Riverview Health Foundation raising money for a...

New large bore MRI

The thought of going in to the hospital for an MRI screening is uncomfortable for some people.

The Riverview Health Foundation is trying to help. The foundation is in the midst of raising money for a large bore MRI scanner. The foundation has already raised quite a bit of money for the machine, including over \$100,000 at the Heartfelt Thanks Golf Tournament last June.

"It was huge," said Trish Oman, executive director of the Riverview Health Foun-

Oman said there are other projects that the foundation is working on, including raising money for the renovation of the atrium. But the primary focus is on the new MRI scanner, which it is trying to raise \$1 million for. Oman said they want to have the money raised by the end of the first quarter of next year, which is March 31,

Oman said that the full purpose of Riverview Health Foundation "is to raise monev for Riverview Hospital." So, the foundation aligns itself with the hospital's needs.

HOW IT WORKS

Many people have had MRI screenings, but others may not be sure how they work. MRI stands for magnetic resonance imaging, and a scanner uses magnetic fields and body. Magnetic field strength is a factor the stronger the field, the higher the quality of an image will be. The field strength is measured in units of "tesla." A common MRI scanner runs at 1.5 teslas (for comparison, the strength of an average refrigerator magnet is 0.005 teslas).

MRI's are painless and generally harmless, but anyone who has seen a machine can understand why people would feel discomfort about going into one - especially those with even mild cases of claustropho-

ner is 60 centimeters, or 23.6 inches. A large-bore scanner has a wider opening of 70 centimeters (27.6 inches), and not only can accommodate claustrophobic patients, but larger ones as well. Some wide bore MRI scanners, such as those in use at radio waves to produce images of a person's Larchmont Imaging in southern New Jersey, operate with a strength of 3 teslas, which allows for higher quality images and quicker generation times.

The foundation will be hosting some different fundraising events, and Oman said that some of the board members will host "some in-home events" to help raise money for the MRI scanner.



Ivy Tech Board of Trustees approves leadership consolidation for Kokomo and Lafayette regions

Trustees has approved the consolidation of the administrative structures of the College's Lafayette and Kokomo regions. The restructuring is part of a series of regional leadership consolidations that began last year to decrease at their home campus and will see no impact on their costs and increase efficiencies in the nation's largest community college system.

David Bathe, currently chancellor of the Lafayette Region, will have administrative responsibility for a restructured leadership team with duties across the two regions. Following Ivy Tech's new structure, the Kokomo and Lafayette regional boards of trustees will remain in place to respond to the needs of their regions and campus presidents will be named for the Kokomo and Lafayette campuses to serve as the College's liaison in the two communities.



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
Boys tennis previews...

Young Golden Eagles have strong players, bigger schedule this season

The Guerin Catholic boys tennis team graduated some great players from its 2013

But don't worry about the Golden Eagles this year - it looks like they'll be reloading instead of rebuilding. There are no seniors on Guerin's varsity line-up, but there are some strong and experienced players ready to make some noise on GC's beefed-up schedule.

"We graduated a strong senior class, and we have a strong returning younger class," said Guerin coach Karl Krauter.

While last year's sectional line-up was a slim majority of seniors, three of them are back. Luke Wiese competed at No. 3 singles behind All-State player Cam Metzger and Honorable Mention Matt Moe, so it's likely that Weise, a junior, will move into the No. 1 spot.

"He's also been named captain this

year," said Krauter. As for the other two singles spots, the

coach said it looks as if two freshmen will move into those positions: Wyatt Metzger and Jake Bratton.

The doubles will be anchored by junior Cole Hepp and sophomore Ben Catton, who played at No. 1 last year. Krauter said he wasn't sure if that team would be the same combination. Another doubles player

in the mix is sophomore Drew Cobb, whom Krauter expects to do well this season after working hard over the summer.

"We're starting to get more players that are becoming more year-round players, and doing a lot of work outside of the tennis season," said Krauter.

Guerin Catholic's schedule has been significantly strengthened and increased this year. The Golden Eagles will play 21 matches, by far the most ever on the GC schedule (the IHSAA's limit is 22). Those 21 matches break down to 14 duals and two big tournaments, including the prestigious John Shirley Invitational, which takes place at North Central Aug. 30.

Guerin will play the Panthers, last year's state champion, in a dual meet on Sept. 11. Other top teams on the schedule are Carmel, Park Tudor, Hamilton Southeastern. Cathedral and Northeastern.

"It's going to be a challenge for us the whole year, no question," said assistant coach Joe Lustig.

The Golden Eagles host Westfield in a scrimmage on Thursday, then travel to Park Tudor on Aug. 19 for their first meet of the

UHS announces entry into Pioneer **Conference**

As reported earlier in the week, University High School is joining the Pioneer Academic Athletic Conference in the next school year.

University released the following statement about its entry into the league:

"University High School announced this week that it will be joining the Pioneer Academic Athletic Conference, effective fall 2015.

This will be the first time that University, an IHSAA Class 1A school, will be part of an athletic conference. School administrators hope that joining the Pioneer Academic Athletic Conference will afford student-athletes more opportunities athletically as well as academically, which is a focus for the college preparatory school.

"Joining the Pioneer Academic Athletic Conference is an exciting move for our athletic program," said John Walls, athletic director at University High School. "We've been considering joining a conference for a few years now, but this seems like the right time and the right conference for the Trailblazers to join. Marquez leads opening day at Red Bull Indianapolis GP

Reigning MotoGP World Champion Marc Marquez of Spain led the first day of MotoGP practice for the Red Bull Indianapolis GP on Friday, Aug. 8, turning a top lap of 1 minute, 32.882 seconds on his Repsol Honda at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Marquez, 21, has a perfect record in winning the first nine MotoGP World Championship series races this season. A 10th win on Sunday would continue his streak and tie Australian legend Mick Doohan for the most consecutive wins (10) in a season in the modern era.

The winner of three races already in his career at Indianapolis - Moto2 in 2011-12 and MotoGP last year - Marquez seems right at home on the newly reconfigured 16-turn, 2.591-mile IMS road course that features new pavement on the circuit's infield section and five modified corners.

"We showed this afternoon that we work well on the new layout and we will be fighting for the victory," Marquez said. "The end of the course and Turns 2, 3 and 4 feel better. I think the biggest improvement is near the end of the course. Between the morning and afternoon practices, I thought the bike was slightly better in the afternoon."

Alvaro Bautista of Spain recorded a trap speed of 212.8 mph (342.5 km/h) on his Honda during the second MotoGP practice session today, which is the fastest ever by a motorcycle at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Before today, the previous standard of 209.2 mph (336.7 km/h) was set by Dani Pedrosa in 2013. The speed trap is located just past the start-finish line on the main straightaway.

The winner of the inaugural Red Bull Indianapolis GP and a nine-time world champion, Valentino Rossi of Italy posted the ninth-fastest time of 1:34.535 on the reconfigured IMS road course, and he appreciates the new and improved circuit.

"For me, I like the circuit very much," Rossi said. "The corners, for me, are a lot 1:34.994 on his NGM Forward Racing Yafaster and a lot more fun. The big step is the maha. asphalt. The surface has very good grip; it's flat. You can control the bike in a better Moto2 practice at 1:37.518 on his Tech-
