Noblesville Schools...

“Agreement has been reached”

Noblesville Schools today announced that an agreement has been reached on the 2014-2015 teacher contract with the Noblesville Teachers’ Forum.

(The Hamilton County Reporter broke the story in its Friday edition).

Highlights of the agreement, as listed by Noblesville Schools, include:

*The adoption of a salary table to streamline the approach to compensation and to address places where compensation was not fully competitive.

*Salary increases based on performance for teachers that are evaluated as effective or highly effective.

“Our goal is to attract and retain outstanding teachers,” said Dr. Beth Niedermeyer, Superintendent of Noblesville Schools, in a press release on Friday. “To accomplish this, we’re focused on building a climate of respect and providing competitive compensation. We appreciate that teachers are the key to our success and want to thank the Forum for working together with us on this important initiative.”

In a statement to The Reporter on Thursday, Debbie Marcum, President of the Teachers Forum, wrote:

“Noblesville schools and the Noblesville Teachers’ Forum have agreed to a contract for the 2014-15 school year. Administration and the Forum worked collaboratively to arrive at an agreement that includes language changes and a salary schedule. The Forum appreciates the cooperation shown at the negotiations table and the ensuing contract.”

The contract is currently pending formal school board approval and will be reviewed at a board work session, open to the public, on Tuesday, Oct. 7.

**Closed caucus
could determine
two House Reps**

Most people in Hamilton County probably think their state representatives in the legislature will be elected by county voters this fall. That’s what usually happens every two years.



But, in an odd turn of events nearly half the county’s population will likely be represented next year by representatives chosen in a closed caucus of Republican precinct committee members.

State Representatives Eric Turner and Steve Braun have both said they will resign from the House after the November election. Since Turner’s Dist. 32 and Braun’s Dist. 24 are heavily Republican areas, they will likely be re-elected. Then, following their resignations, precinct committeemen will choose their successors.

Although any citizen of a district is technically eligible to run in the precinct caucus, most folks don’t even know the process let alone have any support of committeemen. Political insiders, therefore, are most likely to be running and elected. And, the local GOP in recent years has kept all caucus activity closed.

All this is entirely legal, supported by both major parties and has been done before in similar situations around the state. But, it still leaves most of the public out of the loop. Most of the voters, not aware of the process, do not object.

Dist. 32 has been represented for many years by Turner, a Cicero resident, who got in hot water earlier this year for allegedly trying to guide legislation that would benefit the industry of which he is a part. An ethics committee found no wrongdoing, but he is resigning to take a job out-of-state, and thus the pending vacancy.

The district is composed of a big part of Washington Twp, all of Adams Twp, and most of Jackson Twp. In this county plus areas in Tipton, Madison and Grant

Living the “American Dream”...

Godby Furnishings is “40”

Jim Godby is living the American Dream. “Only in American could it happen,” Godby agreed.

From a young boy who worked the family farm in Sheridan; made straight A’s at the high school, and was one of the stars on basketball team during the coaching era of Joe Hobbs, Jim Godby, with son Jeff at his side, has built one of the largest chain of furniture stores in the Midwest.

Godby Home Furnishings is celebrating its 40th anniversary. Godby Furnishings has stores in Carmel, Noblesville/Fishers (on 14th Street), Avon and a second store in Noblesville which just recently opened in the former Ace Hardware building.

It’s an ever-growing business. Recently, Godby’s lost a Westfield location to the U.S. 31 expansion. But, a gigantic warehouse remains near that location, and in their spare time Jim and Jeff talk about expanding again, this time in the Greenwood area.

“We’re circling Indianapolis,” said Jim Godby.

Godby laughs when asked if his American Dream started during his boyhood days in Sheridan.

“Never,” he said. “Never did I think all of this would happen.”

As a boy living in the small town of Sheridan, as was the situation with many farm family kids, Godby enrolled at Purdue University, where he studied Agricultural

Economics. While at Purdue, he got married and Jim and Karen Godby in 1964 had their first son, Jeff. In 1964 he graduated from Purdue with distinction and because of his R.O.T.C. training he enlisted in the Army as an officer assigned to a trucking company.

