Limited interest in this year's elections

For political candidates and their supporters the passing of Labor Day marks the beginning of the campaign season in election years. And, this is an election year albeit a so-called off-year election with even fewer major races than some off -years.

As someone who watches the election process, I detect a very limited interest in the upcoming Nov. 4 voting. Not only are their few major offices at stake, but at the county and township level there are almost no Democrat candidates opposing the Republican ticket.

The election of a U.S. Representative in Congress will headline the voting. Incumbent Rep. Susan Brooks, Fifth



District Republican, is challenged by Shawn Denney, the Democrat, and John Krom, a Libertarian. Brooks is a Hamilton County resident.

There are three statewide offices up this year: Secretary of State where incumbent Connie Lawson is opposed by Beth White, the Democrat; State Auditor featuring Republican Suzanne Crouch and Democrat Michael Claytor; and State Treasurer with Kelly Mitchell, Republican, opposed by Mike Boland, the Democrat.

In county government voters will elect or re-elect 15 public officials. In only one race, for County Council, Dist. 1, is there a Democrat running.

Returning to office unopposed are Circuit Judge Paul Felix, Superior Court judges William Hughes, Richard Campbell and Wayne Sturtevant; Sheriff Mark Bowen, Prosecutor Lee Buckingham, County Clerk Tammy Baitz, County Commissioner Christine Altman, Assessor Robin

Ward, Recorder Jennifer Hayden and Coroner John Chalfin.

Also winning unopposed are GOP County Council members Paul Ayers, Steve Schwartz and Amy Massilamany. Only in Dist. 1 is there a contest. Fred Glynn, Republican, is opposed by Rosemary Dunkle, Democrat, in parts of Clay and Delaware township which are overwhelmingly Republican.

At the township level, only one of the nine Republican trustee candidates is opposed. In Noblesville, Tom Kenley is opposed by Democrat Mike Davis. And of the 27 township board seats at stake (three in each township) GOP candidates will win 25 without opposition.

Fishers voters will elect their first city officials this year, and school board members in all six county districts will be voted upon in non-partisan balloting. Information on these races will appear later in the campaign.

Commissioners are busy

Hamilton County Commissioners Christine Altman, Mark Heirbrandt and Steve Dillinger as of late are, shall we say, earning their pay checks. Not that they don't always do that.

Recently, the Commissioners have been working overtime.

Speaking to the groups on the 37 Corridor Project, the Commissioner have held "town hall type" sessions with the Fishers City Council, the Noblesville Common Council and the Hamilton County Council

Great sessions. All were opened to the public. If you live in the Fishers and or Noblesville area and didn't attend you missed a great opportunity to learn what's happening in that six-miles-of-hell section of State Road 37 between Noblesville and Fishers.

The Commissioners want to turn 37 into kind of parkway, kind of like the Keystone Parkway Carmel recently completed.

If that doesn't happen, the Commissioners have warned that the State (INDOT) will some day come through the turn State Road 37 into what we have seen State Road 31 become.

The big concern Noblesville had expressed about a parkway was cutting the city apart on the east side. Businesses on both sides of the highway. That has happened with Westfield and 31. It's not what the Commissioners have planned for Noblesville. In fact, the parkway with its overpasses and roundabouts will actually bring together the west side of 37 and the east side of 37 much more than what is there today. Have you ever tried crossing 37 on the east side of Noblesville, crossing from one shopping center to another?

We're getting closer to having a parkway. Noblesville City appears to be on board. Fishers City appears to be on board. The Hamilton County Council appears to be on board.

Next step the Commissioners are planning is an open door meeting with businesses along the 37 Corridor. A couple showed up recently at the session the Commissioners had with the Noblesville Common Council. You've got to wonder why more businesses, many more businesses, weren't at that meeting.

Whatever, we're getting closer. How close? Six years is the projected time to complete the project...three years of planning, etc. and then three years of construction.

Heck, after waiting 30, 40 years, a six-year wait isn't all that bad.

The Commissioners also will meet with the Hamilton County Council this Friday, Sept. 5. Interesting agenda. If you're an early riser with no place to be, you might want to attend. The meeting will be held at the Hamilton County Government & Judicial Center starting at 8:15 a.m.

On the agenda is a discussion of capital spending priorities/requests. That, too.

She lived her childhood in Virginia but after graduating from Gary High School, VA, she came to Indiana to live with her aunt and uncle. It was then, she met Harry Horn, whom she married August 30, 1942. Living in Noblesville, they had five children, Harriet (Barry) Green, Rev. Larry (Martha) Horn, Peggy (Tim) Haskett, Jerry (Barbara) Horn, all of Noblesville, and Rev. Terry (Cynthia) Horn, of Jacksonville, FL. She and Harry welcomed Sylvia (Tom) Weaver, of Noblesville, and Mike Jackson, of Fortville, into their home as their own after Irene's sister and her husband passed away in 1957. After Harry

passed away in 1984, she met and married James C. Smith, of Beech Grove, in 1988.

