Southside's traffic flow

The City of Noblesville Wednesday evening at City Hall presented its plans for a new roundabout and improvement project in an open door meeting led by City Engineer John Beery.

About 30 interested citizens, many of whom are business owners in the area,

attended the session, along with four members of the Noblesville Common Council.

The project is at the 10th Street and Greenfield Ave. intersection on the city's southside.

Cars at the intersection often are backed up during morning and evening heavy traffic periods and then during other times of day

and night drivers are left waiting through five light changes.

In opening remarks, Beery talked about three common themes: 1, gateway development ; 2, beautification efforts; 3, improve traffic flow.


Bus riders...

Supporters of rapid-transit came out of a press conference held Tuesday at the Arts Garden in Indianapolis smiling.

A \$2 million federal grant and another \$1 million and cash contributions have a way of making



folks happy.

In this situation, the \$2 million federal grant would come from the Department of Transportation. The other \$1 million or so would come from the cities of Greenwood, Indianapolis, Carmel and Westfield.

Those four cities are where the proposed rapid-transit all-electric bus route would run. That's how Westfield Mayor Andy Cook described the project when information came from Westfield City Hall to the press before the press conference.

Cook talked about the bus route being from Greenwood to smack on the door step of Westfield's Grand Park, a huge benefit to Westfield and Grand Park.

Lane restrictions begin on Hazel Dell Parkway today

There will be lane restrictions in the left lanes of both northbound and southbound Hazel Dell Parkway between 126th Street and Main Street starting today, Thursday, Sept. 18. He included signal replacement and sidewalk improvements in the plan.

“The roundabout will replace an aging signal and reduce delay times,” Beery said.

In answer to a question, Beery said a study indicated that a roundabout would improve the flow of traffic better than “smart signals.”

He pointed to the improvements a roundabout has made at the Wal-Mart area and also at two other shopping areas on the east side of State Road 37.

Beery showed the audience a series of proposed intersection schematics, including sketches of streets leading into the proposed intersection and acquisition needed to do the project. (These sketches appear elsewhere in today’s Hamilton County Reporter).

Beery said the intersection will be open to traffic for a majority of the project duration.

“We expect the new intersection will be more efficient and operate with less delay,” Beery said.

“Disruption to traffic will occur, but it will be isolated, slight, and of short duration. At least one driveway or alley

approach will be maintained and open at all times,” Beery added.

The target date for the completion of the project is Nov. 1, 2015.

Beery set completion goals as follows:
*Appraisals and land acquisition, September, 2014 to March, 2015.


*Final design complete April 1, 2015.
*Project bid late May of 2015.

*Begin construction July 1, 2015.
*Construction complete Nov. 1, 2015

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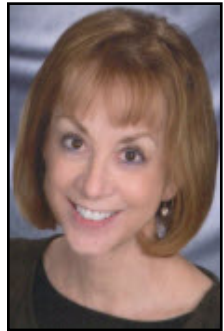
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Choose natural foods over processed items

"If more of us valued food and cheer and song above hoarded gold, it would be a merrier world." -J.R.R. Tolkien

This week's topic relates more to the "food" aspect of Tolkien's quote that the "cheer and song" – although those are important to everyone's lives as well! In particular I am addressing this week the food choices we make based on the nutritional value of those choices



True confession here...if you happen to run into me in the grocery store, chances are I will be surreptitiously glancing at the items in your cart. I suppose it is just a professional hazard of mine as I am both confounded and amazed often times at what I observe in others' grocery carts! Appearing most of the time are the processed, packaged foods which are so convenient to prepare...and so unhealthy when eaten on a frequent basis. We are advertised-to, marketed, and frankly bombarded with these "tasty and quick options" for meal preparation. I also note

that the snack aisles appear to grow every week with a plethora of yummy, salty snacks! In particular, I am concerned about children who are frequently offered these items.

Federal health statistics show that 12.3 percent of Americans 20 and older have diabetes, either diagnosed or undiagnosed. About 37 percent have pre-diabetes, a condition marked by higher-than-normal blood sugar. That's up from 27 percent a decade ago. An analysis of 16 studies involving almost 900,000 people worldwide, published in the most recent issue of the journal Diabetologia, shows pre-diabetes not only sets the stage for diabetes but increases the risk of cancer by 15 percent. Children are being diagnosed pre-diabetic at an alarming rate in recent years.

