# Check new proposed rates

Cicero residents will soon pay higher rates for water, wastewater and trash removal if three ordinances introduced by the Cicero Town Council are approved.

Public hearings on all three have been set for the Sept. 16 Town Council meeting, which will be open to the public. Held at the Cicero Town Hall, Council meetings begin

#### **Water Rates**

The Town of Cicero operates its Municipal Water Utility. The Town Council recognizes the need to increase rates and charges to fund the annual revenue requirements of the utility. The new rates will be phased in.

Present rates and charges were effective with the first full billing period, occurring after Jan. 1, 2014.

The new rates, if adopted, represent a 6.59 percent increase and charges with Phase I effective Jan. 1, 2015.

If adopted, the rates will be phased in with increases of 2.5 percent and 2 percent in years 2015, 2016 and 2017.

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## U.S. 31 construction updates

Overnight lane restrictions on US 31 near I-465 on Aug. 6 and 7

Beginning around 10 p.m. tonight, Thursday, Aug. 7, crews plan to restrict various lanes of northbound and southbound US 31 between 96th and 106th streets to set beams for the new southbound US 31 bridge to eastbound I-465. Temporary stoppages of up to 20 minutes each are expected after midnight while crews set these beams. The lane restrictions also took place Wednesday night.

Overnight lane restrictions on northbound and southbound US 31 are expected to repeat at I-465 on Friday, Aug. 8 and Monday, Aug. 11. No traffic stoppages are expected. All restrictions are expected to end before 6 a.m. the following morning.
