CanStruction, Soup Cook-Off highlight...

Noblesville Main Street First Friday

Noblesville Main Street is expanding its October First Friday event, which takes place Oct. 3 and includes many fun, family-friendly activities.

The day begins with the second annual CanStruction at 6 a.m. in the lobby of Church, Church, Hittle and Antrim.

CanStruction is a unique collaboration showcasing a colossal replica of the Hamilton county courthouse made entirely out of full cans and boxes of food and designed and built by a team of architects, contractors, designers, service organizations and clubs. The giant art exhibition will be open to the public on October 3 until 8 p.m. and afterwards on weekdays until October 19, at which time all food will be donated to local food pantries.

CanStruction is a national organization focusing on the fight against hunger using one can of food as a catalyst for change. One can represents the building blocks of massive sculptures. One can proves that every act of kindness makes a difference. Since 1992, CanStruction has contributed over 17.5 million pounds of food to community food banks nationwide. Locally, according to Feeding America, Hamilton County saw a 68 percent increase in clients being served at food pantries in 2014 thus far. The Noblesville Township Trustee Office serves on average of 70 Noblesville residents every Thursday, and approximately 170 throughout the week with toiletries, diapers, bread and sweets. Last year alone, Noblesville Main Street raised

\$7,500 through generous sponsors and donated 5,000 cans and boxes of food to Hamilton county food pantries through this single project.

Drop by anytime during the day to see the CanStruction in progress.

Meanwhile, fall festival activities and Soup Cook-off will run from 5 p.m - 8 p.m. in the downtown area.

The activities include pumpkin decorating, hayrides, food vendors, caboose train rides provided by the Indiana Transportation Museum, free trick or treating for kids at select stores and a free movie, *Monster University*, provid-

Fitter and Faster Swim Tour coming to NHS

The Fitter and Faster Swim Tour presented by SwimOutlet.com will be coming to Noblesville on Sept. 27 for an educational and fun-filled swim clinic.

Local swimmers will learn the essentials of fast, smart swimming from Olympic swimmers Chloe Sutton and Clark Burckle. The clinic will be held from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Noblesville High School, 18111 Cumberland Road.

Sutton is the only athlete to compete for the USA Olympic Team in the pool and in open water. She has five national championship titles and is seen as one of the premier distance freestylers in the sport.

Burckle is a 2012 Olympian and NCAA Champion in the 200 breaststroke. He teaches swimmers the drills and habits he relies on to remain one of the most consistent competitors in the sport.

The Hamilton County Prescription-Drug-Take-Back Day will be held from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, Sept. 27. Locations in Hamilton County will be: Hamilton Heights High School Parking Lot, Riverview Health Parking Lot and Marsh Supermarket at State Road 37 and 146th Street.

The importance of this event is being underscored by its being held all across the United States on the same day. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

Per current government information, Drug-Take-Back programs for disposal of expired, unwanted, unused, medications is a good way to help en-

Meet Carolyn Johns, a... 25-year Riverview volunteer

Volunteering has always been important to Carolyn Johns. Everywhere Johns has lived, she's volunteered. She kept that going when she moved back to Noblesville, donating her time to the Riverview Health Auxiliary Gift Shop. Johns began volunteering there in 1989, and is still going strong 25 years later.

"I enjoy the gift shop, meeting the people, working with them, helping them," said Johns, who became manager of the shop in 1990, not too long after joining Riverview's volunteer family.

Johns is a strong advocate of volunteering, and is inviting members of the community to join her. They'll have the opportunity on Thursday, when Riverview Health conducts its Volunteer Fair from 1 to 4 p.m. The fair will take place at Riverview's main campus, inside entrance 9.

Johns said the fair is "an excellent opportunity for new people to get involved within the hospital. It's an ideal situation for retirees. It's open to men and women. "

Johns has seen first-hand the work that volunteers do, both as one and as a patient. She is a two-time cancer patient and said "the hospital has been a big supporter and a big help" during that time, as it was for many other people.

The Auxiliary Gift Shop is non-profit, with the money earned going back into the hospital. It has pledged and given over \$1 million to Riverview over the past 20 years. Money is pledged for whatever is needed and the project at the time.

Johns said the shop has pledged \$40,000 for the new MRI that Riverview wants to purchase. The shop has already given the first \$20,000, with the remainder of the money to be given next April.

"The gift shop is something," said Johns. "I've been in retail prior to retiring. I just feel strongly about volunteering."

Johns said the gift shop was on the lower level when she first started, then moved up to the second floor. It will soon move to a new location at the end of the atrium, allowing for a larger space.