In referring back to the quote at the beginning, however, my point this week is also the monetary cost of food. Although the price of produce and healthy foods can fluctuate depending on season of the year, etc., the price of highly processed food is significant regardless of the season! "Convenience" comes not only at a cost to our health, but a budget hit as well. An example I will give is the cost of a simple baked potatoes with salsa, grated parmesan or spices vs. a box of "instant" mashed potatoes. There are many other examples of which you readers are aware so I won't use space here to cover those. You don't

need a cookbook these days to come up with healthy and simple recipes using nutritional items - the Internet has you covered! If you have any doubt of the nutritional value of the shelf-stable, processed foods, the labels will tell you most of what you need to know. If you suffer from high blood pressure, always read the labels for sodium content of that item.

So – who do I think I am, right...do I ever eat processed foods? Of course – in moderation, which is the key to most anything. Potato chips – once in a while. Frozen entrees – not often, but a bean burrito sure heats up quickly in the microwave when a person is in a hurry! Whether you live alone, are feeding a family, or you are somewhere in between, try to stick to the "80-20" rule...with whole, natural (organic when possible) and unprocessed food items as your go-to menu items. Bon appétit!

First, those bucks are to pay for environmental and design work on the route. The work, planners say, should begin early next year.

Pending approval of local funding. The Department of Transportation won't give the grant unless there is local funding.

There already is some proposed local funding. Indianapolis has said it will chip in \$687,636. I'm sure there is a reason for that exact amount. Same goes for Carmel's \$296,592 and Westfield's \$146,206 and Greenwood's \$64,366.

Once again, it should be clear, the federal grant depends on local funding getting approved.

"These are critical steps to get the federal funds to help us build this," said transit planner Ehren Bingham. "This is a major movement forward, a very competitive grant award."

At this point, no one is certain just how much the total project will cost. It has been estimated as high as \$130 million.

That's a bunch of local funding. Much of the funds, it appears, would have to come from a referendum to raise property taxes.

Here in Hamilton County, not just a referendum in Westfield or in Carmel. All of Hamilton County.

First, the Hamilton County Commissioners would need to bring a referendum to the voting public. Second, the voting public would need to pass the referendum.

Hamilton County, down through the years, has been hit hard and has been open to school referendums. Those referendums haven't been county-wide. In this situation, folks in Noblesville and Fishers, for example, would need to vote for higher taxes so that folks in Carmel and Westfield to ride buses to Indianapolis.

Hello! Say that again, please.

Those supporting the project believe actual construction could begin in 2016.

If local funding can be arranged.

The route would use existing traffic lanes. About 40 stations are planned along the route. The electric buses would run every 10 minutes during peak times and 15 minutes during off-peak times.

If local funding can be raised.

