## Many famous people have called Noblesville home

From the Olympic gold medalist David Boudia to the storied pioneer William Conner, Noblesville has been home to some famous sons and daughters who received national attention. And, many of today's residents probably don't know what famous and infamous folks have lived



"among" us.

Most folks have at least some knowledge of William Conner, the frontier fur trader, farmer, army scout, land speculator, politician and founder of Noblesville. Conner settled in the area in 1802 and lived here until his death in 1855. His home is the centerpiece of the widely known Conner Prairie Pioneer Settlement. Conner Street and Conner School carry his name. But, how about Rex Stout? He was born in Noblesville in 1886 and became a well known mystery writer. His fictional stories were adapted for television and made a run on national network TV in the 1970s. Stout's father was editor of the Noblesville Ledger when Rex was born, but the family moved to Kansas when he was young. Stout tried many types of employment and made a fortune when he invented a bank accounting procedure. But, his true passion was writing which he pursued until his death in Connecticut in the 1975. Or, Norman Levinson who became a nationally known fashion designer, credited by some for inventing the woman's pantsuit. Levinson was born into a prominent Noblesville family in 1900. He eventually moved to New York, operated under the

name Norman Norell, and became a top clothing designer in the mid-20th century. Other members of the Levinson family started the Harry Levinson clothing stores which were popular in central Indiana for many years and created the Levinson Scholarship Fund for deserving Noblesville High School graduates. Then there were folks like William Dudley Pelley. He came to Noblesville in 1940 after organizing the national Silver Shirts organization prior to World War II. It will labeled a pro-Nazi organization which

Thursday evening the City of Noblesville will hold a second neighborhood meeting focused on the Southwest Quad area of the city. The meeting will be held at the Gathering, located at 675 Walnut Street. Starting time is 6 p.m. All are invited. Hopefully, it will be as successful as the first meeting, which was held on Sept. 11. A third and final meeting is scheduled for Nov. 13, also at the Gathering. “We were very encouraged by the attendance and the participation at the first meeting,” said Cindy Benedict, Community Engagement Manager, Mayor’s Office.. “All of this is part of a process to create strong partnerships with the city, neighbors and other organizations to keep this important neighborhood energized and healthy,” said Benedict. Notice of the meeting has been mailed to residents in the Southwest Quad, as was the process with the first meeting. “We’re trying to reach everyone,” Benedict said, “but we’ve gotten several back because of incorrect addresses. We’re trying to solve that problem.” The outcome of the first three meetings will be a revitalization plan that neighborhood leaders can use to strengthen this historic and vibrant area of Noblesville. “As with the last meeting, the session will be very interactive and is designed to garner and create community conversations,” said Benedict. “There was a lot of energy brought at the first meeting,” she added. The City describes the Southwest Quad as an area bordered by Maple Avenue on the north, 8<sup>th</sup> Street on the east, Christian Avenue on the south and White River on the west. “On Thursday we will be reviewing the ideas brought up at the September meeting and will continue developing goals and action teams to implement the goals,” Benedict said. Benedict said the second meeting will be somewhat different than the first inasmuch as those who attend will be divided into eight different groups, looking at five particular areas that came up at the last meeting. They are: \*Neighborhood and downtown connections. \*Neighborhood investment. \*Mobility and streets. \*Environment and beautification. \*History and community engagement. The principal goal the City has stated is to bring together data, community input, and best practices to develop a revitalization plan that sets this neighborhood on the path towards being a vibrant community.

Noblesville School Board approves teachers contract

The Board of School Trustees of Noblesville Schools at a Tuesday evening work session school board meeting approved the teachers' contract for the 2014-15 school year. Teachers on Friday had voted to ratify the contract. “Countless hours of discussion was put into reaching this agreement,” said Noblesville Board President Patrick Berghoff. “I commend both groups for the work they put in.” Debbie Marcum, President of the Teachers Forum, said teachers were “very pleased with the new contract. “We were able to bring back the salary scale, and this will allow us to retain our teachers,” Marcum told the Hamilton County Reporter. The State three years ago ended how teachers were paid, which before that time was based on years served. That left lots of teachers unhappy and uncertain about their future. Marcum said the new contract will give teachers a better knowledge of their financial future and will give schools information on just how much they will need to budget for teachers.

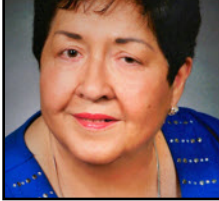

incurred the wrath of President Franklin Roosevelt. Pelley was arrested after Pearl Harbor and held during the war on charges of sedition.

Pelley, who also was a onetime Hollywood screenwriter, returned to Noblesville after the war and started the Soucraft Publishing Company which produced spiritualist tracts among other material. The onetime leader of the large and controversial Silver Shirts died in relative obscurity in Noblesville in 1965.

