# **Carmel to announce Midtown** plans Monday afternoon

Big changes will be coming to part of downtown Carmel.

That's what the city plans to announce Monday afternoon. Carmel will conduct a press conference that will discuss the Midtown project, the area which lies between the city's Arts and Design District and Carmel City Center.

The redevelopment of Midtown between these two anchors, is a key component of the city's efforts to create a walkable, pedestrian-friendly area centered along the Monon Greenway, providing the interest and activity that will encourage walking from one anchor to

Bordered by Main Street to the north; City Center Drive to the south; Range Line Road to the east and areas around 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave SW, Midtown holds the potential to one day complete a continuous downtown core in Carmel with a mix of residential and commercial projects that could constitute a largely self-reliant urban environment.

The press conference will take place at 340 First Ave. SW, which is at the corner of 2nd Ave. SW and 3rd St. SW near the Monon Trail. ## Community Health purchases land at 82nd and Shadeland

One of the most visible sites along the I-69 corridor will soon change. The Community Health Network Foundation owns an 8.9 acre parcel of land on the corner of 82nd Street and Shadeland Avenue that is currently the leased site of the Hilton Indianapolis North. The Foundation has exercised its right of first refusal to purchase the hotel from the current Hilton franchisee, and Community Health Network will reclaim the valuable land for future use by Community's North Region. A management company will be hired to operate the hotel in the interim period, with closure expected to occur by the end of 2014. A team of leaders from Community's North Region will begin planning for how the 8.9 acres will be redeveloped to meet the future needs of physicians and patients.

"The opportunity for the Foundation to purchase the Hilton came at a perfect time," said Joyce Irwin, president of the Community Health Network Foundation. "Community's North Region continues to expand its reach and needs the physical space to meet the growing demands of the marketplace. Opening up this prime area of real estate for healthcare services benefits the residents who live in the northern areas of Central In-

"Community's North campus is located in one of the fastest-growing markets in the nation," said Jason Fahrlander, president of Community's North Region. "Having that land at 82<sup>nd</sup> Street and Shadeland will position us to expand much needed patient services in the future. This parcel is in a vital location that provides easy access for patients and their families traveling from multiple locations via I-69 and I-465.'

The former Community Hospitals of Indiana, Inc. originally purchased substantial acreage in this Castleton corridor in 1981, with the intention of developing a north campus for what is now Community Health Network. In 1985, Community Hospital North opened with a 100-bed acute care inpatient capacity, emergency department and outpatient services. As the northeast side of Indianapolis expanded and the town of Fishers became more populated, the North campus was further developed to serve a growing patient base. Additions to the campus have included a 42-bed neonatal intensive care unit, the

# Traffic shift completed at 136th Street

After the evening rush hour on Thurs- eastbound and westbound as crews contineast side of the roadway near 136th Street to begin construction on the western half of US 31. One lane of northbound and southbound traffic will be maintained between 136th Street and the Monon Trail crossing just south of 146th Street. This traffic shift was expected to happen Wednesday night, but was pushed back due to heavy rain.

All traffic on southbound US 31 will exit into the 136th Street/Eglin Drive/Rohrer Road roundabout. The existing temporary traffic signal at US 31/136th Street will be removed. Motorists wishing to access northbound US 31 from 136th Street must enter via the new ramp east of US 31. One lane of eastbound and westbound traffic will be maintained on 136th Street underneath the new US 31 bridge.

### **UPDATE: 131st Street/Main Street** bridge opens and 126th Street/Carmel **Drive closes on Sept. 12**

Weather permitting, on or after Friday, Sept. 12, crews plan to open the new 131st Street/Main Street bridge over US 31. One lane of free-flowing traffic will be open

day, crews shifted traffic on US 31 to the ue work on the roundabout interchange. Direct access to/from US 31 via the new 131st Street/Main Street interchange will not be available until the US 31 closure ends later this fall (expected before Thanksgiving).

Motorists should note that 131st Street/Main Street will be closed east of Pennsylvania Street, as the City of Carmel is expected to soon begin work in this area. Therefore, motorists traveling eastbound across the new 131st Street/Main Street bridge must turn onto Pennsylvania Street.

Also on or after Friday, Sept. 12, crews expect to close 126th Street/Carmel Drive access across US 31 to begin construction of the new bridge.

INDOT and the City of Carmel will be monitoring nearby traffic signals and making necessary timing adjustments following the opening of the 131st Street/Main Street bridge and the closure of 126th Street/Carmel Drive. Also, a left turn arrow from southbound Pennsylvania Street to eastbound 126th Street/Carmel Drive has been installed to help mitigate traffic.


