Increasing land value could be a hazard for golf courses

Are Hamilton County golf courses threatened by the increasing value of their own land? Certainly marginal golf operations in the Carmel area have been tempted to sell to developers as land values soar.

Will the loss of courses become a trend as the demand for development land spreads through the county? It probably depends on whether golf generates enough money to maintain the acreage for recreational purposes.

On October 31 the Mohawk Hills course at 126th and Keystone will close for good. It has been in business for nearly 40 years. Earlier this year the Sunrise Golf Club on Westfield Blvd. south of 106th Street, now closed, was sold.

In both cases owners of the land have sold to developers and plans are being drawn for various uses, mostly upscale residential home sites. Developers are paying top dollar and scurrying to find more open ground including what little farmland is left south of 146th Street.

Until this year there were eight golf courses in Clay Township alone. Developers have been eyeing these tracts. Several years ago Woodland Country Club sold a valuable corner of its golf course for commercial development at 116th and Keystone, then bought less valuable ground and reconfigured its course.

And, in Delaware Township about three years ago the relatively new Britton golf facility was closed. The valuable tract on Ind. 37 at 131st Street was sold and has become the Fishers Marketplace development.

Some golf clubs appear to be in no danger. Private clubs are doing well since the end of the recession, and not

likely to want to give up their property. Those open to the public are more dependent on direct player revenue.


But, the public facilities owned by municipalities such as Forest Park and Fox Prairie are no doubt safe. In recent years the Brookshire club at Carmel was sold by private owners to the city partially because Carmel wanted to head off talk of a sale to developers. Brookshire is now a public municipal course.

There is some good news for golfers who are also looking for a new home on the golf course. A new course is being planned near the intersection of U.S. 31 and Ind. 38 on the historic Lindley farmstead. It will be an 18 hole course surrounded by upscale housing.

This type of development appears to be the future of golf in the county because the lure of the golf course sells expensive surrounding residential lots and that revenue can offset the cost of the links.

Motorcycle crash on Hazel Dell Parkway claims life of Fishers man

At approximately 8:48 p.m. on Friday night, Carmel Police responded to an accident involving a motorcycle in the roundabout at Hazel Dell Pkwy and 126th Street. Officers arrived and found one vehicle involved in the crash.

Based on preliminary information, it appears that a black 2013 Harley-Davidson motorcycle operated by David S. Gray, 54, Fishers, was traveling southbound Hazel Dell Pkwy at 126th Street. The driver collided with the curb on the north side of the roundabout. During the collision, the driver was ejected from the motorcycle.

The driver of the Harley-Davidson Motorcycle died at the scene as result of his injuries.

Accident reconstructionists from the Carmel Police Department are investigating the crash. The intersection of Hazel Dell Pkwy and 126th Street was temporarily closed during the investigation.

Auto Smart is located at 1348 S. 6th Street. If you want to go there, just drive south on 6th Street until you run out of street.

“I’ve been here since March,” Wise told The Reporter. “I’ve lived in this area for about 14 years.”

Wise’s home is located next to his business, which is nice for making appointments with customers when his shop isn’t open. His regular business hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and from 8-2 on Saturdays. He is closed on Sundays, except for appointments.

Wise’s business is growing.

“We get customers from all over Noblesville and from towns like Anderson and Lapel,” Wise said. “Our rates are good;

\$65 per hour. Others charge as much as \$90 to \$120 per hour.”

Wise expanded by contracting with 24 agencies which need emergency road assistance 24 hours a day.

“That keeps me busy,” he said..

“Starting Wednesday, I will have a U-Haul outlet here; a place where people can come and rent U-Haul trucks and trailers,” Wise added.

Wise hadn’t heard of the City’s neighborhood meetings, but he does have a couple of ideas about improvements in the Southwest Quad.

“More things for kids to do,” Wise said. “There’s a park, but not much there. Not much playground equipment, or anything.

“The City should do something about the houses in which people have moved away and left vacant. The grass is growing, and it makes the neighborhood look bad.”

zle words. I knew what an elk was but never heard of a wapiti.


We appreciate our differences. He introduced me to Greek and Cuban food. I introduced him to my homemade chocolate cream pie.

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# Do not let your heart fail

“And let us not grow weary while doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not lose heart. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all, especially to those who are of the household of faith.” Gal 6:9-10 (NKJV).