Those that attend Thursday's Volunteer Fair will be able to speak with current volunteers and meet with Susan Beckwith, Riverview Health Manager of Volunteer Services. Applications and on-site interviews will also be available.

The FBI National Academy is a 10-week professional course of study for U.S. and international law enforcement leaders that serves to improve the administration of justice in police departments and agencies at home and abroad and to raise law enforcement standards, knowledge, and cooperation worldwide.

Its mission is "to support, promote, and enhance the personal and professional development of law enforcement leaders by preparing them for complex, dynamic, and contemporary challenges through innovative techniques, facilitating excellence in education and research, and forging partnerships throughout the world."

Participation is by invitation only and attendees represent less than one percent of the law enforcement community. Attendees are leaders and managers of state and local police, sheriffs' departments, military po-

lice organizations, and federal law enforcement agencies. Participants are drawn from every state in the union, from U.S. territories, and from over 160 international partner nations.

During the academy, officers take undergraduate and/or graduate college courses at the FBI Academy located at Quantico, Virginia. Courses include the following areas: law, behavioral science, forensic science, understanding terrorism/terrorist mindsets, leadership development, communication, and health/fitness. Officers participate in a wide range of leadership and specialized training, and they share ideas, techniques, and experiences with each other, creating lifelong partnerships that span state and national lines.

Lt. Ginnan is a 13-year veteran of NPD and currently serves as a shift commander assigned to the Patrol Division.

Road remains open...

Pavement work on Field Drive starts today

Pavement rehabilitation will resume on Field Drive beginning today, Tuesday, Sept. 23 and last for three days (weather permitting).

The roadway will remain open to traffic, however lane restrictions will be in place and delays should be expected. Construction activity will be limited during student arrivals and departures at the adjacent Noblesville Schools.

Also continuing on Tuesday, crews will also finish up paving on Herriman Drive and residential streets in Wellington Northeast, then move to pave 191st Street from State Road 37 to Promise Road.

Grand Park announces development of fieldhouse

Soon Grand Park will be able to host an even broader range of sporting activities year-round. A group of local investors have committed to develop a 56,000 square foot indoor facility for basketball and volleyball with an estimated value of \$6 million. The facility will be called the "Grand Park Fieldhouse" and will feature six full-sized courts along with locker rooms, offices and a café focused on healthy eating options. Sand volleyball courts are also being considered.

"We're excited to expand the offerings of Grand Park with the development of this new indoor facility. It's a testament to the viability of this economic development

endeavor that it is already attracting interest from the private sector to join in its continued success," said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook.

Strong demand has been forecasted for this type of basketball and volleyball facility from the local area and across the country for leagues, camps and tournaments. The investor group developing the Grand Park Fieldhouse includes entrepreneur, Andy Card and other local investors. Rodney Sinn will be Vice President of Operations.

In addition to hosting basketball and volleyball events, the Fieldhouse is in negotiations with a third party sports

rehabilitation company, which will allow athletes of all sports to utilize the facility.

"We're thrilled to be involved and to bring an even grander scale to Grand Park with the addition of the great Indiana tradition of basketball," said local entrepreneur/investor Andy Card.

It is estimated that the Fieldhouse will create 100 jobs and bring tens of millions of dollars into the local economy. The facility has a tentative groundbreaking date of April 2015 and opening date of January 2016. It will begin its zoning application over the next several months.

