The booze soon will be flowing in Mudsock

With that will come a \$10 million dollar brewery; new jobs to the area, and thousands of new folks looking for the night life will be flocking to Fishers.

All of which was made possible when four Fishers Town Councilmen voted unanimously in favor of bringing the Sun King Brewery to a farm field located at Kincaid and Park Central Drives.

Sun King, bursting at the seams in nearby Indianapolis, is expanding and opening a second location in Fishers.

About Sun King Brewing

Sun King Brewing Company is the brainchild of Dave Colt and Clay Robinson. With the help of family and friends - Omar Robinson, Andy Fagg and Steve Koers - the first keg of Sun King beer rolled out the door for delivery in July 2009. Now available on tap and in cans at hundreds of locations around central Indiana, Sun King has grown into the second-largest beer brewer in the state of Indiana. The company's commitment to handcrafted seasonal and specialty beers has been rewarded with multiple medals at the Indiana Brewers Cup, Great American Beer Festival and World Beer Cup competitions. Groundbreaking is expected later this vear and the facility is expected to be open by early spring of 2015.

Sun King co-owner Clay Robinson said an independent study by the brewery predicts the project will bring nearly \$20 million and 27,000 visitors a year to the Fishers area. He also said the company plans to hire 20 full time and 20 part time workers.

Fishers has committed to cap proper tax for 25 years, estimated at \$100,000 annual, to help offset capital costs and to fund surrounding public infrastructure.

"Sun King's expansion into Fishers not only creates a new destination for our community, but also aligns with our mission to create an environment in which highgrowth companies compete and thrive," said Fishers Town Manager Scott Fadness.

Sun King is Indiana's second-largest brewery and has expanded its capacity by eight times since opening in Indianapolis in





The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office will be hosting a free public education forum to address these issues on Thursday, Aug. 28 at 7 p.m. at the Hamilton County 4H Fairgrounds. The goal of the evening is to educate area residents on the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse as well as to gather community assistance in fighting these growing problems.

Hamilton County has recently seen a steady rise in the number of drug arrests, overdoses, and underage drinking incidents. Drug overdose reports to the Sheriff's Office have risen fourfold since 2010, and there have been nearly 60 arrests made by the Sheriff's Office for drug possession so far this year. Similarly, arrests for impaired driving under the influence of drugs have doubled in the past year. An indication of the underage drinking problem is reflected in the number of arrests made for illegal consumption. In 2013, more than 600 arrests were made in Hamilton County for minor consumption of alcohol, and 2014 is on course to equal or surpass that number.
