## Will there be interest in Fishers' first city election?

Some more observations on the upcoming election:



Fishers will elect its first city officials in the November 4 election, but is anyone looking? Given the fact that only one in ten registered voters participated in a very competitive May primary, one can hardly expect much interest in the fall election where there is much less competition.

Republican Scott Fadness, currently town manager, will be elected unopposed as the new city's first mayor. Likewise unopposed is Jennifer Kehl, Republican for city clerk. Democrats were unable to come up with candidates for the two highest offices.

There will be contests for only four of the nine city council seats at stake. Unopposed Republican candidates

are Eric Moeller in the North Central councilmanic district, and Stuart Easley in the Northeast District. Two of the three GOP candidates for council-at-large are sure to win. Rich Block, Cecila Coble and Todd Zimmerman are opposed by lone Democrat Maryellen Bein, thus two of the three Republicans are certain to win.

There will be one-on-one races in three districts. In the Northwest, Kent Nelson, Democrat, will run against Selina Stoller, Republican. In the South Central District, John Weingardt will compete with Democrat Greg Purvis, and in the Southwest David George, Republican is running against Justin Kilgore, Democrat.

Easley, George and Weingardt are incumbent town council members.

Switching gears to the countywide election, officials may have blown a chance to generate a big voter turnout this year. Under state legislation the county has an oppor-

tunity to hold a referendum on a new mass transportation tax.

The proposed tax would increase the local option income tax by 25 percent to finance public transportation between Hamilton County and downtown Indianapolis.

Regardless of how one feels about the tax, there's nothing like a controversial referendum question to bring folks out to vote. And, increasing taxes can be controversial. But, county officials decided against placing the question on the ballot this year.

From a statewide political perspective, a big vote in this county would be helpful to Republicans running for state office. The Democrats, however, would be better off without a big vote locally because the GOP usually runs up a huge plurality in Hamilton County.

A missed opportunity for one party is perhaps a big break for the other if statewide races are close.

**Preparations  
already starting  
for 2016 BMW  
Championship**

When the BMW Championships came to Carmel's Crooked Stick Golf Club in 2012, two things happened: Rory McIlroy was the dominant winner, and the tournament was a huge success.

History could repeat itself on both fronts in 2016. Crooked Stick voted unanimously to host the BMW again that year, marking yet another big tournament for a club that has hosted many of them over the past 30 years.

"We are excited about bringing the 70 best players in the world to central Indiana again in a few years," said Tony Pancake, the director of golf and club operations at Crooked Stick.

In addition to welcoming such golf legends as Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson, the 2012 BMW was another jewel in the crown of McIlroy. The championship was his third tournament win in five weeks, and cemented him as the No. 1-ranked golfer in the world. After a slump in 2013, McIlroy won two major titles and again ascended to the top of the world rankings.

On a local level, the BMW Championship's proceeds benefits the Evans Scholars Foundation, which gives out full college scholarships to caddies. The 2012 BMW raised \$3 million for the foundation.

Preparations are already underway for the 2016 BMW Championship. Pancake said Crooked Stick expects to have the tournament staff on its ground by Oct. 1.

"We have already started developing the corporate hospitality packages and will be contacting our 2012 hospitality clients in the next few weeks," said Pancake.

The golf course itself will be getting some a little bit of work, with some of it being done by Pete Dye, who designed the course.

"Additionally we are beginning some work on the golf course by enlarging our putting green, replacing the sand in the bunkers and Mr. Dye will be adding a lake to the 17<sup>th</sup> hole," said Pancake.

This is the sixth location the Noblesville Masonic Lodge has occupied since its inception in Noblesville.

**Building No. 1**


The first lodge or hall of what would eventually be known as Noblesville Lodge No. 57 of F&AM was the upper story of Jesse Lutz' dwelling house, which was on a lot immediately east and across the street

Also, Pancake said that Crooked Stick members Kent Frandsen and John Crisp will be the General Co-Chairmen of the event.

"They have started the process of assigning committee responsibilities in terms of planning and operating the Championship," said Pancake.

In addition to the BMW Championship, Crooked Stick announced that another major event will be coming to the club.

