# **School board elections**

With the passing of the noon hour Friday, the field is re-election. set for the November 4 school board elections in all six Hamilton County school districts. A total of 23 candidates have filed for the non-partisan balloting to be held at the same time as the general election for the first time since school elections were moved from the spring primary to the fall.

Voters in Noblesville district which includes city and township will choose two of the three candidates filed. They are Kevin Kalstad, Julia Church Kozicki and Carl

Johnson IV. Incumbent Patrick Berghoff chose not to seek while Doug Ozolins is unopposed in the White River

There will be no contest in Carmel where Pam Knowles, Lyla Spanenberg and Mike Kerschner filed for the three seats at stake. Incumbent Gregory Phillips did not file for re-election.

Sheridan district voters will choose between Todd Burtron and Randall Brimberry for the Adams Township seat while Todd Roberts will be elected without opposition to the at-large position on the board.

Hamilton Heights voters in Jackson Township will have a choice between Gwen Hunter and Paul Vondersaar

We've heard rumors (only rumors) that someday Noblesville may have a park in the old Firestone plant area, if, of course, enough "safe" ground can be found in the old Firestone plant area.

Then, there is the proposed Eastside Park (as yet, I assume, not officially named). No doubt, you've heard about Eastside Park. We wrote about it and ran a view of the area in The Reporter several weeks ago.

Eastside Park would be located on (you've got it) the east side of Noblesville, bordered on the east by Boden Road and on

the north by 166th Street, in the Wayne Township area. There is, or will be, a huge residential area on the south side, labeled as the Lake Forest subdivision. It's one of Noblesville's fastest-growing area and a very high-level living area.

On the Noblesville Master Plan web-site, this is what is written about Eastside Park. "By acquiring this large parcel (200 acres) of property Noblesville has committed to provide accessible parks and recreation facilities for folks living east of State Road 32, particularly those in Wayne Township."

Eastside Park, you might say, is more recreational than Federal Hill Park. Proposed are:

# **Fishers Police Department** offers drug collection unit

Fishers Police Chief George Kehl would like to remind residents of the drug collection unit located inside the Fishers Police Department. In 2011 the police department purchased a MedReturn Drug Collection Unit. The drug collection container is a safe, effective and sustained way to collect unwanted or expired household prescription, over-the-counter and other unused medicines.

The drug collection unit is a secure steel container permanently installed inside the front doors of the police department. The unit is monitored by police patrols and video surveillance. Citizens can access the drug collection unit 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

"We recognize the need to protect our children and our water supply", said Chief George Kehl. "In the past the police department has partnered with the Fishers Waste Water Utility during Water Awareness Month, but wanted to provide a consistent program that would give residents a way to properly dispose of unwanted medicine", Chief Kehl added.

The contents in the drug collection unit are monitored by police officers. The contents are stored in the locked collection unit or the Fishers Police Department Property Room until it can be disposed of properly. It is not acceptable for residents to leave medicine outside the unit.

# Huskies win "hammer", 52-0

With the Hammer Trophy at stake, Hamilton Heights and its "Superman" flying high put the hammer to rival Tipton, 52-0, in a season opener for both teams at Arcadia Friday evening.

The final outcome was never in doubt.



Heights led 26-0 at intermission and the Huskies didn't let up in the second half.

Superman, better known to his friends as senior Grant Weatherford, did super things for the winners. He carried the pigskin six times for 148 yards. He completed 4-of-6 passes for 82 yards. He also intercepted a pass for a touchdown.

On this night, Weatherford played quarterback, sharing the spot a little with sophomore Josh Feltz, with junior quarterback Ethan Jones sitting out a twogame suspension.

"Both of our guys, Weatherford and Feltz, did a nice job tonight," said Husky coach Mitch Street.

"We got off to a fast start, and that helped. We got our running game going early," Street added.

On the ground, Heights had 38 carries for 362 yards, a 9.5 average per try. Along with Weatherford's half-dozen carries, Jesse Brown added 132 yards rushing in 13 carries; Jesse Kerfoot 48 yards in seven tries and Clayton Cowan moped up late in the game with nine carries for 27 yards.

Joining Weatherford in the passing department was Feltz, hitting on 3-of-3 for 50 yards.

Riley White caught four balls for the Huskies for 32 yards and "little" brother, sophomore Sterling Weatherford had two catches for 69 yards including a 35-yards touchdown strike from "big" brother Grant.

"It was nice to come up and win the opener," Street said.

The Huskies wasted little time doing that. After Heights' defense stopped Tipton in its first series, on Heights' second offensive play Grant Weatherford broke a 97-yard touchdown run.

The Huskies added 26 points in the second quarter and never really worked up a sweat after that.

Heights' defense held Tipton to 67 yards rushing and 10 yards passing in the fist half and to 25 yards rushing and 17 yards passing in the second half.

Heights now will take its show on the road next Friday traveling down Highway 19 to Noblesville and a contest with the Millers at Hare Chevrolet Stadium.


The Blackhawks didn't threaten throughout the game.

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#### **Public Notice Sheridan Water Works**

Beginning in early September Sheridan Water Works will be using chloramines instead of chlorine to disinfect the drinking water. The process has become more cost effective allowing Sheridan to take advantage of the greater disinfection benefit by doing so.