On the lighter side was Lucky Teeter, a Noblesville native, who entertained millions of Americans in the 1930s and 40s with his stunt car shows. After starting his daredevil driving locally, he organized the Hell Drivers and went national.

Unfortunately, his luck ran out in July of 1942 when he was back in Indiana doing a benefit stunt driving show for armed forces at the State Fairgrounds. He died in a stunt just days before he was to enter the army himself.

Helen Worley, also a Noblesville native, made her fame and fortune in Milwaukee and Chicago as the owner of a house of ill-repute known as the Sunflower Inn. She and her associates entertained the famous and infamous including Al Capone during the 1920s and 30s.

After retiring from the business she wrote a book entitled Dirty Helen reviewing her career. The book is found in the local library and a beer brewed locally and known as Dirty Helen is named in her honor.

The most widely known political leader to come from Noblesville was Richard Roudebush. A decorated veteran of World War II, he served in the U.S. Congress for 10 years in the 1960s, then was named head of the U.S. Veterans Administration.

Roudebush returned to Noblesville in retirement, and was honored when the Roudebush Veterans Medical Center was named for him. He died in Noblesville in 1995.

And, bursting on the country music scene in the 1990s was Noblesville native Steve Wariner. He was so popular for a time that his name was placed on his hometown city limit signs.

Besides music, Wariner showed he was an artist. His watercolor of the county courthouse can be found in several locations in Noblesville.

And, finally, David Boudia who did his country proud in the 2012 Olympics by winning gold in diving has lived in Noblesville. Although not a native, he graduated from high school here and is claimed as a resident-hero. David went on to graduate from Purdue University and resides in the Lafayette area.

So, there, in case you didn't know are some of the personalities who have made it big in one way or another well beyond the boundaries of their Noblesville hometown.

# Tom Bader retiring as Recycle Center volunteer

Tom Bader, major volunteer of the Recycle Center in Noblesville, is retiring after 15 years of physical labor as a volunteer operating the main source of revenue which has kept the Center opened. Bader and 10 other volunteers including 2 women have worked feverishly behind the Senior Center. Bill Matlock, Vice President, and Bobbie Bibbins, senior herself, get up very early in the morning to fold newspapers donated by senior or left in the recycle bins. John Landy, president, is hosting a reception for Bader on Saturday, October 11th, from 1:00 o'clock to 4:00 o'clock p.m. to pay Bader homage for his 15 years of dedicated volunteer service.

Bader has operated the forklift and crusher. He loads the trailers to remove the goods brought in by residents and makes certain that cardboard boxes are cut down and boxed

as they draw the most revenue. Matlock and Bibbins fold donated newspapers which run second in money derived which must be put in trailers and sold. There are bins which are sorted and trash discarded such as cans, plastic, glass, etc. It is an endless job even in inclement weather.

Bader was raised in Ann Arbor, Michigan and his father was a professor of English at the University of Michigan. His mother was a housewife until Bader and his brother left and then his mom became a middle-east art expert for the University's Art Museum, as well as a silversmith. After college Bader worked for Indiana Bell as a telephone switching engineer and grew into high tech with Ameritech, Southern Bell and AT&T, retiring in 1999. "I then became active in church and other venues including restoring antique cars" said Bader. He married his wife, Claudine of 50 years and became a member of the

Leadership Committee in White Water Presbytery for his church, First Presbyterian of Noblesville. "My church work led me into joining the Gideons International where I have been doing scripture distributions and speaking in churches around Noblesville," stated Bader.

In 1999 he began dropping off Christmas boxes and discovered 2 men working on bailing a huge amount of cardboard. "I thought "these people needed assistance so I started helping." He says it was not all fun driving a forklift in 15 degree below zero wind-chill and in the snow and heat but it has been rewarding."

At 71, Bader is not stopping to work but sees a future not yet determined but certainly in enjoying his family of 4 children, 11 grandchildren and 2 great grand children." He has had many blessings and has certainly given back to the community.

## 4-H National Youth Science Day... Hamilton County youth to send Rockets to the Rescue

Today, youth in Hamilton County will design and build an aerodynamic craft designed to deliver a payload of food to natural disaster victims as part of **4-H National Youth Science Day (4-H NYSD)**, the world’s largest, youth-led science experiment. The activity, called *Rockets to the Rescue*, was designed by University of Arizona Cooperative Extension and selected as the winning experiment for the seventh annual **4-H NYSD**. Youth all over the nation, and some globally, will also conduct the same experiment at hundreds of local events taking place in all 50 states.

The national rallying event for 4-H Science, **4-H NYSD** is an interactive learning experience that gets youth excited about science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM), and spotlights the many ways millions of youth are engaging in 4-H Science programs year-round.

