Horseshoe Prairie DAR helps people find ancestors

Did you ever wonder whether an ancestor living in this country at the time of the American Revolution might have served in the rebellion against England? Or, if you did hear stories that an ancestor served, perhaps you'd be interested in confirmation and more information on his service.

Assistance in getting such information is available through the local Daughters of the American Revolution, a branch of the national DAR organization. The local chapter is called the Horseshoe Prairie DAR.



The Horseshoe Prairie name comes from the first pioneer settlement in Hamilton County. It was located along White River about midway between Noblesville and Conner Prairie and has long since disappeared.

Historians are aware that at least 12 veterans of the Revolutionary War are buried in this county. The descendants of many others moved into the county in more recent times. To be a member of the DAR, a woman must be a direct descendant of a veteran of the war which won American independence.

The national DAR organization has a vast collection of records of men who served in the Continental armed forces including names, dates of service, battles in which the veterans were involved, pension records and burial locations.

Local DAR chapters can help you access these records. But, one should not expect the local DAR to do all the work for you. There are questions that need answering, and may require research on the part of the person trying to establish connection to a veteran.

The DAR membership is, of course, limited to women, but there is a companion men's organization known as the Sons of the American Revolution or SAR with a chapter in Indianapolis.

The DAR Horseshoe Prairie chapter is headed by Marilyn Marshall. The group sponsors the annual Good Citizen Awards open to high school seniors in the county's high schools with college scholarships awarded to winners.

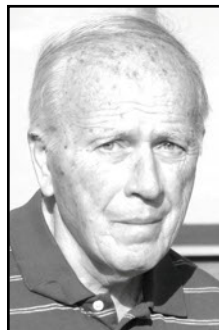
I hope you're noticing that the Hamilton County Reporter more and more is covering state-wide news.

A good example of what I'm trying to explain is our daily publishing this summer

of major league baseball scores, plus the latest news on the Indianapolis Indians. We never send you to somebody's web page to find out that the Cubs lost last evening. I would be embarrassed to tell our readers that we don't have enough space to run baseball scores, or college football scores, etc. because we have to use what space we have to publish local news. That is the situation with many newspapers. Print edition newspapers. I know. I worked for print edition newspapers for most of my life. The number of pages a print edition newspaper can run depends on how much advertising that newspaper has sold for any one issue. That's not the situation with our newspaper, The Reporter.

*Also, no matter how many state or national stories we run or how many ads we sell in any one edition, I challenge anyone to find a local Hamilton County daily newspaper which has more local news and sports EVERY day than The Reporter. No way will you find one. No way.

We have the most experienced; most professional; most caring writers you can

find in Hamilton County. We not only publish the news, we also help you understand the news.

So, no deadline; plenty of space; the most and the best news and sports, that's what The Reporter is all about. Big win for Fishers...

Tigers romp in Mudsock game

There's always some more history to be made when it comes to the Mudsock rivalry between Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern.

The Tigers made it Friday, dominating the Royals 41-10 to claim the Mudsock Trophy. The win improved Fishers to 2-0 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference, and put the Tigers in the driver's seat in the league, as they're the only HCC team with two wins. Overall, Fishers is 3-1.

But the cross-town rivalry trumps all of that, and the Tigers retained the trophy with a convincing win. It's the first time Fishers has beaten HSE at Reynolds Royals Stadium in the regular season (the Tigers did win a sectional game at HSE in 2012).

"It's a big win for us," said Tigers coach Rick Wimmer. "It's a big confidence builder. That's a good football team. Now it's how we respond to the win. We've battled when we haven't played well. Tonight, we played well. Will we be satisfied, or will we continue to work to get better?"

The Tigers won with their stars leading the offense: Zach Eaton threw for three touchdowns, each to a different receiver, while Maurice Campbell had two long touchdown runs.

Campbell got Fishers on the board with a minute left in the first quarter, zooming 32 yards into the end zone. He provided another highlight in the third quarter, as he rushed for a 41-yard touchdown. Campbell gained by far the most ground of anyone Friday,

totaling 190 yards in 18 carries - a remarkable average of 10.6 yards per carry.

"We knew this was a big game coming into it," said Campbell. "Wednesday and Thursday were probably the best two practices of the week. It was 41-10 - that's hard work, that's dedication, that's focus."

Eaton had a highly efficient night, completing 15 of 20 passes for 127 yards. His first two touchdown throws were within 25 seconds of each other in the last minute of the first half.

"Zach had a good week of practice, we got some good receivers," said Wimmer. "Zach's really put the ball on the money tonight. It's good for our offense, because we've got some tailbacks, obviously, that can run. Maurice did a great job of running the football tonight. Offensive line was fantastic."

Eaton found Jordan Hernandez for a 15-yard pass with 27 seconds to go. Then, after a Tigers interception, Eaton passed to Simeon Foster for a 10-yard play -and score. Just like that, the halftime board read 21-3, Fishers.

The Tigers led 27-3 after three quarters before Eaton struck again, this time on a six-yard pass to Chris Thomas. Southeastern's Aaron Matio found the end zone on a four-yard run with 5:28 left to go, cutting Fishers' lead to 34-10. The Royals then recovered an onside kick.

