I had just ended working for the *Indianapolis Star* as a Circulation District Manager and had taken two weeks' vacation time prior to starting work as the Circulation Director at The Noblesville Daily Ledger. Little did I know that those two weeks would not be a vacation at all! On December 31, 1990, there was the New Year's Eve Flood of Noblesville's Old South Side.

50 Years Ago

September 21, 1964

The Carmel Clay School System granted a permit to the Town of Carmel to conduct a series of test drillings for potential water sources.

I grew up on the Old South Side at 850 South 4th Street. Every time I come back to Noblesville, I drive down and sit in front of where the old house was. I look at the tree my father and I planted when I was a small child and think about my parents and growing up there. My father was living at that address and had ended working his life time job at Rand McNally being diagnosed with pre-senile dementia. He called me in the early evening and said, "The police just came by and said to evacuate because White River is flooding!" Kim, I and our two daughters, rushed to his home. He, of course, was very upset and did not want to leave. "I have lived here for 35 years and no flood has ever got into this house!" That was good for a person who had dementia!

He was right as far as I remembered. As a 9 year old child in 1963, I remember standing at our back door and the flood waters getting up as far as the next to the last step before coming into the house, but water never had entered the house before. According the National Weather service the December, 1990, flood was the 4th highest crest of White River to date.

We hurriedly rushed and grabbed some cement blocks my dad had. We put some furniture on blocks and packed what we could. I walked down to the corner of Pleasant Street and 4th Street right in front of Jimmy Atwell's old house and was trying to look down Pleasant Street to the Water and Sewage Plant. Water was up the west edge of South Side Park. Standing there I heard this horrible noise. Then the steel sewage cover blew about 6 feet in the air and water taller than me blew out of the sewage line. Scared me to death! It blew me backwards as I was standing next to it. I am glad the steel cap went the other way! knew then we had a real problem and we were now faced with making major decibetter get out of there!

I learned later that the city had closed the gates to the water coming into the sewage plant and therefore it all blew out of the sewage lines back into the South Side Park

New Year's Day, 1991, our family stood on top of 5th Street between Washington and Pleasant Streets and looked at a huge disaster! Water was up to the top of some houses! My Father's house had water to the top of the windows! Many families of the Old South Side were standing up there looking at all they had in the world destroyed. Many were crying and many just stood there in shock at what had happened. I looked down at my father's house and saw a good amount of smoke coming out of the chimney. I had asked a fireman earlier, "Has the gas been shut off to the area" and he said. "Yes". I then got another long time Noblesville fireman who I knew and pointed to our house. Gary Holt, our neighbor who I grew up with, and was now a heating and air conditioning man rushed and took a boat with a brave Noblesville fireman to my father's home and turned off the gas. I had to describe where the gas meter was because it was under water! So they had to find the shut off under water! No easy task! The Holt's lived two houses down from us and their home was under water as well. The fireman found a way to look into the house and told me, "The water was splashing up against the gas heater that was used

to heat the house." He said, "It was a good thing we got there when we did, the heater was about to blow!" You can imagine the interest then in all the people about the gas and their homes! Finally, the gas was turned off to the area! It could have been an even bigger tragedy than it already was.

The families in our block were long time Noblesville families, Hue and Virginia Holt family, Scoolcraft family, Bob Gentry family, the James Atwell family, and the Bradfield family lived across Pleasant Street across from the Atwell family. On the other side of the park was the Camp family. They as well as many others had lived there as long as I could remember. Across the street was Old South Side Park where all of us played ball and where I learned to play baseball by playing with the older boys. The park and the neighborhood helped me to be the 78th player taken in the free agent baseball draft of 1973 by the San Francisco Giants. It was a tough neighborhood. When the boys in the neighborhood got together to play football it was not touch football! We played tackle and it was some of the roughest football I had seen and I played for Coach Jim Belden at Noblesville High School! Anyone who remembers the Camp, Harber, Bradfield, and Netherly boys would understand what I am talking about! Let's say a few scuffles happened as well. Some of Noblesville's best athletes came from the Old South Side. Many of us were talking about memories on the hill that day of growing up in the neighborhood, the park, and the good and fun times. Interesting stories were told and people were getting reacquainted and hugging and asking about each other. We were all reunited that day by a great tragedy "in the neighborhood." It was now all under water and sions with their lives and their homes.