Eph 2:10 tells us we were “created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them.” None the less, some days it is so hard to walk the road that is laid out. We know as Christians we are to be light to the world. Light in a World that hates us. And we are told not to be surprised by this by our Lord Jesus who said “**If the world hates you, you know that it hated Me before it hated you. If you were of the world, the world would love its own.**” John 15:18-19 (NKJV). Yet we get there, discouraged, tired, feeling used and abused. I overheard the conversation of a co-worker ridiculing, in a very ugly way, a Christian woman whom she had heard took a stand and had not let her child read the Harry Potter Books. This Christian lady had actually taken the time to rewrite the stories replacing the objectionable occultic references that the steadfast Christ follower knew God would consider abhorrent in order that her child could read the story. It made my heart sad, this in a workplace that touts itself to be nothing but tolerant of all. While some believe the book is harmless fantasy others believe that this is exposure to witchcraft and occultism that we as Christians are expressly told to not dabble in - Deut 18:10-12 “There shall not be found among you *anyone* who makes his son or his daughter pass through the fire, *or one* who practices witchcraft, *or a* soothsayer, or one who interprets omens, or a sorcerer, or one who conjures spells, or a medium, or a spiritist, or one who calls up the dead. For all who do these things *are* an abomination to the LORD (NKJV). This is reinforced in 2 Cor 6:10-16, Lev 19:31, Lev 19:26 and in Eph 5:11. While I am not convinced that

a compromise by re-write was the best course of action the open ridiculing of Christian faith and values is apparently an acceptable activity in this commonly named environment of tolerance. The mood of the day – it’s fine if you’re a Christ Follow, just keep it to yourself. With news of ‘The Satanic Children’s Big Book of Activities’, a coloring book that is reportedly being disseminated in Florida’s Orange County public schools, and Satanists holding a black mass in of all places, the Civic Center in Oklahoma City it’s hard not to get discouraged (coincidence or not – just 5 days later a woman is beheaded in the same city). We may slip into doing with a wrong heart – doing out of a feeling of obligation instead of minding the spiritual things of God and doing because we want to out of love and obedience. “For you, brethren, have been called to liberty; only do not *use* liberty as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another. For all the law is fulfilled in one word, *even* in this: “*You shall love your neighbor as yourself.*” Gal 5:13-14 (NKJV). We are reminded that “whatever a man sows, that

he will also reap. For he who sows to his flesh will of the flesh reap corruption, but he who sows to the Spirit will of the Spirit reap everlasting life” Gal 6:7-8 (NKJV).

When it comes to weariness we are not alone. Elijah, whose name means “The LORD is my God”, had just called down the fire of God on Mount Carmel exposing Baal as a false god and defeating the prophets of Baal. He prayed in the rain that ended the three year six month drought. Then upon the fatal threat from Jezebel he became afraid and ran. Elijah cried to God “*It is enough! Now, LORD, take my life.*”. No, God does not take his life. He sends an angel with food, drink and comfort to strengthen Elijah. Elijah goes on and cries to God how he has been “*very zealous for the LORD God of hosts*” and he was the only one left who had not forsaken God. God’s response - I have “*seven thousand in Israel, all whose knees have not bowed to Baal*” 1 Kings 18-19. Just as Elijah was not alone, neither are we Christ followers. Our strength is in God. His Spirit indwelt in us is a river of strength enabling us to endure and continue with the work of “doing good”. So, what is the “doing good” we are to be doing. This is our fruit and the fruit of the spirit in us. It’s being patient, being loving, it’s our acts of kindness & service, It’s our preaching & teaching, our praying and our caring for one another. It’s tending to the fruit of the spirit which is “love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control” Gal 5:22-23 (NKJV). Look back at the opening scripture. You will notice it tells us do good “especially to those who are of the household of faith”. There is a reason we are instructed to gather together in fellowship. Heb 10:24-25 (NKJV) says “let us consider one another in order to stir up love and good works, not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together”. We gather to comfort and edify each other (1 Thess 5:11), to share one another’s burdens (Gal 6:2) and with preaching and teaching we renew our minds learning “what *is* that good and acceptable and perfect will of God” Ro 12:2 (NKJV).

Scripture tells us that “**because lawlessness will abound, the love of many will grow cold. But he who endures to the end**

**shall be saved**” and in Matt 24:12-13 (NKJV) we are told to “**take heed to yourselves, lest your hearts be weighed down with carousing, drunkenness, and cares of this life, and that Day (the day the Lord returns) come on you unexpectedly**” Luke 21:34 (NKJV). Know weary ones that there is a prize to reap when we persevere and run the race to obtain it (1 Cor 9:24). As the Apostle Paul wrote “let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares *us*, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of *our* faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.” Heb 12:1-2 (NKJV). We have confidence “...that He who has begun a good work in you will complete *it* until the day of Jesus Christ” Phil 1:6 (NKJV). Life is fleeting, James 4:14 tells us it is but “a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away”. In the end we will wake to judgment and He tells us “**Do not marvel at this; for the hour is coming in which all who are in the graves will hear His voice and come forth--those who have done good, to the resurrection of life, and those who have done evil, to the resurrection of condemnation**” John 5:28-29. Yes, the evil will get their comeupins and the promised rest is coming. “Then I heard a voice from heaven saying to me, “Write: ‘Blessed *are* the dead who die in the Lord from now on.’ “Yes,” says the Spirit,’ that they may rest from their labors, and their works follow them.” Rev 14:13 (NKJV). Notice the words “their works follow them” – works do not go before you “For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; *it is* the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast.” Eph 2:8-9 (NKJV).

