## Tanker truck crash closes SR 32 in Westfield

## Indy-area building permits stable

The July building permit reports indicate that in the Greater Indianapolis Nine-County area, Single-Family Building Permits increased one percent over the 2013 numbers year-to-date. Reports indicate there have been 3,148 new home permits issued so far this year compared to 3,104 in 2013. In addition, Builder Confidence rose to a reading of 53 on the National Association of Home Builders/Wells Fargo Housing Market Index (HMI). Any reading over 50 indicates that more builders view sales conditions as good than poor.

"The consistent permit numbers are an indicator of a very steady and stable housing market here in Central Indiana," says Steve Lains, CEO of the Builders Association of Greater Indianapolis. "We just learned that Builder Confidence in the market for newly-built single-family homes rose four points in July indicating that consumers are viewing the condition of the housing market as good - and that mirrors what we are seeing here in the nine-county area," says Lains.

In the Greater Indianapolis Nine-County region, the permits issued through July 2014 have created a total economic impact of \$563,755,812 in local income, \$127,981,902 in local taxes, and 9,545 local jobs, year to date (see chart below).

# QB spot still up for grabs

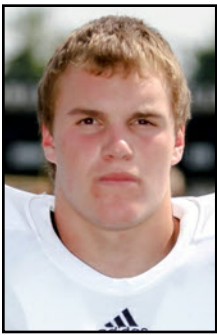

Lance Scheib has listed Luke Melloh as his starting quarterback for the Millers’ season-opening scrimmage tonight, but the Noblesville coach is quick to add that the starting position is still up for grab between the junior Melloh and senior Carl Hardy.

“The quarterback competition is still close and too close to call,” Scheib said Thursday afternoon. “We will play both at the scrimmage, then make a decision as we move forward.”

Noblesville will host North Central from the MIC Conference in a scrimmage session which will begin at 7 p.m. at Hare Chevrolet Stadium.

The quarterback slot is of special interest going into the season because no player on the NHS roster completed, or even attempted, a pass in varsity action last fall. Now-graduated T.C. McKiernan did all the throwing, completing



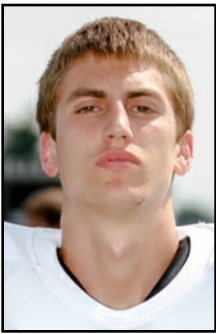

139 in 237 attempts for 1,562 yards and nine touchdowns. He was intercepted just six times during the season.

Passing was a huge part of Noblesville’s offense last year. The running game added 1,419 yards, but McKiernan also led that stat with 518 yards in 177 attempts. Cody Smith, who also graduated, was second with 446 yards. Third in the rushing game was Hayden Stinnett with 358 yards in 83 tries, a 4.3 average per attempt. Stinnett is listed as the starting tailback for the scrimmage tonight.

Scheib’s probable starting backfield is loaded with two-sports athletes, including basketballers Joey Herron at wide receiver and Joey Brewer at tight end, along with Brian McLean, who was a standout on Noblesville’s state championship baseball team last year. Herron caught 32 passes for 348 yards last season.

Noblesville fans will see a defensive unit which is expected to be good. Familiar names returning and listed as

starters tonight are Nick Santos at end, Donavan Lynch at linebacker, Austin Ginther at linebacker, David Cory at linebacker, Jake Owens as a defensive back, Josh Gentry as a defensive back and Zack Niezer as a defensive back. Ginther, Cory and Gentry also are basketball players.

This appears to be the deepest team Noblesville has fielded in years. In the two-deep lineup listed by Scheib, there isn’t a Miller who will start both ways.

“We have been able to develop depth this summer at almost every position and we feel good about where we are across the board as we prepare for the season,” said the coach.

The two-deep lineup includes all seniors and juniors, except for sophomores Austin Dreyer, backup offensive tackle; Josh Garcia, backup defensive tackle; Grant Bullard, backup linebacker and Harris Camp, backup defensive back.

The Millers will open their regular season the following Friday on the road at new-foe Lawrence North.

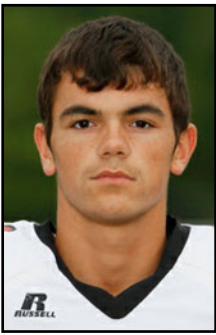

Street said that decision hasn’t made a difference as to how Weatherford is approaching football this fall.



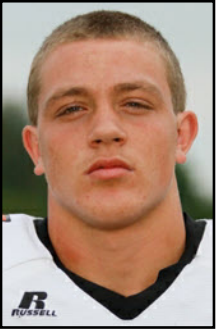
