Turner investigation will lead to new ethics bill

In the aftermath of an ethics investigation that involved State Rep. Eric Turner (R-Cicero), it looks as if there will be a new ethics bill soon in the statehouse.

Brian Bosma, the Speaker of the House, will put together a bill that he said will discuss "significant gaps" when it comes to any bills that a representative is involved in. This was brought about after Turner lobbied fellow Republicans to kill a bill that would have placed a moratorium on new nursing home construction.

In a statement Friday, Turner said that it has been an "honor to serve as the Speaker Pro Tempore under Speaker Brian Bosma. I have remained committed to serving the Speaker, our Caucus, and the Indiana House with the highest integrity."

Turner went on to say that he respects Bosma's decision, and looks "forward to continuing as a member of the Indiana House of Representatives and serving the citizens of my district."

Turner's son founded Mainstreet Properties, a nursing home company that formed a partnership with an Ohio company in a deal worth over \$2 billion. Eric Turner himself reportedly made over \$1 million in the deal.

A House ethics committee conducted an investigation into Turner, later clearing him. But even with the clearing, House Speaker Brian Bosma still made the decision Friday to remove Turner from his leadership post in the House.





Main Street access opening next week; **Carmel Drive bridge construction begins**

Sept. 9.

One lane of free-flowing eastbound crews continue work on the roundabout interchange. Direct access to and from U.S. 31 via the new Main Street interchange will not be available until the U.S. 31 closure between Old Meridian (just <u>US31HamiltonCounty.in.gov</u> north of 116th Street) and 136th Street ends before Thanksgiving.

Main Street will remain closed east of Pennsylvania Street as the city of Carmel closing next week is expected to soon begin work in this Motorists traveling eastbound across the new Main Street bridge must turn onto Pennsylvania Street.





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Four Ivy Tech campuses receive \$200,000 NASA grant

gions will receive a \$200,000 grant from success coordinators in their region who NASA as part of the Indiana Community College Partnership with Vincennes University and The Indiana Space Grant Consortium (INSGC). The grant is one of 35 awards through the National Space Grant and Fellowship Program, aimed at increasing engagement in STEM-related programs (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) at community colleges and technical schools in the country.

Six Indiana college campuses will participate in the INSGC Community College Partnership, including four Ivy Tech campuses and two Vincennes University campuses. The partnership was created based on gaps identified by the Indiana Commission on Higher Education in Indiana's education programs. 
