A case of varicella, commonly known as chickenpox, has been reported at Westfield High School.

Symptoms to watch for include rash, small fluid filled raised blisters, itching, fever, and tiredness.

Students who have received the varicella vaccine can still get chickenpox. Chickenpox can be mild or severe, and the virus can be spread from person to person through the air, or contact with fluid from the chicken pox blisters.



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# **Major renovation of Community Hospital East**

Community Health Network announced a major investment in its East Region today, which includes a dramatic renovation of Community Hospital East and three new health pavilions in the East Region over the next few years. The 2-phased \$175 million project begins this fall, with an expansion and renovation of Community East's emergency department, nearly doubling the number of patient rooms. The project will also include renovation of the imaging department and the construction of two new health pavilions in the East Region, including one in Beech Grove. The second phase will continue to focus on an outpatient strategy for the region, allowing Community patients to get the right care at the right place, closer to home. During the entire project, the hospital will continue normal operations.

"Community Health Network has been committed to the eastside of Indianapolis since opening its first hospital there in 1956," said Indianapolis Mayor Greg Ballard. "We believe this investment reaches beyond healthcare. It will positively impact the area economically and culturally, fostering a vibrant region with the resources necessary for residents to lead a healthy life."

that, as we like to say, 'We're Here. For Community has developed a strategy for Good," said Bryan Mills, president and CEO of Community Health Network and Noblesville resident. "That means Community will remain firmly rooted on the hospital campus where our story began, with a facility redesigned for the future of healthcare. But it also means we're much more than a hospital. We're striving to provide access to the care East Region residents need in order to avoid trips to the hospital."

The investment in Community's East Region is driven by changes in the way healthcare is provided. When Community Hospital East was built in 1956, it was constructed for the needs of the community at that time, when the emphasis was on inpatient services. Due to changes in the healthcare industry, Community is redesigning the hospital campus and building three health care pavilions in the region to fit the needs of today's patients, with a focus on outpatient services.

In addition, Community Health Network completed a health care assessment of the East Region. Among the health concerns for the region are high incidences of asthma, COPD, congestive heart failure, diabetes, high cholesterol, high blood pres-

"We want our communities to know sure and obesity. Based on these findings, including one in Beech Grove the region that allows patients to better manage their chronic conditions in a primary care outpatient setting.

This next initiative will allow us to improve the health of residents in the region and improve the quality and experience of care, while reducing health care costs."

> Phase one of the project will begin this fall, with changes to Community Hospital East that include:

- A completely revamped and modernized building exterior
- Construction of two new health pavilions,

- Renovation and expansion of the emergency department, adding 17,000 square feet and nearly doubling the number of patient rooms to 64; enlargement and expansion of the ambulance bays; the addition of a new ED entrance on Ritter Avenue
- Renovation of the imaging department to improve functionality and patient flow; updating of technologies
- The refresh of inpatient rooms
- Upgrades to the building's electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems
- Removal of a campus building in 2016 that currently houses security, the kitchen connected to the cafeteria, an inpatient pharmacy and wound therapy services to improve patient flow; these elements will be relocated to other locations within the hospital

Phase two of the major project will include renovation of inpatient surgery suites, the continuing refresh of inpatient rooms and construction of an additional health pavilion in the East Region over the next

Groundbreaking for hospital renovations will take place later this fall.

### Indiana State Police unveils new electronic firearms application process

On Thursday, the Indiana State Police unveiled a new electronic firearms application process that will be in effect beginning Oct. 1.

The new process will remove the "paper" application and after Oct. 1 only electronic applications will be accepted. Firearms permits issued after Oct. 1 will also be hard plastic, as opposed to the paper permit currently issued.

"The new electronic application is designed to streamline the application process for both the applicant and law enforcement officials" said Assistant Chief of Staff Major Mike White, Communication and Information Systems. "This system is designed to be user friendly and will make the process easier for all those involved."

Persons already holding a firearms permit or those obtaining a firearms permit after Oct. 1 will also be able to request a duplicate firearms license or request a change of address via the electronic version.

Firearms permits already issued and persons holding firearms permits will not be affected. Those persons will utilize the electronic version when their permit expires if they do not possess a lifetime permit.

## Eagle Scout project brings 'Little Free Libraries' to Westfield

Westfield's public parks will soon become a place where residents can mix outdoor recreation with reading, thanks to a local Eagle Scout project.

Patrick Hester, Westfield resident and Scout, worked with a group of fellow Scouts and the Westfield Parks Department to build four Little Free Libraries throughout Westfield after his grandmother told him about similar projects in other communities.