Guard your heart, do not let it fail so you too may say “I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Finally, there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day, and not to me only but also to all who have loved His appearing.” 2 Tim 4:7-8 (NKJV)

## ‘Hawks fall in 14-13 thriller

So close, yet so far away.

That was the story for Coach Bud Wright’s Sheridan football team as the Blackhawks dropped a 14-13, homecoming thriller to North Knox Saturday afternoon.

A foot here, a foot there and Sheridan might have come away with the victory. An inch or two on one situation would have made the difference.

“We were in the red zone three times and couldn’t take advantage of the situation,” Wright said after Sheridan fell to 3-3 on the year.

After two very good football teams battled head-to-head throughout the day, the game was decided after Sheridan scored and moved within a point, 14-13, with 2:37 remaining.

Wright decided to go for two, but his offensive team didn’t get on the field in time and the Blackhawks drew a five-yard penalty. Still going for two, quarterback Garrett Chesney was stopped short of the goal line.

“I probably should have kicked the extra point,” Wright second-guessed himself.

The 24-second clock on the field wasn’t started, but the referee claimed he counted off 24 seconds after blowing his whistle to put the ball in play.

“I don’t think he did,” Wright said. “I think he was guessing.”

But, it was a game of near misses for Sheridan all afternoon long.

Neither team scored in the first quarter. North Knox broke the scoreless contest by scoring with 9:25 left before halftime.

Sheridan’s first trip into the red zone came after North Knox missed out on a scoring bid of its own. The Warriors moved to inside Sheridan’s 20 but then was stopped on a missed field goal. The Blackhawks then drove the ball down field, and on a 36-yard

pass from Garrett Chesney to Austin Hoover reached the seven-yard line, only to run out of time following a run by Hoover to the one.

“Hoover was within inches of scoring,” Wright said.

So, North Knox went to halftime with a 7-0 lead.

Midway through the third quarter, North Knox gambled on a fourth down play at mid-field. Sheridan’s defense stopped the Warriors short, and the Sheridan offense came back with a touchdown march. In the drive, Wright twice gambled on fourth down and won, once on a Garrett Chesney to Jacob Chesney pass and then on a Garrett Chesney to Hoover pass. Hoover scored from the two with 1:22 left in the quarter and Homecoming Queen (crowned at halftime) Katie Hybarger booted the extra point to tie the game at 7-7.

As the third quarter ended and the fourth quarter began, Sheridan had another missed scoring opportunity. The Blackhawks got to within the 10, but were stopped and Hybarger was just short on a 32-yard field goal attempt.

North Knox broke the 7-7 tie by scoring with 5:01 left in the game and kicking what proved to be the winning point.

That’s when Sheridan made its final bid, scoring on a 17-yard pass from Garrett Chesney to Hoover, but then falling short on the two-point try.

The game was, as billed, a ground battle between Sheridan’s Hoover and North Knox’s Jordan Meurer. Hoover carried the pigskin 38 times for 131 yards. In the game, Sheridan had a total 49 rushes for 134 yards. Meurer carried 41 times for 207 yards. In the game, North Knox had 48 carries for 217 yards.

Sheridan will return to Larry Wright Stadium for its final regular season home game when facing Tipton on Friday.

Westfield's task is very easily defined. Win two games and win the championship. The Shamrocks' two remaining HCC games are with Avon and Fishers.




Girls golf regionals...

‘Hounds, Royals win; Westfield gets first state berth

It's been a year of changes in Indiana high school girls golf, and that was apparent once Saturday's regionals were finished.

The big change is the emergence of new teams in the state meet conversation. None has made a bigger splash than Westfield, which qualified for its first ever state meet after placing second to Carmel (a team that's about as "old guard" as you can get) at the Roncalli regional at Smock Golf Course in Indianapolis.

The Greyhounds scored 312, with the Shamrocks carding 318. At last week's Ben Davis sectional, Westfield beat Carmel by three strokes. Obviously the rivalry will continue at the state meet, which takes place next Friday and Saturday at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel.

