Goals for the Southwest Quad

The crowd was larger than the first gathering at the Gathering a month ago. So large in fact that Noblesville City announced that the third and final neighborhood meeting for the Southwest Quad will be held in larger facilities in the Community Room of the Noblesville Trustee's office. That meeting is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 13 at 6 p.m.

The folks in the Southwest Quad are excited with the attention it is getting from the City.

It's an area bordered by Maple Avenue, S. 8th Street, Christian Avenue and White River.

It's one of Noblesville's oldest areas, and one of the city's most historic areas.

It also is an area, arguably, which for years has been overlooked by city government.

What were presented last night were ideas brought up at the September meeting and to continue developing goals for the future.

when he failed to signal his turn as required by state law. A deputy then observed Brandenburg's vehicle weaving as it travelled down the roadway. The deputy stopped the vehicle and, after a roadside investigation, detained Brandenburg for a certified chemical test. After submitting to the test, Brandenburg was arrested and charged with Operating While Intoxicated and Per Se Operating While Intoxicated with a blood alcohol content greater than 0.15.



Indiana Code prohibits campaign signs on state highway right-of-way

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) reminds all Hoosiers that campaign signs are prohibited from federal and state highway right-of-way according to Indiana Code 9-21-4-6. INDOT personnel are required by state law to remove all unauthor-

ized signs within the state right-of-way. INDOT personnel will remove campaign signs and other illegal signs from right-of-way—per IC 9-21-4-6—as they are encountered in normal highway maintenance activities. Crews may also remove a specific sign if it presents an immediate safety risk, such as being too close to the roadway or creating a sight obstruction. Campaign signs placed off the right-of-way will not be removed.

The right-of-way areas which must remain "sign-free" include:

•All interstates and their interchanges; and

- •All intersections where at least one local, state or federal road intersects with a state or federal highway; and
- All rights-of-way paralleling federal or state highways
- •Where right-of-way is not clearly marked, it may be estimated as the back of the ditch, to the fence line or up to utility poles.

Removed signs will be taken to the nearest INDOT subdistrict office, where they will be kept until after the election. Campaign signs may be claimed by the owner between 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, except for holidays.

Gov. Pence, health officials conduct webcast on Ebola preparedness

On Thursday, Governor Mike Pence joined leadership of the Indiana State Department of Health, including incoming State Health Commissioner Dr. Jerome Adams, for a webcast with local healthcare providers on Indiana's preparedness for Ebola.

"At this time, we have no reported cases of Ebola Virus in Indiana. However, there is no doubt that the Ebola Virus has been a cause for international concern and is a growing concern here in the U.S., now more than ever," said Pence. "In Indiana we have successfully managed emerging diseases before, most recently, the H1N1 Pandemic Flu in two-thousand nine and the first U.S. case of Middle East Respiratory Syndrome earlier this year. The professionalism, dedication and medical expertise demonstrated by our public health and healthcare community during these and other outbreaks gives me confidence that we are prepared to effectively respond to Ebola in our state, should we get

Indiana State Police awarded COPS Anti-Methamphetamine Program Grant

The Indiana State Police has been notified, on behalf of Attorney General Eric Holder, that the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Community Policing Services, has awarded ISP funding under the 2014 Anti-Methamphetamine Program Grant (CAMP). ISP has been awarded \$567,000 in federal funds over the next two year grant

All funds awarded under CAMP must be used to investigate illicit activities related to the manufacture and distribution of methamphetamine. Funds awarded in this program shall be used exclusively for investigative purposes to locate or investigate illicit activities, including precursor diversion, laboratories, or methamphetamine traffickers.

State Police Meth Suppression Section, Indiana led the nation last year in the number of meth lab seizures with a total of 1,808 seizures taking place throughout the state, a 4.7 percent jump from the 1,726 incidents reported the previous year.

Indiana State Police Methamphetamine Suppression Section (MSS) Commander, First Sergeant Niki Crawford, said that the Indiana State Police is honored that its grant submission was fully funded from the grant proposal submitted. "Since the formation of the state's full-time methamphetamine suppression section in 2006, MSS personnel have been working to educate residents, community leaders, business owners and others," Crawford said. City of Carmel assesses storm water monthly fee to property owners starting November

To ensure the protection of our waterways and management of storm water runoff, the City of Carmel created a Department of Storm Water Management and is assessing fees to all Carmel property owners beginning Nov. 1, 2014. Storm water fees will be included on Carmel Utility bills to save on administrative costs. The Department of Storm Water Management is separate from Carmel Utilities.

The Department of Storm Water Management's primary responsibilities will be to oversee and manage storm water infrastructure within Carmel City limits, help protect waterways and ensure the City meets the increasing requirements from the Federal Clean Water Act.