Interesting, because today Godby Home Furnishings has a fleet of 15 trucks which deliver furniture throughout Hamilton County and Central Indiana.

Jim Godby’s life went another direction following his enlistment in the Army. Jim moved his young family to Fort Benning, Georgia for a short time before notified he would need to move the family back to Indiana. Godby’s company was moving out, and no one knew where these troops were going, or when they would be back.

“All we knew was we were getting on a plane to San Francisco,” Godby recalled. “Once there, we boarded a troop ship and sailed for 21 days to what eventually became Cam-Ron Bay, Vietnam.”

The unit was the first boat over and Godby and his mates spent the first few months in tents on the beach. His company unloaded supply ships and built a runway for planes to land.

Godby spent a year away before returning to Hamilton County.

When he returned, Jim took a job with Swift & Company in Frankfort. He later had jobs with Wayne Feeds in Middle Fork and Wakarusa. During that period of time the Godbys had two more children, Nikki and Jason.

It was also during that period of time that Godby’s life changed again, and was the beginning of the furniture store giant he is today. He lost his job at Wakarusa. He accepted a position with a friend’s business in Warsaw. That business was a furniture store. And, after three years working in the Warsaw furniture store, Godby decided to move out on his own.

“I approached my father about loaning me \$5,000 to start a furniture store in Sheridan,” Jim said. “He said it was the craziest thing he had ever heard, and that I would be throwing away my college education.”

Godby then approached his father-in-law, who agreed to co-sign a loan at the bank.

Godby Home Furnishings was opened in 1974 on White Avenue in Sheridan.

If it didn’t work, Godby had a backup plan of driving a dump truck part time and helping his dad farm.

Of course, it did work.

Jeff Godby opened a location in Lebanon and learned the business before, after 14 years, he joined his father as vice-president of the company.

“When Jeff came with us, that is when the company took off,” Jim Godby said.

From that little location in tiny Sheridan started by Jim and Karen Godby, the business now employs over 100 people in Central Indiana and has sales in excess of \$20 million per year. Jim is proud that

Godby Home Furnishings has turned a profit every month that it has been in operation.

Godby also talks about his pride that all of company’s management team is from Sheridan and that dollars are pumped back into local communities through the company’s \$4 million pay roll.

Today, Godby Home Furnishing sells an average of \$70,000 to \$80,000 worth of furniture, daily.

The Godbys attributes their success to a couple of things. The huge warehouse in Westfield gives customers what they want and when they want it. Also, the Godbys talk about doing things the old-fashioned way.

“We come to work every day,” said Jim. “Hard work has made this business what it is today.”

Jeff agreed with his father.

Jim Godby has never forgotten his Sheridan roots. He is a big supporter in Veteran’s Park and he always supports youth sports and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes in all of the towns that Godby Home Furnishings does business.

Indiana pumpkin crop is flourishing

Mild weather in the spring and early summer coupled with sufficient rain in August allowed this year's Indiana pumpkin crop to flourish.

"In general, the pumpkin crop looks good and there should be plenty of pumpkins for everyone," said Dan Egel, a Purdue Extension plant pathologist.

Growers planted pumpkins on time this year because it was not too cold or wet in the spring. Also, the wheat harvest didn't run late - a late harvest can delay planting since many growers plant pumpkins over wheat residue.

August brought an amount of rain suitable for pumpkin flowers to develop into healthy pumpkins.

In the few pumpkin fields that did not produce the intended yield, Egel said the problem was usually that those areas got too much rain, killing vines before the fruits could develop. In addition, fields that remained too wet after pumpkins had fully grown sometimes caused rotting. This happened more in fields with inadequate drainage.

Egel had this advice for consumers in picking out a pumpkin:

"In general, if you like the looks of the pumpkin, take it home," said Egel. "However, it might be a good idea to avoid pumpkins with soft spots or brown, shriveled handles."