Alyssa Cook and Maggie Rees, two seniors that have been leaders forever, each had 74s, and that led the way for the Greyhounds. Cook was the second-place individual and Rees third. Madison's Amanda Dettmer won medalist honors with a 70.

"That was one of our goals was to finish first, so that we could get in a good position going in the finals Friday and Saturday," said Carmel coach Ken Kelly. "We've worked real hard to this day."

As for the Shamrocks, their fantastic freshmen were 1-2-3. Cailyn Henderson scored 76 (giving her fifth place), Margaret Wentz had 77 and Adrienne Montalone carded an 80.

"We're really excited," said Westfield coach Trevor Neu. "Our goal was to come down here and compete for first and win, but our main objective was to advance. Survive and advance, that's what I preached to the kids last week. Get to state, and then hopefully shoot two good rounds and be in the mix with everything."

The lone senior on the team, Kaylee Purcell, almost went to state as an individual last year. Now she gets to go with her entire team.

"Oh my gosh, it's really exciting," said Purcell. "It's exciting to move on. It's definitely our goal this year. So to be that close, I'm glad that we moved on."

Guerin Catholic got an individual through to state, with Marissa Singer's 76 making her one of the five advancing individuals. Singer was fourth overall. Her teammate Sarah Baxter, a state qualifier last year, carded 83.

Singer was very happy to be advancing to state.

"I started off well," said Singer of her round. "I got one-over on the front nine." She was able to remain consistent on the back nine. Singer said being consistent "is definitely one of my priorities."

Over at the New Castle regional at Westwood Golf Club, some different names crashed the party. To be sure, Hamilton Southeastern was in the mix, rising to the top to win the championship there.

The Royals held off Columbus North, another "old guard" team that nonetheless qualified for state for the first time in four years. In third place was New Palestine, a team that had never made it to state before, but finally broke through this year. The Dragons played well, giving Southeastern some nervous moments during the front nine.

But the Royals didn't get rattled - in fact, they carded the same score on both the front and back nines. The sum of 155 and 155 equals 310 and a trophy.

"New Pal and shot 152 on the front side or somewhere around there," said HSE coach Steve Guenin. "We were pretty pleased with the way we played, it was just

people were playing better than us. They did a really nice job holding things together."

The New Castle regional is arguably the toughest of the five regionals. Example: The Royals' Kat Leighty won the Anderson sectional medal with a 76. Leighty was two strokes better at Westwood with a 74 - and tied for fifth. Cathedral's Betsy Werner was the low medalist with a 68.

Ciara McAree helped HSE out with a 77, while Phoebe Cha carded a 78.

New Pal's first-ever trip to state came at the expense of Fishers, another team that was bidding for an inaugural place at the big meet. The Dragons got the Tigers by one stroke, 324-325, with Fishers relegated

to fourth place. Katie Brooks led the Tigers with a 79.

Noblesville had an incredibly consistent day: Hadley Moritz scored 81, the Millers then had three players with an 83, and their fifth score (Emily Padgett) was an 85. The reward was a fifth-place finish with a 330. That sadly brought an end to Noblesville's great streak of 10 consecutive years of qualifying for state.

Hamilton Heights' Caitie Gehlhausen, a sophomore playing in her first ever regional, wound up in a playoff for the fifth individual to advance to state after her round of 77. The playoff went to Greenwood's Hannah Cross, but expect Gehlhausen to be back again next year.

"It was obviously not my year, but I still have two more years left," said Gehlhausen.

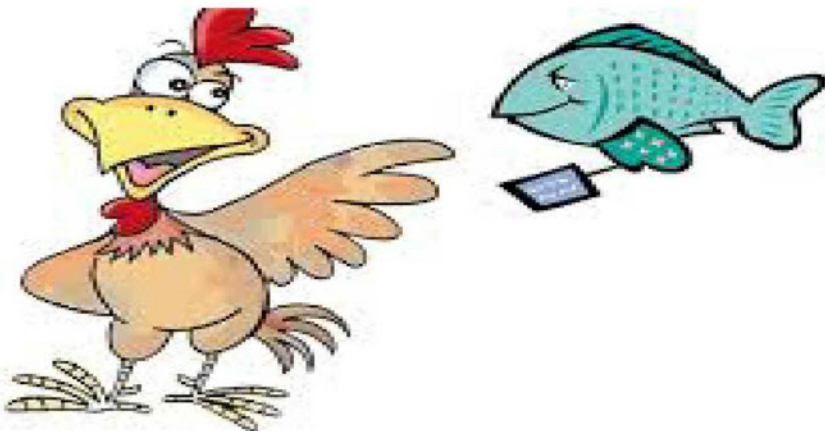