The Western Amateur Championship, which Pancake said "is one of the top amateur events in the country," will be hosted by Crooked Stick in 2020. It's historically appropriate that the club membership approved that at the same time as the BMW Championship - the pro event was originally called the Western Open. Both events date back to 1899.

from what was the Methodist Episcopal Church, located on 10<sup>th</sup> & Clinton Street. It was on lot 5, block 5 of the original town of Noblesville.

The lumber to fit up the room for a Lodge room was sawed at the Walter Saw Mill in Cicero, then run and operated by Judge William Neal and Ellis Evans. Neal hauled the lumber from Cicero and delivered it to Jesse Lutz and the work fixing up the upper story for a large room was done by Joseph Lutz, Jesse’s brother.

The exact date of the construction is unknown, but was assumed to be sometime in 1845 or 1846 by Jesse Lutz and others. On May 28, 1847 Hamilton Lodge No. 57 was granted a charter.

One might believe that the upper level of such a primitive structure was merely the most convenient place to meet but this was not the case. The structure was so built with

the idea in mind that the second story was in fact designed to be a Masonic Lodge.

**Building No. 2**

The second Lodge building was located in what is now known as the Sowerwine Building, located on the northwest corner of the intersection of 9<sup>th</sup> and Logan. The building was purchased on March 24, 1848 and the deed is found in Record Deed L page 559 in the Recorder’s Office and conveyed to the Lodge Lot 3 in Block 8 in the original plat of the town of Noblesville. The purchase of the building also included the two rooms immediately west of that building. The Lodge occupied the second floor.

In 1853, W.M. James E. Springer along with John T.Cox and David Moss conveyed a portion of this lot to Thomas T. Lindsey. The disposition of the remainder of the lot is unknown. The original building purchased

\*It wasn’t long ago that the City of Noblesville held a community style session in the Firestone area to discuss upcoming changes of street signs. Stop signs; 4-way stop signs, etc. Not a lot of people attended, but the City was there to share.

\*The City also has shared its plans, hopes and dreams for the proposed Federal Hill Park on the west side of White River.

Of course, most school board and government meetings are open to the public. Most, although not all. Those that aren’t are labeled “executive session” and by law are legal..

Same thing was true about a pair of meetings held today and tonight in Noblesville.

New Noblesville Schools Superintendent Beth Niedermeyer today is holding a “table talk” session from 4 to 5 p.m. at Noble Coffee in downtown Noblesville.

Niedermeyer has said she will listen to what the community likes and, by golly, what the community doesn’t like.

Tell me when was the last time that type of session was held in Noblesville;

Then tonight at 6 p.m. at the Gathering, located at 675 S. 8<sup>th</sup> Street in Noblesville, City Hall is holding a public neighborhood meeting for residents of the area bordered by Maple Ave., S. 8<sup>th</sup> Street, Christian Avenue and the White River (Southwest Quadrant). It is a meeting, the City has said, will develop a neighborhood plan.

This will be the first of three meetings to gather residents’ ideas as well as review data and revitalization best practices.

“The outcome will be a revitalization plan that neighborhood leaders can use to strengthen this historic and vibrant area of Noblesville,” the press release said.

Don’t you love that? Let’s hope the City continues that practice in other areas.

The other two meeting dates will be Oct. 9 and Nov. 13, both at 6 p.m. at the Gathering.

**Building No. 5**

On June 4, 1884, the Lodge purchased the old City Hall, located on the southeast corner of the intersection of 9<sup>th</sup> and Logan and is now known as the Masonic Hall. The current address of this is location is 89-98 North 9<sup>th</sup> Street. Built in 1870, this building at one time housed a City Theater on the third floor and the local newspaper on the second floor. The stepped gable along the square and compass symbol on the front of the building was an addition by the Lodge. Occupied by the Lodge until 1915, this building is still standing.

**Building No. 6**

Our current location is at 295 S. 9<sup>th</sup> Street. Construction started on Sept. 24, 1914 with the dedication on May 31, 1915.

by the Lodge is long gone. A new building was built on this lot in 1867 and another in 1887.

**Building No. 3**

On Aug. 12. 1852 the Lodge purchased what has become known as the Corner Drug Store building, which is located on the southwest corner of the intersection of 9<sup>th</sup> Street and Conner Street. The building was purchased from Brother G.M. Shaw. Built in 1850, until it was razed in 1914, the Lodge occupied the third story until Feb. 8, 1881.