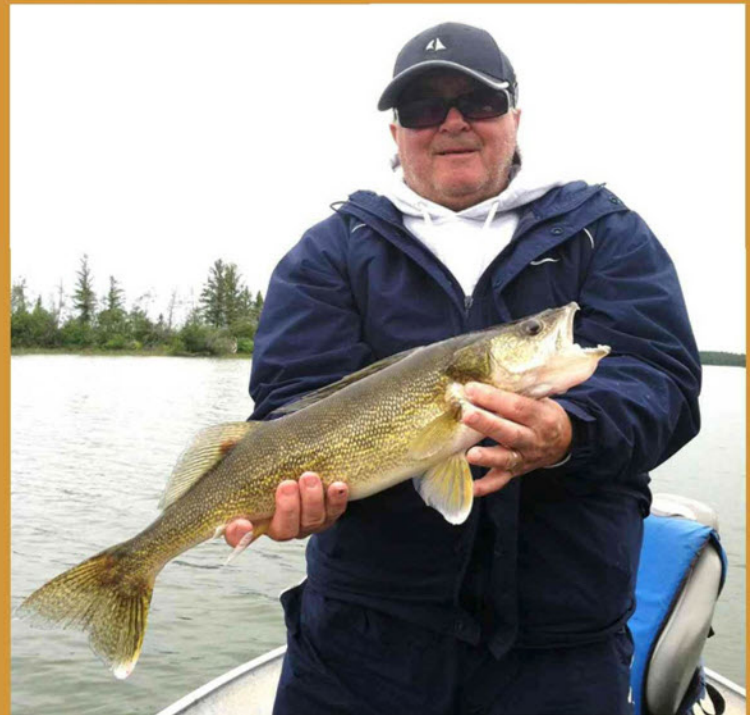

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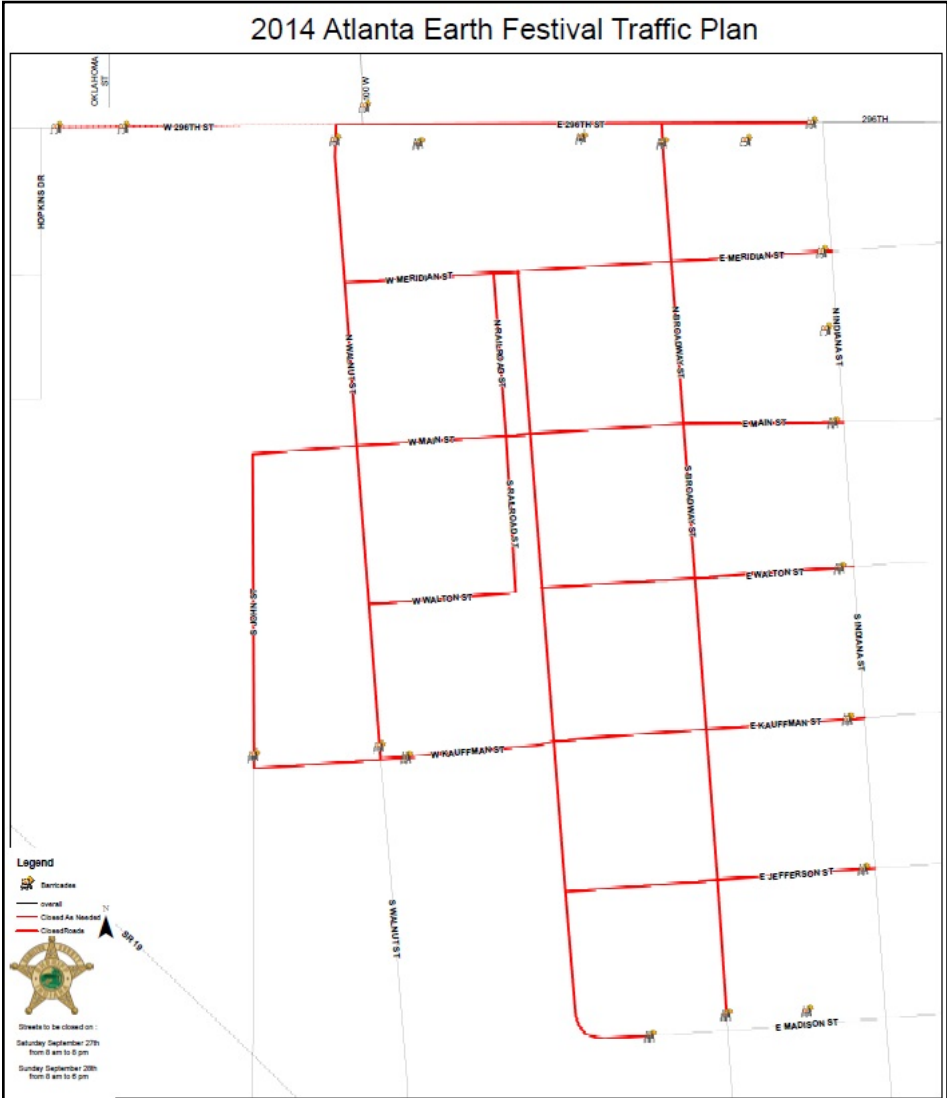

Street Closings in Atlanta on Sept. 27-28 for New Earth Festival

The annual Atlanta New Earth Festival takes place this weekend, September 27 and 28th. During the course of the event, crowds of 50,000 or more are expected. While Sheriff deputies will be in the area for security and traffic control, congestion and delays may be experienced along State Road 19, 296th Street, and other roads. In addition, many streets in Atlanta will be closed to vehicular traffic on Saturday and Sunday. Vendors will be setting up during the day on Friday so although streets will be open during that time, please be aware of additional traffic in the area.