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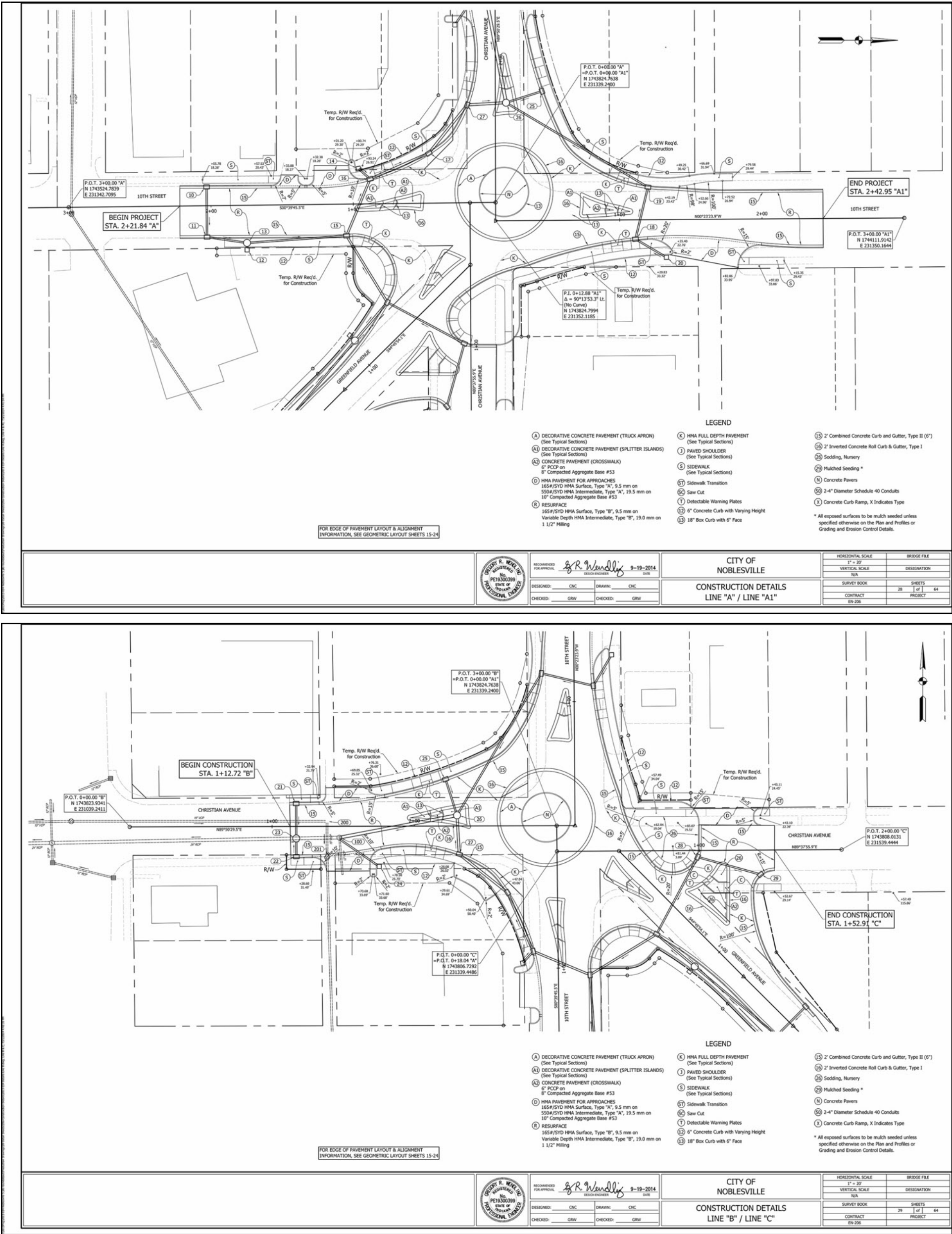

