'All of this is part of a process to create strong partnerships with the city, neighbors and other organizations to keep this important neighborhood energized and healthy," said Benedict.

The onetime leader of the large and controversial Silver Shirts died in relative obscurity in Noblesville in 1965.

On the lighter side was Lucky Teeter Noblesville native, who entertained millions of Americans in the 1930s and 40s wrote a book entitled Dirty Helen reviewwith his stunt car shows. After starting his daredevil driving locally, he organized the Hell Drivers and went national.