**Building No. 4**

From Feb. 8, 1881 to June 4, 1884, the Lodge was temporarily located in the International Order of the Odd Fellows Hall, located on the south side of the square. The current address of this location is 835-839 Conner Street. The Lodge met on the third floor. Built in 1866, this building still stands.

# State Fairgrounds' new Pedestrian Plaza

Work has begun on a new capital improvement project at the Indiana State Fairgrounds that will create a new gateway for visitors walking into the recently renovated Fairgrounds Coliseum. The Pedestrian Plaza project will slow vehicular traffic immediately in front of the Coliseum; enhance the area's appearance; and provide new space for special activities before and after Coliseum events.

The project is the result of a federally funded Transportation Enhancement grant awarded through the Indiana Department of Transportation. The grant provides 80 percent of the project's nearly \$2 million total cost with the remaining 20 percent paid by the Indiana State Fair Commission.

"This new plaza will help beautify the entrance area to the Coliseum, but more importantly it's another way to improve safety for our visitors and employees," Indiana State Fair Executive Director Cindy Hoyer said. "We're grateful for the support from the Indiana Department of Transportation and hope to keep working with them on future grants that will continue to enhance the fairgrounds."

Work on the current project began September 2. The majority of the construction should be completed by December with only the landscaping left to finish next spring. An emphasis has been put on "placemaking," a process that combines the design and programming of public spaces that strengthens the connection people have with those spaces. Cripe did the design

work and 3D Company is the prime contractor handling the construction.

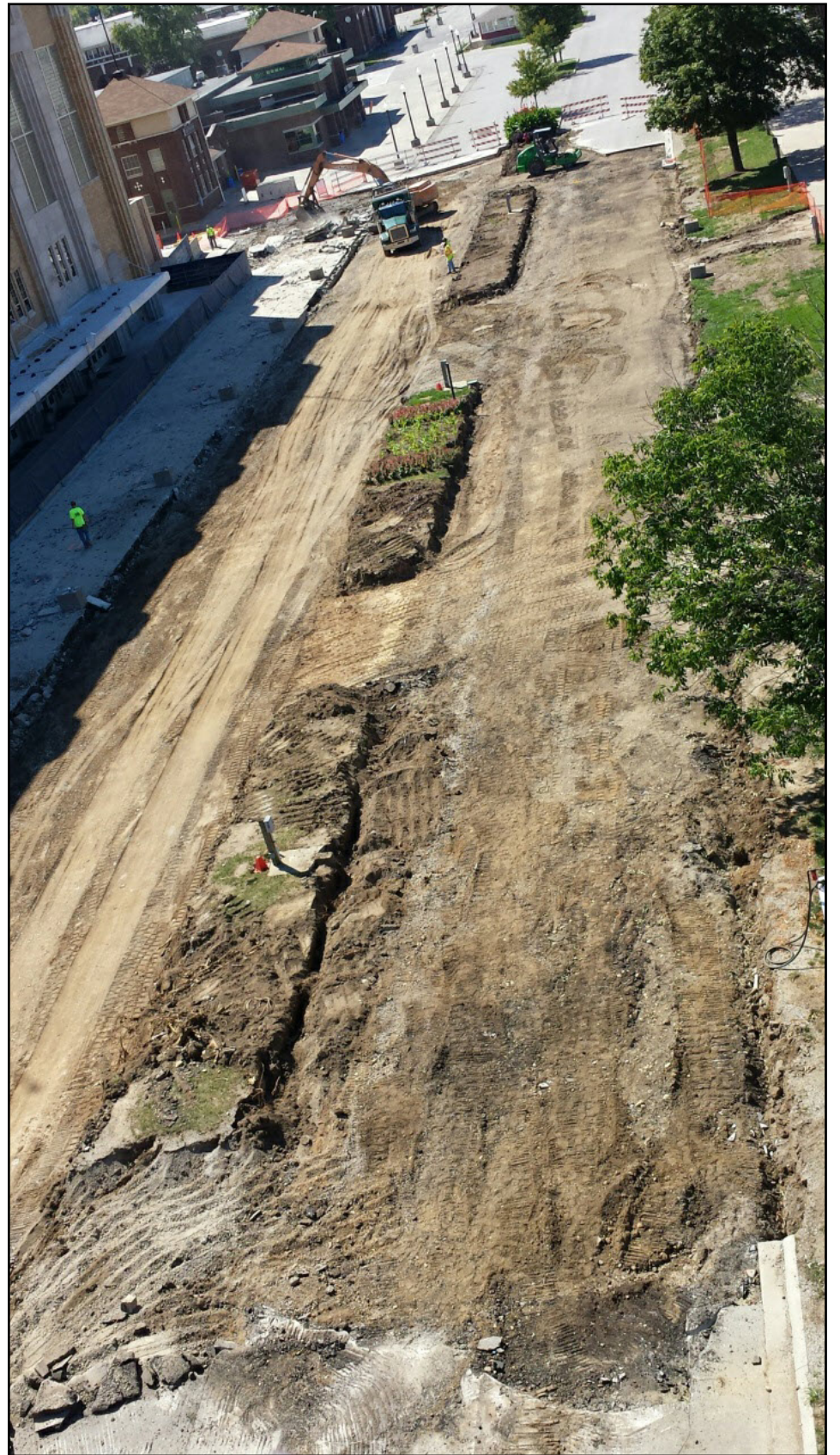
Once complete, the Pedestrian Plaza will limit vehicular traffic in front of the Coliseum to only the north side of Main Street. The rest of the street will continue to have vehicular traffic on the north and south sides of the street's landscaped islands.