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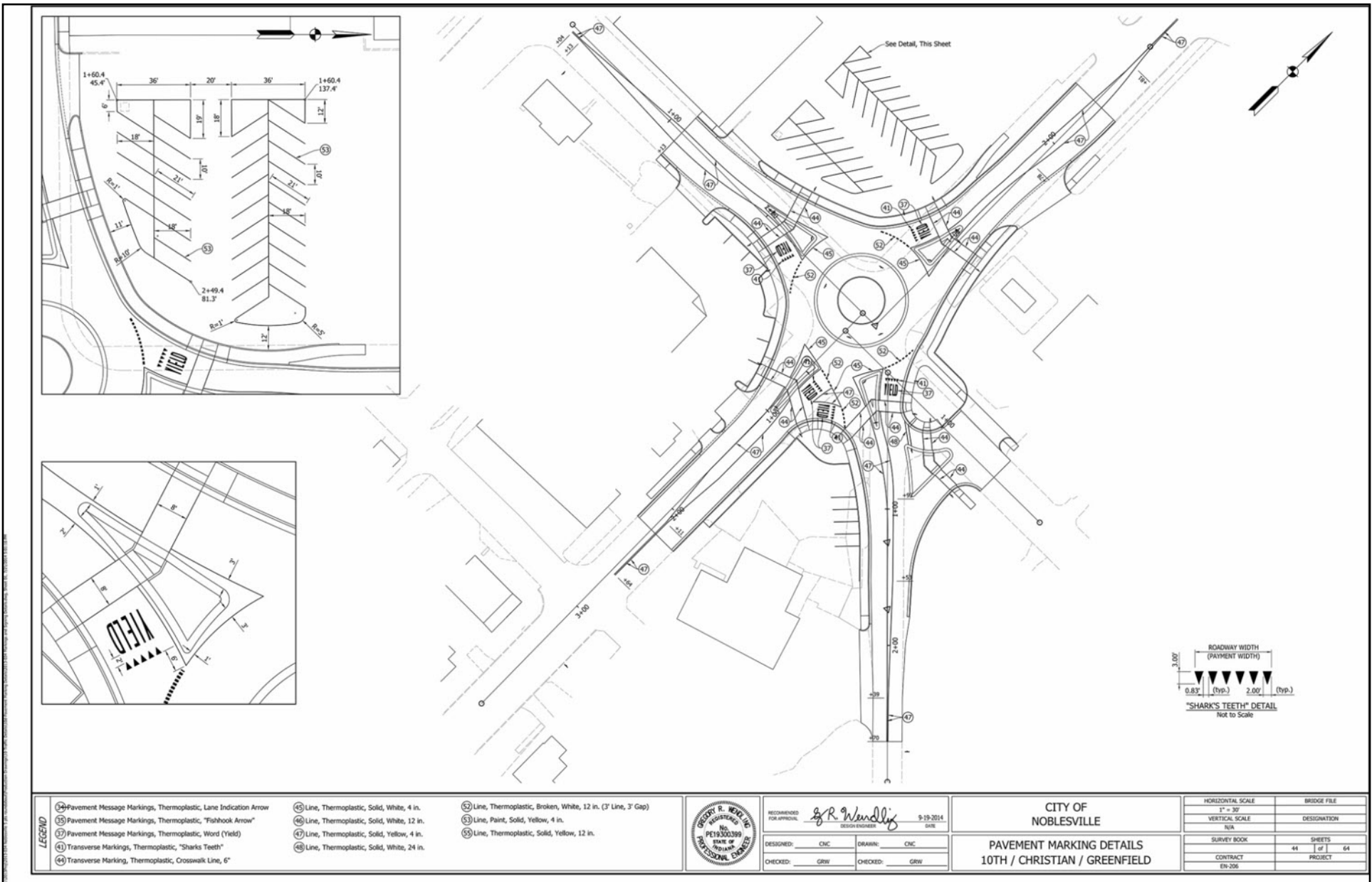
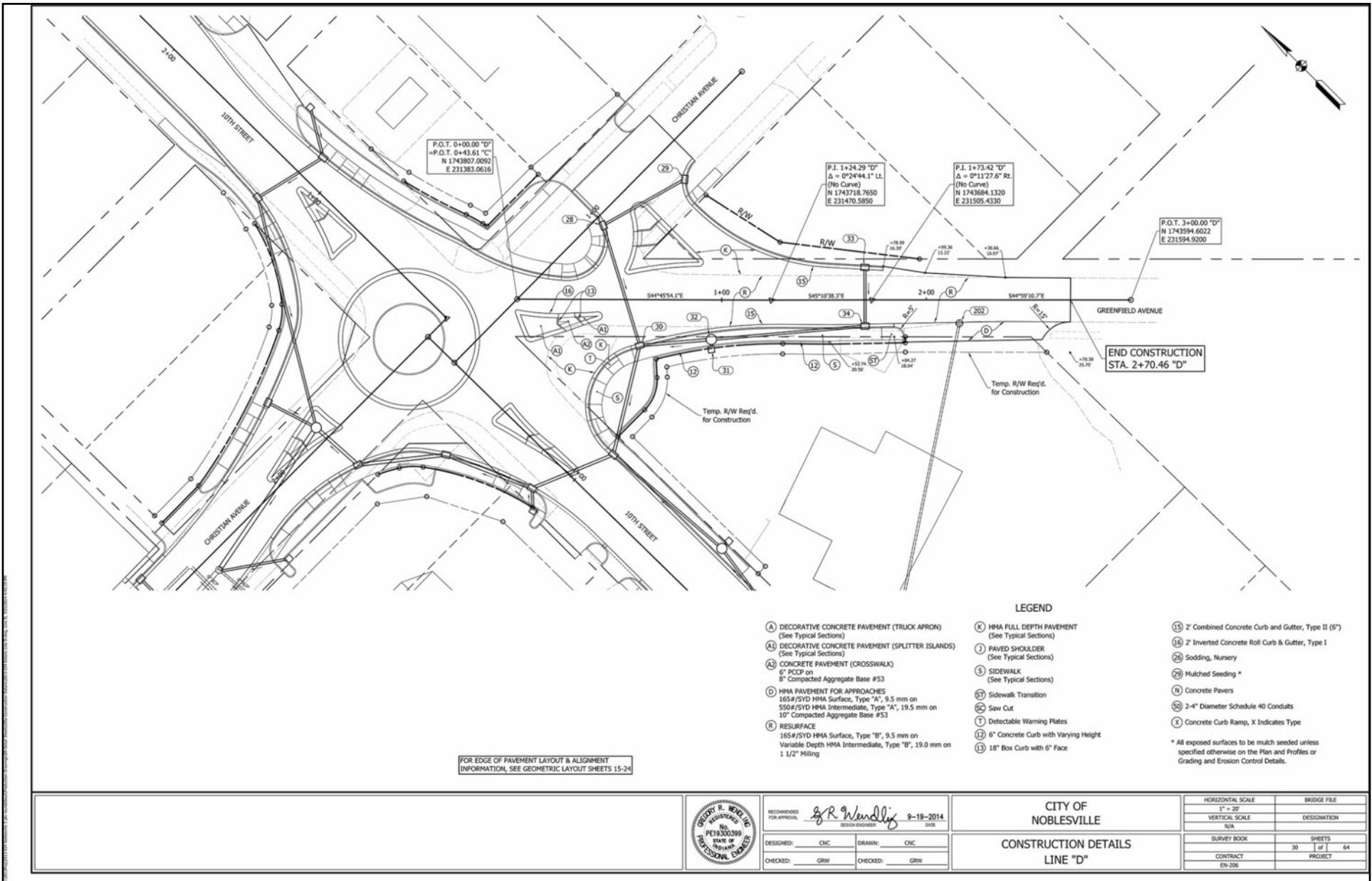
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Indiana House accepting intern applications for 2015 Session

