Little change likely on local school boards

Little change is likely on the Noblesnon-partisan school ville board. Only two of the five seats are up for election this year. There is a contest because three candidates are running for the lic's satisfaction with two seats. Incumbent Julia Church Kozicki is running along with newcomers Kevin Kalstad and Karl Johnson. Patrick Berghoff who was elected four years ago did not run for re-election.

Sunday Special: A meeting of minds...

City Hall & the School Board

It's nothing like the Hatfields and the McCoys, but seldom do school boards and city governments sit down for tea. While pledging to understand and support the other guy, school boards and city government often shall we say, have different agendas.

It has been that way in recent years in Noblesville.

"This is my fourth year on the Council and only the second time remembering meeting formally with the schools," one Noblesville Common Council member told The Reporter at a Council/School Board join session earlier this week.

There were the normal politically correct statements

'We understand you want Noblesville to grow, but...." was what we heard from the School Board.

"We understand your concerns over growing enrollment, but..."was what we heard from the Council.

It probably happens that way in most cities, like Noblesville, which want to keep growing and most school boards, like the Noblesville School Board, which are concerned with where to put all the new kids.

"I think we are doing a good job of managing the growth," said Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear, who once served on the local school board.

"A city which does not grow, dies," said Noblesville Councilman Rick Taylor.

"We're running out of space," said Jane Barr, Noblesville School Board Secretary. "We'll have to begin using portable classrooms, and today they are not safe for the children."

"What is the answer?," School Board President Patrick Berghoff was asked.

Can you spell referendum?

The School Board pulled no punches when stating that, yes, a referendum likely will be on the 2016 ballot.

Passing referendums isn't an easy process, for any school system and any election year. The one Noblesville most likely will propose in two years will be extremely difficult to pass.

But, arguably, a referendum which will be very much needed if the Community of Noblesville wishes to maintain, or better, its educational system.

At the meeting, the School Board presented some scary facts: growth vs. the schools' ability to have classroom space for that growth.

Paul prayed three times for what he referred to as a thorn in his side to be removed. What this thorn was we are never actually told. I myself think this was a physical affliction. Other theories include that the thorn was an emotional issue such as anger control or possibly a spiritual battle or temptation. Some Bible experts even theorize that for all their grumblings the thorn may actually have been the Corinthian Church itself.

Whatever this thorn actually was is not really of consequence. What mattered is that God used the thorn to keep Paul humble. Paul had been given such great revelation from God that Paul could not even recount his story of being caught up to Paradise in the first person for fear of becoming or fear of being perceived as boastful. Of course there was also a "lawful" prohibition on Paul's revealing of the glories he saw while in heaven but the actual telling of the event was told in the third person. Self-pride is a trait that God finds detestable hence the thorn in Paul's side. In 2 Cor 12:7-10 (NKJV) Paul tells us "... lest I should be exalted above measure by the abundance of the revelations, a thorn in the flesh was given to me, a messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I be exalted above measure. Concerning this thing I pleaded with the Lord three times that it might depart from me. And He said to me, 'My admission of our frailties? Ah, but more grace is sufficient for you, for My strength are nothing but dependent solely on Him mities, that the power of Christ may rest In Jesus's own words - "







It probably doesn't happen as much as you'd like, but from



months' worth of living expenses — should you pay off debts, or fund your IRA or another investment account?

There's no one "correct" answer and the priority of these options may change, depending on your financial goals. However, your first step may be to consider what type of debt you're thinking of paying down with your extra money. For example, if you have a consumer loan that charges a high rate of interest and you can't deduct the interest payments from your taxes — you might conclude that it's a good idea to get rid of this loan as quickly as possible.

Still, if the loan is relatively small, and the payments aren't really impinging on your monthly cash flow that much, you might want to consider putting any extra money you have into an investment that has the potential to offer longer-term benefits. For instance, you might decide to fully fund your IRA for the year before tackling minor debts. (In 2014, you can contribute up to \$5,500 to a traditional or

mortgage interest is typically tax deduct- carefully.

ible, which makes your loan less "expensive." Even beyond the issue of deductibility, you may instinctively feel that it's best to whittle away your mortgage and build as much equity as possible in your home. But is that always a smart move?


Increasing your home equity is a goal of many homeowners — after all, the more equity you have in your home, the more cash you'll get when you sell it. Yet, if your home's value rises — which, admittedly, doesn't always happen you will still, in effect, be building equity without having to divert funds that could be placed elsewhere, such as in an investment. In this situation, it's important to weigh your options. Do you want to lower your mortgage debts and possibly save on cumulative interest expenses? Or would you be better served to invest that money for potential growth or interest payments?

If you were to fall ill or lose your job, could you get money out of your home if your emergency savings fund fell short? Possibly, in the form of a home equity line of credit or a second mortgage, but if you were not bringing in any income, a bank might not even approve such a loan — no matter how much equity you have in your house. You may more easily be able to sell stocks, bonds or other investment vehicles to gain access to needed cash.

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
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Football Extra Paschall shows all-state style

The 235-pound tailback carried the ball 28 times and gained 110 yards. He also scored all three of Carmel's touchdowns.



winning points in the last minute. Last week,








