'Lucky' story will be featured on **Channel 20 tonight**

The story of one of Noblesvillle's



famous Lucky Teter, will be featured tonight on WFYI-TV Channel 20. at 9 p.m.

Lucky whose name was Earl M. Teter, was born and raised on a farm near Noblesville

in the early years of the 20th century just as the automobile was catching the imagination of the country.

He made stunt driving a popular spectator sport for millions of autocrazed fans. His career started locally in the 1920s and eventually went national with his Lucky Teter Hell Drivers in the years prior to World War II.

He died during the war on July 5, 1942 at the Indiana State Fairgrounds while doing a stunt called the Rocket Car Leap in which his car was to go 150 feet through the air. It was to be his last performance before joining the U.S. Army

The day's event was billed as an Army Emergency Relief Show.

Teter was survived by his wife, father and sister. The sister, Ruth Teter died in 1969 and left the family's 120acre farm to Noblesville's First United Methodist Church dedicated to the memory of the Teter family.

Today it is the well known Teter Family Retreat used by church groups and others in the community. The parklike grounds are located on the west bank of White River north of Noblesville and include a two-story lodge, cabin and picnic shelter.

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