Storm water fee structure for Carmel property owners is listed in the table below. Historically, the City of Carmel has absorbed the expense of storm water management.

As Carmel grows, so do the costs to maintain storm water infrastructure and compliance with the unfunded mandate from the Federal Clean Water Act. The City budget no longer is able to bear these costs while maintaining all the essential services provided to the community.

In Indiana, 80 communities, including Fishers, Westfield, Plainfield, Brownsburg and Greenwood, have already created departments to manage storm water and charge fees to property owners.

Carmel favored, other county teams will make noise

The conventional wisdom at this Saturday's Noblesville cross country sectional is that Carmel is the favorite.

That doesn't take much brain power to figure out. The Greyhounds are not just sectional favorites on both the boys and girls sides, but are also state meet contend-

All of the Hamilton County teams will compete at the Millers' Chanquapin Ridge cross country course this Saturday. It's the first time in a while that the sectional will take place on a Saturday, after years of being a Tuesday occasion.

Saving that the Carmel girls are a state championship "contender" is rather benign. The Greyhounds are actually favorites to win the whole thing, using their famous depth to dominate this season.

how good Carmel? is IndianaRunner.com has a list of the season's Top 100 times, and the 'Hounds have 12 athletes listed. Carmel usually shuffles its state tournament line-up as it progress through October, and with that depth, don't expect anything any different in the 2014 post-season.

The Harris twins, senior leaders for Carmel, have the Greyhounds' best times -Haley Harris ran an 18:00.1 at the Valkryie Invitational on Sept. 20, with Kelsey Harris clocking in at 18:02.5 that day. Also at the Valkryie, Maddie Dalton had the state's best freshman time, with a race of 18:23.2. Stacy Morozov, also a junior, is in there with an 18:19.0 at that meet.

But believe it or not, Carmel doesn't hold the county's best time. Who dares to invade the Greyhounds' rarified air? That would be Rachel Nichwitz of Hamilton Southeastern.

Nichwitz, also a senior, had a big day at the Sept. 13 Wildcat Classic, running a 17:58.1. That's only one of two sub-18 minute times in Indiana so far this season. Avon sophomore Taylor Nicholson has the state's best mark, with a 17:53.7 at the Ben Davis Invitational.

The Royals are rated sixth by HoosierXC.com, the new venture by Scott Lidskin, the well-respected retired Westfield coach who guided the Shamrocks to four state championships. (Yes, Carmel is ranked No. 1.) Also in the Top 100 are senior Courtney Pfanstiel, who ran an 18:29.9 at the Hoosier Crossroads Conference meet this past Saturday at Noblesville, and sophomore Sabrina Bippus; she went 18:46.7 at the Wildcat.

Noblesville is ranked 12th, and has a pair of runners in the Top 100. Senior Abby Crouch is having a fine season, racing the Marion Invitational course in 18:54.1. Abi Little, a middle-school standout just a year ago, is adjusting well to high school running. Little went 18:58.4 at the HCC meet.

Fishers is in the rankings at 20th. While the Tigers don't have any runners in the Top 100, they've been able place well in meets by running consistent times. At the HCC meet, Corinne O'Leary clocked in at 19:39.05, and Lorinda Kirk finished in 19:55.94.

Westfield and Guerin Catholic each have a Top 100 runner. The Shamrocks' Devon Leahy completed the Ben Davis Invitational in 18:37.7, while the Golden Eagles' Rachel Yuska clocked in at 18:44.9 at the Sept. 13 All-Catholic Championship, which Guerin hosted.

In the boys race, Carmel is favored. The Greyhounds have seven of the Top 100 runners in IndianaRunner.com's rankings, and are easily No. 1 in HoosierXC's poll.

Junior Ben Veatch has Carmel's best time, finishing that fast Valkyrie meet in 15:08.9. Veatch is second to Brebeuf Jesuit senior Zack Snider, who blitzed to the All-Catholic blue ribbon in 14:58.2, the only sub-15 minute time so far this year.

The Greyhounds have a pair of sub-16 minute runners in Theodore Browning (15:51.9) and Thomas Revard (15:59.2), both of whom also ran their fastest at the Valkyrie.

Mirroring the girls team, Hamilton Southeastern's boys are also ranked sixth. The Royals have five Top 100 runners, with Matt Sraders leading the way. His 15:43.3 performance last Saturday won Sraders the

Freshman Gabe Fendel has been a big help for the Royals, with a 16:03.1 at the conference meet. His is the third-best ninthgrade time this season. Junior Bryce Barnett clocked in at 16:06.4 at the same meet.

Fishers is ranked 11th, with three Top 100 runners. Nick Butler finished the Chanquapin Ridge course in 15:54.2 at the HCC meet, with Trevor Thompson finishing in 16:03.1 and Jake Kleist clocking in at 16:10.9.