If not now, maybe never...

Millers looking to clip Eagles

If not now, then never?

That question must be on the minds of everyone in Miller Nation as Noblesville travel to Zionsville on Friday for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game.

The Millers have never beaten the Eagles. Never, like in the 13 years Noblesville and Zionsville have met in HCC competition. Thirteen up; 13 down.

There's more.

In five of the last six contests between the two schools, Noblesville has been limited to one touchdown or less.

Noblesville nearly got the Eagles off their back last year, losing to Zionsville 13-9 at Hare Chevrolet Stadium.

But, this battle Friday will be different. Surely, it must be different.

Noblesville is smoking, coming out of the blocks with a 3-1 record. A Top 10 team in both state polls, Noblesville has lost only to No. 6 Fishers in a 16-13 nail-bitter. Last week the Millers knocked off Class 5A Top 10 Westfield, 17-12. Earlier, Noblesville handled two non-conference foes, Lawrence North 36-33 and Hamilton Heights 34-0.

Zionsville? Well, it has been a little different kind of start for the Eagles. Playing under new coach Pat Echeverria,

Zionsville's only win in four games has been an 18-3 decision against Boone County neighbor Lebanon. Zionsville has lost to McCutcheon 21-13, Westfield 44-34 and Brebeuf 28-10.

"We are excited to play Zionsville this week," said Miller coach Lance Scheib.

"They are a dangerous team as they were last year, and we hope we have learned from last year's approach as we prepare for them."

Zionsville can score passing the ball or running the pigskin. Last week against Brebeuf, junior quarterback Trevor Liechly hit on 18-of-30 passes for 198 yards. The team's leading ground gainer through four games is junior Eddie Mattingly with 214 yards in 34 carries. Senior Kyle Sheehan has 156 yards in 35 trips. The leading pass receiver is Bill Hudson with 19 catches for 308 yards.

The Eagles have scored seven times on the ground and three times through the air.

At Noblesville, Scheib credits much of his team's early season success to line play.

"The biggest reason we are 3-1 is due to the play of our offensive line, led by Brandon Knights, Dustin Aitken, Jacob Reks, Jeffrey Musselman and Eric Ferguson" said the Noblesville coach. "They are playing with great confidence and playing tough, physical football."

The Millers, behind that line, is piling up good yardage. Hayden Stinnett has carried 69 times for 355 yards and four touchdowns. Quarterback Luke Melloh has 37 carries for 192 yards and six scores. Jarel Youree has 25 carries for 171 yards. Youree is leading the team with a 6.8 yard average each time he carries the football.