But the Tigers' Josh Lloyd erased any comeback chances by making an interception - and running it 82 yards to score. Anthony Beck made the extra point kick; he converted 5-of-6 on the night.

"Defensively we played very, very well," said Wimmer. "Great team win all the way around."

The Royals got on the board late in the second quarter after a 24-yard field goal by Brady Hoffman, who also kicked the extra point after Matio's score.

Matio carried for 143 yards. Tyler Janney and Carter Poiry each had turns at quarterback - Janney was 5-for-10, Poiry 8-for-14. Kyle Schrank had five catches for 57 yards.

Fishers is back home next week to host Brownsburg in a game with big HCC implications. The Bulldogs opened conference play with a 27-7 win over Avon Friday. The Royals, now 0-2 in the league and 1-3 overall, travel to Westfield.

Noblesville wins HCC thriller

Any team in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference with hopes and dreams of beating Noblesville this football season may want to do a little praying, too, trying to get an answer on how to handle the Millers’ defense.

Westfield, playing Friday evening at Hare Chevrolet Stadium, didn’t have an answer as host Noblesville handled the Shamrocks, 17-12.

The Shamrocks certainly had their opportunities. Westfield left more point on the field than it put on the scoreboard. All of which started in the first six minutes in the game when twice Noblesville’s defense stiffened and held the visitors to a pair of field goals.

“That hurt,” Westfield coach Jake Gilbert said.

That defense did a lot of bending, but very little breaking against the Shamrocks.

Austin Ginther had nine tackles and two assists. Donavan Lynch eight and four; Niezer seven and three and David Cory five and four. Cory added to his game by picking off a Westfield pass.

Hank Davis, who had 4.5 tackles and three assists, delivered the final blow to Westfield with a 44-yard punt and just a minute left in the game. The Shamrocks got the pigskin at their six-yard line and couldn’t climb out of the hole.

“It would have helped if we could have caught a pass or two (after the punt),” said Gilbert. “We were 16-of-33 tonight, and I know of at least five passes that we dropped.”

“The game was won up front,” Scheib said. “Both on the offensive and defensive sides.

The game also was won because Westfield couldn’t beat the Millers in the

red zone. Time after time, four times in all, Westfield threatened and each time the Millers’ slammed door.

Noblesville took the lead by scoring 10 points in the second quarter. Ziezer booted a 23-yard field goal. Stinnett scored on a 30-yard run and Niezer kicked the extra point.

In the fourth quarter, Melloh scored what proved to be the wining touchdown on a three-yard run. Andrew Little kicked the PAT.

Westfield’s final score was a 16-yard run by Caldwell with 4:18 left.

The loss left Westfield 1-1 in the conference and 2-2 overall with Hamilton Southeastern coming to The Rock next Friday.

Noblesville has a conference date the same evening at Zionsville.

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Carmel offense explodes....

'Hounds blast Pike 48-21

As Indiana Class 6A football teams watched No. 1 ranked Carmel roll to three consecutive victories mainly on its defensive abilities the first three weeks of the season, everyone wondered when Coach Kevin Wright's potentially dangerous offense would explode.

The state got its answer last evening at Greyhound Stadium. So did No. 6 rated Pike.

Carmel exploded for 28 first half points and then exploded even more with 20 third quarter points while rolling over Pike, 48-21, in a big MIC Conference game.

With the victory, Carmel moves to 2-0 in the conference.

"Our offense had been close," Wright said. "We had played three ranked teams with good defenses. Eight times in those three games we had drives closing and didn't finish.

"Tonight we got lots of help from lots of different players," Wright added.

The Greyhounds rushed for 329 yards in 57 carries and completed 9-of-11 passes for another 124 yards.

Pike, flat out, couldn't slow the Carmel attack.

It was an attack which came from everywhere.

On the ground, speedster Chris Perkins had his best night of the season with 16

carries for 124 yards and three touchdowns. Shakir Paschall carried 19 times for 67 yards.

Quarterback Michael Viktrup added 75 yards in 10 carries and another Carmel speedster, Isaac James, contributed 55 yards in nine tries. Viktrup and James each scored a touchdown.

When Carmel decided to go to the air, Pike couldn't stop that attack, either.

Viktrup hit on 9-of-11 tries for 124 yards and two touchdowns. Six different receivers caught at least one pass. John Ramsey and Jake Herr each yanked in a touchdown toss.

"Our receivers are young, and even James (a quarterback) is playing a receiving position for the first time," Wright pointed out. "We got James a few snaps at quarterback tonight."

At the same time, Carmel's defense completely stopped Pike cold on the ground, holding the Red Devils to two yards rushing. All of Pike's damage was done through the air, hitting on 31-of-55 passes for 348 yards and all three of Pike's touchdowns.

"We wanted to get out early and get the lead," Wright said. "Last week Pike kept coming back against Ben Davis. Tonight we went up 20-7 and actually had a 35-7 advantage at one point in the third quarter."

Carmel drew first blood, scoring at the 4:54 mark of the first quarter on an 11-play,