Egel said pumpkins with full, green stems indicate the pumpkin was harvested recently.

counties. Whether anyone from Hamilton County will seek election in the caucus remains to be seen.

Dist. 24 has been represented in recent years by Steve Braun who lives in Zionsville. The district includes significant portions of Clay and Washington townships plus southeast Boone County. Braun is resigning to become the state commissioner of Workforce Development. At least one Clay Township resident is known to be interested in seeking the seat.

So, the method of selection of new representatives is legal, but is it fair to the people? Well, one can argue it is not. But, there is a certain advantage. The political parties in these situations are likely to select someone who is knowledgeable in local government and someone who will not embarrass the district or the party. Let's hope that's what happens here.

Kincaid House moving to permanent home this morning

The historic Kincaid House will be on the move this morning, as Wolfe House and Building Movers will transport the house to its new home. Between 9:30 and 11 a.m., the Kincaid House will move from its current location on Kincaid Drive in Fishers, following a route along 106th Street, to 11100 USA Parkway, its permanent home. Everyone is invited to watch as Wolfe House and Building Movers move the historic Kincaid House 0.4 miles from the corner of 116th Street and Kincaid Drive to 11100 USA Parkway. The Town of Fishers will close a portion of 106th Street on the east side of Interstate 69. The Kincaid House weighs approximately 250 tons and is 36 feet wide by 35 feet deep. Because the road is only 26 feet wide, the house will hang over the road by about five feet on each side during the move process, necessitating some temporary sign removal and tree trimming. The house in its move, evenly distributed, weighs less than a full tractor trailer on the road.

Matio rushes for 291 yards...

Royals run past Millers

The weather is turning, and it's starting to look like Hamilton Southeastern's football season is also turning.

The Royals won back-to-back games for the first time this season, grinding out a win over Noblesville 16-7 at Hare Chevrolet Field Friday night. It was the first football game of October, and it felt like it: Chilly, damp and a little windy.

"Obviously it comes at a great time for us," said Southeastern coach Scott May. His team is now 3-4 for the season, and 2-3 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. Noblesville fell to 2-2 in the conference and 4-3 overall.

Both teams trudged through the first half, with the defenses doing most of the work. The only points came in the second quarter, when HSE's Brady Hoffman kicked in a 33-yard field goal. That gave the Royals a 3-0 halftime lead.

Southeastern got into the end zone in the third period, with Aaron Matio scoring on a three-yard run. Matio set up his touchdown with a 65-yard breakaway on the previous play.

"He had a great night," said May of Matio. "Offensive line obviously blew some holes open."

The Millers responded quickly, getting the touchdown back in less than 90 seconds. Brian McLean caught a 20-yard pass from Carl Hardy, and Andrew Little's kick cut the Royal lead to 9-7.

But there was no stopping Matio. The junior carried the ball 39 times, rushing for an incredible 291 yards. He reached the end zone a second time with 3:20 left in the third quarter, this one from four yards. Hoffman made the extra point kick.

The Millers had to deal with a strong HSE defense, which limited them to 79 yards rushing. Hayden Stinnett carried 17 times for 69 yards.

"It was a game of missed opportunities," said NHS coach Lance Scheib. "Then we couldn't get our mojo going against their offense, and we just couldn't get off the field a little bit. It wasn't for a lack of playing hard, it wasn't for a lack of wanting to win the game. Our kids have got to find a way now to fight through this."

Kerfoot puts on a first-half show as....

Heights win conference tilt

In Hamilton Heights’ 21-13 Mid-Indiana Conference, home field victory over Northwestern Friday evening, Jesse Kerfoot carried the football 16 times in the first half gained 169 yards and scored two touchdowns.

After re-injuring a shoulder in that first half, Kerfoot was out of action the final two period.

As Coach Mitch Street put it, that produced one of those “next man up situations.”

Nathan Roth was that “next man” and he carried the ball 14 times for 72 yards.

