are G.E.D. level, 8th grade level of above. They take test in about a two-month period.

Get this. The program made it possible for 32 inmates to receive their G.E.D. last year.

The jail averages housing a little less than 300 inmates a day. These folks need to be fed, daily. The jail's kitchen staff not only prepares food for the inmates in the jail, but also for the Juvenile Services Center and the Hamilton County Community Corrections. Last year the total number of meals served by the kitchen staff was 376,844.

They provide courthouse security. There are 14 full time corrections officers charged with security and safety of the courthouse. better known to us as the Judicial Center. They also provide protection at the historic courthouse, which houses the treasurer's office and auditor's office.

The jail is operated by 51 corrections officers. These include visitation officers,


transportation officers and administrative correction officers.

The Juvenile Services Center is a busy place. In 2013 there were a total of 1,052 juvenile referrals made by law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County. Of those, 278 were detained in secure detention. There were 465 juveniles incarcerated during 2013. This is the highest number in the last three years. The average age was 17and the average length of stay was 19 days with an average daily population of 24.

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There is a danger in doubt

If it is a sin to doubt, all doubt is sin.



I recently had a lively debate concerning this matter and have come to the conclusion that the foregone declaration is not a logical statement. I would first like to preface my argument with a clear definition of how I am differentiating doubt

from disbelief with doubt as to being in a state of seeking, to be undecided or to question. In the language of the New Testament this would be "diakrino" – to separate thoroughly, to judge, distinguish or to decide to make a determination concerning the object of doubt. Versus disbelief defined as being without an absolute trust in the inspired Word of God, to be disobediently unbelieving, or hardening your heart purposefully rejecting faith in Christ. In other words "apistia" which is literally being without faith. And "... without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him." Heb 11:6 (NKJV)

I believe we can look at the preceding definition of doubt and consider this a couple of different ways. We can consider doubt as a pivot of some sort, a question you can rest and turn on. But the problem with this is that we can get stuck oscillating on top of a pivot and when this happens we go nowhere, we get stuck spinning in doubt! Left in this condition we are open to any number of inaccurate commentaries, deceptions and schemes from ill meaning wolves, scoffers and/or uninformed fools thinking themselves to be wise. A better option is we can look at our object of doubt and let doubt be a propeller – an agent that will drive us to seek answers and explanations, something that will push us to look for a deeper meaning in regards to our spiritual understanding. This is what the early believers in Berea did. The apostle Paul was on his second missionary journey with his companion Silas. They had just fled from Thessalonica by night and had gone to Berea where they went into the Jewish synagogues preaching the message of Jesus. The Bereans we are told were "... more fair-minded than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness, and searched the Scriptures daily to find out whether these things were so" Acts 17:10-11 (NKJV). The Bereans were willing to examine what was presented to them in search of the truth and this is what believe every spirit, but test the spirits, whether they are of God; because many false prophets have gone out into the world" 1 John 4:1 (NKJV) and in Prov 14:15 (NKJV) we are told "The simple believes every word, But the prudent considers well his steps."

God is not angered by the questions of a sincere seeker who wants to know the truth. Throughout the bible there are multiple examples of bible greats who had questions and doubts. They sought their answers of the Lord. We read about John the Baptist who was seeking reassurance after being imprisoned by King Herod for calling out the king over his act of adultery with his brother's wife Herodias. Matt 11:2-6 (NKJV) "And when John had heard in prison about the works of Christ, he sent two of his disciples and said to Him, "Are You the Coming One, or do we look for another?" At this point in time John had already baptized Jesus and the bible tells us in John 1:32-34 (NKJV) "John bore witness, say-

en like a dove, and He remained upon Him. more. So you see even in our belief we can I did not know Him, but He who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'Upon whom you see the Spirit descending, and remaining on Him, this is He who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I have seen and testified that this is the Son of God." John had true faith but he also had a moment of doubt. Jesus rather than rebuking John for his uncertainty lovingly sends him an answer in the form of this message carried back to John by John's disciples - "Go and tell John the things which you hear and see: The blind see and the lame walk; the lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear; the dead are raised up and the poor have the gospel preached to them. And blessed is he who is not offended because of Me."

Multiple times Jesus refers to the disciples as being slow to believe or having little

The apostle Peter had his moment of doubt in Matt 14:26-31. Jesus had just reassured the disciples it was indeed He walking on the water toward them and not a ghost when Peter said, "Lord, if it is You, command me to come to You on the water." Jesus replied for Peter to "Come," and Peter walked on the water toward Jesus but, Peter became afraid and started to sink below the water crying out "Lord, save me!" immediately Jesus stretched out His hand and caught him, and said to him, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?"

Luke 24:25 -27 (NKJV) "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Jesus tells Cleopas and an unnamed disciple on the Road to Emmaus just before recounting to them all the Scriptures concerning Himself.

Then Jesus appears to the 11 disciples in Jerusalem were Cleopas and the unnamed disciple had just told of their amazing encounter with Jesus. How Jesus had appeared before them, walked with them, even ate with them but when the disciples saw Jesus they doubted it was really Him standing before them. You would think the disciples above all else would have recognized Jesus. Yet Jesus is not angered, instead He invites them to examine him saying "Why are you troubled? And why do doubts arise in your hearts? Behold My hands and My feet, that it is I Myself. Handle Me and see, for a spirit does not have flesh and bones as you see I have" Luke 24:38-39 (NKJV).

Then Jesus enlightens our beloved Doubting Thomas. After the 11 disciples had told Thomas of their encounter with children of God without fault in the midst Jesus Thomas informs them, "Unless I see of a crooked and perverse generation, in His hands the print of the nails, and put among whom you shine as lights in the to shew thyself approved unto God, a workmy finger into the print of the nails, and put world, holding fast the word of life...." Then eight days later Jesus appears before know the truth we harden our hearts to it (KJV). "Keep yourselves in the love of Thomas and the disciples saving "Peace to you!" then He invites Thomas to "Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into My side. Do not be unbelieving, but believing." And Thomas answered and said to Him, "My Lord and my God!" John 20:24-28 (NKJV). Jesus rather than being angered at Thomas's doubt was pleased to move Thomas from doubt to belief.

And then one of my personal favorites, Mark 9:17-25 (NKJV) tells the story of a father whose son is stricken with an unclean spirit. After the disciples are unable to cast out what is later described as a deaf and dumb spirit the father runs to Jesus crying "if You can do anything, have compassion on us and help us." To which Jesus replies 'If you can believe, all things *are* possible to him who believes." Immediately the father of the child cried out and said with tears, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!" And Jesus commands the unclean spirit to

The bible tells us Eve was beguiled by the serpent – he deceived her by leading her to doubt what God had actually said. Deception and manipulation can be a powerful instigator of doubt. 
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Get healthy before Friday