For many years cities in the United States, such as Indianapolis, use chloramines as a disinfectant. Chloraminated water is the same as chlorinated water for all of the normal uses we have for water.

However, there are two groups of people who need to take special care with chloraminated water: kidney dialysis patients and fish owners. Chloramines must be removed from water used in kidney dialysis process and from water that is used in fish tanks or ponds.

What are chloramines? Chloramines are a combination of chlorine and ammonia which are used to kill potentially harmful bacteria in water. They do not increase the pH levels, and they do not affect pool water. Chloraminated water will not harm plants due to the chlorine demand of the soil.

Why is the Water Works changing to chloramines? Ammonia is becoming a ground water problem throughout the State of Indiana. Ammonia drastically increases the chlorine demand and makes it more difficult for chlorine to be sustained out in the far reaches of the distribution system. Instead of ammonia being a problem to us we have decided to make it an asset by adding a very small amount of ammonia to the existing natural ammonia found in our ground water and combining it with a bit more chlorine to form chloramine. Because chloramine can persist in water for several weeks, whereas chorine dissipates over a period of days to hours this gives us greater disinfecting abilities. Other benefits are that less disinfecting by-products will form and chloramines are less of an oxidant then chlorine and the iron and manganese minerals will less likely stain our fixtures.

Is chloramines disinfection safe? Chloraminated water is no different than chlorinated water for all of the normal uses we have for water. Water that contains chloramines is totally safe to drink for pregnant women and children. The digestive process neutralizes the chlormines before they reach the bloodstream. Even kidney dialysis patients can drink the water. Boiling the water is not an effective method of removing chloramines either. The only practical methods of removing chloramines from water are using a water conditioner which contains a dechlorinator or by using granular activated carbon.



## **Changes to mourning dove** season for 2014-2015

The Indiana mourning dove season will expand by 18 days for the 2014-15 hunting season.

To accommodate these additional days, the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife has added a third period for dove hunting, in December and January. Additionally, the DNR extended the first period, and modified the second period to avoid the firearms but will concentrate in areas associated with deer season.

The 2014-15 mourning dove hunting season is:

- Sep. 1 Oct. 19
- Nov. 1 Nov. 9
- Dec. 13 Jan. 11

Hunting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. The daily bag limit is 15 with a possession limit of 45.

"Most mourning doves are harvested in September, but great dove hunting can be found later in the season with a little scouting," said Budd Veverka, DNR farmland game research biologist. "Looking at data from the past five years, I would expect to see approximately 11,000 dove hunters harvest nearly 214,000 mourning doves in 2014. With the extended season, the harvest could be even higher."

The expansion is based on research by the Indiana DNR and U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service

Since 2003, Indiana has partnered with the USFWS to place leg bands on more than 1,000 mourning doves each summer in Indiana. The banded birds help biologists determine hunting harvest rates, estimate annual survival, and provide information on the geographical distribution of the harvest. From these efforts, The National Mourning Dove Strategic Harvest Management Plan and the National Mourning Dove Banding Program were developed.

The Eastern Management Unit Technical Committee, of which Indiana is a part, implemented the Mourning Dove Harvest Strategy in 2014. The strategy sets standard regulations at a maximum 90-day season with a 15-bird bag limit, rather than the past 70-day season.

"Doves are found throughout the state, farming," Veverka said. "Recently harvested grain fields with water nearby are typically hotspots for dove hunting."

To hunt mourning doves, Indiana residents must purchase the annual hunting license for \$17 (\$7 youth consolidated license) and the game bird habitat stamp for \$6.75. Nonresidents must also purchase the game bird habitat stamp in addition to the \$80 annual hunting license or the \$31 fiveday hunting license (\$17 annual youth hunting).

Federal regulations require all licensed dove hunters (including lifetime license holders) to register with the Migratory Bird Harvest Information Program (HIP) and carry proof of registration while hunting. HIP registration is free and available at wildlife.IN.gov/3567.htm or by calling 1-866-671-4499.

Hunters using state fish & wildlife areas or state-owned reservoirs are required to use non-toxic shot when hunting mourning doves. Additionally, hunters may not hunt migratory birds with a shotgun capable of holding more than three shells.

If you harvest a banded bird, you can report it at 1-800-327-BAND (2263) or reportband.gov. Hunters may keep any bands they recover.

# Tribe blanks Toledo

Rafael Perez blanked the Toledo Mud Hens (66-68) into the seventh inning and Jose Tabata drove in three to lead the Indianapolis Indians (67-67) to a 5-0 shutout win in front of 15,012 fans on Friday night at Victory Field.

The ballpark's capacity crowd marked the second-largest attendance of the season behind a throng of 15,066 on July 11 vs. Columbus.

Perez began and ended his outing with a strikeout to help pace his seven-whiff performance, the most of the 12-year veteran's career since his personal-best of nine in 2005. The lefty allowed just four hits over his 6 1/3 innings to improve to 3-0 in his last three starts.

The red-hot Jose Tabata plated a pair in the fourth with the first of his two doubles to extend the Tribe's lead to 4-0. Tabata has registered two-hit efforts in five of his last six games and eight of the last 13 since Aug. 4.

Vin Mazzaro tossed 1 2/3 scoreless frames and Josh Kineny fanned two in the ninth to complete the shutout.
