Noblesville wants a change

Steve Dillinger labels the presentation made by Noblesville City Plan Director Christy Langley as a "suggested proposal."

Nothing official, at this time. Nothing to vote on, at this

Langley made an appearance at the Hamilton County Commissioners meeting to talk about the future of zoning in Wayne Township. Currently, the County owns some zoning rights in that area. Noblesville's suggestion is for the County to relinquish some of the territory to the City. Or, at this time, at least talk about it.

"Absolutely, completely 100 percent fodder for "It wasn't even a formal proposal. We just knew that in order to move forward the Commissioners had to at least be open to the idea."

So, Commissioners Dillinger, Christine Altman and Mark Heirbrandt went away from the meeting each with four maps, to study the plan Langley presented. The Reporter has obtained, from the City, copies of those maps. They are printed elsewhere in today's newspaper.

Basically, what the City wants to do is to have zoning right for areas they would like to develop, so that back-toback territories would not be faced with an issue of County zoning rules and City zoning rules, which might be different.

"I understand that," Dillinger told the Reporter. "But discussion," Langley told the Hamilton County Reporter. my biggest issue is some of the pockets Noblesville doesn't want. It might be difficult, for example, for our people (snow plow drivers; the sheriff, and others) to know what zoning area they are in. We have a situation like that in at Home Place in Carmel where there is a pocket of County land surrounded by Carmel zoning."

Langley said she doesn't believe that will be a problem. "Snow removal, police protection, etc. are city limit issues, not planning jurisdiction," Langley said. "Planning jurisdiction boundaries only extend regulations as they

U.S. 31 updates: 196th Street closed this week

Crews have closed 196th Street west of US 31 through Friday for paving operations.

Upon the completion of construction in fall 2015, access to/from US 31 via 196th Street will be permanently removed. Once complete, 196th Street will become a cul-de-sac, and the nearest access point to/from US 31 will be available via 191st Street.

Reminder: 131st/Main Street bridge opens and 126th Street/Carmel Drive crossing closes Sept. 11

After the evening rush hour on Thursday, Sept. 11, crews plan to open the new 131st/Main Street bridge over US 31. One lane of free-flowing traffic will be open eastbound and westbound as crews continue work on the roundabout interchange. Direct access to/from US 31 via the new 131st/Main Street interchange will not be available until the US 31 closure ends later this fall (expected before Thanksgiving).

Motorists should note 131st/Main Street will be closed east of Pennsylvania Street, as the City of Carmel is expected to soon begin work in this area. Therefore, motorists traveling eastbound across the new 131st/Main Street bridge must turn onto Pennsylvania Street.

Also beginning Thursday, Sept. 11 after the Main Street bridge is open expect to close 126th

Traffic shift on US 31 near 136th Street on or after Sept. 10

After the evening rush hour this evening (Wednesday, Sept. 10), crews plan to shift traffic on US 31 to the east side of the roadway near 136th Street (weather permitting) to begin construction on the western half of US 31. One lane of northbound and southbound traffic will be maintained between 136th Street and the Monon Trail crossing just south

Traffic on southbound US 31 will exit into the 136th Street/Eglin Drive/Rohrer Road roundabout. Motorists wishing to access northbound US 31 from 136th Street must enter via the new ramp east of US 31. One lane of eastbound and westbound traffic will be maintained on 136th Street underneath the new US 31 bridge. 



With the Main Street Bridge over U.S. 31 (pictured here) set to open on Thursday, the City of Carmel will soon begin its own street improvement project. Main Street will be reconstructed and expanded, and there will be installation of new curbs, sidewalks and other necessary maintenance items.

Carmel's Main Street improvements to begin

The City of Carmel will begin a major street improve- incorporate roundabouts into its U.S. 31 interchanges, work on the portion of Main Street that extends over U.S. ment project working on portions of Main Street near the new state highway interchange on U.S. 31. The \$4.4 million city project, set to get underway this fall and funded mostly by state transportation funds, has been awarded to entry point for motorists from across the state to access E&B Paving

The project calls for reconstruction and expansion of the roadway, installation of new utility lines, curbs, gutters, storm sewers and sidewalks. The roundabouts at Illinois and Old Meridian along Main Street will also be expanded to accommodate two lanes of traffic. The work is being done in order to meet the traffic demand anticipated as a result of the new interchange currently under construction. to keep Main Street closed east of U.S. 31 to Old Meridian The Main Street project will extend from the Illinois Street roundabout west of the highway, to the Old Meridian Street roundabout east of the highway.

"This is an exciting project for Main Street, and its improved connectivity east and west across Carmel," said Mayor Jim Brainard. "We are pleased to see the state the west and east of U.S. 31. The state is responsible for Facebook and on Twitter.

which along with our Main Street project upgrades will make travel more safe and efficient.'

The Main Street interchange will also be the primary Carmel's popular Arts & Design District, located a mile east of the interchange.

"This is a rapidly changing area and this project is designed to improve the infrastructure needed to handle what we predict will be a much higher volume of traffic," said Jeremy Kashman, city engineer.

Preliminary work will begin this week as the city plans Street. INDOT plans to open the Main Street bridge over the highway this week. Traffic will be directed south on Pennsylvania Street toward the business district at Carmel Drive, where they can continue eastbound on Carmel Drive.

The Main Street improvements will be concentrated to


31, including the bridge and ramps.

The city of Carmel project is being funded primarily by \$4.2 million in state funds made available by INDOT as part of a new program that allows the state to swap \$1 in federal funds with 75 cents in state funds. Under this method, local governments bid approved projects and costs will be reimbursed by INDOT. It is anticipated that the city's portion of the project cost will be roughly \$1 million, funded through a combination of existing Engineering Department funds, Utilities and a portion from a previously issued road bond.

Preliminary work will include a weekend closure of the Illinois Street roundabout at Main Street. Details on that temporary closure will be announced soon.

Agricultural Outlook 2015 webinar on Friday

The program, free to the public, will be presented by Purdue University professors of agricultural economics James Mintert and Corinne Alexander. Mintert also is director of the Center for Commercial Agriculture.

"Yield prospects for the state are among the best in the country, and this means the grain handling and processing of the most important issues for next year industries will be at full capacity," Mintert and Alexander wrote in a preview of the provide insight into whether higher yields outlook. "Prospects for record total Indiana production of corn and record high soybean yields are good, although lateseason rainfall and early frost still present threats to yields."

Grain and soybean prices in 2014-2015 will be much lower than in recent years, creating a challenging environment for Midwest crop farmers, the economists said. As part of the webinar, Mintert and Alexander will discuss strategies for marketing this year's corn and soybean crops.

As farmers and agribusiness managers are starting to think about what to plant in

Purdue's preliminary estimates of costs for 2015 crops along with expected net returns for each crop.

The webinar also will provide an updated economic outlook for livestock pro-

"Livestock producers' income proslivestock prices and lower feed costs," Mintert and Alexander noted. The livestock sector is entering an era of recovery following several difficult years. How rapidly livestock producers respond to this recovery by expanding their herds and how quickly that affects prices will be addressed during the webinar.

The economists also will explore one - land values and cash rents. They will this fall will offset lower prices and provide more farm income, or less.

"The level of income this year can influence land values and cash rents for 2015, but expected returns for 2015 crop production and interest rates are expected to be more important," they said. "Results from this year's Purdue Land Values Survey suggest that Indiana land values have topped out, and it looks like some adjustment in land values and cash rents will get underway in the year ahead."




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Noblesville, Westfield junior varsity football get victories
