Get ready for another public transportation plan

Are you ready for another public



transportation plan? Well, Indianapolis mayor Greg Ballard supported by mayors of Carmel, Westfield and Greenwood have one for you.

We haven't heard much about a mass transpor-

tation link to Indy since the legislature adjourned last spring. They passed legislation which would allow voters in central Indiana counties to decide if they want to increase their local option income taxes to pay for wider public bus routes linking all of us with downtown Indianapolis.

Now, a new plan without the necessity to vote on it has been announced. Federal money has been approved for the planning of a super bus, rapid transit route running from from Westfield on the north to Greenwood on the south through Indianapolis with limited stops.

The \$1 million cost of the planning phase is being paid only by taxpayers

Rep. Turner to resign from House after election

State Rep. Eric Turner (R-Cicero) revealed Friday that he indicated interest. intends to resign his seat in the Indiana House following the November general election in which he is a candidate for re-elec-

That resignation comes about assuming Turner wins on Nov. 4 in the 32nd House District which includes portions of north and northwest Hamilton County. His opponent in this fall's election is Robert Ashley, a Tipton Democrat who lists his occupation as a freelance journalist.

If Turner wins in the heavily Republican district, he will resign before the legislature convenes. GOP precinct committeemen in

Dist. 32 will replace him. Thus far no candidates for the seat have

Turner, 63, is president and CEO of T-3 Investments Corporation. He was called before the House Ethics Committee earlier this year after being accused of working to foster legislation that would aid his company, but was cleared of any wrong-doing. Despite being cleared, Turner was removed from of his duties as House Speaker Pro Tempore at the end of August.

Turner says that after leaving the House of Representatives he will join a Christian based organization named EQUIP in Atlanta where he will work in leadership training with pastors and laymen.

Turner has served in the state legislature since 1994; this followed an earlier statehouse term from 1982-86.



Hamilton County Jail being under capacity likely will be gone. The third floor to the Community Service building likely will be needed.

And, although the state will fund some of the change, local taxpayers will need to reach a little deeper in their pockets.

More jail space will be needed.

When Judge William Hughes attended the Aug. 29 meeting of the Hamilton County Commissioner, he said that the state is aware it is putting a heavy burden back on the county and there will be funding coming in the next legislative session. It will, Hughes added, probably be funding for programming as opposed to funding for building space.

Hughes also said, in response to a question from Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt, that approximately 500 people were set to state prisons on a D felon last year, and starting July 1, 2015 they will be sent to the Hamilton County Jail.

"We will have to deal with it here," Judge Hughes said.

A study currently is being conducted by the Commissioners as to where the County can find addition jail cells for short-term (probably about one year) offenders.

Commissioner Steve Dillinger told The Reporter, "It may be finishing the third floor of the Community Service building," he said.

"There is additional space at the Juvenile Center, but laws will not allow us to house together adults and juveniles."

The eventual estimated price tag for construction is \$100 million. But, don't get excited, most of the cost would be paid by federal grants. Of course, usually these federal grants require a "local match" and what that amounts to is unknown at this time.

Would a Democratic administration in Washington really want to put that kind of money into central Indiana to build the first all-electric bus system in the country? Sounds almost like an April Fool story, but it's not, and you'll be hearing more about it in the media in coming days.

Millers finally beat Eagles

Finally, the Noblesville football team has removed its last Hoosier Crossroads Conference roadblock.

After 13 consecutive losses, Noblesville got its first ever win over the Eagles, powering past them 37-13 at the Zionsville field. This one was hardly in doubt, as the Millers led 21-6 after the first quarter.

"You have to want to make plays to make change," said NHS coach Lance Scheib. "And our kids made plays tonight."

But it wasn't all flash and dash that got the Millers their points. Hardy used a good old-fashioned quarterback sneak to get Nobesville a second-quarter touchdown, taking it in from the Zionsville 1.

The defense also got involved. After a back and forth third quarter, the Millers The Millers improved to 2-1 in the pushed the Eagles back to their 6-yard line, then Austin Ginther tackled the Zionsville quarterback in the end zone for a safety.

"The kid that was amazing tonight was "We're disappointed we're not 5-0," said Austin Ginther," said Scheib. "He put two quarterbacks out, did an amazing job and really is starting to play some great football.

"It wasn't pretty at times, but it was physical, and I'm very proud of them."

Hardy and Melloh combined for 260 total yards passing. Hardy completed 10 of 11 throws for 111 yards, while Melloh was 7-of-10 for 149.

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

Jordan Kyriakopoulos puts a stop to Clinton Central at the Blackhawk 1 yard line.



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

Shamrocks win historic first title

Westfield's freshman golfers have been making waves all season.

On Friday, they helped the Shamrocks make history.

The Westfield girls golf team won its first ever sectional title, claiming the Ben Davis sectional at South Grove Golf Club. The Shamrocks carded a team score of 312, edging past defending state champion Carmel by three strokes.

"I couldn't be happier for the girls," said Westfield coach Trevor Neu. "I'm extremely happy for our senior Kaylee Purcell, who's kind of seen our program develop over the course of our four years."

The Greyhounds finished with 315, but are still advancing to regional, as the top three teams advance. Ben Davis got the third spot with a 331. Guerin Catholic finished fourth, but qualified two individuals for the regional; the top three individuals not on an advancing team also earn the right to move on.

Westfield's freshmen may be young, but keep in mind that they have been playing golf for most of their lives. For example, Henderson said she began playing when she was 4

"And I've done tournaments, summer tournaments throughout my life," said Henderson.

With junior tournaments so prevalent, many players know how to deal with pressure situations before high school. This is all leading up to the fact that Henderson won a three-person playoff after she, fellow Shamrock freshman Adrienne Montalone and Carmel's Alyssa Cook all found themselves on top of the leaderboard with 73s.

Henderson drove the green on the first playoff hole, and birdied it to win medalist honors.

"She just does what she does," said Neu.
"It was fun," said Henderson. Many

"It was fun," said Henderson. Many golfers get nervous about a playoff, but she enjoyed it "because it was that good competition."

Henderson and Montalone's scores (Montalone's 73 a personal best) led the way, and freshman Margaret Wentz helped out with an 80. Purcell carded an 86; she has played as an individual at regional for

the Shamrocks, now she gets to play as part of a team. Morgan Baechle had an 87.

After Cook's round, Maggie Rees scored 76. Greyhounds coach Ken Kelly said "they both had to scramble for their scores today," and was happy they didn't give up. Katie Boyer carded an 80, and 'Hounds coach Ken Kelly was proud of how she played.

"I'm not going to get too concerned about how we did as a team score out here," said Kelly. "This is a step along the way for us. Advancing's the most important thing for the team right now.

Both Singer and Baxter (who went all the way to state last year), had 78s, which assured them advancement to regional.

"Marissa Singer and Sarah Baxter played extremely well," said GCHS coach Mark Mathews. "Seventy-eight's a good number, and they both shot 78."

The Golden Eagles had several players who were completely new to golf on the team, and they all enjoyed it.

"I had eight girls, and really only four of them were golfers," said Mathews. The other players had just started playing this year, and Mathews noted that they "worked very hard." Some of the new-to-golf girls had scores in the 90's, which isn't bad at all.

"It was a lot of fun to coach," said