Nothing, really, slowed the Huskies as they moved to 5-2 overall and 4-1 in the conference.

“I thought we played a complete first half, the most complete half we’ve had this season,” Street said after the game. “Kerfoot isn’t very big, but he is strong and fast and he ran the ball well tonight.”

Street said, following the game, he didn’t know as yet how serious the injury was to Kerfoot.

Hamilton Heights never trailed, but the Huskies never really bolted away from a good Northwestern team. The Huskies led 14-0 at halftime and 14-7 after three quarters. A 39-yard pass from Ethan Jones to Sterling Weatherford on the first play of the fourth quarter settled the issue.

Hamilton Heights was hampered by penalties. A dozen were called against the Huskies, totaling 105 yards.

“I don’t know what was going on out there,” Street talked about those penalties. “We don’t normally commit that many. I think the most we’ve had in any game has been six; five and under most games. But, whatever was happening, we need to clean it up before our next game.”

Northwestern threatened first, a drive which stalled at Heights’ 28-yard line when the Huskes recovered a Tiger fumble.

After a scoreless first quarter, Heights scored on the first play of the second quarter on an 18-yard run by Kerfoot. Cameron O’Malia kicked the extra point.

The Huskies drove 80 yards in seven plays to add a big, big touchdown before halftime. Kerfoot had runs of 12, 32 and 21 yards before finally going 11 for the TD. O’Malia again added the extra point, giving his team a 14-0 advantage with just 1:02 remaining before halftime.

Northwestern cut the lead to 14-7 in the third quarter, but Heights got what proved to be the game winning TD when Jones hit Sterling Weatherford for the 39-yarder on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Northwestern scored again with 3:50 left in the game, but Sterling Weatherford blocked the PAT attempt, leaving the Tigers eight points shy at 21-13.

The Huskies will continue their conference chase next Friday in their final home game of the regular season, visiting Western.

'Hawks run past Tipton, 53-16

After 50 years of coaching, Hall of Fame mentor Bud Wright still is able to throw something new at an opponent. That's what he did last evening as Sheridan unloaded on Tipton, 53-16, at Larry Wright Stadium in Sheridan.

Well, maybe not something new. But, something new Tipton hadn't seen from the Blackhawks this season.

"We went to the power set," Wright said. "That's something we hadn't used yet this season. I don't know, I guess it caught them by surprise."

The power set resulted in 350 yards of rushing in 49 ground plays.

Wright said the final outcome should have been more.

"I think the referees made up their mind that we were not going to score any more,"

said the coach. "With seven minutes left in the third quarter, we only ran nine plays the rest of the night. We ran eight plays and were flagged on six of them. I tried to tell them I wanted to put our reserves in, but I never got a chance."

Avon and Fishers now each have just one conference loss. Westfield has two.

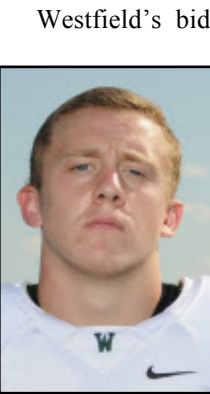
Last evening, the visiting Orioles quickly unloaded on Westfield, jumping to a 16-0 advantage in the first quarter.

The score remained 16-0 until Westfield got a touchdown in the third quarter. Avon matched that score with a touchdown of its own in the fourth frame.

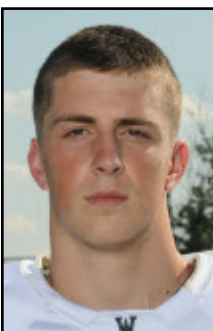
Avon's defense did a number on Westfield's offense, holding the Shamrocks to just 140 yards rushing and only 80 yards passing.

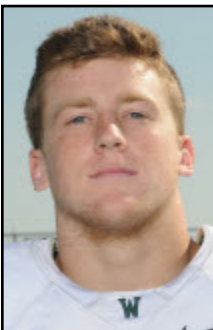
Through the air, Pepiot was 10-of-26 and had one pass interception.