Gas leak closes 146th Street

Due to a gas link break in the area of 146th Street and Oakridge Road, 146th Street was closed Tuesday between Adios Pass and Saddleback Drive. Traffic was open at Clay Terrace but there were significant backups and delays in the area and motorists were encouraged not to travel on 146th Street west of US 31. **Money Magazine ranks Carmel  
No. 3 in “Best Places to Live”**

Carmel, Indiana was once again ranked at the top of the list by *Money* magazine on Monday when it released its bi-annual Best Places to Live in America” survey. Two years after Carmel was ranked #1 in the country, the city came in at #3 on the list this year, behind McKinney, TX, and Maple Grove, MN. The news comes on the heels of last week’s survey by 24/7 Wall Street, which ranked Carmel #12 against all American cities with more than 65,000 residents.

The *Money* magazine survey looked at 781 American cities with populations between 50,000 and 300,000 focusing on data driven by more than 50 factors, including the local economy, projected job growth, the local housing market, schools and access to health-care. That list was pared to 35 top scoring cities, which were then visited by reporters who looked for a “sense of community and other intangibles.”

The article noted positive attributes such as Carmel’s use of roundabouts for traffic flow, its vibrant performing arts, 50 corporate headquarters, new developments in the central core and quality of life aspects such as Carmel’s system of multi-use paths.

“This is more great news for Carmel, which continues to attract national attention from major media outlets for our quality of life,” said Mayor Jim Brainard. “I recognize it is tempting to discard these kinds of surveys, but the truth is they can help a city in its’ economic development efforts. In fact, I hope my phone starts ringing tomorrow from CEOs in New York to entrepreneurs in California looking for a Midwest home. Those are calls we like to get.”

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# Millers rise to seventh in football poll

The Noblesville football team is in the midst of a good season so far, and coaches around the state are taking notice. The Millers have risen to No. 7 in the latest Class 6A Indiana Football Coaches Association poll. Last week Noblesville was ninth, moving up after its history-making win over Zionsville last Friday.

"I am excited for our parents, student body, and community, these groups take great pride in the state rankings," said Miller coach Lance Scheib. " Our players have done a great job of understanding why we have had a good start, they continue to focus on the process and not the results but understand the way they practice each week has a direct reflection of how we play on Friday. The team has the same goal as they have had each week, which is to end the week 1-0.

Noblesville is 4-1 so far this season, and the Millers have achieved that record while playing a rather difficult schedule. Noblesville's only loss was a narrow 16-13 defeat to Fishers, which happens to be the No. 6 team in 6A.

The Millers also got a win over Westfield, which is ranked No. 8 in 5A. Noblesville will play another big game this Friday, as it travels to Lawrence North to take on Bishop Chatard, the No. 3 team in 4A.

The Tigers also have a 4-1 record, with their only defeat at the hands of Pike, which is tied for 10th in 6A. That was a close game too, 26-22. Fishers will play at Avon this Friday; the Orioles are receiving votes in this week's poll.

As for the Shamrocks, they've also had a challenging schedule. In addition to Noblesville, Westfield took on Southport, the No. 5 team in 6A. The 'Rocks (3-2) will travel to Fishers on Oct. 10.

The No. 1 team in 6A is Carmel. The Greyhounds moved up from No. 2 after Ben Davis dropped a 28-21 game to No. 3 Warren Central. The Giants are now ranked second,

while the Warriors remain third. Carmel faces Ben Davis on Oct. 3, with Warren the following week. The 'Hounds, unbeaten at 5-0, have already played Pike.

Guerin Catholic is receiving votes in the 3A poll. The Golden Eagles are 3-2 with a tough schedule as well. They've defeated 2A No. 3 Lafayette Central Catholic and had narrow losses to Terre Haute South, No. 5 in 5A, and Martinsville, which received a vote in 5A.

It won't get any easier for Guerin: This week it plays Greenwood, which is receiving votes in 4A. That's followed by games with 3A No. 2 Brebeuf Jesuit and the aforementioned Chatard.

Hamilton Heights has played two ranked teams so far: Noblesville and Lewis Cass, which is No. 7 in 2A. Sheridan opened with Western Boone, now rated No. 10 in 3A, and will close with Tri-Central, which is seventh in 1A. The Blackhawks host North Knox on Saturday; the Warriors are receiving votes in 1A.

Marian's Price named NAIA National Defensive Player of the Week

Marian University sophomore defensive back Eric Price was named the NAIA National Defensive Player of the Week after leading the Knights to a shocking 31-18 victory over top-ranked and defending national champion Grand View University on Saturday, the national office announced on Monday.
