Southeastern carry on its girls golf tradition.

"We feel like we have a solid group of returning girls all with state tournament experience," said Guenin in an earlier email to The Reporter. "Seniors Marissa Holliday

and Kat Leighty have been big contributors for the last three years and we are hoping for big things from them this year. Juniors Ciara McAree and Phoebe Cha bring with them two years of varsity experience. The

With this fast start, Fishers is truly taking aim at putting itself into the girls golf elite. Smith said the Tigers' goal is to get to the state meet this year.