Besides being a homemaker, Irene worked for Standard Grocery Co., the Veterans Administration, and after 20 years, she retired from the accounting department at Best Lock Corp. Randall Drive closes today at 96th Street

Randall Drive will be closed at 96th Street starting at about 9 a.m. this morning, after the heaviest part of the morning rush hour has passed.

This is the final phase of this work to complete the realignment of the existing Randall Drive with the traffic signal at the HH Gregg store entrance.

This will help traffic in the area as this new alignment for Randall Drive will allow southbound traffic approaching 96th Street to turn on to 96th Street with the aid of the traffic signal. In addition to the realignment, the new section of road will include curbs and sidewalks and connect to an asphalt pedestrian/biking path along the north side of 96th Street.

Construction is anticipated to be completed in four weeks weather dependent.

The most rewarding marketing mistake I ever made

Recently, a colleague asked me, “What was the most rewarding mistake you ever made in business?”

It’s a great question, and I quickly had an answer for him because it was an incredibly painful mistake. However, it proved to be an invaluable lesson that has served me well in the years since. I’m sharing so perhaps you can learn it the easy way.

The lesson: Don’t ever stop marketing because you think you’ve reached the point where you don’t need to. And, secondarily, believe the old adage that warns, “Don’t put all your eggs into one basket.”

There’s a story, of course!

Years ago, my public relations company connected with a large publishing house that served many prestigious authors. The first few of its authors we accepted as clients had such successful campaigns, we quickly became the publicity firm of record for this publisher. I thought we’d tapped the mother load! The publisher kept a steady stream of clients flowing to us, and eventually, they became about 80 percent of our business.

We were so focused on delivering for these authors that we became much less focused on getting our company name out to prospective new clients. We slowly stopped marketing. Our newsletters ground to a halt. We didn’t waste time networking. We quit our efforts to get the same publicity for our company that we get for clients. Why bother? We didn’t need new clients!

We had a whole basket full of beautiful perfect eggs and we were happily skipping along with it.

And then ... it broke.

The publisher ran into some serious problems with its investors and the business came crashing down. And guess who almost went with it?

Our eggs were cooked.

Faced with only a few clients and no prospects, we got busy fast and cranked up the marketing department (me!) again. It took awhile to regain the momentum we’d lost but, thankfully, we had a side business that could help pay the bills in the interim. Slowly but surely (this was before the age of social media, which really speeds things up), we built up a new list of prospects and clients – only this time from a diverse array of sources.

It was a terrible but powerful experience that demonstrated very clearly: No matter

how great things seem to be going, you never stop marketing. It needs to be a constant hum because if that hum stops, you know there will be a big problem ahead.

I stopped marketing because I thought I had all the clients I needed. Over the years I’ve seen others make the same mistake but for different reasons. Here are a few:

One great publicity hit is a really bad reason to stop marketing. I’ve talked to people who believed if we could just get them on “The Oprah Winfrey Show” (before 2011) or “The Ellen DeGeneres Show,” that was all they’d need. They’d be done. Yes, a big national show can give you a tremendous launch, but you won’t keep soaring unless you do something to stay in the public eye. I guarantee you, there are plenty of people you never heard of who got their “big break” and then disappeared because they stopped marketing.

Most of us won’t get those huge hits – and that’s not a reason to stop, either. I haven’t been on “Oprah” but I often hear from prospective clients that I or my business was recommended to them by someone I’ve never met and don’t know. That’s what good, sustained marketing does. It may not always create fireworks, but that doesn’t mean it’s not working for you.

Yesterday’s story is old news. Look for fresh new ways to stay in the public eye. The publicity you get today can continue to work for you online, but eventually, it’s going to be old news. We encourage our clients to post links to their publicity on their websites; it shows visitors that they have credibility with the media. But if those visitors see only publicity and testimonials that are five or 10 years old, they’re going to wonder why no one’s been interested in you more recently.

Just as I put all my eggs in one basket by relying on one source for clients, it’s also a mistake to rely on just one marketing tool. Maximize the reach of the publicity you get in traditional media by sharing it on social media. Put a blog, or other content you can renew and refresh, on your website. Write a book. Do speaking engagements (for free, if necessary). Your audience is likely not all huddled together in one corner of the world. To reach them, use a variety of marketing tools.

Whatever it is you’re promoting – your business, your product, your book, yourself – keep the momentum going. If you want people to know you’re out there, you have to stay out there.

Funny thing usually occurs...when Governments increase any staff for any position including clerical I've never seen a reduction and now we have come to recognize with most towns and counties the respective governments are the largest employers...if efficiency in government is the key----How does this continue to grow and exist ?
I think it's been proven as a result of many many studies that the mere presence of police may not be a complete remedy for any crime issue or reduction in crime statistics.