Hamilton County youth will conduct the *Rockets to the Rescue* experiment at Hamilton North Public Library, 209 W. Brinton St, Cicero, IN, 46034 from 5-7 p.m. and will respond to a fictional scenario: A natural disaster has left people without food on a remote, isolated Pacific island, and the youth have been asked to build a rocket that can be launched from the mainland, travel over the ocean and deliver high-energy food to the population. The experiment combines two 4-H issue areas—science and food security—and incorporates aerospace engineering concepts to help youth design a rocket out of everyday materials, including recyclable two-liter bottles, cotton balls, pipe cleaners, rubber bands and a protractor.

“Our nation is falling behind other countries in the fields of science, technology, engineering and math,” Kathleen Bohde, 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator. "However, participation in high-quality positive youth development programs like **4-H NYSD** offers youth and adults the opportunity to engage in scientific exploration and work together to build the next generation of our nation's scientists, engineers and mathematicians."

A recent longitudinal study conducted by Tufts University, *The Positive Development of Youth: Comprehensive Findings from the 4-H Study of Positive Youth Development* revealed 4-H programming does indeed get young people more connected to science. According to the study, 4-H’ers are *two times* more likely to participate in *science programs* during out-of-school time (grades 10-12) and 4-H girls are *two times* more likely (grade 10) and nearly *three times* more likely (grade 12) to take part in *science programs*, compared to girls in other out-of-school time activities.

The national sponsors of 2014 **4-H NYSD** are Lockheed Martin, Hughes (HughesNet Satellite Internet) and John Deere. Other partners include Dow Agro-Sciences, NBC Learn, Afterschool Alliance, and NASA who have all collaborated on this event.

# Fishers hosts Westfield

Host Fishers and visiting Westfield will go into a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game Friday at Reynolds Tiger Stadium pretty much with the same goal.

Only one can come away happy.

That goal is to win the conference championship. Or, at least tie for the conference championship.

Fishers currently is 3-1, tied for the top spot with Avon. Westfield is 3-2 and still in the race is Noblesville at 2-2.

Should Fishers defeat Westfield, the Tigers then would need only to beat conference-winless Zionsville the following week, the last week of the regular season, to be assured of at least a tie for first place. In order for Fishers to win outright, Avon would have to lose to Zionsville or Noblesville.

Should Westfield defeat Fishers, the Shamrocks still could tie for the championship, if Avon loses a game.

“Our goal is to continue to improve and fight our way past a good Fishers team on Friday,” said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert.

“Even though we lost last Friday to Avon I like the focus our team has shown and how we’ve practiced the past few weeks. I know we are getting better,” Gilbert added.

“This is a HCC game that will have a great effect on our hopes to win a conference title and to keep Westfield’s hopes for a share of the title alive,” offered Fishers coach Rick Wimmer.

“Our last three games with Westfield have been very competitive games,” Wimmer said.

That’s true. Fishers won 48-45 in three overtimes last year; 40-30 two years ago and 19-14 three years ago.

But, looking a little deeper into the series, Fishers has owned Westfield. The Tigers have defeated the Shamrocks seven consecutive times. Westfield’s only victory in the series was a 32-20 decision eight years ago, Fishers’ first season of varsity football.

“Westfield is a team that gives you a lot to prepare for,” Wimmer continued. “They are very multiple in their defensive fronts, coverages, stunts and blitzes.

“Offensively, they have good balance with their play-calling; a hard-nosed running back (Elvin Caldwell), who can be difficult to tackle; and a multitude of receivers that do a good job of spreading the ball around. Their quarterback (Ryan Pepiot) is a first-year starter who is completing about 58 percent of his passes and is leading the conference in passing yards. Their kicker (Nick Dowd) is one of the best kickers in our league.

“We will need to play nearly mistake free and with great effort to get a win,” said Wimmer.

The game will match the passing leader of the conference (Pepiot with 1,348 yards) against the conference’s second-leading rusher in Fishers’ Marcus Caldwell (165 carries for 1,056 yards). The conference leading rusher is Brownsburg’s Toks Akinribade with 1,162 yards.

“Fishers is great as usual,” said Gilbert. “They are extremely well-coached. Great technique and great at what they do. I think Maurice Campbell is arguably the best player in the league. Their offensive line is fantastic at blocking the zone. They are always solid on defense. They probably have the best secondary in our conference.”

Campbell has rushed for 16 touchdowns. Fishers’ leading receivers are Simeon Foster with 16 catches for 255 yards and Chris Thomas with 15 receptions for 296 yards.

For Westfield, Pepiot is 95-of-169 yards through the air. He has thrown seven TD passes and has been intercepted seven times. Caldwell has rushed for 11 touchdowns. Westfield’s leading receivers are Ben Lotfalin with 33 catches for 399 yards, Milo Beam with 22 catches for 463 and Nick Henderson with 17 receptions for 288 yards.

Westfield’s Matt Crupi has 34 tackles and 57 assists, the top defensive numbers in the conference. Fishers’ Joel Wilson has six sacks, No. 1 in the HCC.
