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fallen sin nature which came about through the disobedience of Adam and Eve in Genesis 3. The apostle Paul recognizes this constant struggle in Romans 7:18-24 (NKJV) "For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh) nothing good dwells; for to

will is present with me, but *how* to perform what is good I do not find. For the good that I will to do, I do not do; but the evil I will not to do, that I practice. Now if I do what I will not to do, it is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells in me. I find then a law, that evil is present with me, the one who wills to do good. For I delight in the law of God according to the inward man. But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members. O wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death?" Yet Paul also told us in Romans 6:6-7 (NKJV) "knowing this, that our old man was crucified with Him, that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves of sin. For he who has died has been freed from sin."

At first glance this sounds confusing. I'm saved therefor sin's dominion in me has been abolished but I still practice the evil that I do not want to do! How can this be? The difference lies in being a slave to sin. A deliberate, willing, and dare I say even an participant in sin. eager Versus "hamartano" where we slip, fall short or miss the mark. Please do not mistake the wording to lessen the seriousness of the offense of sin which always carries consequences. But it brings up the aged old debate - If I sin am I still saved?

2 Cor 13:5 (NKJV) Tells us "Examine yourselves as to whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Do you not know yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you?-unless indeed you are disqualified." Ask yourself. Search your heart. Come to a conclusion. If you believe and have faith that Jesus is the virgin born son of God, that He died on the cross as the atonement for your sins, that He rose in body from the grave and now sits at the right hand of God, and you have accepted Him as your Lord and Savior then your salvation is assured. Whether you feel saved or not is not the question. It is by FAITH we are saved. Therein lies the question, are you still saved if you sin? Well let me ask you, have you lost your faith? Have you chosen to disqualify yourself from saving grace and mercy by walking away from your faith? If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us *our* sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar, and His word is not in us." And 1 John 2:1-2 (NKJV) "My little children, these things I write to you, so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous. And He Himself is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the whole world." The truly saved Christian takes no plea- <u>blood of Jesus Christ the result is death.</u> sure in sin. That is due to the new nature bestowed in us at the time of salvation. Now knowing what Christ has suffered for us in order that we may be reconciled to Him, sin brings about a guilt and sorrow that leads us to repentance. Not simply an admission of wrong doing but a rejection of the offense coupled with a turning toward God in obedience to his desires for our new life in Him. This new nature evokes a deep desire to please God. While the sin nature still dwells in us the key is to not let it rule in us. This is what Paul was referring to plays some piano and mandolin.

when he wrote about waging war in our We live in a constant struggle due to our members - the conflict between the intellect, emotions, fleshly desires and the spirit. The victory has been won through the power of the resurrected Christ but there is a daily, hourly, sometimes by the minute, battle that remains in our mind, spirit, and body until the day of our glorification. Living for God takes will power. A type of will power that on our own we do not possess. The good news is that at the very moment Christ is accepted as our personal savior we are indwelled with, and become the sanctuary for, His Holy Spirit. It is the power of the Spirit that gives us the strength and the will to wage the war against the transgressions and temptations that we all struggle with. This Holy Spirit empowered resolve must be deliberately exercised. We must consciously and continuously take control of our thoughts, actions, and reactions. While I do not believe we fall into sin I do believe we can be weak warriors in the spiritual battle we face in opposition to sin. However we are not left alone to fight the battle. 2 Cor 10:4 (NKJV) proclaims "... the weapons of our warfare *are* not carnal but mighty in God for pulling down strongholds". God has given us weapons to use in the battle. These Godly weapons are described in Eph 6:11-18 (NKJV) where we are told to put on the whole armor of God. This armor is not merely a protective defense but likewise should be intentionally used as an offensive weapon to be wielded daily in the battle. We take up the daily assault against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness. Regardless of where we ourselves perceive that the assault is coming from – possibly an attack of weakness, fleshly desires, from within our own vain imaginations or even brought on by the actions of others. In the end (I also add, to begin with and throughout) our battle is against "spiritual hosts of wickedness". So what are the weapons at our disposal? The primary offensive weapon is the Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God and without which no warrior is well armed! In the Word you find Truth, which girds and protects us from deception and without leaves us open on every side. We have <u>Righteousness</u> as a breastplate, which is the justification (just as if I had not done it) obtained in Christ through faith. We stand ready and advance toward obedience out of love with our feet shod with the gospel of peace. We have a shield of faith to fend off attacks of the adversary and a helmet of salvation - which is our hope and promise. We are outfitted to stand our ground. And then stand the ground we have

Senior citizens can take classes free of charge and there will be a program for high school students to take college classes and later, if they so choose, to transfer those credits to other schools. That tuition, too, will be free.

It all begins Monday. Noblesville's east side will become another world. That world will change even more when the Boys & Girls Club moves into old Conner School.

The trespassing problem is growing rapidly in 18-35 year old population throughout Indiana.