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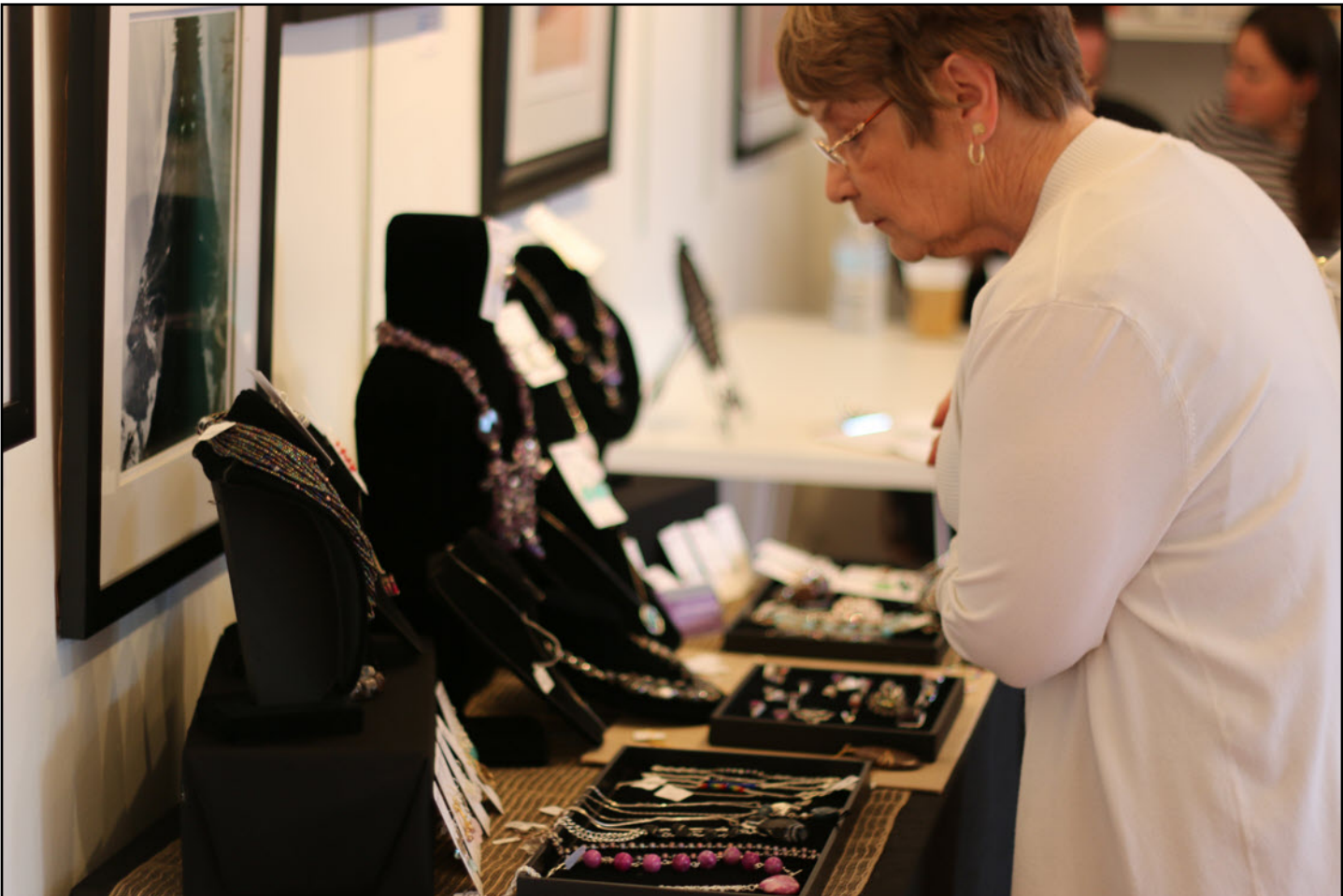

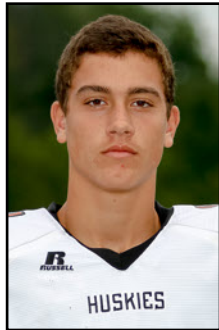

Last season Westfield ended a five-year losing string to Zionsville by edging the Eagles in a 10-7 thriller. Coach Jake Gilbert would like to see his Shamrocks start a win string of their own by beating Zionsville a second consecutive time when Westfield hosts the Eagles in a Hoosier Crossroad Conference opener for both teams Friday at The Rock.

“Zionsville looks a lot different than in the past,” Gilbert looked at his opponent. “They still have some good players and this will be a great challenge for us.

“I’m glad we are at home. I’m anxious to see how we respond to our first loss of the season,” Gilbert said.

Westfield is coming off a 37-26 loss to a strong Class 6A Southport team. A week earlier, the Shamrocks opened their season with a 35-14 victory over Harrison.

Zionsville will bring a 1-1 record to Westfield. The Eagles lost their season opener to McCutcheon 21-13 and last week defeated Boone County rival Lebanon 18-3.

That may be the situation Friday when Sheridan hosts Clinton Prairie in a Hoosier Heartland Conference contest.

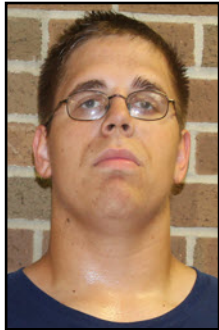