"I like the idea of people spending time at the libraries, meeting and talking," Hester said. "We do too much on our phones and electronics."

The libraries are located at the Downtown Westfield Association, Asa Bales Park, Bed and Biscuit Kennels and the Monon trailhead at Greyhound Pass. The goal is simple: people are free to take a book, as long as they leave a book for someone else to read.

The total cost of building the libraries was about \$1,600, with funding being donated by family, friends and neighbors. The rest of the cost Hester made up for by working summers at Conner Prairie, where he pulled wagons for guests of the Symphony on the Prairie series.

Over 750 books were donated to initially stock the libraries. Half of the books located at Asa Bales Park are in Spanish.

For all of his work, Hester still sees this as a community initiative. "I would like to thank all the generous supporters of this project and the members of my Boy Scout Troop 107 for all the help building the libraries and installing them," he said.

According to the parent organization, as of January 2014, the total number of registered Little Free Libraries worldwide was conservatively estimated at around 15,000. For more information on this and other Little Free Libraries projects, visit

# IndyCar adds Brasilia race to 2015 schedule

INDYCAR announced Thursday it is returning to Brazil next season and will sanction a Verizon IndyCar Series event at Autódromo Internacional Nelson Piquet in the capital city of Brasília during the 2015 season. Hulman & Company CEO Mark Miles and Maruska Souza Holanda, President of Terracap, a government-owned company that owns the racetrack, made the joint announcement from Brasília today. The Brasília Indy will be held on March 8,

"We're eager to continue INDYCAR's rich history of racing in Brazil with today's announcement of a Verizon IndyCar Series event in Brasília next season," Miles said. "This event is an instrumental step in the growth of INDYCAR as we continue to execute our strategy of adding race markets and events that drive us forward. We've received a tremendous amount of support from Governor Agnelo Queiroz, the Government of the Federal District - GDF and the Bandeirantes Communications Group throughout this entire process. INDYCAR fans throughout the world are unbelievably enthusiastic about our sport and we're excited to showcase another thrilling event next season."

INDYCAR previously sanctioned a Verizon IndyCar Series street race in São Paulo (2010-13) and CART raced in Rio de Janeiro (1996-2000) on an oval circuit that was also named in honor of Piquet.

"I look forward to having the race in Brasília; it will be a marvelous event not only for developing Brasília but for all of Brazil," Brasília Governor Agnelo Queiroz said while visiting the Indianapolis 500 in May. "The racetrack is located close to downtown and we expect more than 100,000 fans at the event. The racetrack is a permanent facility and it was built in the center of the city in 1973, and we were determined in our improvements that the track should meet the safety and performance requirements for INDYCAR, F1 and MotoGP. We truly hope the event will bring investments and economic development for the whole Central region of Brazil."

Brazilians Tony Kanaan and Helio Castroneves, two of the most successful and popular drivers in the Verizon IndyCar Series, applauded the 2015 schedule addition.

"It's awesome news that we're going back to Brazil next year," said Kanaan, the 2004 Verizon IndyCar Series champion and 2013 Indianapolis 500 winner. "The fans there love INDYCAR and support the race and we also have Brazilian sponsors involved in our sport, so racing in my home country is a no-brainer. I raced at the Brasília track a very long time ago, in the beginning of the 90's, but I remember it being very cool. I can't wait for INDYCAR full-season cars in 2015 with the 2.2-liter, to get back there in 2015."

Castroneves, the three-time Indianapolis 500 winner who recently finished second consecutive Manufacturer Championships in the Verizon IndyCar Series champion- and 33 victories since returning to IndyCar ship behind his teammate Will Power, racing in 2012. With the announcement, echoed Kanaan's sentiments.

"We are living in great times for Brazil," Castroneves said. "The World Cup was coming to Rio de Janeiro in 2016. In between we will see the return of the Verizon IndyCar Series beginning in 2015. Brazilians are very proud of their sports heritage, including motorsports. I know it will be a great event at a new venue for us in the returns for 2015. Carpenter, whose thirdcapital of Brasília, the Autódromo Internacional Nelson Piquet, named after one of our greatest drivers. I love racing in my native country and I hope to be the winner next vear."

Brasília joins NOLA Motorsports Park as the second new INDYCAR venue added to the calendar for next season. INDYCAR officials are currently finalizing the entire 2015 Verizon IndyCar Series schedule, which will be announced later this offsea-