Through the air, Scheib is working with two quarterbacks. Melloh is 20-of-32 for 247 yards. Carl Hardy has connected on 17-of-25 tosses for 230 yards. Hardy has tossed for two touchdowns, Noblesville's only scores through the air in the four games. Josh Donham and Logan Robbins each have caught one TD pass.

"The defensive line, led by Nick Santos, Logan Compton, Sonu Dhillon, Jake Hornsby, Zach Powers and Josh Garcia, is a big reason our defense is playing at such a high level," Scheib continued. "They were responsible for four holding calls against Westfield last week, and that created a lot of adversity for the Westfield offense."

Leading Noblesville in tackles is Austin Ginther with 33. He is followed by Donavan Lynch with 20 Zack Niezer 18, Nick Santos 14 and David Cory with 11.

Santos has four quarterback sacks and Lynch two.

Fishers to host Brownsburg

The 2014 Hoosier Crossroads Conference football race is shaping up to be one of the most wide-open battles ever in the history of what now is a seven-team conference.

After the second week of the conference season, only two teams are undefeated in conference play. Fishers is 2-0. Brownsburg is 1-0. Those two teams will square off Friday at Reynolds Tiger Stadium in Fishers.

Both teams are 3-1 overall. Each has lost to Pike from the MIC Conference. Pike defeated Brownsburg 59-19 and also defeated Fishers in a tight 26-22 game.

Since losing to Pike, Brownsburg has gone unbeaten, knocking off Lawrence North 28-14 and Franklin 34-27 in non-conference game and then last week opening the HCC season with a 27-7 win over Avon.

Fishers has a 32-20 non-conference win over North Central and the Tigers have defeated Noblesville 16-13 and Hamilton Southeastern 41-10 in HCC play.

“We are happy to be 3-1 at this point in the season,” said Fishers coach Rick Wimmer, “but we know there are several tough games approaching, starting this week’s game with Brownsburg.

“Our team continues to progress.

“We have run the ball well each week, featuring tailback Maurice Campbell. But our other running backs who have rotated in, Jermaine Huddleston and Roberto Rodriguez, also have contributed well.

“The offensive line obviously has a lot to do with our success in running the ball. We are rotating six or seven linemen in most games and we continue to make improvements in that group each week,” said Wimmer. “Offensive guard Titus Martin leads us in pancake blocks. Offensive tackle Luka Skudzik consistently grades out some of our most consistent performers. Center Matt Haffley had an outstanding game last week against HSE. New starters Gavin Laffoon at offensive guard and Chase Bower at offensive tackle have shown improvement each week. Sophomore Charlie Bernhardt has played significantly time as an offensive tackle.”

Campbell has carried the pigskin 102 of Fishers’ 140 rushing plays and has gained 593 yards, a 5.8 average per trip. He has rushed for eight touchdowns.

Wimmer also is pleased with the Tigers’ passing attack.

“Zach Eaton made great decisions most of the night last week and threw the ball with more confidence and authority,” said the coach. “We had no drops among our receivers. Eaton completed 15 passes to 11 different receivers, so we are spreading the ball out to a number of people. Receivers Chris Thomas, Simeon Foster and Jordan Hernandez all made big plays on TD catches and other receivers such as Evan Long, Noah Smyth, Noah Rogers and Kade Orris are also contributing as pass catchers and blockers.”

Eaton is 43-of-76 for 488 yards and four touchdowns. Thomas leads the teams in receptions with 10 for 159 yards and two TDs.

“Defensively, we made some significant improvements in reducing the number of missed tackles,” Wimmer continued. “Three players intercepted passes (Jeremy Chinn, Kevin Tribble and Josh Lloyd), bringing our season total to seven.

“Our kicking game has been solid with regards to coverage. Josh Lloyd has proven to be a very valuable weapon in punting and has flipped the field position advantage numerous times this season,” Wimmer concluded.

Fishers defeated Brownsburg 41-17 last season after being shutout by the Bulldogs 31-0 two years ago.

Brownsburg is a young team with an offense centered around sophomore quarterback Hunter Johnson, running back Toks Akinrigade and receiver Tyler Kirtz. Johnson is 51-of-84 for 631 yards and five touchdowns. Kirtz has 20 catches for 271 yards. Akinrigade has carried 60 times for 784 yards.

The last time Lawrence North defeated Carmel was the 2004 season when a Wildcat team led by current Guerin Catholic coach Tom Dilley knocked off the Greyhounds 23-18.
