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



So close, yet too far away....

'Hawks fall in 14-13 thriller

So close, yet so far away.

That was the story for Coach Bud Wright's Sheridan football team as the Blackhawks dropped a 14-13, homecoming

thriller to North Knox Saturday afternoon.

A foot here, a foot there and Sheridan might have come away with the victory. An inch or two on one situation would have made the difference.

"We were in the red zone three times and couldn't take advantage of the situation," Wright said after Sheridan fell to 3-3 on the year.

After two very good football teams battled head-to-head throughout the day, the game was decided after Sheridan scored and moved within a point, 14-13, with 2:37 remaining.

Wright decided to go for two, but his offensive team didn't get on the field in time and the Blackhawks drew a five-yard penalty. Still going for two, quarterback Garrett Chesney was stopped short of the goal line.

"I probably should have kicked the extra point," Wright second-guessed himself.

The 24-second clock on the field wasn't started, but the referee claimed he counted off 24 seconds after blowing his whistle to put the ball in play

put the ball in play.
"I don't think he did," Wright said. "I think he was guessing."

But, it was a game of near misses for Sheridan all afternoon long.

Neither team scored in the first quarter. North Knox broke the scoreless contest by scoring with 9:25 left before halftime.

Sheridan's first trip into the red zone came after North Knox missed out on a scoring bid of its own. The Warriors moved to inside Sheridan's 20 but then was stopped on a missed field goal. The Blackhawks then drove the ball down field, and on a 36-yard

pass from Garrett Chesney to Austin Hoover reached the seven-yard line, only to run out of time following a run by Hoover to the

"Hoover was within inches of scoring," Wright said.

So, North Knox went to halftime with a

7-0 lead.

Midway through the third quarter, North Knox gambled on a fourth down play at mid-field. Sheridan's defense stopped the Warriors short, and the Sheridan offense came back with a touchdown march. In the drive, Wright twice gambled on fourth down and won, once on a Garrett Chesney to Jacob Chesney pass and then on a Garrett Chesney to Hoover pass. Hoover scored from the two with 1:22 left in the quarter and Homecoming Queen (crowned at halftime) Katie Hybarger booted the extra point to tie the game at 7-7.

As the third quarter ended and the fourth quarter began, Sheridan had another missed scoring opportunity. The Blackhawks got to within the 10, but were stopped and Hybarger was just short on a 32-yard field goal attempt.

North Knox broke the 7-7 tie by scoring with 5:01 left in the game and kicking what proved to be the winning point.

That's when Sheridan made its final bid, scoring on a 17-yard pass from Garrett Chesney to Hoover, but then falling short on the two-point try.

The game was, as billed, a ground battle between Sheridan's Hoover and North Knox's Jordan Meurer. Hoover carried the pigskin 38 times for 131 yards. In the game, Sheridan had a total 49 rushes for 134 yards. Meurer carried 41 times for 207 yards. In the game, North Knox had 48 carries for 217 yards.

Sheridan will return to Larry Wright Stadium for its final regular season home game when facing Tipton on Friday.