The plaza will offer a number of attractive and functional features, including:

- Curbless walkways for better ADA accessibility
- Transitional paving for slowing vehicular traffic
- A drop-off zone
- Decorative urns and light fixtures
- Trees and other landscaped beds

In addition to the plaza, the pedestrian tunnel that connects the fairgrounds' infield to Main Street will receive new specially designed roof coverings that will protect them from the weather and make the short walk from the infield to the Pedestrian Plaza more enjoyable. Mindful of the upcoming Indy Fuel hockey season in October and the IUPUI basketball season in November, fairgrounds personnel have posted additional directional signs for the most convenient parking options while construction continues.

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# Westfield Police offer tips on avoiding phone scams

The Westfield Police Department has received some reports about a recent telephone scam in Westfield. The caller states that they are from the police and that you must call a 916 area code number or you will be taken in front of a judge.

This is a variation of several different scams where the caller states you either owe money or have a warrant out for your arrest. They tell you to call another number with payment information or they will have you arrested. There is another scam where the caller states a family member has been arrested and needs you to wire money for their bail. Do not respond to these calls and do not call any number the caller gives you. You can always verify the

information they are trying to tell you through law enforcement or a family member.

Here are a few tips to help avoid telephone scams:

Do not respond to telephone, email, or mail requests to send money through a wire service.

Do not respond to requests to send or wire money domestically or internationally to a law enforcement agency, attorney allegedly working on a relative's behalf, or court official.

If you have caller ID, you can check the Internet to see if there is a scam alert associated with that phone number.

If you receive calls threatening arrest, deportation, or other actions, call your local law enforcement for advice.

Never give personal information – birth date, social security number, bank account information – over the phone unless you initiate the phone call.

If the caller is claiming a loved one is in jail, hang up and call that person or another family member to verify the statement.

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# President Obama announces strategy against ISIL

*On Wednesday night, President Barack Obama addressed the nation about the threat of the Islamic State (ISIL) which has been terrorizing Iraq and Syria, and is responsible for the murder of two American journalists. Here is the transcript of his speech:*

My fellow Americans – tonight, I want to speak to you about what the United States will do with our friends and allies to degrade and ultimately destroy the terrorist group known as ISIL.

As Commander-in-Chief, my highest priority is the security of the American people. Over the last several years, we have consistently taken the fight to terrorists who threaten our country. We took out Osama bin Laden and much of al Qaeda’s leadership in Afghanistan and Pakistan. We’ve targeted al Qaeda’s affiliate in Yemen, and recently eliminated the top commander of its affiliate in Somalia. We’ve done so while bringing more than 140,000 American troops home from Iraq, and drawing down our forces in Afghanistan, where our combat mission will end later this year. Thanks to our military and counterterrorism professionals, America is safer.