After the water subsided questions were starting to be asked, like why did the sewer caps just blow off and water go 6 feet into the air? Why was this flood worse than the others where no water had gotten into the houses? What are we going to do now? People were looking to the City of Noblesville and others for help and answers.

For our family we started to clean up as many others on our block. Remember that vacation? Well, it was two weeks of grueling work! Dumpsters were set up in the park. When we were finally able to enter the house it was a devastating experience. Mud everywhere! Also fish and everything else that came from a flooded river and sewage as well! My father's chest freezer was moved two rooms into the living room! Ruined furniture, clothes, beds, and a life time of memories. Do we try to clean this up? What would work and what would not? We had to have an electrical inspection and gas inspection before anything could be turned back on and it was winter in Indiana! Cold, and we were trying to cleanup a major mess without electricity and heat!

The Red Cross was there and I remember the 5th grade teacher at Third Ward School, Bob Harber, on the back of a truck for Red Cross and asking how were and handed me a bucket, mop, water, and cleaner along with some other items. We were taking out loads by hand and throwing

ing out the living room frozen carpet on my back and barely able to get it into the dump-

Finally, we were able to get the gas and electrical back on. You know the hoops that you have to go through. We were first told we would have to hire a private electrician and all kinds of people to get these things back on! Remember this was the Old South Side where many people were hard working folks and living pay check to pay check. Elderly people and some poor people as well.

A FEMA worker came in one day and ask us a few questions as were cleaning up and asked us what it was costing to do the different things and he wrote a check on the spot to help us for which we were very

The city of Noblesville was trying to help as well. They were able to obtain a federal grant to buy up the houses. The deal was they would give you reasonable value for your home based on an appraisal. The city held meetings and of course, many were upset. As the Circulation Director of the Noblesville Daily Ledger, the Ledger had a paper route in the Old South Side area. My wife, Kim, would help us collect for the paper and each month would go to they did not understand what was going on. Would I lose my house? Is the city going to force me to move? I have nowhere to go? I cannot move anywhere else and I am on a limited income and cannot sell the house for what the city is offering? Who do I talk to?

Kim and I went to the meetings representing my father and asked a lot of queswhen the city put out a form asking questions of the residents. In the meeting it was stated, "this was a general questionnaire and would not be used as a determining factor." However, it did end up being used as a determining factor, which really did not sit well with folks.


As I remember there were three questions asked. Would you be willing to sell your house? Yes, maybe, or no. Remem-

things in the dumpsters. I remember carry- would not determine anything. Quite frankly, a neighbor said, "I put no, because I did not know what I was being offered for my house." Made sense to me. I answered mavbe. The form was used by the city to determine the order of who would be eligible to get federal grant money for their house. People were very upset about that! So, if you answered yes, you were eligible first. However, there were other qualifications as well. So, yes first, then maybe, and then the no people. The process should have been handled differently and the city had a guy who was to handle negotiations. I had several conversations with him to keep abreast of what was happening and of course, negotiate. He was generally helpful.

> The city ended up purchasing my father's home. I thought the price was low, but the house had been damaged and we would not ever to be able to sell it to anyone else. Why would someone else buy it? Also, in the selling of the home the agreement between us and the city was, there would be no more housing built there and it would always be a green space. As I remember, the city purchased 44 houses in the first buy and knocked them down. Later more houses were purchased.

This experience promoted me later in 1998 as a member of the Hamilton County the Old South Side. She got to know the Leadership Academy to suggest a study on people and many would cry and tell her affordable housing in the city of Noblesville. 






