COMPLAINT

Comes now the Plaintiff herein, David McCollough, by counsel, and for his Complaint against Defendants Noblesville Schools and Jeff Bryant shows as follows:

- Coach David McCollough loyally served as basketball coach at Noblesville High School for twenty (20) years. During that twenty (20) years he never received a negative evaluation.
- In January 2014, a small group of disgruntled players went to Defendant Jeff Bryant, Noblesville High School Principal, and falsely alleged that Coach McCollough threw a basketball in the manner of a baseball pass at a player in anger and intentionally struck the player in the head with the ball.
- Principal Bryant and Noblesville Schools vowed to conduct a "thorough investigation" of the incident. In doing so, Defendants Jeff Bryant and Noblesville Schools assumed a duty to exercise reasonable care and skill in conducting the announced investigation. This would include substantive and procedural due process.
- The investigation was performed negligently, without regard to the basic rights of Coach McCollough and the commitment made by Principal Bryant.
- Many witnesses to the event, including adults, were not interviewed. Only disgruntled students were interviewed, and then not individually. Some of the team leaders were not asked about it.
- Coach McCollough was suspended for a few days and asked by Jeff Bryant to make a voluntary statement to the press, allegedly to put the matter behind him and Noblesville Schools. Coach McCollough cooperated with the public relations officer for Noblesville Schools, Sharon Trisler, in drafting a statement. However, after the statement was completed, and without Coach McCollough's knowledge or consent, at the direction of Defendant Jeff Bryant Noblesville Schools changed Coach McCollough's statement to include an admission by Coach McCollough that he threw a ball and struck a player, something he did not in fact admit and something that was not true. The statement was then sent to the media over Coach McCollough's name and was transmitted around the world, making it to publications in Iowa and even to Forbes. Noblesville Schools personnel also made oral statements consistent with the false written statement.
- After successfully completing the season as a model coach, Coach McCollough was relieved of his duties as Head Basketball Coach at Noblesville High School on April 16, 2014.
- Noblesville Schools did not follow their own policies and procedures set forth for athletic coaches. Immediately prior to his removal Coach McCollough had not received an evaluation for any of the five (5) years prior. Coach McCollough was not allowed to see player and parent evaluations and/or discuss them with the Athletic Director or the Principal. Defendant Jeff Bryant specifically ordered that Coach McCollough not be allowed to see the player/parent evaluations, not even for purposes of responding to any false assertions. He was also not allowed to appeal his suspension at a hearing before the School Board. His request for a hearing was ignored.
- After a past course of conduct of automatic one (1) year contract renewals, Coach McCollough automatically received a contract extension through spring of 2015. By working as the Head Basketball Coach at Noblesville High School without a new written contract after March 24, 2014, Coach McCollough's employment was year to year, requiring a one (1) year notice prior to termination as a matter of law.

- The above actions by Noblesville Schools and Jeff Bryant constitute a violation of Indiana law, including but not limited to negligent breach of duty, breach of an assumed duty, intentional infliction of emotional distress, libel, slander, etc. Coach McCollough suffered damages and damages per se.
- Noblesville Schools breached its contract with Coach McCollough, who should now be reinstated.
- Defendant Jeff Bryant, individually, intentionally violated Coach McCollough's constitutional rights and committed intentional infliction of emotional distress, tortious interference with contract, tortious interference with a business relationship, libel, slander, and other torts.
- Coach McCollough should be reinstated and awarded damages in a substantial amount to compensate him.
- Prior to filing this Complaint Coach McCollough timely served a Tort Claim Notice upon the Defendants, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by specific reference.

WHEREFORE, the Plaintiff herein, David McCollough, requests reinstatement and the entry of a judgment against the Defendants in a just and proper amount, including for his Court Costs and attorney fees, and requests all other relief just and proper in the premises

REQUEST FOR TRIAL BY JURY

Comes now the Plaintiff herein, David McCollough, by counsel, and respectfully requests that any and all issues in this cause be tried by jury.


Shamrock Boulevard closed at SR 32