Still, we continue to face a terrorist threat. We cannot erase every trace of evil from the world, and small groups of killers have the capacity to do great harm. That was the case before 9/11, and that remains true today. That’s why we must remain vigilant as threats emerge. At this moment, the greatest threats come from the Middle East and North Africa, where radical groups exploit grievances for their own gain. And one of those groups is ISIL – which calls itself the “Islamic State.”

Now let’s make two things clear: ISIL is not “Islamic.” No religion condones the killing of innocents, and the vast majority of ISIL’s victims have been Muslim. And ISIL is certainly not a state. It was formerly al Qaeda’s affiliate in Iraq, and has taken advantage of sectarian strife and Syria’s civil war to gain territory on both sides of the Iraq-Syrian border. It is recognized by no government, nor the people it subjugates. ISIL is a terrorist organization, pure and simple. And it has no vision other than the slaughter of all who stand in its way.

In a region that has known so much bloodshed, these terrorists are unique in their brutality. They execute captured prisoners. They kill children. They enslave, rape, and force women into marriage. They threatened a religious minority with genocide. In acts of barbarism, they took the lives of two American journalists – Jim Foley and Steven Sotloff.

So ISIL poses a threat to the people of Iraq and Syria, and the broader Middle East – including American citizens, personnel and facilities. If left unchecked, these terrorists could pose a growing threat beyond that region – including to the United States. While we have not yet detected specific plotting against our homeland, ISIL leaders have threatened America and our allies. Our intelligence community believes that thousands of foreigners – including Europeans and some Americans – have joined them in Syria and Iraq. Trained and battle-hard-

ened, these fighters could try to return to their home countries and carry out deadly attacks.

I know many Americans are concerned about these threats. Tonight, I want you to know that the United States of America is meeting them with strength and resolve. Last month, I ordered our military to take targeted action against ISIL to stop its advances. Since then, we have conducted more than 150 successful airstrikes in Iraq. These strikes have protected American personnel and facilities, killed ISIL fighters, destroyed weapons, and given space for Iraqi and Kurdish forces to reclaim key territory. These strikes have helped save the lives of thousands of innocent men, women and children.

But this is not our fight alone. American power can make a decisive difference, but we cannot do for Iraqis what they must do for themselves, nor can we take the place of Arab partners in securing their region. That’s why I’ve insisted that additional U.S. action depended upon Iraqis forming an inclusive government, which they have now done in recent days. So tonight, with a new Iraqi government in place, and following consultations with allies abroad and Congress at home, I can announce that America will lead a broad coalition to roll back this terrorist threat.

Our objective is clear: we will degrade, and ultimately destroy, ISIL through a comprehensive and sustained counter-terrorism strategy.

First, we will conduct a systematic campaign of airstrikes against these terrorists. Working with the Iraqi government, we will expand our efforts beyond protecting our own people and humanitarian missions, so that we’re hitting ISIL targets as Iraqi forces go on offense. Moreover, I have made it clear that we will hunt down terrorists who threaten our country, wherever they are. That means I will not hesitate to take action against ISIL in Syria, as well as Iraq. This is a core principle of my presidency: if you threaten America, you will find no safe haven.

Second, we will increase our support to forces fighting these terrorists on the ground. In June, I deployed several hundred American service members to Iraq to assess how we can best support Iraqi Security Forces. Now that those teams have completed their work – and Iraq has formed a government – we will send an additional 475 service members to Iraq. As I have said before, these American forces will not have a combat mission – we will not get dragged into another ground war in Iraq. But they are needed to support Iraqi and Kurdish forces with training, intelligence and equipment. We will also support Iraq’s efforts to stand up National Guard Units to help Sunni communities secure their own freedom from ISIL control.

Across the border, in Syria, we have ramped up our military assistance to the Syrian opposition. Tonight, I again call on Congress to give us additional authorities and resources to train and equip these fighters. In the fight against ISIL, we cannot rely on an Assad regime that terrorizes its people; a regime that will never regain the

legitimacy it has lost. Instead, we must strengthen the opposition as the best counterweight to extremists like ISIL, while pursuing the political solution necessary to solve Syria’s crisis once and for all.

Third, we will continue to draw on our substantial counterterrorism capabilities to prevent ISIL attacks. Working with our partners, we will redouble our efforts to cut off its funding; improve our intelligence; strengthen our defenses; counter its warped ideology; and stem the flow of foreign fighters into – and out of – the Middle East. And in two weeks, I will chair a meeting of the UN Security Council to further mobilize the international community around this effort.

Fourth, we will continue providing humanitarian assistance to innocent civilians who have been displaced by this terrorist organization. This includes Sunni and Shia Muslims who are at grave risk, as well as tens of thousands of Christians and other religious minorities. We cannot allow these communities to be driven from their ancient homelands.

This is our strategy. And in each of these four parts of our strategy, America will be joined by a broad coalition of partners. Already, allies are flying planes with us over Iraq; sending arms and assistance to Iraqi Security Forces and the Syrian opposition; sharing intelligence; and providing billions of dollars in humanitarian aid. Secretary Kerry was in Iraq today meeting with the new government and supporting their efforts to promote unity, and in the coming days he will travel across the Middle East and Europe to enlist more partners in this fight, especially Arab nations who can help mobilize Sunni communities in Iraq and Syria to drive these terrorists from their lands. This is American leadership at its best: we stand with people who fight for their own freedom; and we rally other nations on behalf of our common security and common humanity.

My Administration has also secured bipartisan support for this approach here at home. I have the authority to address the threat from ISIL. But I believe we are strongest as a nation when the President and Congress work together. So I welcome congressional support for this effort in order to show the world that Americans are united in confronting this danger.

Now, it will take time to eradicate a cancer like ISIL. And any time we take military action, there are risks involved – especially to the servicemen and women who carry out these missions. But I want the American people to understand how this effort will be different from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. It will not involve American combat troops fighting on foreign soil. This counter-terrorism campaign will be waged through a steady, relentless effort to take out ISIL wherever they exist, using our air power and our support for partner forces on the ground. This strategy of taking out terrorists who threaten us, while supporting partners on the front lines, is one that we have successfully pursued in Yemen and Somalia for years. And it is consistent with the approach I outlined earlier this year: to use force against anyone who threatens

America’s core interests, but to mobilize partners wherever possible to address broader challenges to international order.

My fellow Americans, we live in a time of great change. Tomorrow marks 13 years since our country was attacked. Next week marks 6 years since our economy suffered its worst setback since the Great Depression. Yet despite these shocks; through the pain we have felt and the grueling work required to bounce back – America is better positioned today to seize the future than any other nation on Earth.

Our technology companies and universities are unmatched; our manufacturing and auto industries are thriving. Energy independence is closer than it’s been in decades. For all the work that remains, our businesses are in the longest uninterrupted stretch of job creation in our history. Despite all the divisions and discord within our democracy, I see the grit and determination and common goodness of the American people every single day – and that makes me more confident than ever about our country’s future.

Abroad, American leadership is the one constant in an uncertain world. It is America that has the capacity and the will to mobilize the world against terrorists. It is America that has rallied the world against Russian aggression, and in support of the Ukrainian peoples’ right to determine their own destiny. It is America – our scientists, our doctors, our know-how – that can help contain and cure the outbreak of Ebola. It is America that helped remove and destroy Syria’s declared chemical weapons so they cannot pose a threat to the Syrian people – or the world – again. And it is America that is helping Muslim communities around the world not just in the fight against terrorism, but in the fight for opportunity, tolerance, and a more hopeful future.

America, our endless blessings bestow an enduring burden. But as Americans, we welcome our responsibility to lead. From Europe to Asia – from the far reaches of Africa to war-torn capitals of the Middle East – we stand for freedom, for justice, for dignity. These are values that have guided our nation since its founding. Tonight, I ask for your support in carrying that leadership forward. I do so as a Commander-in-Chief who could not be prouder of our men and women in uniform – pilots who bravely fly in the face of danger above the Middle East, and service-members who support our partners on the ground.

When we helped prevent the massacre of civilians trapped on a distant mountain, here’s what one of them said. “We owe our American friends our lives. Our children will always remember that there was someone who felt our struggle and made a long journey to protect innocent people.”

That is the difference we make in the world. And our own safety – our own security – depends upon our willingness to do what it takes to defend this nation, and uphold the values that we stand for – timeless ideals that will endure long after those who offer only hate and destruction have been vanquished from the Earth.

May God bless our troops, and may God bless the United States of America.
